GO INTO CRATER DEPTHS

Perilous Journey Into Heart of Vesuvius

DESCEND 1000 FEET

Fearful Trip of Nine Hours by Professor and His Assistant—Lowered by Great Ropes Into Terrifying Abyss Amid Noxious Gases

London, May 18.—The Chronicle's Milan correspondent sends the following dispatch:

"Professor Mallada of the Royal Observatory at Mount Vesuvius accomplished yesterday the extraordinary feat of descending the depths of the crater of the volcano. Before the awful eruption of six years ago, numerous attempts have been made by scientific adventurers to penetrate the funnel of Vesuvius, but in vain, owing partly to the precipitous nature of the slopes of the interior, but principally because of the dense deadly gases.

The actual diameter of the crater is about 300 yards. Professor Mallada, accompanied by an able young expert named Narvaso, attached to the observatory, started at eight in the morning, taking scientific instruments for observation purposes, photographic cameras, a couple stout ropes, one 350 feet and the other 300 feet in length.

Using the long rope for the first part of the descent, they were lowered inside the volcano to a depth of 300 feet, till they landed on some strata of lava, overhanging another horrid abyss 150 feet lower down. After exploring this perilous slope of 90 degrees and jagged masses of petrified lava, they found the means to fix the second rope, whereby they were able to reach an enormous fissure created some years ago, when the volcano was suddenly and completely extinguished.

The intrepid explorers discovered that this huge fissure extends to the very bottom of the crater, which was finally reached at a depth of 1,000 feet. There they remained a couple of hours.

"Professor Mallada was able to take a number of instantaneous pictures of avalanches and showers of red hot ashes, which were taking place at the time in various parts of the crater.

"Despite the precautions taken, the explorers were at times almost overcome by the suffocating gases.

BEATEN TORY IN QUEBEC IS STARTING SUIT

Bruchesi Says Langlois Caused Hurtful Pamphlet to Be Circulated

LAST MINUTE NOMINATION

Rumor Makers Busy Again With Plans of Sir Lomer Gouin—Yesterday's Report is Denied by Him—Devlin Elected in Temiskamingue

(Canadian Press)

Montreal, May 18.—Charles Bruchesi, defeated Conservative candidate and one of the three who lost their deposits in the four-cornered struggle which resulted in Adolphe Langlois' return to the legislature by an overwhelming majority, has entered action for \$10,000 against Mendosa Langlois, another of the victors, contending that he caused to be published a pamphlet circulated just before the election in which the plaintiff's candidature was referred to as illegal and null, thus causing him to lose many votes.

Mr. Bruchesi, who is a brother of the archbishop, was a last minute candidate, obtaining the final signature to his nomination just three minutes before the time of receiving them had elapsed.

Quebec, May 18.—It was rumored today at the close of the first cabinet council held since the elections, that the premier, Sir Lomer Gouin, would surrender his seat in St. John's to Hon. J. E. Cron minister of agriculture, who was not elected.

While the ministers were all non-committal, it is understood that this will be the programme, though Hon. C. R. Devlin may resign one of his seats to the defeat of a minister.

The premier denies a report that he is to enter federal politics by resigning his seat in the legislature to replace Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He also denies that he contemplates the creation of a ministry of public instruction.

THEY BACK UP COBB

Man Assaulted by Player Was Crippled Pressman—Detroit President Takes No Part

(Canadian Press)

Boston, May 18.—A deep sleep, superinduced by opiates, shut out a world of agonies from the troubled mind of Clarence V. T. Richeson, during the earlier hours of today.

The iron will of the former clergyman, who awaits death by electrocution next week, for the murder of Ava Linnell, gave way last night. The collapse came while the condemned man was alternately beseeching his counsel to have his body interred beside that of his mother in Virginia, and hysterically raving over the fanciful preservation of the two guards forming his death watch.

