Mr. Phillips next dealt with the cost of distribution and said the Kirby-Phillips report showed the annual operation cost to be \$322,500. Of this amount \$103,500 could be dispensed with the first four years, making the cost \$219,000 for 10,000,000 k.w.h., which was double the quantity of current for which the citizens now paid the company \$504,000 annually.

The first year would be spent in con-struction, when about twenty-five per ent would be handled and in the third year, 100 per cent, or all of the present load would be handled. The rates the first four years would be forty per cent less than the present company rates; an average rate of 6½ cents against 10½ cents.

A Campaign of Slander. The chairman, in introducing Mr. Mc-Lellan, said that all the opposition had brought to light was slander and supposition, not facts. Mr. McLellan had not sought the position of mayor. The Hardware Clerks had asked him to run on their platform. The United Organizations also backed him. The issue was whether the citizens or Power company should run the city.

It was further suggested that similar action be taken by the Halifax board, to whom copies of the proposed amendments had been forwarded.

doned the seeming cold calculation of the assertion by declaring that inefficiency in any form deserved to be stamped out; that in the end the cost of poor business methods was borne by the entire country.

"At the beginning of the war-time period of prosperity thousands of persons deserted the plow-share for the simple life of store-keeper. They had a few hundred dollars and a healthy distaste for work. They made money, not by studying the science of business, or by the exercise of their brain, but simply because they could buy a commodity for such-and-such a price, keep it awhile and make a hundred per cent. on their investment. It is this class of business man who is bound to hit the wall—is already hitting it, in fact. But any man who will devote himself conscientiously to the problems of doing business on a falling market, and correlate his selling and his advertising can escape these consequences," he said.

Must Learn New Methods.

Must Learn New Methods.

Continuing his address, Mr. Mackin-

Continuing his address, Mr. Mackintosh said, in part:

"There never was a time in the commercial history of the United States when it was so urgent that we business people get together and discuss conditions thoroughly and carefully. We have got to learn to do business today on an entirely different basis than for the last quarter of a century and for another quarter of a century to come we will have to do business upon this new basis.

"Colonel Ayres, the government statistician who founded the statistical department for the American Expeditionary Forces over in France and then came back to Washington and investigated price figures running back more than a century, has prepared a very interesting thart which shows us that the extreme peak of high prices over which we have just passed is nothing new in the history of our country. We have heard people talking as if this last burden of high prices were something absolutely unparalleled in the history of this country, while it has happened precisely three times the same way. Three times, prices have gone up 250 per cent. above the starting point. The first time, after a slow and steady climb of thirty years, that peak was reached in 1812. The war of 1812 accelerated the climb of high prices so much that they toppled over and started down.

"Then for twenty-five years that



"Then for twenty-five years that downward path continued until the bottom of the valley was reached. Once more prices started slowly to climb until after a quarter of a century the war of 1861-1864 accelerated the prices and toppled them over. Again they started downward and kept going down for a period of twenty-five years when once more they started up for twenty-five or thirty years until the great war accelerated them enormously and again they toppled over and started down.

"Prosperity and high prices have nothing in common. If high prices meant prosperous country in the world today? If high prices meant prosperity, obviously a country having prices which have reached such high levels would be the most prosperous in the world. In reality, of course high prices have nothing to do with prosperity. The only relation is this: How much in comi modities can a man get for what he earns by his labor? How much will his effort buy him?

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



This move on the part of the shipping firms is the result of a definite break between the longshoremen of Montreal and the shipping federation and grows out of the action of a mass meeting of longshoremen last night, at which the offer of the new wage was rejected. Shipping men said today that they had taken several hundred names of men who will commence work on the new terms when the first ocean boats arrive next week.

TV'O CAUGHT IN FIRE ESCAPE CHASE

Twenty Shots are Fired by Police Rounding Up Alleged Loft Burglars.

(New York Times) Two alleged loft burglars, one of them Nathan ("Waxy") Gordon, were captured after an exciting chase just after daybreak yesterday morning, after they daybreak yesterday morning, after they had stepped from an areaway at 31 East Twenty-seventh street and had brushed past Detectives Lawrence and Ryan of the Safe and Loft Squad. The block was surrounded quickly by uniformed policemen, and twenty or more shots were fired before the men were captured, on the sixth-floor fire escape of the Hotel Senton, 35 East Twenty-seventh street.

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Lawrence and Ryan at first thought the men were watchmen, but when they did not answer a call to come into the street the detectives became suspicious. Then the men caught sight of a private watchman in uniform and took to their heels. They ran back of the building, and for a moment were lost to view. Lawrence and Ryan blew their whistles and fired several shots to bring aid. Soon they had the hotel and the adjoining loft building surrounded. Across the way is Madison Square Garden.

"Waxy" and his companion, the detectives said, re-entered the loft building, but leaving by a basement window they ran through the courtyard of the Hotel Senton and began climbing the hotel's fire escape. The detectives fired several shots, but as heads came poping out of the hotel windows they held their fire while several policemen ascended by the hotel elevator to head off the fugitives. Just as Policeman Dennis Cronin and another policeman reached the top floor of the hotel, a window marked "Fire Escape" opened and the two fugitives climbed in. Cronin covered both and quickly searched them for weapons. They were unarmed, and offered little resistance. Gordon and his partner, who said he was David Teitel, 26 years old, 916 Tiffany street, the Bronx, a salesman, were taken to the East Thirty-fifth street station house Detectives found bolts of silk valued at \$20,000 piled up on the stairs. The largest haul was obtained from Benjamin Heller, on the fourth floor. Harold Love, on the seventh floor, and Samuel Silverstein, on the fourth floor with Heller, appeared as complainants. The prisoners were held without bail for examination today by Magistrate Hatting.
