### SCHOOL BOYS TIE YOUNGER PLAYMATES TO A SNAPELING.

MAKE AN UNSUCCESSFUL EFFORT TO BURN THEM TO A CRISP.

New York, March 23.—A Sun special from Pikesburg, N. Y., says: Some of the school boys at Slatersburg, on Friday attempted to burn at the stake two of their playmates. At the noon hour Cecil Horn, Ernest Killmer, Frank McManney, John McManney, Willie Terpening, and Allie Burgher, who ranged in age from 8 to 16 years, wandered off into the woods west of the public school building. The larger boys seized Willie Terpening and Allie Burgher, the two youngest boys, and tied them to a sapling. Then they gathered dry leaves and bushes, which they heaped up in a big pile against the two prisoners and set it on fire. The two little boys landed to the tree shrieked with terror, but their tormentors ran off into the woods and left them, to their fate. They were rescued by Frank McManney, who released the two boys after they had been considerably warmed by the thick smoke. The flames set fire to the trees and in a few minutes a forest fire was raging, which was not subdued by the farmers living near by until quite a piece of ground had been burned over. It is said that the older boys concerned in the affair will be severely punished. The incident is regarded as the legitimate fruit of the perusal of yellow literature.

MAY BE GOVERNOR GENERAL.

OTTAWA, March 24.—A despatch received from London, England, says that the Duke of Leeds will succeed the Earl of Aberdeen as Governor General of Canada in 1898. George Grenville Osborne, tenth Duke of Leeds and a prince of the Holy Roman Empire was born in 1808 and succeeded to the title on the death of his father, in 1895. He was educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, and at an ancestral private secretary to the secretary of state for the colonies from 1886 to 1888. He was married in 1884 to Lady Katherine Lambton, daughter of the second Earl of Durham. He has four daughters living.

NEWS NOTES. The late Wm. Smith, ex Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, left an estate of \$17,000.

Judge Taschereau, of the Supreme Court, who was granted six months' leave of absence four months ago on account of ill health, was married at Ottawa on Monday to Miss Marie Panet. The bridegroom is 60 and the bride 18 years old.

The real fishery season has opened splendidly. Steamers Harlow and Yoland which were fishing in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, are returning to St. John's, the former having 15,000 seals and the later 22,000. Several schooners are among the seals getting good fares. This is the best beginning of the fishery for twenty years.

An official return issued by the Registrar-General shows that during the year ended December 31st an increase of 2,043 persons had taken place in the population of Ireland. This increase is due to a marked decrease in the rate of emigration.

St. Paul, Minn., March 24.—The rivers of southern Minnesota were on the rampage yesterday. Cottonwood river rose fifteen feet and is still rising. This river empties into the Minnesota just below New Ulm, and the great volume caused the Minnesota to back water and force it up at that place. Some of the roads into that city are already inundated, and the prospects are that traffic will be cut off from all directions except west.

Chicago, March 24.—A severe storm struck Chicago yesterday afternoon, accompanied by snow and high wind. At midnight the storm had assumed the proportions of a blizzard. Railway and street-car traffic was seriously interfered with. The storm was general throughout the northern part of Illinois and portions of Wisconsin, Iowa and Minnesota.
