### FOREST FIRES ARE MENACING SECTIONS IN THE MARITIME

Chester, N. S., May 28.—The district about East River, a few miles from here, is very seriously menaced by forest fires. A very bad fire started at Goat Lake on Wednesday, but is now under control. This fire burned over some 100 acres. Yesterday, after a freight train of the Halifax and Southwestern had passed, a new fire broke out in the green woods about a mile from the scene of Wednesday. The fire is still burning, and a serious forest fire is burning near Alton.

Toronto, May 28.—As a result of evidence given before the royal commission enquiring into timber limits, the crown timber agent at Port Arthur has made a seizure of many logs there, and they will be held pending investigation as to the limits from which they have been obtained.

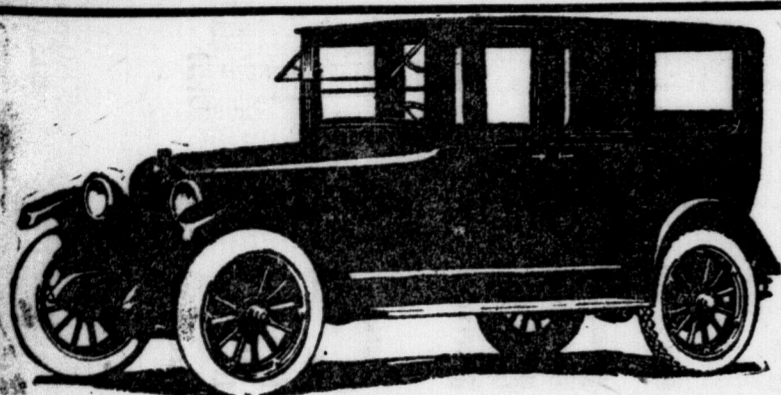

**Degrees Are Conferred on Western Graduates by Chancellor Roche**

Medals Were Also Presented At Largely-Attended Convocation in Wesley Hall Last Evening—Chancellor Tells of Steady Growth and Bright Future For Western University.

"It is a very easy thing to study sociology, but it is a very hard thing to go out into life and socialize society," said Dr. Howard P. Whidden, I.A., M.P., president of Brandon College, Brandon, Man., in his address to the graduating classes in arts and medicine at the annual convocation of the Western University, held in Wesley Hall, Friday evening.

Dr. Whidden urged the graduates to use the knowledge they had acquired in their college courses to enable them to better understand the needs and aspirations of their fellowmen and help to accomplish the greatest possible good for the greatest possible number. He advised them not to be discouraged because on first trials they had not had learned in college halls would not work out in dealing with men and with groups and organizations of men. At each rebuff or reverse, they should study to learn more, and they should study men as well as books.

**Wrong Idea.**

"Too many people have gone slumming for the sake of putting something in a notebook rather than putting something in the life and socializing society," said Dr. Whidden. He also urged them not to neglect the individual in giving all their attention and lending all their interest to larger social groups. Too many social reformers were interested in groups of men, but had no more genuine interest in John Smith as a human being than in John Smith as a mere concept.

Going out into the world as educated men and women they should keep in mind the whole nation, yes, the whole world. They should think in terms not merely of the Western University, life, but of a Canadian university life.

A national vision, much less a sense of world citizenship, was not possible to one who thought only of a small part of a province. Men of broad imagination and sound sense were needed in the world today, as never before. All should aim to bring education up to a higher standard, and make it more appreciable, not necessarily by robbing it of any of its traditional frills, but by making it practical and better suited to meet the actual needs of the world today.

any institution of its kind, and looked for remarkable expansion and development in all its departments. Large money endowments had given old universities a better start than Western, but, as time went on, the Western University was growing in influence and the extent of its work, and many of its graduates had signally distinguished themselves in their own and other countries.

If the good sense of her people would only prevent liberty from developing into license and revolution from supplanting constitutional methods a great future lay before Canada. By the millennium had not yet arrived and the world was likely to be still further stirred by radical propaganda and social discontent.

