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THE MEMORANDUM

Mr. Borden has at last been compelled to bring down the information which was asked for by the Liberals. He did it with a very bad grace. When pressed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier he declared that it was confidential. Later he said that it was in the first instance confidential, but that part of it which related to the cost of construction. And then, at a time when Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Graham were not in the house, he produced the memorandum in full.

The letter which was produced last night has been held back for six weeks. It might as well have been given at the end. The Conservatives appear to hold it as an evidence that the Canadians cannot build naval vessels. They apparently rejoice that somebody connected with the British Admiralty has a poor opinion of Canadian ship-builders.

We all know that had the policy of the Liberal government been carried out by Mr. Borden, we would by this time have the beginning of a ship-yard at the port of St. John, where smaller naval vessels could be built, and where eventually we could build Dreadnoughts. It was Mr. Hays who headed back to the great British ship-building company their deposit and declined to give them the contract.

There is nothing in the memorandum submitted to parliament yesterday which in any way changes the situation. Canada ought not to be asked to spend \$35,000,000 for the benefit of the ship-builders of the old country. Mr. Winston Churchill says that a shipyard can be laid down for about \$4,000,000. Canada is rich. At least that is the boast of the Tories. She can better afford to add another \$10,000,000 or \$20,000,000 and establish shipyards of her own than to send the whole of this \$35,000,000 out of the country.

The Borden government has made the naval question a question of party politics. That is not good for the interests of the Empire. The Borden government has broken faith with Australia. This is not good for the interests of the Empire. The Borden government has cast a reflection upon the loyalty and the capacity of the people of Canada. That is not good for either Canada or the Empire. It is time for a change.

LET 'EM ALL COME This discussion of the naval question may not be an unaimed evil. It ought to result in a lowering of the tariff, or at least in a very substantial increase in the British preference. To bring about such a result it will of course be necessary to convert the Conservative party, but they are busily engaged at the present moment in converting themselves. They point out that because it would cost more to manufacture battleships in Canada than in England, therefore the battleships should be manufactured in England, and Canada should send its money to that country. It cannot be long before the Conservatives will perceive that this principle may be applied to many other things besides battleships. It costs a good deal more to manufacture many things in Canada than in England. Why not have them all manufactured in England and imported into Canada? A lowering of the British preference would help to bring them in, or a complete abolition of the tariff on English goods would be still more effective. There is no more reason for refusing to build naval vessels in Canada because they cost more than there is for refusing to manufacture any kind of metal or textile products or any other goods which are protected by a high tariff. The logic of the situation must surely be perfectly clear to every Conservative in the country. This is their opportunity to do for the other British manufacturers what they are so eager to do for the British makers of warships. What will Mr. Borden do about it?

Canadian Collier's takes the ground that the Maritime Provinces "should enjoy a maximum assistance from the government in maintaining the trade with the West Indies." It does not agree with the Maritime importers who want the service taken to the St. Lawrence in summer. The maritime provinces built up this trade and they would suffer if the vessels went to their trade and about do a great deal to build up Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. It must remain in the hands of the Eastern Canadian ports.

Canadian Collier's gives the following reasons in favor of re-distribution. "There is one member of Parliament for every 55,068 people in British Columbia; for every 23,332 in Alberta; for every 49,248 in Saskatchewan; and for every 45,561 in Manitoba; but Ontario needs only 23,340 voters to get an M. P.; Quebec 30,810; New Brunswick 27,068; Nova Scotia 27,335; and Prince Edward Island 23,262." Collier's endorses the statement that it is time for the re-distribution bill at Ottawa, and wants to know if the government is afraid of what Alberta and Saskatchewan might do about the naval policy.

There is a government bill before the legislature of Nova Scotia which involves the principle of co-operation and applies it to the rural telephone. Under this bill three or more farmers may become incorporated as a telephone company, furnish poles and erect them, and secure a subsidy of \$20 a mile from the government. This, it is estimated, will put up the wire. Each subscriber buys his own telephone, and existing companies must give communication with their subscribers for a fixed charge of five cents. It is estimated that the cost to the farmer for his telephone will not be more than \$4 or \$5 per year, and he will be able to talk, not only with his neighbors, but to subscribers in the nearest market town. The working out of this system in Nova Scotia will be watched with a good deal of interest in other provinces.

THE SCHOOL BOARD

Matter of Salary Increases—The Playgrounds—Savings Banks a Success. At the monthly meeting of the board of school trustees last evening the matter of medical inspection in the schools was discussed, and its importance being fully realized by all present, a unanimous vote was passed that a memorial be sent to the provincial house asking that an amendment be made to the act regarding school inspection. A letter from the St. John City and County Teachers' Association was received, suggesting that the assessments for school purposes be increased in order to provide a means for raising the salaries of the teachers.

A letter from A. M. Belding, on behalf of the Playgrounds Association, was placed before the board. The letter asked if it were possible to secure the use of the assembly room in the Centennial school for two months for the use of playground teachers beginning about the end of this month. The object was to train the teachers in various ways for the work of the Playgrounds Association. The request was granted, the expense of the lighting and heating being borne by the association. The department of education wrote stating that it had received the report of the annual training committee, and that a visit would be paid soon by one of the department officers.

