The safest and the soundest principle is to keep salt within reach of animals all the time and allow them to take it at will, as their appetites demand. It is not always possible or economical to keep water constantly before animals, but salt is readily snough placed so that they may take it at will. We much prefer rock salt for stock. It is more economical in that there is much less wasted. Moreover, animals are less apt to take too much of it. When deprived of salt for some time, teeding steers can easily enough get too much if it is put before them in rock form they cannot eat it, but are compelled to satisfy their appetites by licking it slowly and are not likely to get an excess.

All pastures should contain boxes of salt. Unless barrel salt is protected under a shed it will waste from washing when the rains come, whereas the forck salt is subject to such loss only in slight degree. No horse can run any distance without taking breath, and the result is almost immediate, confusion and suffocation, which bring the animal to a slow galt or a complete stop. The greatest care must be taken not to pull too long on this line, as the horse may empty his lungs and fall from exhaustion.
