## LATEST FROM INDIA.

The following telegraph despatch was received at the Foreign-office from Acting Consul-General Green, December the 14, 1858, at -4 p.m. :-

Alexandria, Dec. 10
The steamer Ganges arrived at Sues from Bombay yesterday, with dates to the 25 th of November.
The Queen's Proclamation has given general satisfaction throughout India.
In Oude the talookdars are tendering their submission, and surrendering their forts and arms.
Rajah Loll Mahdoo Singh surrendered himself and his forces of Amethy on the 10th of November.

The fort of Simree, in Oude, was taken by Brigadier Eveleigh on the 9th, with the loss of only two Europeans killed and three or four wounded.
Tantra Topee is in the Satpoorah hills, the outlets of which are closely guarded.
The following are official telegraphic des-patches:-
From Indore, Nov. 28. -The Nawab of Banda has separated from the rebels, and is gone to General Michel's camp 'en route to Indore. He states he comes under the Queen's proclamation.'
From ${ }^{*}$ Swuntwarree, Nov. 23. -The remining rebel leaders have given themselves up to government.'

No loss on or side. On the 3rd of Nov., Brigadier Wetherall to's the fort of Rampore Kupia by ass fault, and found five guns in it. He lost thirty men; the loss of the rebels was severe. On the 9th of Nov., Brigadie. Eveleigh took the fort of Jamie, Two Europeans were killed. The fort of Ame-
thee was surrounded by Coll Madeoo Singh on the 9th of Nov., and on the 11th of November was occupied by our troops. Sixteen guns found, more belived to be in the fort.

Central India.- On the 31 st of Ottober aud 1st of November Tantia Topee and his followers, with guns, but with a number of elephants, crossed the Nerbudda 40 miles up stream from ${ }^{\circ}$ Hoshungabad and are believed to be making towards the Deecan. They were last heard of as crossing the Chundwara hills. They have plenty of mon, but are short of ammunition. Gen aral Michel was at Hoshungabod on the 7th and Brigadier Parke was expected there on the 8th, The Resident at Hyderabad and the Commissioner at Nagpore are watching the rebels, and are prepared,
Bengal-Nothing particular has occared during the last fortnight. The rebels, it is expected will try to break away, and make in the direction of Mirzapore. A mutiny is amid to hoy occurred in the rebel? men

the 14th they crossed the Tate River and proceeded in the direction of and Dhar to the Nerbudda. They reached Acharpore, on the south bank of the Nerbudda, on the 21st. All the forts on the north bank of this river are guarded. The British forces are in close pursuit. Troops have been concentrated at Sindwa and Chopra to prevent the enemy entering Candeish.
The Banda Nawab has left the rebel camp, and on his way to Major-General Michel.
Adil Mahomed and his party have searanted from Tania Topee, and are now with Maun Singh near seronge, pursued by the column

Executive misrule which they lack the spiExecutive misrule which they lack the spi-
rit to repudiate, or still worse become a parrit to repudiate, or still worse become a par-
ty to injustice by participating in advantage which such governments are prone to concede as a reward for toleration by those who are capable of being silenced by such unworthy considerations.
We have frequently
that as the Members of urged the argument accountable for the acts of the Government they support, so are the supporters of those Members equally accountable. If we are
correct in this conclusion it must follow that our needy Ministers are not so much to be blamed for availing themselves of the mateis that party who being independent in means, still for the sake of greater pecuniary advantages yield their inf greater pecuniary vacate the claims of the supporters of a Government, which they well know to be a flaprantly corrupt one; thus contributing to debenefit, of the reasonable advantages of equitable Legislation aud just rule, burthening them in the first place by an exhorbitent per centage upon the necessaries of life, and in the second by bolstering up $s$ Governmont which is sedulously bent upon increasing taxation whenever and however that obfeet can be most certainly attained. We would _ not be understood to include
our commercial body generally in this cen sure, acknowledging with satisfaction that the majority are above such influence, we only allude to those who shrink not from the odium which such a course necssarily entails
