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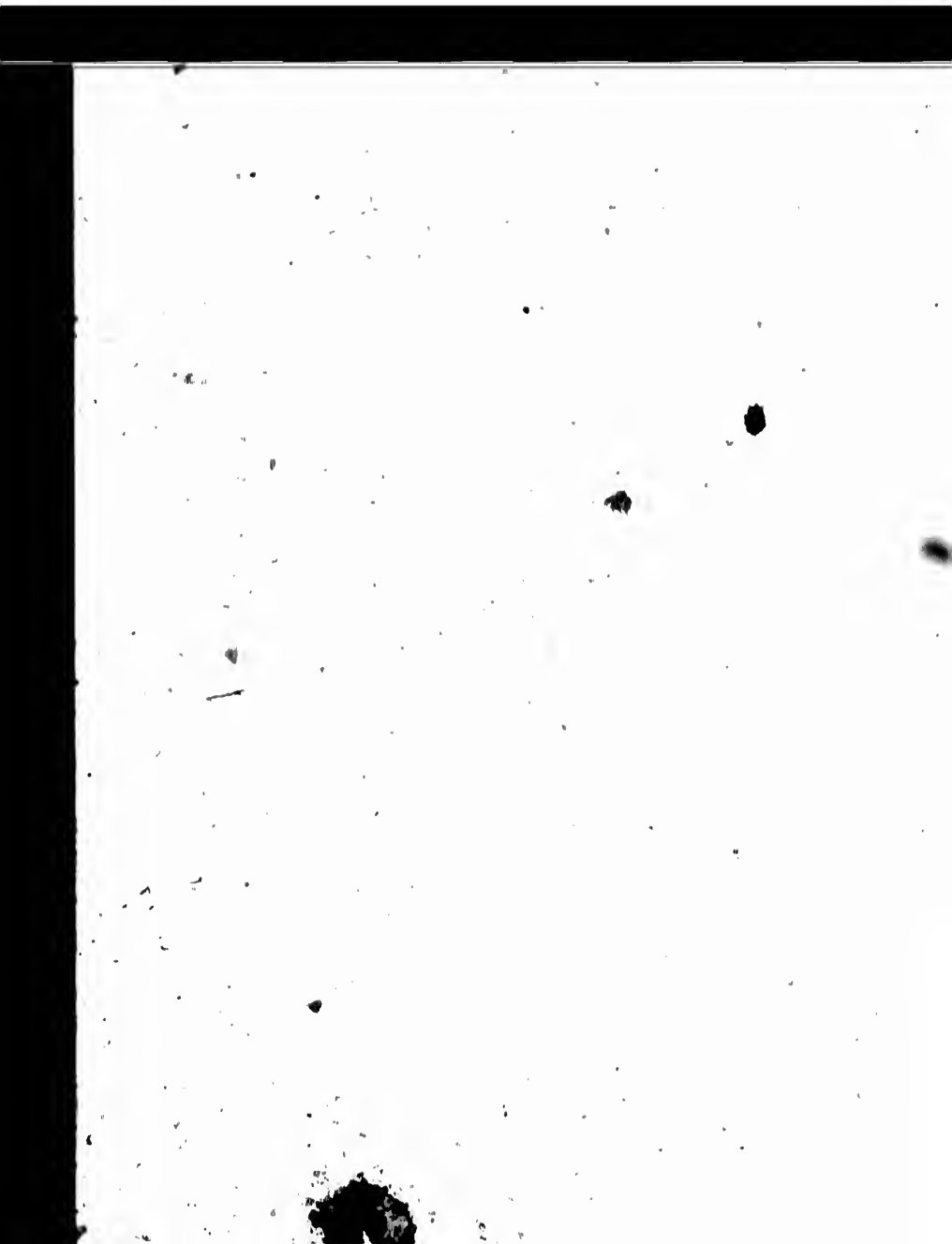
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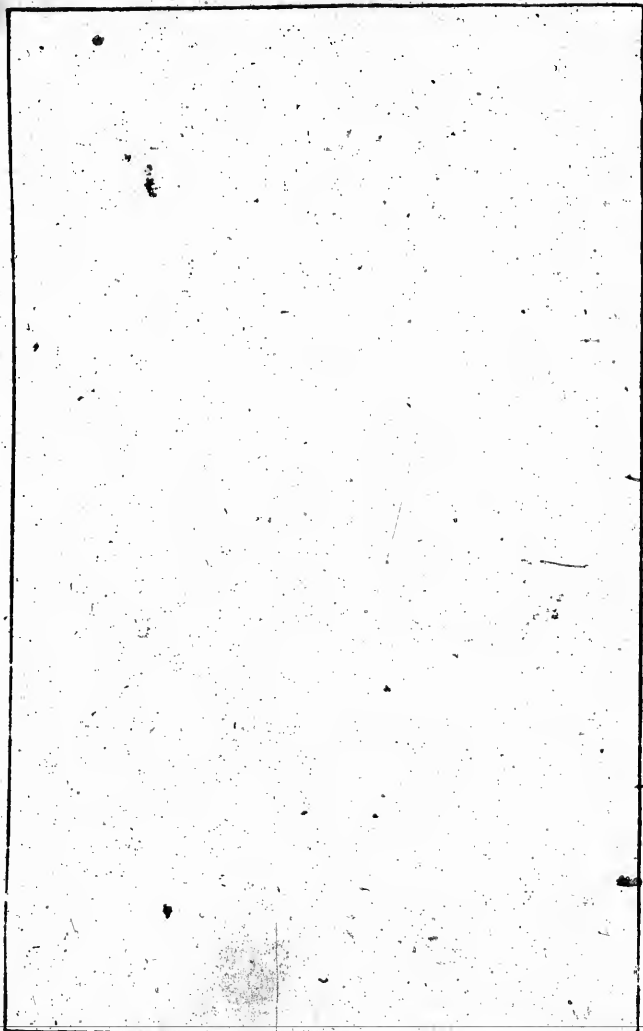
