The applicant must make personal selection, must own free and clear sufficient furni-ture, live stock and farm implements to begin active cultivation, and in addition he must have enough money to pay 10 per cent. of the purchase price of the land selected, as well as sufficient to main-tain his family for one year. The \$2,000 loan will be added to the purchase price of the land, but the railway company will expend it for the erection of a house, barn, fencing and other essentials, as well as for the cultivation and cropping of at least fifty acres. The company will em-play the farmers and their families and pay them current rates for the work done. The proposition rings clear, and it will no doubt bring in many tenant farmers. In-cidentally, the propaganda will serve as an example for American roads, many of which are now doing good work in point-ing out the natural advantages possessed by almost every section of our own coun-try. was necessary for the full equipment of twenty-five farms of 160 acres each, which were to be used towards demonstrating the advantages of mixed farming in Western Canada.

This scheme is the logical outcome of the ready-made farms for the Britishers and the more recent colonization project by which the company propose to loan to American farmers a sum of half a mil-lion dollars, in sums of \$2,000 each for the improvement of farms which they pur-chase from the C. P. R. under certain conditions.

chase from the C. P. R. under certain conditions. When the Canadian Pacific Railway Company announced its ready-made farms in the irrigation district of the west, it recognized this handicap by offering to place the settlers not only on a ready-made farm, but in the ready-made houses, with barns, to be paid for in instalments running over a series of years. This step proved highly successful. The company in this instance will se-lect from its unsold land in districts to be determined upon in Manitoba, Sas-katchewan and Alberta sufficient land for the purpose. These farms will be fenced and on each there will be provided a suitable dwelling, stable, granary, small dairy, well, and if considered desirable, a silo, as well as the requisite farming im-plements for the growth of such wheat, oats, root crops and forage as may be deemed necessary for the purpose to be attained. The farm will also be stocked with the best of high grade cattle, pigs, chickens, etc., so that the settler may be placed on a profit paying basis from the first. The crop of every acre will be planned by the expert, and only when the farmer has demonstrated his ability to properly handle the enterprise, will be be permit-ted to purchase the farm, with its build-ings and stock, at the cost price to the company, with the privilege of paying in six or eight equal instalments, charging the usual rate of interest. If these twenty-five farms succeed, the policy will be extended, and by this means the C. P. R. is endeavoring to solve a purely economic problem in offering to the back to the land man the one chance that philanthropists have been demanding for many years. be first.