NEW YORK, May 28.—Several indictments charging profiteering in sugar were returned in federal court here today. One indictment charged the Economy Wholesale Grocers Company and Abraham Gladstone of Chicago with having sold in New York on May 1, 50,000 pounds at 24 cents. They are alleged to have bought the sugar for 15 1/2 cents. Another indictment charged D. O. Netter of New York and Morris Spirt of Waterbury, Conn., with having sold at 26 1/2 cents a pound 52,000 pounds of sugar, which it was alleged cost them less than 19 cents.

### SAYS TWO WORKERS DISCHARGED BY HYDRO

NIAGARA FALLS, May 28.—Charges that two of the men prominent in the trade federation were discharged yesterday were made today before the Government committee investigating conditions in the hydro chipewawa work by J. A. Fleet, representative of the A. F. of L. The commission decided today to leave Niagara Falls at noon and return next Tuesday. It is expected that the commission will sit another week before finishing their investigation.

**INCONSISTENT.**  
 "Let the people vote" was the text of a lengthy sermon which Sir Adam Beck delivered on the McCrea street railway measure at Toronto this week. Like most texts it is admirable, but unfortunately Sir Adam, like a good many preachers, has not always practiced what he advocates.

In fact, the career of the London and Port Stanley Railway since Sir Adam took charge of the road has not always been in accordance with what the people wanted. The McCrea measure would give municipal councils the right to advance car fares after the Railway Board has declared that the roads cannot be operated at the old rates. Sir Adam is opposed to this. He declares that only the people should say whether the fares should be advanced. It is not on record, however, that any vote was taken when London and Port Stanley fares were raised from thirty cents to fifty cents, and the people were supposed to own the road. The capitalization of the same road has been almost doubled without the people being consulted.

One of the principal clauses of the famous London bill, which met a sad end in the Legislature was to permit issuing of \$125,000 debentures for expenditures on the London and Port Stanley. The Railway Commission, of which Sir Adam Beck is chairman, asked for the inclusion of this clause in direct defiance of the will of the people.

Maybe Sir Adam was not fully reported. Possibly his full text was "Let the people vote and then go ahead and do as you please anyway."

**VERY MUCH OF A NECESSITY.**  
 One of the glaring blunders of Sir Henry Drayton's luxury list is the taxation of sporting goods. Bat and ball, lacrosse and hockey sticks, tennis racquet, football, gymnasium apparatus, etc., all the things that go to the building up of clean, healthy young men and women and that help keep the older ones fit, will be made more difficult to secure. Nothing is so necessary to our social and industrial welfare as physical fitness. The more fit we are physically the higher the good health rate will be, the higher the moral standing of communities. Good health and happiness are synonymous. To develop the boys and girls the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, public schools and church organizations are doing much, but this taxation on the instruments of recreation and exercise will handicap them. We are realizing more and more that play is absolutely essential to the best and most successful citizenship. Then why legislate to put it out of the reach of many by making a luxury of it?

**JAPAN AND MILITARISM.**  
 The tremendous expansion in Japanese industry brought about by the war is firing the militarists with an insatiable ambition. The "Great Siberia" policy, covert attempts at economic domination of China, the ultimatum of Japanese representatives on the international consortium to develop Chinese resources that they were prepared to play a lone hand—all these are evidences of a great expansionist program centering in Japan. The motive is love of economic power.

They are plans which will shortly be brought to book for the question of continuing or terminating the Anglo-Japanese treaty is to be decided within about six weeks time. Canada is interested in the agreement on two vital points: that of Japanese immigration and that of equal trade rights in Siberia and China. At the recent International Conference of Commerce, held in the Luxembourg Palace at Paris, the Canadian delegate was enabled to confer with Baron Matsui, ambassador of Japan. At Brussels this week delegates from the two countries will meet again at the International Financial Conference. Finally, both Canada and Australia are to be consulted on the new treaty. When concluded, it will be registered with the secretary-general of the League of Nations.

The potentialities of Japanese expansion, as well as the relations of this country with Japan, depend largely upon the character and conditions of the Japanese workers, on the one hand, and, on the other, on the policy of the capitalists of Japan.

