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MINUTES OF THE SECOND ANNUAL MEETING
— OF THE —
BLOOR STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH
YEAR 1889.

PURSUANT to notice duly given on the two previous Sabbaths, the Second Annual Congregational Meeting of the Bloor Street Presbyterian Church was held on Wednesday, the 15th day of January, 1890, in the lecture-room of the Church, the Rev. W. G. Wallace, pastor of the congregation, presiding. Mr. William Davidson was appointed Secretary. The meeting was opened with devotional exercises.

The minutes of the Annual Congregational Meeting, held January 16, 1889, were read and confirmed.

Mr. G. C. Robb, Clerk of Session, presented the statement of the Session.

The Secretary presented the report of the Managers. The Treasurer (Mr. Hunter) being absent through illness, the Secretary read the Treasurer's financial statement.

On motion of Mr. Thos. McCracken, seconded by Rev. Dr. Gregg, the Managers' report and Treasurer's statement were received and adopted.

It was then moved by Rev. Dr. Gregg, seconded by Mr. J. L. Blaikie, that the thanks of the congregation are due and hereby given to the Managers for the faithful and efficient discharge of the onerous duties cast upon them.—*Carried.*

The Chairman named Mr. W. S. Thompson and Mr. J. Duncan scrutineers in the election of Managers. The election of Managers to fill the place of the retiring Managers was then proceeded with.

Nominations having been made and a ballot taken, the scrutineers reported that Mr. Wm. Davidson, Mr. R. J. Hunter and Mr. M. Langmuir had received the highest votes, and the Chairman declared them duly elected.

Mr. W. J. McMaster, one of the Managers, having been called to the office of Elder in the congregation, tendered his resignation as a Manager, which was accepted.

The Chairman having called for nominations of persons to fill the vacancy in the Board of Management, occasioned by Mr. McMaster's resignation, and a ballot having been taken, the scrutineers reported that Mr. Andrew Muirhead had the greatest number of votes. The Chairman declared Mr. Muirhead elected to fill the office rendered vacant by Mr. McMaster's resignation.

It was moved by Mr. McCracken, seconded by Mr. G. Crane, that Mr. Donald and Mr. Jas. McIntosh be appointed Auditors of the year 1890.—*Carried.*

The Report of the Treasurer of the amounts contributed through the white envelopes to the revenue of the congregation was presented, taken as read, and directed to be printed with the Annual Report.

Mr. G. C. Robb, presented the report of the Missionary Committee. On motion of Mr. Robb, seconded by Mr. Davidson, the report was received and adopted.

It was then moved by Mr. Geo. Crane, seconded by Mr. John Harvie, "That the Missionary Committee for the year 1890, consist (in addition to the members of Session) of Messrs. A. Milne, Jas. Fraser, D'Arcy Fenton, A. Elliott, Jas. McMaster, John Aitken, J. Duncan, James Dickson and Thos. Smylie."—*Carried.*

Mr. Fotheringham presented the report of the Sabbath School, which on motion of Mr. Fotheringham, seconded by Dr. MacLaren, was received and adopted.

Mr. Thos. McCracken presented the report of the Building Committee. On motion of Mr. McCracken, seconded by Mr. Harvie, the report was adopted.

Mr. Fotheringham moved, seconded by Mr. W. J. McMaster, the resolution of which he gave notice at last Annual Meeting, which was carried, after being amended to read as follows: "That the constitution

be so amended that all motions involving an expenditure, not otherwise provided for, of congregational funds, shall be submitted to the Board of Managers for their report thereon, before being brought before the congregation."