Richeson learned definitely, for the first time, yesterday, that he must meet death by electrocution. Through the day he bore himself with much fortitude. Little by little, the awful import of the decision he had heard, began to impress itself upon him. Some one of those who entered the death chamber, imparted to the prisoner the fact that his father did not care to have his body taken to Virginia for burial.

As the day wore on, other incidents occurred to distract and disturb the condemned man. The discussion by Richeson, his counsel and spiritual advisers, directed upon the execution, and the prisoner begged both Rev. Herbert S. Johnson, his chosen adviser, to take the chair with him.

Richeson also expressed a wish that Attorney Morse should be present during the last few minutes and further exacted a promise that either one or other of the ministers would remain constantly with him until he died.

Frederick Has Report About the Valley Railway Bonds—News of Capital

Frederick, N. B., May 18.—The effort made in London to float a new issue of \$273,250 of St. John & Quebec Railway four per cent debentures endorsed by the government has thus far been unsuccessful. They were offered at 98 1/2, but British investors evidently consider the rate of interest too low, and consequently the bonds are still in the hands of the underwriters. The hitch which has occurred in regard to negotiating the Valley railway bonds probably accounts for uncertainty in regard to date of provincial elections.

TAFT HITS HARDEST BLOW YET

Tells Some Things Plainly in Campaign Speech in Ohio

REASONS FOR OPPOSITION

Why He Lost Support of Brown and Why Dan Hanna is Against Him—President is Tired of Being Lied About

(Canadian Press)

Toledo, O., May 18.—I've got tired being lied about and held up to the country as having violated every rule of conduct when I am not conscious that I have violated any," shouted President Taft late last night, in the course of a speech to a crowd that filled every available seat and blocked the aisles of the Toledo auditorium.

Mr. Taft's speech was one of the most bitter and one of the most plain-spoken that he has made since he began to answer the charges of Colonel Roosevelt and to use hot shot of his own.

The president bluntly charged that Walter Brown of Toledo, one of the Roosevelt leaders here, had ceased to be a Taft supporter, because the president refused to accept his recommendation for judicial appointments.

He declared that the opposition to him on the part of Dan Hanna of Cleveland came as a consequence of indictments against Mr. Hanna by the Taft department of justice.

Mr. Taft called the tariff views of Mr. Roosevelt "ridiculous and labeled his scheme for a tariff that would make a division of profits between the laborer and the employer as "catch penny phrases."

TRAINS IN COLLISION NEAR WOODSTOCK; NONE SERIOUSLY HURT

Struck Head-on, but One Was Slightly Damaged at Time—Track Clear Again

Woodstock, N. B., May 18.—(Special)—A head-on collision occurred last night between a north-bound and south-bound freight train. The accident was at Smith's Crossing, a mile below town. Several cars were derailed, but no one was hurt.

MORE THAN 3000 IN EXCESS OF LAST YEAR

C. P. R. Passenger Figures For Last Winter Season Very Large

(Special to Times.)

The passenger figures for the C. P. R. during the season which has closed reached a total of 69,530. Compared with the previous season when 62,300 were carried this shows an increase of 3,230. The total includes only the passengers arriving by steamer and going through to the west, or coming from the west to take ship here and does not include the large number of local passengers from or for points in the maritime provinces who do not show on the train returns.

The statement shows a substantial growth in the traffic and it is worthy of note that in handling this great number of passengers, in addition to all the regular traffic, there was not an accident of any kind to a single passenger reported.

PEOPLE WERE KEPT AWAY FROM KING

Something Unusual in England and There is Disappointment at Aldershot

London, May 18.—There was considerable dissatisfaction at Aldershot yesterday over the prohibition by the military officials that the public should not come close to the range of their Majesties, who were put in a strenuous day at the manoeuvres.

CORONER'S JURY SAYS MURDER

Montreal, May 18.—That Edward Gordon Horan, foreman for the Standard Construction Company of St. Anne De Bellevue, who was found dead with his skull fractured in three places on May 7 was murdered by some person or persons unknown was the verdict of a coroner's jury yesterday afternoon. Horan's body was found near the railway track and a gin bottle lay close to him. At first it was thought he had been struck by a train.

