Young Sailor Hangs Half Hour in Mid Air; His Hand Jammed in Block

Boston, May 21-While scores of dock workers and others looked on in rror, Jack Burke, 19 years old, able seaman on the Shipping Board West Calumb, and youngest member of the crew, hung suspended in mid-air for nearly half an hour with his left hand tightly wedged in on the boom over No. 3 hatch.

a block on the boom over No. 3 h.tch. The young man, suffering intense pain, gamely kept his nerve and did not attempt to wrench himself free. To have done so would have sent him hurling to the deck 25 feet below, which would have meant death. The block had become jammed and Burke was ordered up to clear it. While he was aloft the winch was started in some unexplained manner, and the boy's hand was caught. He shouted and his cries attracted some of his fellow seamen, who shut off the power. Men on the pier urged him not to let go, and despite the agonizing pain of his crushed hand, he did not falter. Twenty members of the crew succeeded after nearly half an hour in bringing the injured lad to the deck by means of ropes. Someone meantime had telephoned the Hospital, and an ambulance was waiting. Burke was rushed to the Marine Hospital in Chelsea. It was learned that the boy's thumb and forefinger were so badly injured that they were am-putated. It was hoped that the hand could be saved.