Mr. McCracken moved, seconded by Mr. Robb, the motion of which he gave notice at last meeting, *viz*: "That in the event of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Managers by death, resignation or other cause, the Managers shall, when they deem it advisable, call a meeting of the congregation to fill such vacancy."—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. S. Thompson, seconded by Mr. S. Crane, that this congregation takes this its earliest opportunity of thanking the Board of Management of Knox College, for their kindness in permitting the Convocation Hall and class rooms of the college to be occupied by the congregation during the time that the alterations to the school-house were being made, and of its appreciation of the good wishes and kindly feeling of the Board of Management towards this congregation on all occasions. Also that the thanks of this congregation be given to Mr. and Mrs. Fullarton, for their attention to the comforts and convenience of the congregation and Sabbath school during the time that services were being held in the college.—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. J. McMaster, seconded by Mr. J. L. Blaikie, that the thanks of the congregation be given to the choir for their assistance in the service of praise.—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. Davidson, seconded by Dr. MacLaren, that the matter of arranging for an organist, until the opening of the new church, be left in the hands of the Session.—*Carried*.

Moved by Mr. A. B. Scott, seconded by Mr. Robb, that with the Annual Report, there be printed all supplemental reports and statements, and a list of the members of the congregation with their addresses.—*Carried*.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned, the Benediction being pronounced by the Rev. Dr. Gregg.

Annual Statement of Session for 1889.

In presenting the annual statement for the year 1889, the Session would call upon all the members of the congregation to join in thanksgiving to God for another year of prosperity and blessing. Peace and good-will have prevailed amid much connected with the erection of a new church-building, that might have led to difference of opinion: the membership has largely increased, notwithstanding the inconveniences resulting from building operations, and above all, there has been true spiritual growth and increase in the knowledge of God's will. For these and many other blessings, let us praise the Lord, and press on with renewed faith and courage.

Net increase during the year 134 or 66½ per cent.

During the year one adult and thirteen children were baptized. The Communion of the Lord's Supper was observed four times: on all of these occasions the attendance was large. The greatest number met on October 27th, when 270 partook of the ordinance.

Only one name had to be removed from the roll of communicants because of death, but six children of members died. The Session deeply sympathizes with all the bereaved ones in their sorrow, and heartily and lovingly commends them to the "God of all comfort."

In looking forward to the important work now before the congregation in finishing and entering upon a large and suitable place of worship, the Session trusts that there will be a continuance of the hearty and

earnest good-will and unanimity in seeking that the building and all work carried on in it and in connection with the congregation, shall be for the honor and glory of God in the salvation of sinners and the upbuilding of God's children. For these ends let all pray and work and live.

Report of the Board of Managers.

To the Members and Adherents of the Bloor St. Presbyterian Church :

The Board of Managers have much pleasure in presenting their Second Annual Report, and in doing so have to acknowledge the many tokens of Divine blessing on the congregation, and of the guidance of our Heavenly Father.

In the report of the Managers presented at the last annual meetings the matter of erecting a new church was brought before the congregation. This project at that time was regarded by many as premature and attended with difficulty and misgiving as to possibility of accomplishment, but was referred to a committee for their report. The report having found in favour of proceeding with the erection of a church, a resolution was passed at a congregational meeting held on Feb. 22, 1889, unanimously and heartily adopting the report of the committee. The scheme, having received the sanction of the Presbytery and the hearty and material support of the congregation, has taken a substantial form by the erection of the building now in process of construction on the corner of Bloor and Huron streets, which bids fair to be not only a credit to the Presbyterian Church, but an ornament to the city. The congregation is to be congratulated that the work thus undertaken has progressed without interruption from any cause, and the prospect is that by the midsummer of 1890 the new church will be ready for occupation. It is also a matter of thankfulness to the Controller of all things that so far no accident or mishap has occurred to any of those employed in the construction of the building. On the fourth day of September, 1889, (being the anniversary of the induction of the pastor), the foundation-stone was duly laid by the Rev. Dr. MacLaren. While the congregation is to be congratulated on the progress which is being made in all branches of the church's work, it must not be forgotten that with increased privileges and blessings, come increased obligations and responsibilities, and it is to be hoped that everyone connected with the congregation will cheerfully do his share, and adopt the motto for the year given by the pastor, and, looking to the Master for direction, ask in the spirit of the petition, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?"