Horan had been in charge of a gang of foremen. Yesterday, Armand Lavigne, who lives near the tracks, testified that on the afternoon Horan met his death he had heard voices in angry altercation, and later, between ten and eleven o'clock at night, he was disturbed by a quarrel going on near the tracks. His son recognized one of the voices as Horan's, while the others were those of foremen.

Other witnesses had testified that there had been trouble previously between Horan and his men, while those who brought the news to Horan's family said that they had been living in fear of an assault upon him.

PRINCE OF WALES WILL NOT TAKE PART

Toulon, France, May 18.—It is announced that on account of mourning in the British court for King Frederick of Denmark, the Prince of Wales will not take part in the evolutions of the French fleet in the Mediterranean next week.

THE OLD HOME IS CALLING

Sheaves of Letters From Our People Abroad

MANY WOULD RETURN

Back-to-New-Brunswick Movement Shows Evidence of Being Great Success and Particularly in Outlook of Many Returning Here to Stay

(Special to Times.)

The exile's lot is not a happy one is the first general impression gained from glancing over the correspondence which has been received by the secretary of the board of trade in connection with the plans for the Back to New Brunswick movement. Of the vast number who have written from all parts of the continent there are few who do not show their regret that their fortune has conspired to live elsewhere. To those who have not done as well in other places as they might here, it is but natural that the old home should look good but the others who have succeeded and they are the vast majority, proportionately, readily admit that material prosperity does not entirely compensate for their exile from their old haunts and their old friends.

One and all hail with hearty satisfaction the news of the awakening of the city and province and of the great developments which are coming. If they stand the share in the new prosperity of the province they are glad that the others at home will. But in many of the letters there is a plaintive note as they ask "Why did it not come sooner; why did not the new prosperity come in time for us to have made it unnecessary to leave our homes to seek a living?"

Now that these are passing the winter months many of them announce their intention of returning as soon as they can, others say they will be here for the old home week to look the situation over and others tell of new ties which bind them to their distant homes with regret. They want to come back but cannot see their way clear to do so.

The correspondence so far has been distinguished by its practical nature. Those who are coming back for a holiday trip have not found it necessary to write for much information as this has been spread broadcast, but those who are planning to come back to stay are writing to learn more definitely of the prospects for themselves and to find where they could fit in. Men of all trades and professions, from laborers to financiers have written for information regarding openings here and for details regarding the present cost of living, etc. To all these, personal letters have been sent giving the information they want.

From the great sheaves of letters received asking for openings for employment a letter was sent to the local employers asking for a statement of the number of men they could employ and the class of employment desired. The replies showed a scarcity of labor both skilled and unskilled.

The letters from the employers told of openings for laborers at many kinds of work, for millmen, woodworkers, brick-makers, brick layers, stone cutters, machinists, boiler-makers, black-smiths, pattern makers, nail makers, tinsmiths, metal workers, furnace men, tinamits, carpenters, builders and workers in many other lines ranging from the demand for unskilled labor to a request for a pen and ink artist. This information is filed and as requests for work are received the secretary is able to give definite opportunities for work of the kind to which the applicant is accustomed.

From the great sheaves of letters that have been received it is easy to see that the Back to New Brunswick week is going to be a great success and, what is even more important, that it is going to have lasting results of a most satisfactory character.

DUKE OF SUTHERLAND GIVES FAMOUS TITLE TO CANADIAN ESTATE

**La MARQUISE de FONTENOY**  
 Irish Peer's Gallant Effort to Save Servant From Drowning—A Ghost in Court Case

That genuine Irish peer, Lord Dunsany, who has just added another laurel to his gallant record by plunging into the Serpentine Lake in Hyde Park, and repeatedly diving in the effort to save the life of a servant, and not giving up the attempt until thoroughly exhausted, is the head of the well-known house of Fontenoy, which settled in Ireland prior to the Norman Conquest. Hence, my allusion to him as being genuinely Irish.