PREFACE.

Sweet is the peace my Father gives.

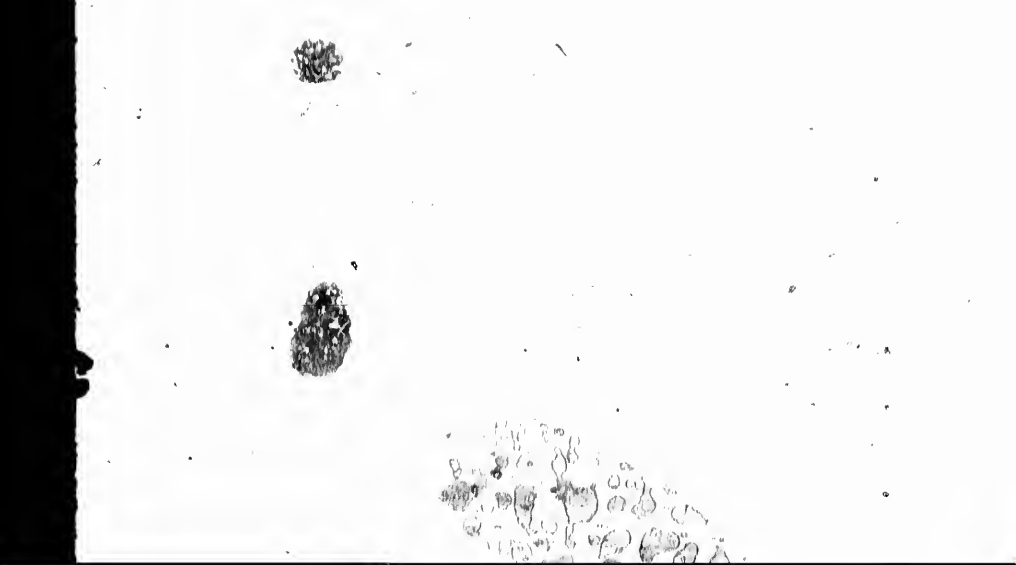
If the living God is our support, we shall

And keep us lest we stray.