As will be seen by reference to the Treasurer's statement, the amount contributed towards the revenue of the congregation for the year has been \$4,201.48. This amount is derived entirely from contributions on the Sabbath days, \$3,379.91 being contributed by 170 persons through the white envelope, and \$821.57 by open collection. While this showing may be regarded with satisfaction, it must be apparent that some of the members and adherents, who might be expected to contribute through the envelopes, have not yet availed themselves of this means of contributing. As the Sabbath day collections is the only method employed for raising the revenue, the Managers cannot too strongly press upon contributors the necessity of making their contributions not only as liberal as their means will permit, but also that the greatest possible regularity be observed.

For the information of the congregation the Managers desire to state that the amounts contributed through the envelopes is kept with perfect secrecy; the duty of keeping the book in which the names and amounts are recorded being confided to a sub-committee of two persons who alone are aware of the amounts given by each individual, so that those desiring to contribute through the envelopes need not hesitate to adopt the plan, either through fear of being regarded as penurious on account of smallness of offerings, or ostentatious by largeness of contributions.

The expenditure of the year 1889, as appears from the Treasurer's Report, has been \$4,356.19, showing that the revenue has not been equal to the expenditure by about \$154.71. This may be accounted for by the unsettled state of the congregation, attendant on the building operations, and the continued inclement weather since the congregation re-assembled in the school house. Having regard to the increased obligations connected with the new building, and other matters arising out of and connected with it, the Managers have estimated the expenditure for the year 1890 at about \$6,500. This will necessitate increased liberality on the part of the congregation. "Freely ye have received, freely give."

On account of the limited capacity of the present building, it is scarcely to be expected that very large accessions to the congregation will be made until the new church is opened, but from the large population continually coming into the neighborhood, and with the faithful

ministration which the congregation is privileged to have and the devoted attention of our esteemed pastor, it is confidently expected that when the new building is opened the number attending the church will be greatly augmented, and the offerings correspondingly increased, and in this way not only will sufficient be raised to pay all current liabilities, but to set aside a substantial sum to be devoted towards reducing the debt.

During the year the Managers have given liberty to the Public school trustees to occupy the lecture-room for a Kindergarten school, which is a great convenience to the children in the immediate vicinity of the church (many of whom belong to the Sabbath school connected with the congregation), and has also helped to familiarize the children with the building and been of help to the Sabbath school and congregation.

The Presbyterian Ladies' College have also asked and been granted the use of the lecture-room for entertainments given in connection with that institution, under the direction of Dr. McIntyre, the Principal of the College. These instructive and enjoyable entertainments have been highly appreciated by the congregation and their friends.

The Managers would urge upon the members the desirability of cultivating the social element amongst those connected with the congregation. The Women's Association and the Young People's Association give the fullest opportunity to every one, not only of becoming acquainted with the members of the congregation, but also of taking some part in actively promoting the interests of the Church.

The Managers have to express their appreciation of the cheerful co-operation of the ladies and young people in the various undertakings connected with the congregation, not only by relieving them of many onerous duties, but adding much to the success and pleasure of the entertainments and social gatherings held from time to time.

The Managers who retire this year by rotation are Messrs. R. J. Hunter, Wm. Davidson and A. B. Scott. It will be your duty to elect others to fill their places.

Report of the Building Committee, Jan. 1890.

IN presenting their Report to the Annual Meeting, your Committee beg to review the work done during the past year.

This committee was appointed at a meeting of the congregation held on Feb. 22nd last, at which meeting a subscription list was opened for funds to be applied to the erection of a new church, and at that meeting the sum of \$11,860 was subscribed. Your committee was then instructed to prosecute the canvas for subscriptions and procure plans for a new church. On April the 24th, your committee submitted plans for a new church, having a seating capacity of 1,170 sittings; 710 on ground floor, and 460 in gallery. These plans included the necessary alterations to the school-house. The subscription list was also submitted and then amounted to \$14,139, which sum they regret to say has not since been increased. The congregation approved of the plans and authorized the committee to call for tenders, at the same time giving the necessary authority to raise \$50,000 by way of mortgage on the church property. Your committee on June 17th recommended tenders to the amount of \$53,406, which were accepted and also reported that they had secured a loan of \$50,000, from the Canada Life Insurance Co. at 5 per cent. The work under the contracts was commenced on 23rd June, and on 4th Sept., the anniversary of the induction of our loved pastor, the foundation stone of the church was duly laid by our staunch and esteemed friend and co-worker, Rev. Wm. MacLaren, D.D.