The world of Japanese labor presents an interesting spectacle. It is a curious mingling of the modern and the medieval. With workers the world over, Japanese labor is demanding shorter hours and higher pay. There are in Japan... the western

sense. The Police Regulations—Article 17—hated of the workmen, although not expressly forbidding associations of workers for self-protection, makes inciting to strike a criminal offence. This article has been so interpreted by the Japanese police as to prevent picketing, the accumulation of strike funds, and other functions of the union machine so well known to the labor world of America and Europe. Nevertheless, strike follows strike in Japan. So far, they have been chiefly among the male employees. They have affected the machine and metal workers, the dockers, the workers in shipyards, in aeroplane works and printing establishments. The strikes last but a few days, for no funds are available. When they succeed, they succeed through their suddenness.

Strikes since February in Japan have assumed a more distinctly political significance. The claims and theories put forward re-echo the communistic doctrines of the Russians, phrases and terms of the International Labor Conference in Washington, claims for manhood suffrage and the abolition of class privileges.

Japanese progressives stake their faith on the Labor Code established through the Washington Conference, upon the abolition of secret treaties made compulsory on members of the League of Nations. They count upon international influence exerted through their membership of the league, and especially upon the labor office of the league, to humiliate and discountenance the militaristic party.

**LILACS.**  
 "Tonight the scent of lilacs  
 Comes to me again,  
 And ghosts of buried summers  
 Walk with the lowly rain."

"I don't believe any of you happen to have just the same passion for the blue hyacinth which I have—very certainly not for the crushed lilac-leaves; many of you do not know how sweet they are, and how they bewitch you with young memories as they do me," writes Oliver Wendell Holmes, referring to "homely sounds and odors," in "The Autocrat at the Breakfast-Table." And so before over the lilacs trees are in leaf there is romance and old memories "out of the grey of forgotten things" in the fragrance of their twin buds; then the full leaves venture forth bravely before the warmth of spring is fully assured, in friendly forgettable fashion, but of all lovely mysteries, are the flowers. It would seem a marvel to behold one such bloom, but great showers of purple and white plumes on branches high and inaccessible, and those that bend low to the grass in uninterrupted beauty of growth, seem a lavish mystery of wonder and fragrance. As if in search of lovely setting for their beauty, the lilacs come with the fruit blossoms, and so it comes about some sunlit morning that they are banded in beauty before the snowy boughs of the apple and cherry trees in some neighboring yard, if not in our own, and a wandering breeze carries their fragrance to the wayfarers to business, and whispers wayward dreams of rebellious idleness and surrender to the hour.

Of all drifting fragrance there is none like that of the lilacs after rain, or their misted awakening in sea-moisture. Bliss Carman, held in the wonder of their sweetness, in "Songs of the Sea Children, sings:

"Tonight I hear the rainbirds  
 Piercing the silver gloom;  
 The scent of sea-blown lilacs  
 Wanders across my room.  
 "Caught in their wake I follow  
 The drift of memory;  
 Once more the summer twilight  
 Settles upon the sea—"

and follows the "drift of memory" to picture one who stood under the lilacs to give "one little hour of heaven," and then the two "for ever the castaways of bliss." And from season to season, "so long as the world endures," the hauntingly sweet breath of rain-wet lilacs will walk hand-in-hand with memory down old romantic ways.

There is a constancy about lilacs that endears. Long after old farm homes have dropped into ruins the trees of lilacs cling to their old reserved place, to peep wistfully in at bare and broken windows and creep protectively about old roofs in a seeming yearning that says, "Things that used to be are not." A half-belief seems to linger in their lonely loveliness, that hands that loved them will come back, that secrets whispered beneath them will be retold again, and that old dreams must be awakened and realized for young hearts with every dawn of spring. The lilacs remember, and their soft, slow fragrance is burdeningly sweet with memories. For these they are loved.

**EDITORIAL NOTES.**

**THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL.**  
 [Montreal Star.]  
 No part of Canada's war work has been more thoroughly done than the collection of war records and mementos. The result should be the establishment in Canada of a permanent memorial, steeped in the deep emotions aroused by the nation's first great world service.