A soldier by profession, he served throughout the war in the ranks of a lieutenant in the Coldstream Guards, being present at Belmont, Graysan, Modder River and Magersfontein, and in thirty-four years old, married, in 1904, Lady Beatrice Child Villiers, youngest daughter of the seventh Earl Jersey, the son of his little six year old boy, Lord Dunsany is the eighteenth holder of the peerage which was created by Henry VI.

Besides being a son of Mars, Lord Dunsany is an author of some note. Some of the titles are "The Gods of Paganism," "Time and the Gods," and "A Dreamer." He has also written a play production entitled "The Glittering Gate," which was described by a trenchant critic as "strange and horrible."

**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**EMERGENCY SALAD.**  
 Delicious salads may be made from canned vegetables of choice quality such as green, wax or kidney beans, beets, asparagus, French peas or spinach. Either a French or cooked dressing may be used and the vegetable should be removed from the can and well chilled before serving.

**BARRIQUED HAM.**  
 Cut rather thick slices of cold boiled ham, laying them in a frying pan. Cook on both sides until they begin to crisp at the edges and then put on a hot dish. Add to the fat in the pan four tablespoons of vinegar, a salt spoon of English mustard, a tablespoon of white sugar and a few dashes of black pepper. Boil up once, pour over ham, let it stand covered for couple of minutes and send to table.

**TOMATO AND CORN SALAD.**  
 Prepare large, firm tomatoes by paring carefully and extracting three quarters of the pulp, leaving enough to make the "cup." Have at hand enough cold boiled corn to fill the excavated tomatoes, and set the filled tomatoes in refrigerator until you are ready to serve them. Lay upon crisp lettuce or starch small stalks of endive upright in the corn after dipping the endive in mayonnaise.

WHICHEVER way the wind doth blow,  
 Some heart is glad to have it so;

"Yes," said my neighbor, "I've been just as blue as can be all day. Anything do matter? Oh, no. It's just the weather. I'm always blue when it rains like this for two or three days in succession. I'll be all right when the sun comes out, but just now I'm so depressed I don't know what to do. That's the way with all our family. My sister figs herself almost sick if we have two or three bad days, and my mother was just so. We are all very sensitive to weather."

My neighbor concluded this speech with an air of self-approval as unmistakable as if he had made a great discovery. What possible cause for pride is there to be found in the fact that one is upset by such a trifle as a little rain?

And yet I know how many people who are similarly depressed and thrown off their poise by the accident of bad weather. I think they are both unfortunate and foolish. Don't you?

Unfortunately, because bad weather must come; "some days must be dark and dreary," and it is too bad to add that cause for depression to the innumerable legitimate causes that crowd the ordinary life. Foolish, because such a tendency can be controlled.

Come a second rainy, drizzly day right on the heels of the first rainy drizzly day, (I do not think many people mind one rainy day. It is only after a period of sunshine, it may even have a restful charm, it is the second successive bad day that brings the blues) and you are dismayed. I am sorry it is raining. Rainy weather always makes me so blue," and straightway you justify your expectations of yourself by feeling blue.

Just as people who expect to be seasick and who go down into stuffy cabins and make all the odious preparations usually are seasick.

But suppose you did not allow yourself to think anything about the matter beyond the cheerful thought that it is likely to clear soon, and that anyhow the rain is doing the crops and the flowers much good. Suppose you brought up all the cheerful things you had in your mind treasury; said something unusually pleasant to someone; hummed a little song about your work and amused yourself by trying to see how well and how swiftly you could do that work; and then, when your tasks were done, suppose you read some especially absorbing book; made a call on some particularly interesting person or even went out for a splendidly invigorating walk right in the rain, do you think you could be very long? Try it sometime. Who knows but that the very next rainy day will be able to greet and dispel the gloom with our optimistic philosophy.