Your committee finding that more funds would be required to complete the buildings, placed the matter before you at a meeting held on Nov. 4th, last, when you authorized a further loan of \$20,000 on a second mortgage. Your committee acting on the instructions thus given, appeared before the Presbytery and obtained from them their consent to the further encumbering the church property.

Your committee regretted that circumstances had occurred which caused Mr. Donald MacKay to withdraw the offer mentioned in their last report, but are pleased now to be able to report that through the kindly assistance of Dr. MacLaren, a loan of \$16,000 has been negoti-

ated with the estate of the late John MacLaren, payable in five years with interest at 6 per cent. payable half-yearly, with the privilege after three years of paying off the whole or any sum not less than \$1,000 on any gale day. A personal bond was given similar to the one given to the Canada Life Insurance Co.

Your committee have also entered into the following contracts :

The buildings at present are insured for \$30,000. \$10,000 on the school-house and \$20,000 on the church.

The work on the school-house was so far completed that we were enabled to occupy it for worship on Nov. 24th, last, and the work on the church is progressing in such a manner that the architect assures your committee that there is every reason to hope that the building will be ready for occupation at the date specified in the contracts, *viz.* May 15th next.

The \$20 from "Free Will" is a special contribution for "Foreign Missions," to be added to the assessment on the congregation and not included in its share to the Schemes.

The \$813.33 received in envelopes was contributed by 107 contributors; of this amount two gave \$185.00, and ten gave \$246.09, or twelve persons gave more than one-half of the whole amount.

The Committee regrets that there are still a large number in the congregation who seemingly do not realize that Foreign Missions and

the other schemes of the church, have any claim upon them. They sincerely commend to the attention of all, the earnest appeal of Paul to the Corinthians, and trust that all will yet "abound in this grace also."

Sabbath School Report.

DURING 1889, the Sabbath school continued to make substantial progress. At the beginning of the year, three new classes were added to the twenty-two with which 1888 closed. Towards the end of the year, both the adult and primary classes became unwieldy through numbers and were divided, each into two. Counting two formed on the first Sabbath of 1890, we have thirty-five classes in the school: two primary, twenty-seven intermediate, four youths, and two adult classes.

Removal to Knox College caused some falling off in the attendance, but in July and August, the school was so reduced through absence of both scholars and teachers, as to seem little more than a fragment of itself. While the average attendance of the second quarter was 206, and of the fourth 302: for the third it was only 203, and this reduction in numbers produced, unfortunately, a corresponding loss in the ambition, and work of the school, so that the record of the year was thereby materially reduced.

The average for the whole year was 262. The number of scholars now enrolled is 387, and of officers and teachers 43; in all 430.

The increase in numbers is 40 per cent. over 1888. The increase in the amount of Scripture memorized is 50 per cent., and of the shorter catechism over 60 per cent. When, however, all or nearly all have adopted the plan of "some work every day" in Sabbath school studies, and parents see that that work is regularly and well done, we may look for results more commensurate with their unspeakable importance in the formation of character, and the dissemination of saving and eternal truth.

It should never be forgotten that the Sabbath school is only an auxiliary to the Christian nurture of the home, and does not relieve fathers and mothers of this their inalienable and sacred duty, to bring their children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

During the year, owing to drawbacks inseparable from the removals made necessary by building operations, our teachers' meeting maintained precarious existence: but, since returning to our own place of worship, the greatly increased attendance and interest strengthen the hope that this may soon become what it ought to be, "The right hand of efficiency" in the school.

Notwithstanding a good many changes in its *personnel*, the staff has sustained if not increased its efficiency.