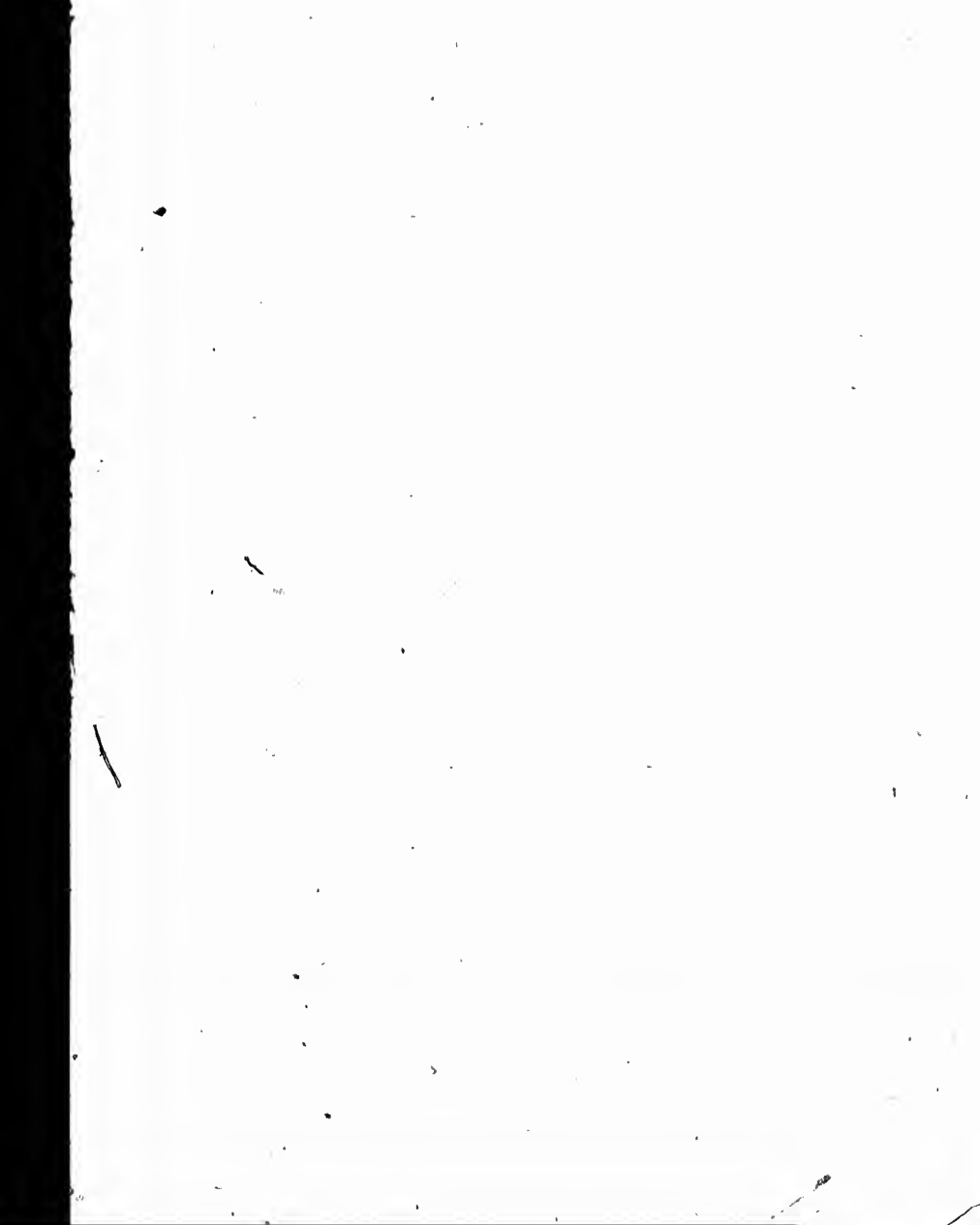
Walk closely with God, and he will faith-

 That as thy days thy strength shall be.