The third annual report of the Canadian War Records Office, just submitted to parliament by Lord Beaverbrook, suggests the outlines for a worthy monument. It is greatly to be desired that Ottawa rise to the full height of a broad conception and give the nation not only a central war memorial fit to inspire future generations, but also a shrine for the elevation of Canadian standards of art. Canada needs it.

The assembling of war memorials of many kinds has been a labor of love for certain eminent Canadians abroad and others at home. In this important matter no other country has been better served, and the work thus well begun is one in which all Canadians may take pride. In building for the centuries, for men will not forget the great war, it is well to build securely.

**SUNDAY NEWSPAPERS.**  
 [Ottawa Journal.]  
 The Sunday newspaper provides no working journalist with Sabbath labors. So far as he is concerned the Sunday edition is completed on Saturday. Newspapers that publish on seven days of the week employ sufficient staff to give each member one or more days off.

But the "uplifters" have earned the gratitude of all Canadian citizens, including working journalists. The inflated Sunday paper is the curse of many United States cities. Newsboys with raucous voices destroy the quiet restfulness of Sunday morning; newspapers inflated with advertisements and trashy articles continue the atmosphere of commercialism and materialism into hours that are better left to the contemplation of nicer things; colored comics and sporting slang impart artificiality and coarseness into the home on the day of all days when these things should be missing.

Canadian working journalists will be found holding up both hands for continued prohibition of Sunday newspapers, not because they as a class derive any special benefits, but because they know Sunday newspapers to be unnecessary and lowering to the tone of journalism, and of public and private life generally.

The "uplifters" are by no means alone in urging the strictest enforcement of the law prohibiting the sale of newspapers on Sunday.

**ROMANCE OF CHILDHOOD.**  
 [Amherstburg Echo.]  
 The little boy who hunts Indians is every little boy in America. Along the alley warpaths of the congested city, and out on the rolling prairies of the back pasture, the relentless pursuit goes on day after day. Each night millions of little hearts are uplifted in thanksgiving that the redskinned savages lurk about the world to be hunted. An occasional green apple nightmare, in which the hunter is scalped and tied to the stake only serves to enhance the trail next afternoon as soon as school is out.

The eye of the six-year-old which makes a piece of barrel hoop look like a tomahawk is the romantic spirit. The form of this spirit of romance persists beyond the allotted three score and ten. Because of it no theatre is fittingly equipped unless it has sundry coats of mail and back-drop castles.

**LOWER PRICES.**  
 [Ottawa Journal.]  
 Almost daily reports from the United States during the last two or three weeks tell of a price-cutting wave that is forcing down prices of merchandise. The character of the reports would convey the impression that high prices were to be left behind in a few leaps. To the consuming public it would seem, at first impression, to be a welcome prospect, but a little more thought would show that it is neither a possible nor a desirable prospect.

A sudden large drop in the prices of staple commodities could not be permanent because production has not yet overtaken, and for some time will not overtake the shortage of supply. Neither can there be a permanent reduction of any considerable extent while the present enormous inflation of the currency continues. To bring about a large reduction would be to expose the people to evils greater than the high cost of living. The business of the country and the people depend on the other. A sudden break in prices from whatever cause would jar business to the foundations, and the consequences would be reflected on the people. A financial and business panic is something that people have cause to remember for decades. Prices cannot be returned suddenly to old levels without a panic.

A gradual reduction in prices, complying with economic conditions, is what is in the interests of all. And only such a reduction is possible. The price-cutting in the United States is not the commencement of a hasty dash to normal prices. In the presidential election year in the United States there is always a tightening of credit. Credit is now being curtailed, and merchants are finding difficulty in financial future purchases at enhanced prices. Consequently they are seeking to turn present stocks into money by means of reduction sales.

In many cases orders are being cancelled on the manufacturers. The manufacturer, with the goods made up and on his hands, is compelled to lower his prices to some extent to get rid of them. In that there is a prospect of a permanent reduction. Obviously, however, he could not reduce them below the profit line and continue to keep his factory running. Could he not sell at a reasonable profit he would have to lock up his plant and turn his employees away.