Richard McBride that one of the objects of his visit to London is to arrange for a new building for the agent-general of that province, is assumed in Canadian circles here to resolve some of the doubts which have been expressed as to the extent to which the Canadian provinces will participate in the proposed dominion government building.

"An important subject to be taken up" he said, "is the agent-general's office in London. Its business has increased so much a tremendous rate and so great are the possibilities of the future that the question of increasing its efficiency must be disposed of without any delay. Formerly I have only considered it expedient to provide more central quarters, but it lately has struck me that the time has come when British Columbia might go so far as to erect a building of its own. Ontario has already set the example."

"A building worthy of the province and a place where its resources can be displayed and explained as well as a meeting place for British Columbians visiting London, will certainly be provided if it is certain that such a step can be shown to be urgent, and in the interests of the province. It is being urged to do with the proposal of the dominion government to have more central London offices. In some quarters it is felt that the best interests of the different provinces would not be met by having their administration directed from one building. They say that what might be good for Australia, would probably not be wise for the dominion. Certain it is that at present Canada is represented by one or the other of its provinces in the position decided to be the best for its purpose. British Columbia, for instance, taps the financial part of the "city." Ontario has the Dominion House, and the large number of farmers who come to Covent Garden and other markets. It is held with good reason that if all the provinces were combined in one building, public attention, attracted by having offices in various positions, must necessarily be restricted. British investments in his province and the prices asked for these were examined by the most respectable and reliable London. Some disappointment has been expressed because a certain lumber concern failed to measure up to all the statements which I believe led to its organization here. This is a very regrettable incident. The world knows that we have perhaps the most extensive and valuable timber reserves in existence, and it has been most clearly demonstrated that with proper management, the business can be made to pay handsomely. Let it be understood that we do not want a single dollar unless it is invested on the right lines."

**ENGLAND IS MAKING READY AS IF FOR WAR**

(Continued from page 1.)

The public confidence is threatened to be shattered by extravagant exploitations by a group of land boomers who are now trying by every trick to sell Canadian townships and farm lands here. These exploiters charge often tenfold the proper value and trade on the ignorance of the British public. Their abundant advertisements and absurd promises have been so widely answered that, encouraged by success, they are now, I understand, planning campaigns on a still larger scale. Some of these schemes are bound to meet disaster upon the great body of sound Canadian propositions. Canadians here urge Lord Strathcona to take the initiative by publicly branding some of the worst as unworthy of English support. Canadians in London urge this step merely for the sake of protection of English funds but also that the reaction of these unchecked folly may not dull Canadian prestige here.

Public interest in the Titanic committee investigation increases daily. When the committee was first appointed, many, particularly the American community here, declared that Lord Mersey's former close association with great shipping firms would lead him to gloss over all fault and generally whitewash all concerned. Each day has proved the complete futility of this fear and has demonstrated the greater efficiency of the English skilled investigation over the amateur Washington inquiry. It is impossible to deny that much of the evidence has caused a very painful impression here. While traditional custom prevents the writer making personal prejudgements of individuals concerned during the inquiry privately men are frankly uttering caustic condemnation.

**CHANGE IN THE CALENDAR TO BE CONSIDERED**

Rev. Dr. Raymond Brings Home News of Plan Proposed by Sir Sanford Fleming

After having attended the sessions of the Royal Society in Ottawa, Rev. Dr. W. O. Raymond returned to the city at noon today. The meeting was very representative, he said, and well attended. Some of the most learned scholars and scientists were present, and every province was represented, while the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and Princess Patricia honored the meeting with their presence at the lecture given by Colonel Lowther. The other maritime province delegates were Doctor Bailey of Fredericton, and Doctor McKay of Halifax.

Several recommendations were passed to be brought before the dominion government for consideration. Amongst these might be mentioned a matter brought forward by Sir Sanford Fleming to have an amendment made in the calendar so that New Year's Day would stand by itself, there would be an extra month between July and August, each month would consist of four weeks, and every day would fall on the same date in succeeding years.

