SCHOOL BOYS TIE YOUNGER PLAYMATES TO A SNAPE.

MAKE AN UNSUCCESSFUL EFFORT TO BURN THEM TO A CRISP.

New York, March 23.—A San special from Pikesburg, N. Y., says:

Some of the school boys at Pikesburg, on Friday attempted to burn at the stake two of their playmates. At the noon hour Cecil Horn, Ernest Killmer, Frank McManney, John McManney, Willie Terpening, and Allie Burgher, who ranged in age from 8 to 16 years, wandered off into the woods west of the public school building. The larger boys seized Willie Terpening and Allie Burgher, the two youngest boys, and tied them to a sapling. Then they gathered dry leaves and bushes, which they heaped up in a big pile around the two prisoners and set it on fire. The two little boys, bound to the tree shrieked with terror, but their tormentors ran off into the woods and left them, to their fate.

They were rescued by Frank McManney, who released the two boys after they had been considerably warmed by the thick smoke. The flames set fire to the trees and in a few minutes a forest fire was raging, which was not subdued by the farmers living near by until quite a piece of ground had been burned over. It is said that the older boys conspired in the affair and will be severely punished. The incident is regarded as the legitimate fruit of the perusal of yellow literature.

BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., March 22.—Business in the Olneyville factory district is looking brighter than at any time in the past three years. Mill owners and overseers who have been interviewed on the matter assert that such is the case, and they say, too, that while things are improving slowly, it is a good solid ground and will benefit everyone in and about this city and its populous suburbs.

Orders are coming in for mill machinery, an immense corporation comprising eight large factories and employing 3,000 operatives, the sixty-hour schedule is now in vogue. Other mills are also getting ready to start on full time, and in every direction the cloth business is looking brighter.

Beginning with to-day the boot makers in the Bangs Rubber Mills will have steady work, and at the offices of the new industry it is stated that more operatives are to be employed constantly.

Little rubber workers from Bristol are flocking here to secure employment in the new factory, but the Millville and Woonsocket rubber workers have got in ahead. The Bangs prefer to employ their old help.

LABOR TROUBLE AT WALTHAM.

A NUMBER OF FINISHERS IN THE AMERICAN WATCH FACTORY DISCHARGED.

WALTHAM, Mass., March 24.—A notice posted at the American Waltham Watch Co.'s factory, Tuesday evening, marked one of the most critical labor crises in the city's history. It was that the factory would close on Friday evening, March 26, for a week to give the management an opportunity to readjust one of the departments, and such of the hands as would be needed in that period would be notified personally to report for work.

Everybody in the city knows that the department in question is the "finishing" room, where about eighty of the highest skilled men in the factory are employed. About twelve months ago there was a dissension between the finishers and the management over a question of wages upon certain sizes of watches. Mutual concessions were made and the finishers were satisfied with the agreement under which they have since worked and which expires on March 31. Finishing work is practically a trade secret, and finishers have the only trade union in the watch industry. Their rules forbid the teaching of the work to women, and there is said to be only one female in the world who is competent to do the work. She is employed in the American watch factory. Fifty finishers have been discharged with only three days' notice and they attribute the fact to two reasons. One is that somebody has been secretly teaching the trade to women behind the closed doors of the mysterious emergency room in the watch factory. The other is that some traitor has been present at secret meetings of the finishers and betrayed the transactions of their council. They decided that the only course left for them in the interests of self-protection was to organize a union of their own.

and enquiries would need to be made, but investigation so far is most suggestive as to the close connection of pauperism and drink; not to speak of other and worse things.

From other tables given in the Bureau's report, the article goes on to say, "it appears that 15.63 per cent of this 3,230 paupers were found to be excessive drinkers, 49.62 per cent were addicted to drink; 23.81 per cent and chiefly young persons, were total abstainers, and of 7.93 per cent excluding from the 3,230 cases investigated all male and female paupers under twenty and thirty years of age respectively, there were left 2,558, and among these the relation between intemperance and pauperism was found to be 80 per cent, and, therefore, very close indeed.

"The conclusion then is," says this report, "that if we root out intemperance a large amount of adult pauperism will cease, and if those who contend against intemperance do so because they wish to destroy pauperism, we have reason to say from the study of these figures that their energy has not been wasted. On the contrary, it has been well expended."

Referring to causes of pauperism other than drink, yet closely connected with it, though less under the control of legislation, the writer of this article goes on to say:

"Paupers of this kind are isolated from the rest of the population. They are not, and never were, physically capable of rendering efficient service to society. They are usually mentally defective as well as dependent, and they tend to extinction. But the pauperism allied to intemperance is usually the evidence of a life of wasted opportunity. When pauperism is caused by intemperance it means that a life of usefulness has been lost to the community. It, therefore, intemperance can be controlled, it is hardly to be expected that the most degraded type of pauperism will be destroyed (in our own opinion we think it might be almost altogether destroyed), but it does mean that a grave injury to society that results in other forms of pauperism will, to a great extent, cease."—Canada Presbyterian.
