SIXTEEN BRIDES IN ONE BIG WEDDING Engaged Pairs of Prelly French Town are all Married Together.

PARIS, Feb. 2.—The pretty little town of Plougastel, so well known to tourists in Brittany during the summer, was this morning the scene of a quaint ceremony, when, according to ancient custom, all the couples- who have become engaged during the last twelve months were married together. There were sixteen couples. The wo-men wore the most lively and pictur-esque costumes, ranging from scarlet to applegreen, but the most gorgeous part of their raiment consisted of their elaborately embroidered and change approprishaped aprons. After the sixteen couples had gone

through the ceremony in the presence of the Mayor, and had assisted at mass, all proceeded to the great tent which had been erected, according to ancient custom, in the fields in memory of the time when nemadi tribes

inhabited the district and lived in tents. From time imortal it has been the custom for cousins to intermarry at Ploughgastel, and the majority of those married today were cousins. The fact does not seem to have had any

evil effect, for a finer race of people than the inhabitant of Plougastel does not exist.


Churchill Harbor is simply a land locked lake of eight mifes in length running northeast and southwest by about four miles in breadth. in area approximately two townships in ex-tent. The Churchill or English River falls into the harbor on its southwest corner. An outlet of about one-quarter of a mile wide at Fort Prince of Wales leads to the open sea and to places. 


