BOLSHEVIKI RUSHING ALL FRONTS IN THEIR OFFENSIVE AGAINST POLES; BATTLES

Fierce Fighting in Progress A long Dvina and Pripet Rivers -Reds Launch One Attack After Another-Poles Claim Capture of 400 Cossacks.

Warsaw, May 29.-Russian Bolshevik reinforcements are being brought up everywhere in the offensive against the Poles, which is increasing in violence along the northern sectors of the front, says an official statement issued at headquarters here today. Fierce combats are raging from the Dvina River on the north! to the Pripet River on the south, a distance of approximately 220 miles, and the Soviet armies are launching attack after attack.

Prisoners captured by the Poles west of the Beresina River, the statement says, include 400 (assacks cut off from the rest of the Bolshevik army in the drive toward Minsk.

SEERESS PREDICTS UPHEAVAL IN EUROPE WITHIN A YEAR

Budapest, May 29.-Startling prophecies relative to world peace, political changes, impending in Europe, and the fate of prominent figures in the great war, are made by Hungary's national soothsayer, Mme. Sybilline Bellaugh. Thrones will be re-established all over Europe, including France, Germany, Austria, Poland and Hungary, within a year," she says. "The Hohenzollerns will return to Germany, but the former emperor will go insane, and the crown prince will be murdered. There will be sanguinary upheavals in France preliminary to the constitution of a kingdom. Bolshevism will end in 1921 in Russia. Mexico will be the starting point of the next war. High prices will abate, and European will be quoted at par in two years. There will be the greatest exodus of Jews from Russia and Central Europe in history, but they will not go to Palestine. 

(By Staff Reporter.) MELBOURNE, May 28. - Farmers from all over the district gathered in the town hall here tonight to hear J. J. One indictment charged the Economy Wholesale Grocers Company and Abraham Gladstone of Chicago with having sold in New York on May 1, 50,600 pounds at 24 cents. MANAGER OF QUARRY CRUSHED TO DEATH BY TILTING CRADLE

John Bonis, St. Marys, Killed Instantly; His Head







EFFORT TO OVERRIDE

PROFITS LIMITED

Doherty Introduces Amendments To Criminal Code Governing Racing.

INSPECT MACHINES

Government Officials To Supervise Operation of Pari-Mutual Systems.

OTTAWA, May 28.—(Canadian Press) -Profits of racing associations are limited according to the amount bet on each race, by a provision of the amendments to the criminal code, introduced in the Commons this afternoon by Hon.
C. J. Doherty.
These amendments provide that bet-

ting shall be by the pari-mutuel system only, and that profits of race track owners shall be limited to 7 per cent of owners shall be limited to 7 per cent of the amount bet on each race, where that amount is under \$20,000. On all amounts over \$20,000 and under \$30,000, the percentage is restricted to 6 per cent. Amounts over \$30,000 and under \$40,-000, to 5 per cent.

Total Amount Bet.

Over \$40,000 and up to \$50,000, 4 per cent, and all amounts over \$50,000, 3 per cent. In each case the percentage of the racing club or association is to be gauged by the total amount of money bet on the race by the pari-mutuel

of the racing club or association is to be gauged by the total amount of money bet on the race by the pari-mutuel system. There is also a change in regard to the "breaks," which the association is allowed to retain. Provision is made for the racing association retaining the odd cents which are less than any multiple of five cents. Pari-mutuel machines operated under the new amendments are to be inthe new amendments are to be in-spected, approved and operated under the supervision of government officials, appointed by the department of agriculture. There will be an official at each track to see that no bets are accepted after the horses go to the post in each race, when the machines must be locked, and in that way it is aimed to check any attempt at fraud. Racing associations are to pay the cost of such supervision.

Number of Days.

All the present conditions regarding the operation of betting on race tracks, with regard to the number of days of racing, etc., are continued in force, and the provision that pari-mutuels alone shall be used, and that profits shall be restricted as above are added to the present regulations.

No definite date is set for the bill coming into effect, but it is anticipated that it will be law immediately on reeiving the royal assent.

OTTAWA, May 28 .- (Canadian Press) The Irish question, with its relation to the United States and also to the negro problem in the United States of America, is to come before the House militia.

"And it is further resolved: that some effective means should be taken to edu-cate the citizens of the United States of America and especially certain members of the United States Congress to study their home concerns with a view to mit-igating the horrible situation concern-ing the negro problem and such other

problems requiring attention in that NO ACTION TAKEN. America, is to come before the House of Commons in a resolution moved by Sir Sam Hughes, former minister of militia.