**ACCUSED BARON PLEADS**

Rome, May 18—The trial of Baron Vincenzo Paterno, a former cavalry lieutenant in the Italian army, was continued today in Camera. The public were excluded. In answer to the charge that he had strangled, stabbed and then shot Princess Giulia Trivigi Sant'Elia, lady in waiting to Queen Helma, and afterwards attempted to commit suicide, Paterno declared that the crime originated from his jealousy. He said he had intended to commit suicide, but in a moment of aberration unconsciously killed the princess.

**FISH AT NORTHPORT.**

Sackville Post.—The Report comes from Northport, N. S., that the herring catch this year is beyond all records. For the past few weeks the waters along the shore have been teeming with fish and the tacks have made a rich haul. Over 5,000 fish have already been prepared for market. The only complaint heard from fishermen is to the effect that the nets were too full and the catch too large.

**MEN AND WOMEN**

Lumbermen Optimistic

Rangor Commercial-Lumber markets of the state report a spirit of optimism throughout the trade. Interviews with prominent lumber dealers disclose the fact that the demand for all kinds of lumber is really in excess of the supply. Prices in the lumber market were not yet firmly established for the coming season, according to some dealers, but were certain to be equally as firm as last year's and likely to be higher. Reports from outlying districts show that the ice in many of the rivers and streams has not yet broken up, and consequently any correct estimate of the quantity of raw lumber that will come down to the mills is impossible. It is known beyond dispute, however, that the cut will be in excess of last year's. Maine is experiencing this year no competition from southern or western lumber markets beyond what has been usual, and in fact most of the varieties of lumber that come into the Boston market from these sources are such as are not obtainable in Maine. Traffic in pulp wood is not at present lively, and the price per cord remains practically unchanged.





ANNIVERSARY OF THE LOCAL C. M. B. A. TO BE NEXT WEEK

The twenty-second birthday of Branch 134, C. M. B. A., will be observed on Tuesday evening next, and will mark an important epoch in the history of the work of this order in St. John, a work of charity, benevolence and fraternalism. It was in April, 1890, that several bright young men, interested in the advancement of their own welfare, and the welfare of fellow-beings, assembled in the law office of J. L. Carleton, now Judge Carleton, and after having, through the merits of the various fraternal societies, decided to have established in this city a branch of the C. M. B. A. Immediately were begun negotiations which terminated in the successful launching of Branch 134 in St. John's Hall, May 21, with a charter roll of twenty-three members. T. P. Tansy, of Montreal, initiated the branch. Rapidly and encouragingly the numbers increased, and the ranks soon swelled to such proportions that the association was compelled to remove from its temporary quarters in the Furlong building to the commodious and comfortable suite in Union street with the register showing a membership of 360.

Of those assembled in that evening twenty-two years ago there are still taking an active interest in the promotion of the association the following—Grand deputy, R. J. Walsh; past grand deputy, Hon. J. L. Carleton; Thos. Kichham, Hon. R. J. Ritchie, Thomas Gorman, P. Toke, and M. Ryan. These members, with the late P. J. O'Keefe, took prominent hold in the work of the launching of the association, and they were instrumental in its building, expansion and prosperity in St. John. Mr. O'Keefe opened negotiations with the supreme officers of the order and was successful in the establishment of a branch in Carleton, Branch 133, which will also celebrate its twenty-second anniversary next week.

The first president of the city branch was Hon. J. L. Carleton, and since that time there have been nine others—Thos. Gorman, P. Toke, Thos. Kichham, M. D. Sweeney, Hon. J. Ritchie, Richard O'Brien, Joseph Harrington, Chas. P. O'Neil, and Richard J. Walsh, the present incumbent, who was recently honored with the appointment of grand deputy in succession to Mr. Kichham, who, owing to ill health at the time had been compelled to retire after a faithful period of service. Since the establishment of the branch in the city others have been instituted here and the membership has steadily grown so that those who survive are well pleased with the result of their efforts of more than a score of years ago. In the year following the institution of the city branch and that on the west side, Branch 184 was launched in Fairville and it also has shown a prosperous growth, while the latest addition to the ranks, Branch 482 in North End, has really amazed those who have noted the rapid strides with which it has scaled the ladder, though still actually in its infancy. More than 700 names have been enrolled with Branch 134 in this city, and from this it can readily be seen that much good has been accomplished for the members and the widows left penniless. In other ways the branch has established an enviable name for itself, and amongst these might easily be mentioned the excellent course of lectures given during the winter months. Already the course of lectures for next winter has been well arranged for.