One beloved teacher, Miss Elliott, was called to her reward almost before buckling on the harness, the Master desiring her presence in the upper Sanctuary. Nine other teachers, and five officers through removals or other causes, withdrew from the work of the school. Others, however, were readily found to fill the vacancies thus created, and we enter upon 1890 with a devoted and harmonious band of workers.

Continuing the previous year's simple system of weekly offerings for the schemes of the church, the school raised over \$450. To this may be added \$7 birthday offerings; \$79 a thank-offering from the school at the reopening in November, and \$123 collected for the Library fund.

Unable as yet to assume the support of a missionary to the heathen, our school, feeling the great importance of helping to break the yoke of Romanism in our own Dominion, has undertaken the cost of the education of a boy, Joseph Dupuis, at the Pointe aux Trembles schools. This in addition to a charge upon our funds, has become a charge upon our faith and prayers, that he may soon be brought to a saving knowledge of the Saviour. Indeed, it is hoped and believed that our school "prays and gives," and "gives and prays" in all its offerings.

The satisfactory statements made in the report for 1888, respecting the annual entertainments, library funds, etc., might be repeated for 1889, but it is sufficient to say that in every way these matters were carried through successfully, the congregation and friends responding cordially and liberally when appealed to.

Once more acknowledging with humility the many tokens of Divine favor, we ask the sympathy, co operation and prayers of the congregation during the year upon which we have so happily entered.

CONSTITUTION
OF
THE BLOOR STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

Adopted January 18th, 1888.

1. THAT the temporal affairs of the congregation be managed by a Board of Managers, elected to hold office for three years, one-third of such Board to retire annually, and one-third of the Board to be chosen from among the members of Session, and two-thirds from those who are not members of Session. In the meantime the Board to conduct its business in accordance with the rules laid down for Boards of Managers in the Book of Forms published by authority of the General Assembly.

2. That the Board of Managers shall consist of nine members, until this number be changed by the congregation in accordance with the rules of the Book of Forms.

3. That the election of Managers shall be made from members nominated and voted upon by ballot papers at same meeting. That at the first election the names of those who shall retire at the end of the first and second years, shall be determined by "lot" at the meeting at which the election is made.

4. That no pew rents be charged, and that the money required for ordinary congregational purposes be raised by weekly offerings, made by the envelope system, and by open collection.

That the envelopes be numbered and that the Treasurer keep a record showing the name of the recipient of each number, and the amounts received, and shall report annually the amount contributed by each member.

5. That a monthly collection by the envelope system be made for the "Schemes of the Church" and in the meantime this collection be made on the last Sabbath of each month.

6. That the members of Session, together with an equal number of members chosen by the congregation at each annual meeting, shall constitute a committee to take charge of the funds raised for the "Schemes of the Church." That this committee shall appoint a Treasurer, and shall remit the money received to the General Treasurer of the church, at frequent intervals, and shall recommend to the annual congregational meeting an allocation of the money among the various schemes. This Committee shall also report to said annual meeting, the "numbers" of the contributors, and the amounts received from each, and they shall at all times have authority to devise and take such steps as may be necessary to increase the amounts contributed to the "Schemes of the Church."

7. That the "Missionary Record" of the church be supplied to each family or adherent of the congregation.

8. That the expenses of the Sabbath school be made a charge against the congregation, and that the regular Sabbath School collections be for mission purposes; that the money for the expenses of the school shall be appropriated yearly by the Board of Managers, and paid over to the Treasurer of the Sabbath School Association.

9. That the Sabbath School Association and other congregational associations, report annually to the annual congregational meeting, the moneys raised and disbursed by them, said report to be presented through the Treasurer for the Schemes of the Church.

(Adopted at Congregational Meeting held 15th January 1890.)

10. That all motions involving an expenditure, not otherwise provided for of congregational funds shall be submitted to the Board of Managers for their report thereon, before being brought before the congregation.

11. That in the event of a vacancy occurring in the Board of Management by death, resignation or other cause, the Managers shall, when they deem it advisable, call a meeting of the congregation to fill such vacancy.
