II.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, June 22nd, visible in Asia, Australasia, Pacific Ocean and Western edge of North America.

III.—An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 7th, visible to Southern half of South America and Cape of Good Hope.

IV.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Dec. 31st, visible in Southern Ocean.

V.—A total Eclipse of the Moon, Dec. 16th, visible in some way to the world generally. To the Eastern seaboard of North America it will be invisible. In the adjoining region as far West as the Mississippi River the Moon will set in the morning with the coming shadow.

VI.—A partial Eclipse of the Sun, Dec. 31st, visible to Eastern portion of Dominion of Canada. The Sun will rise partially eclipsed where visible, and as follows: Halifax, N.S., 9h. 38m.; Quebec, 9h. 10m.; Montreal, 9h. 2m.; Toronto, 8h. 21m.

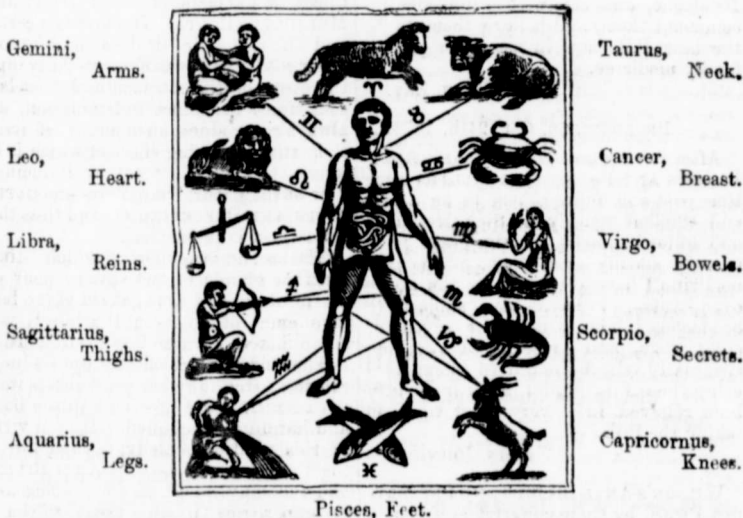

of the hair. Here then is the seat of all diseases which produce the loss of hair, and blanching or turning gray. resulting from a weakened energy, and to be attributed to excess of mental or corporal labor; also humors of the scalp, which can be detected by a small white scale around the hair tube, which when forcibly removed, will exude a yell-wish matter. This, if not cured, will result in baldness of the most inveterate kind, but by using the VITALIZER in time, it will eradicate the disease. Another phase of disease is a contraction of the skin which closes around the hair sheath, and prevents a circulation of the coloring matter.