There were many expressions of satisfaction at the showing made by the Penny Savings Bank, which had collected \$7,722.02 since it was started in September of last year. The statement showed the following school balances: St. Malachi, \$291.91; Dufferin, \$355.54; Albert, \$325.23; Winter, \$1,669.57. Total, \$2,722.02. The chairman said that in the short time that the bank was in operation it had done excellently, and that he hoped to see it working in all the schools of the city next session. The matter of having the school savings bank in all the other schools would be taken up in due time for such arrangements to be made.

Some trouble had been experienced by the secretary, Gordon Leavitt, in collecting the taxes from the teachers, as the board to which the city was supposed to collect them did not agree with the salary arrangements. A motion was passed which was to be paid by the employees of the school board to be deducted from their salaries.

The secretary's report for February, submitted. It showed 72 irregular attendances, 16 truants; one boy committed to the reformatory. During the month the board of health reported two cases of diphtheria, two cases of scarlet fever and twenty-one cases of measles. MAKES HIS LAST APPEAL FOR HIS CHILDREN OF THE FOREST

Dramatic Scene in Calgary Church as Aged Missionary Gives Final Address

Calgary, Alta., March 11—Stooping under the burden of four score years and six, silver locks drooping to his shoulders, and his countenance creased by deep furrows born of years in the open, Father Lacombe, "Arousal" (The man of the Good-Heart) as the Blackfoot Indians know and call him, stood in St. Mary's Catholic church on Sunday, and with tears of emotion and gratitude streaming down his cheeks, pleaded for funds for his mission among his proteges, the Redmen.

As the Indians worship him, the white men reverence him, the opportunity of hearing the little black-robed priest, who has given his whole life to the Indian, might have been a rare one for the Calgary people, and the large church auditorium was packed to capacity by members of all creeds and nationalities.



TO MAKE A NAVY AN ISSUE BETWEEN THE PARTIES IN THE DOMINIONS

Least Concession Mr. Borden Can Make is to Consult the Canadian People—The Contribution Idea Condemned by All the Overseas Dominions

London, March 11—The Daily News and Leader contains a remarkable article on the construction policy of the Canadian Liberals and Mr. Borden's action. The least concession he can make to the Canadian people is to consult the British Empire before committing them to a constitutional revolution, condemned by all the other dominions of the empire. It is not to be imagined that Canadian Liberals are alone in condemnation of the Borden scheme. The Australian government has repudiated any extension of it to Australia. Hon. Mr. Saner, on behalf of the South African government, has expressed his fear that the movement going on in different parts of the empire was not wholly spontaneous. He criticized Canada's policy of having a minister on the council of defence, and doubted whether South Africa would follow suit.

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



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BORDEN FORCED AT LAST TO YIELD

Quebec Lost Money.

Quebec lost money this season, despite their wonderful record. After such a discouraging season last year it was thought that the game was dead, but the sports are beginning to "pick" up again and the town will probably be on the baseball map next season. There is every prospect that before the season opens, in which case the conditions would be favorable for "one more condition"—Woodstock correspondence.

As far as Houlton is concerned there will be no league team here. Past experience has proven that this town will not support professional baseball. Then again the indifference is still over \$2,000 from last year's dead episode—Houlton Pioneer.

Forty Leagues.

New York, March 10—Schedule making of the nearly two score of recognized baseball leagues of the country is practically complete for the 1913 season with only a few departures from last year's programme.

The first pennant race is to be started as usual by the Pacific Coast league the two major league seasons, but also the last to close on Oct. 20. The big opening day of the year comes April 10, making not only the commencement of the two major league seasons, but also those of the American association, the Southern league and the Texas league.

IMPOSSIBLE TO SELECT MIDDLE WEIGHT CHAMPION WITH DIFFERENT WEIGHTS IN THE VARIOUS BOXING COUNTRIES

It will be a hard matter to determine a world's middle weight champion while the weights in various countries where boxing bouts are held, vary. The middle weight class, one of the most important divisions in the boxing world, is without a champion in America and there is no recognized world's champion. The American weight is, or has been, for the last twenty-five years, placed at 158 pounds ringside, while the European and Australian weight is 160 pounds at three o'clock.

There is no recognized American champion, as there has been a mix-up regarding the same since Stanley Ketchel's death. At that time Billy Papke was considered the next in line, but Billy went to Australia and made a very poor showing, losing to Dave Smith, whom he afterwards defeated, but losing a hard 20-round battle to Johnny Thompson.

The latter made the American limit of 158 ringside and after the contest claimed the title, but he was not given general recognition, probably due to the fact that he was getting that point when he was ready to retire. Since then Mike Gibbons, Frank Klaus, Jimmy Clabby and Jack Dillon, have all piked in bids for it, but McGooty, a Milwaukee boy, who was a heavy weight a short time ago, but who is now back to the 160-pound mark, and who can make 158 if necessary. Moha was going along splendidly, beating Billy Papke and others in the east, but he took it into his head to lay off awhile and he did. He gave Johnny Thompson a beating a week or more ago, and weighed only 160 pounds at the time, and now he is negotiating a match with Ed McGooty for a match over the half marathon route. Jack Dillon is also after both Moha and McGooty and if the three meet there will be some fur flying, for each one is hot after the middle weight honor.