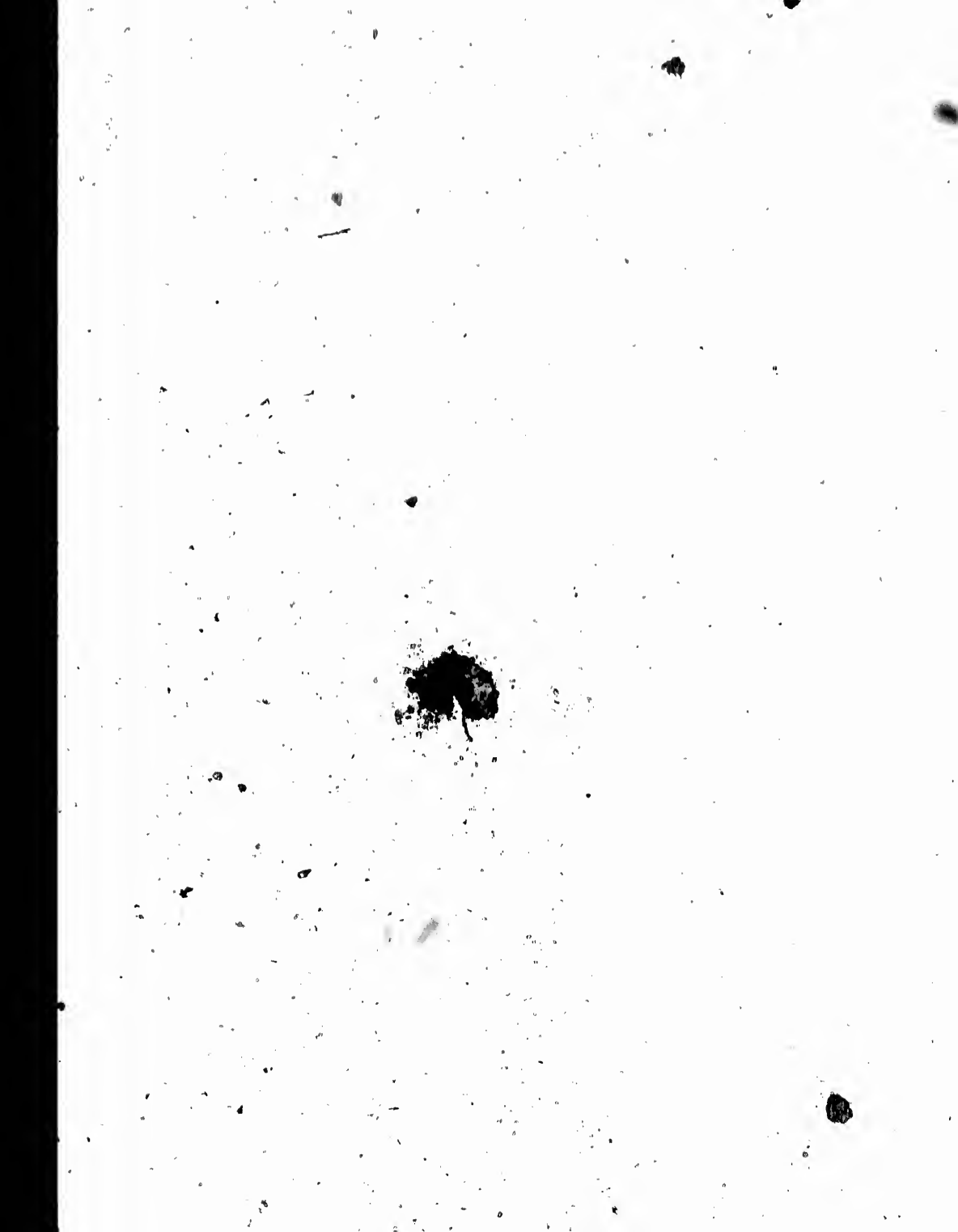

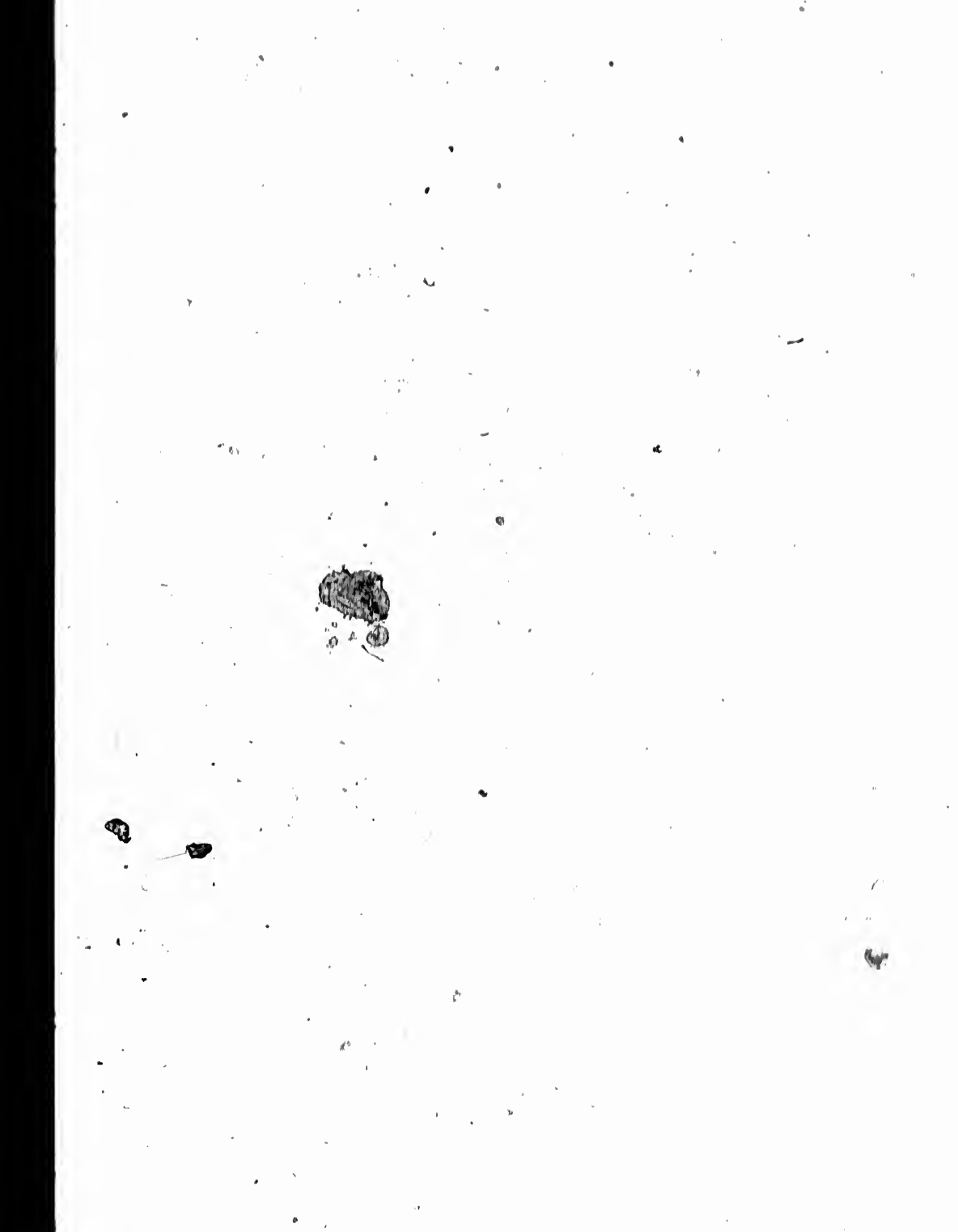

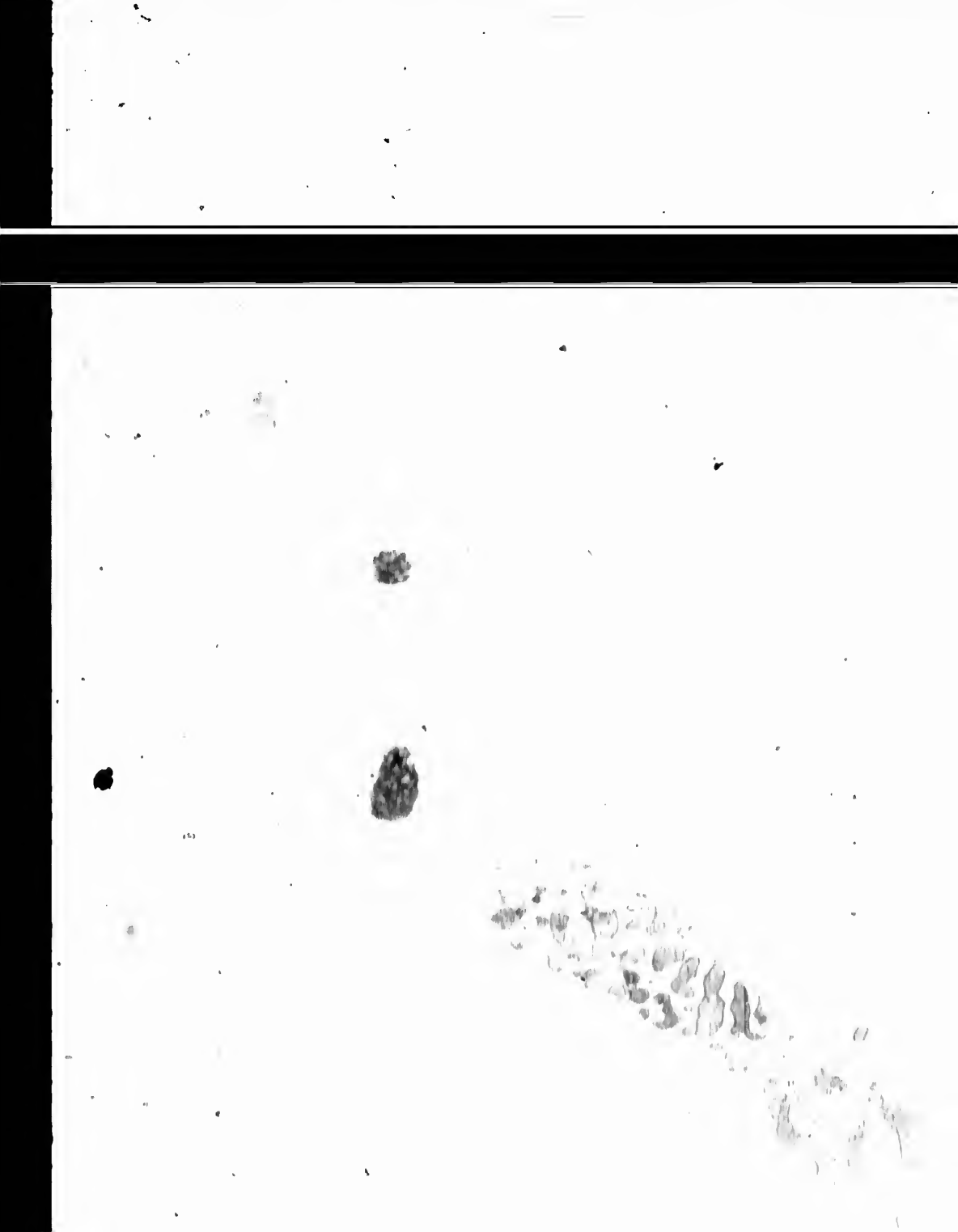

