## VINDICATED ANGLO-SAXON AERONAUTICS BY GREAT FLIGHT

### Hon. Chas. Stewart Rolls Across the English Channel Twice Without Alighting—Making the Round Trip Between Dover and Calais in Ninety Minutes

Dover, Eng., June 2.—The Hon. Chas. Stewart Rolls, captain in the London section of the Army Motor Service, driving a Wright biplane, vindicated Anglo-Saxon aeronautics by crossing the English channel twice this evening without alighting. He made the round trip between Dover and Calais in ninety minutes.

While two Frenchmen, Louis Bleriot and Count De Lesseps have crossed the channel in an aeroplane, it remains for an Englishman in an American machine to perform the double feat. The distance across between the two points named is 21 miles, so that his over-water flight of 42 miles without a stop establishes a new record.

Captain Rolls left Dover at 6.30 o'clock. The atmospheric conditions were excellent. He lost no time in manoeuvring after describing a circle, headed towards the French coast. In anticipation of the flight torpedo boats steamed at full speed across the channel. The pace of the aeroplane was swifter.

Captain Rolls sent his machine to a height of 300 feet, and at that

altitude he skimmed through the air like a great bird. The motor worked perfectly. The crowd who watched the start confidently awaited the return and it was not long before the speck which those who had telescopes saw disappear on the French coast, growing larger with every minute.

When finally the aviator became visible to the naked eye cheer after cheer arose from the enthusiastic spectators, and as he gracefully soared toward the landing place made famous by Bleriot, he was given an ovation. He alighted at eight o'clock at almost the same spot as Bleriot, showing little signs of strain of his magnificent flight.

## SENSATIONAL SCENE AT ST. STEPHEN

### While Body of the Mother of Mr. Arthur Price, of Moncton, Was Being Taken to the Grave—Gates of Company-Controlled Cemetery Were Locked Against the Dead

St. John, June 3.—The Telegraph's correspondent at St. Stephen says:— A disgraceful occurrence took place Thursday afternoon at the entrance of the St. Stephen Rural cemetery. The cemetery is owned and controlled by a company. The by-laws, rules and regulations by which the operations of the cemetery are conducted, have caused much dissatisfaction. The present superintendent, J. R. Sederquest, who has control of the cemetery, receives his instructions from the company and has proved himself a most trustworthy official.

Among his orders is one which allows no horse but that of the company to enter the cemetery. Thursday afternoon the funeral of Mrs. Morris, of this town, took place, and Samuel Mehan, a local undertaker, was engaged with his horse to take the body to the cemetery for interment. When he reached the cemetery gate it was closed and locked. Town Marshal Cotter was there, presumably on duty. Arthur Price, a son of Mrs. Morris, now of Moncton, but formerly an undertaker of this town, was attending the funeral, and it is said by instructions from him, Mr. Mehan attacked the gate with an axe and broke the lock. Mr. Mehan's horse with the body then proceeded to the grave where the interment took place.

## GOVERNOR-GENERAL COMING FOR THE NIobe CELEBRATION

### Hon. L. P. Brodeur, Minister of Marine, and Hon. R. Lemieux, Postmaster General, Will Also Be Present—International Tribunal Suggested

Ottawa, June 2.—It was announced at Government House today that His Excellency the Governor General and Countess Grey would sail for England on June 9. The tour is a purely private one, and they will be absent one month. His Excellency's trip to Hudson's Bay was in consequence postponed until August. Earl Grey will probably return in time to take part in the demonstration at Halifax in connection with the arrival of Canada's first naval vessel, the Niobe. Hon. Mr. Brodeur and Hon. Mr. Lemieux have arranged to attend the Halifax celebration.

In connection with the creation of the International Tribunal for the control of rail traffic crossing the border, to which Chairman Mabee of the Railway Commission has been appointed as Canadian representative, it is possible that some arrangement may be reached by the Governments of Great Britain, the United States and Canada for a similar tribunal to afford some medium of control of control of rates both on passenger and freight to be charged by Atlantic steamship companies.

## KING GEORGE MEETS VICTOR EMMANUEL

### Italy's Monarch Asked to Come to Aid of Little Crete—Independence of Island Hellenic Ambition.

Rome, June 4.—King George of Greece arrived here today in the strictest incognito, to confer with King Victor Emmanuel regarding the Cretan situation and to urge that Italy as one of the four protecting powers of the island assist in the realization of the Cretan ideal. The ambition of Crete is shared, the Grecian monarch insists, by the whole Hellenic race.

## HOW FARMERS CAN PRACTICE OBSERVATION

Canada, being a nation of farmers, has to pay a very large seed bill each year. Last year our crops called for 33,000,000 bushels of seed grain—wheat, oats and barley, and we are constantly increasing our agricultural acreage. This being so, the economy of sowing good clean seed is at once apparent. The advantages to be derived from it are like the proceeds of a sum of money laid out at compound interest—they are cumulative in their effect and grow in ever increasing ratio. Some years ago a competition was carried on in some 450 places in Canada, to see just what the actual results of using clean pure seed would be. If we reason from the results obtained from it, we find that our grain yield last year would have been increased by 190,000,000 bushels of bushels had clean vigorous seed been sowed on every acre under cultivation. Now, 190,000,000 bushels of grain would fill 1,500 miles of railway grain cars. It is such a large amount that it is hard for the mind to comprehend, but, at any rate, it goes to show that it would pay our farmers to be particular about the kind of seed they sow.

Prince Edward Island furnished Seed for the North West two years ago, and had to ship it under disadvantage. It can supply Canada with Seed if given a chance. Why not have the tunnel?

The countries visited were England, Scotland, Ireland, Denmark and Holland. Denmark and Ireland, being the strongest competitors of Canada in the British market, received most attention. The report described clearly how the hogs are bred and reared, and the various steps taken to develop the export bacon trade. The far famed co-operative system, as applied by the Danes to the breeding and rearing of the swine, the packing and marking, is fully described. Co-operative feed buying, which involves the purchase of over six hundred million pounds of grain, oil cake, etc., a year, is fully dealt with.

OUR PRISONS

Our lock-up is in a most unsanitary condition. This paper some years ago drew attention to the gaol and lock-up but without effect.

With our modern knowledge of diseases and their circulation, through microbes and germs; it is wonderful that we can get a man to act as a keeper of the gaol or even lock a prisoner in our town cells.

We have had occasion to visit the several places of imprisonment in the county within a short space of time and while not much sympathy or consideration is usually given to the inmates by the general public, the keepers, at least, should be protected from the deadly diseases that lurk in the clothing or persons of the prisoners.

Why not secure a residence for our gaol keeper where the fumes and microbes of the dregs of the earth are not continually arising through the building to his family? Why not fumigate the gaol, and lock up at least once a month? Needless to mention the diseases that go into them. Suffice it to say that no man has kept his family in the residence provided, for any length of time and come out healthy; and many healthy men, for minor offences have been compelled to lodge in cells previously tainted by Tuberculosis, and even more terrible diseases, without any precaution against their spread.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-empted six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
