DEAR MR. EDITOR.—While I sit in the comfortable office of the Acadia Villa Hotel waiting for my boys to come in from the Collegiate Academy I will employ my time in giving you a few impressions which I have formed of Wolfville.

Religious Instruction in the Schools.

To Whom it May Concern:—I have lately learned that an incident which occurred in Greenwich school about two months ago regarding religious instruction, is becoming a subject of conversation both here and in Wolfville, and as the facts have not been given to the public their information is not very clear on the points involved and their comments, as I have some reason to know, are of such a nature as to call for some statement from me.

I had supposed that when the Supt. of Public Instruction, the trustees and teachers acceded to my request as a right under the Nova Scotia law, that the matter would be dropped. That public attention should be attracted in any degree was not to be hoped for, and it certainly was not forced to it. But if the public is really interested it should be encouraged and more information given.

I do not intend going into the merits of the question at this time as my only desire is to make a short statement in explanation of my position before those who might be disposed to push me into outer darkness are able to close the gates upon me.

The N. S. law on the subject of religious instruction in schools instructs the teacher to inculcate by precept and example a respect for religion and the principles of Christian morality. If this were done I would only be too pleased with such a disposition of the question as far as I am concerned, but I feel compelled to add that if any Mohammedan or infidel objected to the insertion of the word 'Christian' in the law as quoted I should in fairness to them agree that a sectarian teaching has no place in a non-sectarian school. With all due respect to the teachers, who no doubt feel helpless in the face of custom, I must say that the meaningless ceremonies performed in our schools in the name of religion, are not only worse than worthless but not in accordance with Nova Scotia law.

If this view is correct, and I am ready to uphold it, of what crime against society am I guilty when I make the very mildest possible protest by requesting that my children be non-participants in these exercises? It is a custom of which I completely blame one in particular, but if there are people who wish to place the finger of condemnation upon me only ask them to study the subject before doing so, and then if the public interest seems to demand it I shall be only too happy to reply in full.

Kings County Baptist District Meeting.