After looking over all we can not help but exclaim that among the real 168-pounders at ringside weight, none are better than Jimmy Clabby.

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CANADA BONDS

OLD COUNTRY

Reasons for Comparative Failure of Recent Issue

BETTER TERMS FOR OTHERS

Market Full of Fours and Fours and a Half - Unusual Commercial Activity in Britain and Balkan War are Other Causes

(Times Special Correspondence.)

London, Feb. 27—Financial circles on this side have read into the various comments made in Canada on the reception given to recent Canadian issues the meaning that there exists in the dominion an opinion that Canadian issues are not being given a fair show. The question of the all-around position is at present one of absorbing interest and there is a feeling on this side that even Canadian more or less expert in the financial concerns of their cities, especially in the growing towns of the west which are incurring large expenditures in improvements, do not fully appreciate the unusual conditions now prevailing.

It is maintained that if they did fully realize the various causes which have led to produce the present money stringency there would be less disposition to become cynical; and while a great deal is to be said fairly, that is the opinion of an authority on this side competent to judge. The reference is not to Canadian issues which may be described as those which even in an easy market would not be readily taken up; it is declared that no explanation is needed in these cases; but with regard to issues like Toronto and Winnipeg, which had such a cold reception, the reason is to be easily found in the fact that the market is chock full of 4 per cent and 5 per cent investments, so that until the process of digestion has made the appetite keen, there will be no change.

Canada is not alone in her grumbling at the sparse response to her appeal for money. Eighty per cent of the New Zealand issue of inclosed stock was left on the underwriters' hands; and the cure which is becoming more obvious every day, is the higher interest must be offered. The alternative is to hold back the issues until the European and general situation becomes clearer; and while a great deal is to be said for this view, it is, on the other hand, realized in many quarters, with such a world-wide demand for money, which is likely to continue, that it would be unwise to lose what chance Canada has for getting money at the present time.

The question is asked, if China is prepared to pay 4 1/2 per cent, how can Canadian towns and cities expect to attract the investor at a lower rate?

Other Causes

There are further causes operating to the disadvantage of Canadian issues. The first is the unusual commercial activity in Great Britain. Money which in other years was looking for outside investment through the agency of bond brokers, is now profitably occupied in British undertakings. It is by no means a new thing for investors approached on the question of investment in Canadian issues to point to the fact that absolutely first-class English stocks can be purchased to produce not 4 per cent, but up to 6 per cent. The effect of this is, of course, obvious. So long as investments can be secured here to produce such returns, Canada will pipe to the 4 1/2 per cent time in vain.

The second cause is the Balkan war, and this is advanced as an even more potent reason than when the war broke out. A most depressing factor is the unexpected prolongation of the war, which is hindering the sowing of the spring crops over a large area. Only now it is fully realized how severe has been the drain of this war. It operates not only in Threadneedle street, but on the boulevards of Europe, whose operations are, of course, reflected in the English money market. So intimately are the financial systems of the world connected that a strain at one point is felt over the whole system. While, therefore, said my adviser, there is no disposition in financial circles here to treat Canadian issues harshly, there is, on the other hand, no doubt that many financial advisers at the present time as recommending their clients not to invest in Canadian securities for the reason that they can get better returns in other investments.

If the question is asked why reputable investment firms here encourage the flotation of Canadian issues, knowing as they do that the result will probably not be satisfactory, the reply is, once given, that it is a matter of business and earning a commission; and further, even though a big percentage of such issues may be left hanging hands, they are usually able to find banking houses and insurance companies and other investment corporations who are willing to purchase the balance at a substantial discount. This, however, is not healthy; and the inevitable result of an accumulation of unnumbered balances is two-fold. Future issues will stand a

worse chance; unnumbered balances will go at a still lower discount.

Western Mayor Investigates

In conversation with M. W. Morton, mayor of Prince Albert, your correspondent was informed that it has been an extremely interesting experience for him to come here and witness the effects of the present extreme stringency of the money market. Mr. Morton came in company with Alderman Woodward in connection with the financial business of Prince Albert. He found that the unusual commercial activity, and the widespread demand for money had overtaken the capacity of the British investor. He was informed it was uncertain how long this unusual condition would prevail, but he was advised that the present time was very inopportune to make an issue.

What happened in the case of Mayor Morton must happen in the case of many other Canadians occupying prominent positions in connection with the financing of their cities who can take the time to come

here and study conditions. It need not be emphasized that the time has passed when it was excusable for Canadian towns and cities to leave their financial policy in the hands of those who were not well versed in the complicated business of finance. But there is on this side a growing feeling that it is desirable to emphasize the advisability of making issues only at such times as are considered opportune by Canadians really expert in world finance, acting in cooperation with their London advisers. A situation which is daily growing more difficult, and which carries in its train effects which can not now be fully measured, might be considerably eased if that advice were generally followed.