GERMAN WAR WESSEL CALLS

The Bremen Unexpectedly Sails Into St. John Harbor—Here Till Tuesday

Unannounced, and without any formalities, the big three funnelled German cruiser Bremen, with Commander Seeburn in command, steamed up the harbor between seven and eight o'clock this morning and anchored in the stream, just off Reed's Point. People in the vicinity wondered what the cruiser, flying the German colors, was doing in port, but she had only dropped in to pay a visit while on a regular tour of American ports. Between eleven and twelve o'clock Mayor Frink, Percy W. Thomson, acting German consul here, and Councilor Robert Thomson is absent from the city; Alfred Porter and Collector of Customs Dunn went out to the cruiser in the tug Neptune to pay an official visit to the commander and staff. They were shown about the ship, and came ashore about one o'clock. As they were leaving the ship a salute of seven guns was fired. The Bremen is one of the best German mander Seeburn and his staff were to pay an official visit to Mayor Frink at City Hall. After the visit they were to be shown about the city. On Monday the German consul, who is expected to arrive in the city today, will pay an official visit to the ship.

The Bremen is one of the best German cruisers afloat, and is fitted out with all modern appliances. She carries a large crew of officers and men. Before coming here she was stationed at Newport, R. I., for a few days, and called at several ports on the way down. She will remain in port until Tuesday, when she will leave for Philadelphia to take part in a naval celebration there. While in port she will be open to inspection for several hours each day, and it is expected that a large number will go on board.

PARENTS AND DOCTORS EQUALLY RESPONSIBLE

Births Must be Recorded—Better Results Follow Paragraph in The Times

Writing to the registrar of vital statistics the other day, a mother, after explaining her neglect to record the birth of her child, said that "she considered it was the duty of the physician in attendance to do this, or, if should be incumbent on the parents to have with them the parents' copies of the blank forms which are required to be filled in with the particulars called for by the registration act."

It should be borne in mind that under the act both parents and physicians are individually responsible for neglect or failure to make returns. Provision, however, is made in the law that in case the report has been made by any one of such persons the other person shall not be liable. The value and importance of records of this kind to the ruling generation cannot be overestimated, and the mutual understanding between physicians and their patients in the matter of making these reports.

TODAY'S POLICE COURT

In the police court this morning three prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 or thirty days in jail, and two others were remanded on like charges. Two men, arrested on a charge of fighting together in King Square were remanded. Policeman Pitt and T. J. Driscoll gave evidence. The prisoners said they were only having a friendly boxing match when the police came along and arrested them. One of the complainants sported a nice black eye in the court, and his Honor remarked that it did not look as though the bout was very friendly. John E. Jones, arrested on Wednesday last on charge of maliciously breaking a window in the I. O. G. T. ticket office in King street was brought into court and fined \$20 or two months in jail. Jones told the court that he had broken the window during a "temporary freak," caused by business reverses and worry. He said that he was passing through the city on his way to Nova Scotia and would leave town immediately. The damage done amounted to \$11.33 and he will be allowed to go when he pays for the damage. James A. Wilcox was brought into court and further remanded. Three remanded prisoners, charged with drunkenness, were brought into court and dealt with. Two were again remanded and one was fined \$4 or ten days in jail. His Honor was to have given judgment in the case of John Chebroun, charged with a violation of the liquor license act, this morning, but the matter was allowed to stand over until Monday morning.
