Speaking of idolatry, he said:—"There is remarkable correspondence between Romanish worship and Hindu morship. Romanism is but a new label on the old bottles of paganism containing the deadly poison of idolatry. Often the Hindu ask us when seeing the Romish worship, "What is the difference between Christianity and Hinduism?"

La Presse quotes these words, with what printers call a "scare" heading beginning, "Our religion insulted," and protests against them energetically. "The majority of the Protestants who compose the Christian Endeavor society must regret the words which one of their speakers employed this morning in order to insult Catholicism, and consequently Cathelics, who form the vast majority of the inhabitants of Montreal. After the sympathetic reception of which the association was the object on the part of Mayor Desjardins, a Roman Catholic; on the part of the French press, and of the whole Catholic population of this city, we scarcely expected words so full of insult to us. Will the insulter be repudiated by the other members of the Christian Endeavor society?"

His friends say that the views he expressed were the result of years of study and deep deliberation, and were read from manuscript on an important occasion, and therefore will not be retracted. OTTAWA, July 14.—Prof. Wiggins says that in two or three weeks a very brilliant comet will be seen in the northern

liant comet will be seen in the northern sky.

He had been watching for some weeks for a comet, which, he says, is the large variable star seen by Cornelius Gemma in 1570 in the constellation of Cassiopia, as its reappearance was about due.

In 1864 he announced that Gemma's star, usually called the Star of Bethlehem, was only a large comet at its perihelion, when its tail surrounded it and gave it the appearance of a star of the first magnitude. He considers that his theory has been proved now, for on the might of the 8th inst. he saw for a few minutes, between clouds and near the pole of the heavens, a star of the sixth magnitude moving rapidly sunward, which he pronounces a comet, and which is seeking a nearer perihelion than in 1570. On its return from the sun it will be very brilliant. It is now, he says, probably below the horizon.

Sunday labor is prohibited in Europe, except in France and the Netherlands, where the workmen are given time for devotional exercises. Night work is prohibited for women under 21 years of age in Austria, Belgium, France. Germany, Great Britain, Netherlands and Switzerland, except in cases where factories run continuously all hours. The hours of labor are eleven dully, except in Great Britsin, where ten hours only are allowed. In un healthy occupations a ductor's certifisate is required in all countries for both women and children.
