This practice provides the opportunity for serious loss, for which the postal service is fre-quently blamed. The public is hereby notified that the postoffice department will not consider parcels left on top of parcel receptacles and street letter boxes as being posted, and any loss which occurs in this manner is a matter entirely outside the jurisdiction and operation of the postal service. A postoffice department memorandum says:

"Commencing on 15th November, 1921, letter carriers shall carry for sale a stock of postage stamp books sufficient to meet the demands of purchasers on their routes."

FIRE DESTROYS 5-STORY HOME More Than a Score Injured in

Endeavor To Reach Safety.

FIVE BODIES RECOVERED

Victim Falls to Death After Clinging to Window Ledge.

New York, Nov. 14. - Ten lives were lost and more than a score of people injured in a fire of unknown origin, which partially destroyed a five-story tenement house on West 17th street before dawn today. The building was occupied by fifteen families, mostly Armenians and

Nine were burned to death and the tenth died in a fall from a ledge, where he had clung until exhausted.

Five bodies, all unidentified, were found huddled together near a doorway on the fifth floor of the building, and firemen state there are four more bodies in the

Investigation by firemen showed the fire had originated in the basement and roared up the airshaft to the second floor. where it "mushroomed," spreading through the four upper stories of the building. The fire had gained a good headway before being discovered, and when the firemen arrived the flames were pouring out of the windows of the second and third stories.

Many of the people who lived in the tenement groped their way to windows, where they clung to ledges and screamed for One man became exhausted



Russia's Food Production Is Decreasing

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—The food production in Russia has fallen to about one-half of the total production previous to the war, according to a statement made by L. D. Wilgress, Canadian trade commissioner, in the weekly bulletin department of trade and commerce, who has just returned to London from a visit to Moscow, Petrograd and the famine belt at Kazan. Industrial production, says Mr. Wilgress, is now only one-tenth what it was in 1913.

The total production of rye in Russia before the war amounted to 79,500,000 tons, while in 1920 the crop amounted to 40,000,000. The immediate cause of the famine is the long drought of the

Hugh Walpole

Miss Macpherson Predicts Still Greater Achievements for Successful Novelist.

Hugh Walpole was the subject of study at Saturday night's meeting of the University Women's Club held at the Arts Building, Western University. After a brief but intensely interesting account of the life of this distinguished man of letters, given by Miss Skelton, Miss Mary Macpherson undertook to give a critical paper of his works, which proved not only entertaining but exceedingly instructive.

During the course of her critical study of Walpole, Miss Macpherson

read brief passages from his works to illustrate his style, mentioning the three groups under which his works are classed: Studies in place, including the "Golden Scarecrow," "The Wooden Horse," and the "The Gods of Mr. Perrin"; Prologues, including the "Pre-lude to Adventure" and "Fortitude"; and the Rising City, including "The and the Rising City, including Iris Duchess of Rex," the "Green Mirror," the "Secret City," the "Dark Forest," "Jeremy," the "Wooden Horse" and "The Thirteen Travelers," this latter group of books showing the struggle between the old aristocracy and the new democracy.

The speaker referred to the author's habit of using the same characters in different novels, without making any attempt to have them grow up in sequence. She also pointed to his very happy faculty of catching just the right word or phrase to set a picture vividly, and concluded with the thought that Walpole showed promise of even much greater achievement in the future. 





Mr. Justice Sutherland Presides at High Court Sessions.