My guilt removed, my sin forgiven.

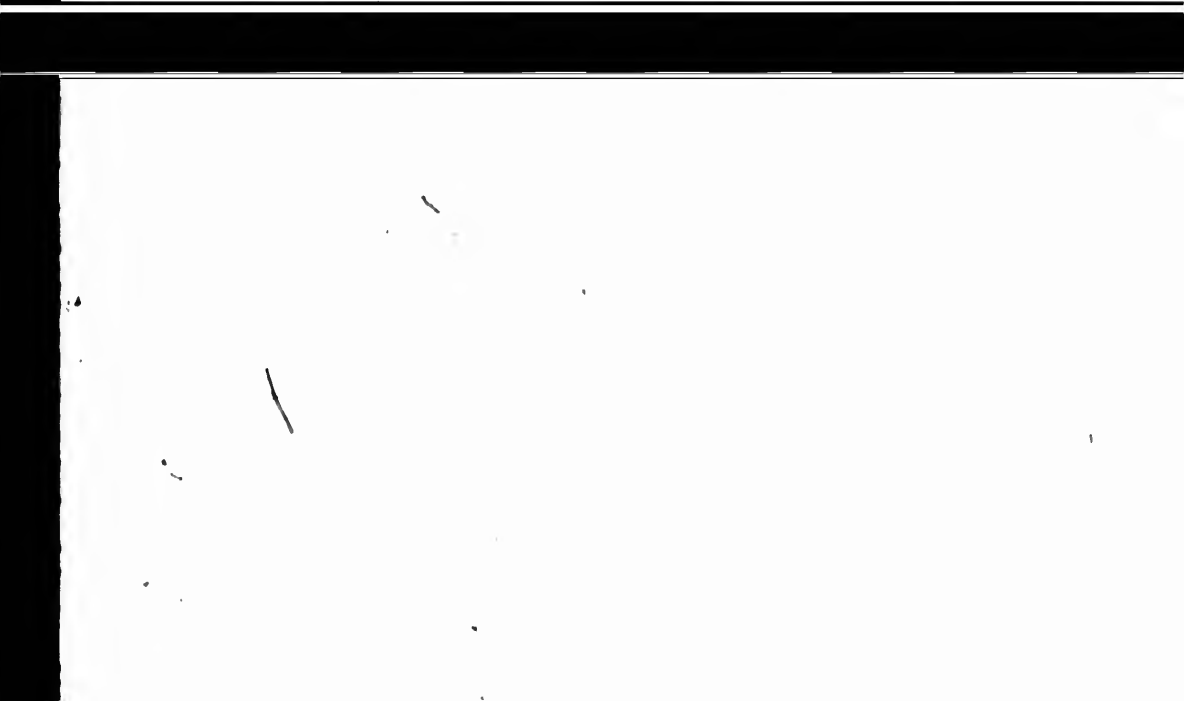
The one offering of Jesus made a full and everlasting atonement for all our sins; he is our peace: believing this, we shall be peaceful.
