#### THE POWER BYLAW.

The city council will be asked submit to the ratepayers in January a bylaw authorizing the council to enter into a contract with the hydro-electric commission to supply the city of London with Niagara power. The city council has asked the com

mission for estimates of the cost of delivering a block of 10,000-horsepower ready for distribution to customers in London. The price quoted by the commission, it is stated, will about \$20 per horsepower, perhaps a little less, provided a sufficient number of municipalities can be grouped ation, insurance, etc., on the machinery, appliances and transmission lines of the hydro-electric commission.

The position of the city of London if the ratepayers adopted the bylaw in January would be as follows: The city council would have power to enter into a contract to purchase from the question of the future of Canada the hydro-electric commission 10,000hosepower per annum, at an annual cost to the city of \$200,000. This \$200,-000 would not include the cost of local distribution. It would be necessary foar the city to purchase the London Electric Company's plant, or erect a distributing station of its own, in order to deliver the power to customers. The city must then find sufficient sale for Niagara power to meet its obligation of \$200,000 a year to the hydro-electric commission, and the cost of distributing the power within its own boundaries. It is said that in order to be on the side of safety, each municipality in the scheme will ask for only onehalf the amount of power for which estimates have been furnished. If London contracted for only 5,000-horseower the rate per horsepower would probably be \$3 or \$4 greater than if double the amount of power were pur-

It will be the duty of the city council, before entering into any agreement with the hydro-electric commission, to make a thorough canvass, so as to ascertain the amount of power which it may reasonably expect to dispose of. SCHOOL COUNCIL CANNOT INITIATE

Advisory Board To Be Used Merely to Suggest and Recommend.

Toronto, Nov. 20.-The date has not yet been fixed for the first meeting of the newly-elected advisory council, but Dr. Seath, who represents the Minister of Education on the council, gave it out this morning that there are several matters standing over for discussion, which will necessitate calling the members together before the end of the year.

The superintendent of education is busy working out the details of procedure in connection with the council. but it is understood that they will only deal with questions submitted by the minister, and have no right of initia-

"No exact details have yet been settled," Dr. Seath said, "but there is an honest intention to make it a useful council, and to deal with it as thoroughly representative of the various school interests of the Province, and as voicing the desires and opinions of the teachers.

"So far as is legitimately consistent with responsible government, the representations and wishes of the council will receive the utmost consideration.' 


