## More Renewed

### Toronto Globe Says Nagging at United States is Silly and Undidignified.

The Nugget recently printed th views of an undoubtedly able American journalist upon the relations and conditions of his country and the Do minion of Canada. The Toronto Globe, in an editorial upon these vi ws, has this to say :-

Though we disagree with much that is said by an American journalist we judge him to be a fair-minded man, who is striving to reach a right conclusion. He says that he is a careful reader of Canadian papers, that he fnds in them a general tone o hostility to the United States, and that the same tone pervades the speeches of Canadian public men. Or the ot'er hard, Carada is rarely mentioned in Ame ican journals of pullic speches. As to the attitud of the American pless, our correspendent is right. We see every day a gre t pile of American newspapers we rarely find in them a speech or an edi orial article unfriendly to Canada -and we find an increasing number of friendly references. When a jingo istic or unfri nily reference does appear it is likely to be copied and an swered in the same spirit, as is natural. But surely the general attitude of the American people ought to be judged by what is done by 99 per cen .. of the news, apers in three hun dred days of the year, not by the exceptional outbreaks of the erratic and

Our correspondent is perhaps laying too much st ess on anti-American feeling in Canada. He declares, for instance, that the old reciprocity treaty was abrogated by the Ameri cans largely because of the unfriendly attitude of Canada during the civi war. Now, it is true that there were southern sympathizers in Cana da during the war, and that some southern plots were hatched here. But it is also true that many Can dian were proud of the reputation which Canada had won as the refuge o slaves fleeing from their owners, and remain d staunch friends of Lincoln and the north. Conspicuous amon there was George Brown; the virtual, if not always the titular, leader of the Reform rarty. He hated slavery from the bottom of his heart; he assailed the institution of slavery in his newspaper, The Globe, for twenty years; he personally befriended slave refuge s; he was one of the first to pe ceive the sterling qualities of Lincoln and to understand the motives whi h guided his policy; and he threw his whole personal influence and the influence of his newspaper on the side of the Union. It is wi hin the mark to say that half the people of Canada held views similar to Mr. Brown's. But his attitude is entirely forgotten in the United States, while the tradition of Canadian hostility is carefully preserved, and puns through all the American hi tork and biograrhy of the cerical. Moreover, a good many Canadians who had been friendly were turned away by the Trent aleir, which happened soon after the war, and as a onsequence of
