London, Jan. 6.—Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, in answering a request in the House of Commons to-night, to state what the government policy was with respect to the seizure of neutral mails, replied that goods otherwise liable to seizure on board neutral vessels did not, under international law, acquire immunity by being sent through the post. The allied governments, he said, were accordingly applying the same treatment to all such goods, however conveyed.






