Bright Angel Camp Grand Canyon, Arizona

May 22nd 1913

It is not possible for mere words to describe the wonders of this wonderful part of the world, or even the mind to imagine what the terrific convulsion of nature must have been in former ages out of "the deep sea" of wonders these marvellous formations of rock and sand-stone.

Here spread before one, as far as eye can see, arise, side by side, mosques, minarets, Buddha temples, pyramids, battleships, and Greek theatres, of almost perfect form and coloring.

If the early Egyptians had seen these wonderful formations, they could easily have imitated their form and color, and modelled their wonderful buildings which remain to this day, some in perfect condition and some in ruin, so exactly has nature set the copy for all that is marvellous in models of architecture for temples, and pillars and tombs for the mighty dead.

But what can we say about the illusionary, visionary, mirage of coloring, which clothes and shrouds these mighty giants, and brings out in relief, now a strata of lime stone, tinged with yellow, then all the deep varying shades of red, piled up in monuments of different forms, from three thousand to eight thousand feet in height, relieved only by the soft dark green of plateau and canyon, in the innermost recesses of which one can catch glimpses of the sparkling Colorado river gleaming and flashing in the eternal sunshine of this arid land.

A visit to this fair spot is not complete, unless the visitor sees the sun set over all this majesty.

As the sun disappears over the distant mountain, peak and turret, and castle, each in turn, flash out in high relief, lighted by the departing rays, and all is veiled by the illusive violet coloring, which deepens to a deep purple glow in the valleys, and is only seen over eastern landscapes, a coloring which artists in vain attempt to copy, and which mingling with the rays of the setting sun, leads the mind on and up to "the rainbow round about the throne" so appealing to the imagination is the varying changing miracle of coloring.

On this high point, surrounded by a deep silence that can be felt, the low murmuring of the pines only breaking the great stillness, one can but feel, with deep awe in ones heart, the majestic power which has wrought this wonderful and changing scene, and the heart goes up in a voiceless prayer to the almighty creator in praise and adoration.

Broomhall's Foreign Crop Cable

APRIL 22, 1913.

UNITED KINGDOM.—Outlook for the wheat crop is less favourable, owing to the continued wet weather. Spring sowing is backward. Weather is now improving and is spring-like.

FRANCE.—There is some mention made of a thin plant and loss of colour, other-wise the outlook is favourable. Spring cereals are mostly starting well.

GERMANY.—The recent severe cold weather has damaged the fruit crops and has affected the cereal crops, but the damage to the latter is repairable. Spring sowing is progressing favourably. Weather is improving.

RUSSIA.—Some damage to winter crops is confirmed. Spring crops are mostly favourable. In the Volga region the weather is rather dry, but the weather on the whole is reasonable.

ROMANIA.—According to an official estimate the shortage in the acreage to wheat will amount to 1,185,000 acres. Condition of the crop is satisfactory. Spring crops are progressing favourably.

BULGARIA.—According to an official report the condition of wheat is favourable.

HUNGARY.—Recent severe weather has not done any damage to the crops.

ITALY.—Crop outlook is generally favourable. Native offers are firm and scarce. Weather is normal.

SPAIN.—The recent improvement has been maintained.

NORTH AFRICA.—Damage by frost has been experienced in two departments; others are in need of rain.

INDIA.—Harvesting of wheat is progressing favourably.

New Science Building for Dalhousie

The Contract is Awarded to Falconer and McDonald.—Material to be Iron Stone and to Cost \$150,000

The contract for the new science building for Dalhousie University has been awarded to Falconer and McDonald, at a figure in the vicinity of \$150,000, the job to be concluded by July, 1914.

The building is to be of iron stone, the same material as in All Saints Cathedral. It will be 62 feet by 152, and three stories high. The stone will be quarried at the North West Arm.

The engineers will lay out the ground today, it is expected, and tomorrow the contractors will begin. —Halifax Herald

The annual report of the Manitoba Department of Agriculture shows a marked increase in production in that Province for 1912. In grain production, an increased yield of over 22,000,000 bushels over the previous high-production year is shown. Much of the wheat in eastern Manitoba, owing to bad harvest weather, was reduced in grade. The average yield per acre in 1912 was 20.7 bushels, as compared with 18.29 bushels in 1911. The oat crop showed a small increase in yield, being 46 bushels per acre, as against 55.6 bushels in 1911. Barley, at 3.15 bushels per acre, showed an increase in yield of nearly 4 bushels per acre over that of 1911. Work with alfalfa has proven that it may be successfully grown in nearly all parts of the Province.

Greeks Suffered Heavy Losses

Athens, May 26.—The seriousness of the fighting between the Greeks and Bulgarian in the vicinity of Saloniki, is indicated by the official figures of the Greek losses. These show three officers and fifty-six men killed, and three officers and 194 men wounded.