Present economic conditions, including high prices, has been reached over a period of five years. It would be very hard to expect to escape from them.

The basis of the support of the libraries will henceforth be on a per capita basis instead of the old fraction of a mill rate.

MANAGER OF QUARRY CRUSHED TO DEATH BY TILTING CRADLE

ST. MARYS, May 28.—John Bonis, manager of the Thames Stone Quarry Company, Water street south, was instantly killed at the quarry shortly after 10 o'clock this morning. Mr. Bonis was adjusting the friction gear of the tilting cradle, which holds the stone car when it reaches the top of the quarry preparatory to its load of stone being dumped into the stone crusher. The operator of the tilting cradle, not knowing of Mr. Bonis being nearby, tilted the car of stone, with the result that Mr. Bonis was caught between two braces and crushed, death being instantaneous.

FEW STRIKERS RETURN.
New Bedford, Mass., May 28.—Few strikers returned to the cotton cloth mills here today as a result of the vote taken last night to end the walkout, which has been in effect in eight plants for the past four weeks. 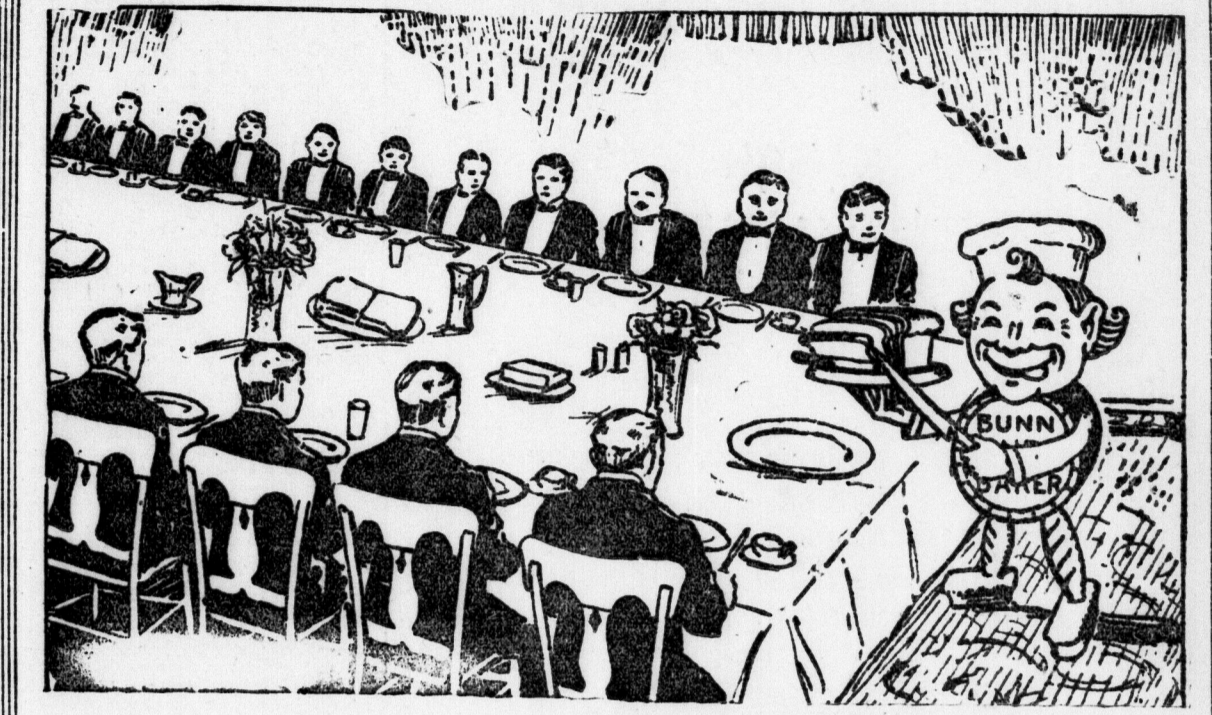