The fighting has now ceased, the arrival of King Constantin having a beneficial effect on both sides. Greece proposes the demarcation of a wide neutral zone between the two armies and the Bulgarian Premier has promised to issue stringent orders to the military commanders to prevent further conflicts.

Transplanting Trees

How to Make Trees Comfortable at Moving Time

In a planting tree to make it grow—and there should be no other aim—the tree should be made just as comfortable in its new environment as possible. If the land is wet it should be drained, for trees will never thrive with wet feet. The best results are obtained by preparing the land the previous year for the setting of the trees. Clover plowed under in the Fall will make humus the following year and keep the soil moist about the roots. Trees will often do well in poor soils and unfavorable conditions if good soil is placed about their roots, so that they get a good start the first year or so. After they once become established they do considerable towards taking care of themselves.

The hole dug for a tree should be large enough, so that the roots may be spread out naturally in all directions. Yet it is not necessary to dig very wide holes if the trees are heavy-rooted, for the roots of a tree always need trimming back at transplanting time. Cut back all roots larger than a lead pencil, leaving a clean-cut surface. Remove all broken or lacerated roots and those that become dried and dead. The cut surface should always show fresh, living wood. When these clean-out surfaces come in contact with moist soil the cambium grows out over the head and forms a callus, from which new roots start very readily.

TRIMMING AND PLACING THE ROOTS

In trimming the roots it is best to make a sloping cut, with the cut surface facing downwards. When such a tree is set, the cut surfaces will always come in contact with the soil, and the callus forms readily. It is thought by some that the cut surfaces facing downward cause the tree to become deeper rooted than when cut otherwise. This may have some effect on making trees deep-rooted, but more, doubtless, depends on the nature of the soil.

If the ground is a hard clay in the bottom of the holes, it will pay to haul good earth and put a shovelful or two in each hole. As the tree is lined up, it should be placed so that the large or main roots are in line with the prevailing wind. It will be noticed by those handling trees that the largest or main roots usually grow in directly opposite directions from the base of the trunk, and seldom at right angles to each other. These large roots form a sort of root axis, which are sometimes known as the brace roots of the tree. If care is taken in setting the trees, so that the brace roots are in line with the prevailing winds, the trees will be firmly fixed and not easily affected by storms. If, on the other hand, the main root axis is placed at right angles to the prevailing wind, the tree is rocked backwards and forwards, as if on a hinge. Attention to this point will save many trees. The neglect of it is often seen where the collar of the tree works a hole three or four inches across. This, of course, causes great loss of moisture and injury to the roots. Trees should usually be tilted a few degrees towards the direction of the prevailing wind.

THE PLANTING BOARD

One of the quickest and most accurate methods of setting trees is by the use of the planting board. This board is usually six feet long and four inches wide. It has a hole bored near each end, and on the middle of one side, exactly between these holes, a notch cut about half-way through the width of the board. When the ground is staked out and everything ready for planting, the planting board is placed so that the notch is close about the stake where a tree is to be set. Iron or wooden pins are thrust through the two holes of the board; then the board is lifted off one pin and thrown around on the other, out of the way. The hole is then dug, and when the board is swung around and dropped over the first pin the notch will indicate exactly where the tree is to be set. By bevelling the notch a trifle, the slope to the prevailing winds may be given by fitting the tree every time in the notch.

This method is rapid and so accurate that orchards may be put in on straight line without the trouble of sighting the trees.

Filling in the holes is the most important step in the whole operation. To get the best results, moist soil must be placed closely about the roots so that there will be no airholes or crevices. The best instrument for accomplishing this work is the human hand. When the tree is placed in position the roots are spread out and a shovelful or two of the finest and best earth thrown upon them. This should be carefully worked into the crevices with the fingers, and when the hole is about one-third full, all the earth should be tramped down solid. The bigger the better, the heavier the man, the better for the tree. There is little danger of tramping it too much, but trees often die for lack of tramping. After the roots are all covered and packed in tightly, the hole may be filled with the remainder of the earth. The surface should be left loose; tramping it would pack the soil so that it would lose moisture and dry out the trees. A mulch of manure about each tree is a good thing to conserve moisture.

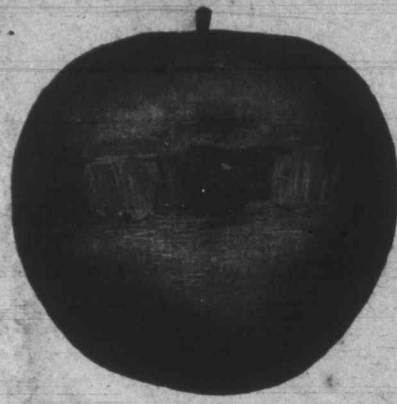
The house and wood house at the farm of the late John T. Bennett, at Randville, near Canning, were burned about 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.
