Development of the British drug industry, brought about by the war, has rendered Great Britain largely independent of foreign sources of supply.

The steamer Pocalontas with 1700 Polish troops aboard, was held at Quarantine upon arrival in New York on the 21st, when physicians discovered two cases of typhus aboard.

Former Premier Georges Clemenceau, who has been visiting Egypt for the past two months arrived at Paris on the 21st. He was alert and smiling but avoided interviewers and would not be photographed.

Notices were sent out on the 23rd by all United States railways sending goods to Canada that on and after May 1 next all consignments to Canada must be prepaid in United States currency. This means an advance of about 10 per cent. on all goods imported from the States to Canada.

At least six persons lost their lives in the blizzard which raged over Colorado from Saturday to Monday, and many others are reported missing. Three of the dead were sheep herders, and their herds perished with them. Nineteen other herds are missing and their herders are believed to be lost also.

Much sympathy will be extended to Dr. A. A. Macdonald, ex-M. L. A., Souris, on the loss he has sustained in the death of his amiable partner, Mrs. Macdonald, who passed away on Sunday. Mrs. Macdonald, who belonged to Montreal, had been in delicate health for some time and her death was due to heart trouble.

Dr. Mercher, a member of the French Academy of Medicine, after an extended investigation, has determined that during a period of five months in 1917 a total of 3,690,000 shells fell on the front of three French armies. The shells, according to Dr. Mercher, killed 13,265 men and wounded 55,412. According to his figures, it took a total of 395 shells to kill one man, and half as many to wound one.

The Supreme Council at Paris has definitely decided to internationalize the Dardanelles, according to a Havas despatch from San Remo. Allied contingents will be stationed in Constantinople, so as to guard against Turkish rulers in the future leading their people astray and becoming again a danger for their neighbors and Allies. The allied military and naval experts, the despatch adds, will meet to discuss methods for organizing control over Turkey.

Calgary advices of the 22nd say: Mobilization of all available teams from the cities of the province to assist in seeding operations is being planned by the U. F. A. in co-operation with the Southern Boards of trade. The mayor and commissioners and many business men have approved of the idea. It is estimated that seeding could be assisted to the extent of 2,000 acres a day in Southern Alberta if 300 teams could be secured from Calgary, Lethbridge and Medicine Hat.

The law placing restrictions on the importation into France of articles of luxury has become law. It was signed by President Deschamps. Among the articles forbidden by the law are natural and artificial flowers from England, fruit from Belgium, feathers purchased on the Antwerp market, and jewelry, silk stockings from the United States, also are to be forbidden. M. Francois-Marcel, Minister of Finance, invites the French trade to restrain from buying in foreign markets all products excepting coal, wood and agricultural machinery.

Local and Other Items

Sir Malachy B. Daly, K. C. M. G., former Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia, died at his residence at Halifax after an illness of several weeks.

Rev. Ronald B. Macdonald, formerly of Souris, who has been spending the winter at Norfolk, Virginia, leaves there shortly on return to Prince Edward Island. He will spend some time visiting various cities on the way home.

Caught beneath a descending freight elevator, Frank Scott, foreman of Clark Bros. Limited, shoe factory, St. Stephen, N. B., was badly crushed to a concrete floor. He escaped alive in a remarkable manner, but although suffering severe injuries hopes for his recovery are entertained.

In a desperate attempt to cure themselves of the morphine habit, two returned soldiers about thirty years of age, walked into the Provincial Police Court clerk's office at Winnipeg, and begged to be sent to jail for six weeks each. The request was granted and the clerk made the necessary papers.

Scottish farmers who arrived at Kingston, recently, with the idea of doing farm work refuse to take \$50 a month with free houses and milk, which appears to be all the farmers hereabouts are offering notwithstanding the high prices they are receiving. They say they prefer to take construction jobs at \$3 a day and their keep. Some of the farmers who applied at the local labor bureau stated that they were told by the authorities in the Old Country that Canadian farmers were paying from \$75 to \$100 a month, besides free house and milk.

Rules Relating to Private Bills. 36 All petitions for Private Bills must be presented within fourteen days after the commencement of the session exclusive of adjournment.

37 No Private Bill shall be brought into the House, but upon a petition first presented, truly stating the case at the peril of the suitors for such Bill, and such petition must be signed by the said parties.

38 A committee shall be appointed at the commencement of every Session consisting of five members of whom three shall be a quorum to be denominated, The Private Bills Committee to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, and no proceedings after the first reading shall be had upon such Bill until such Committee has reported thereon to the House.

39 So soon as the Committee has reported any Bill, such Bill together with any amendments that may be suggested by the Committee, shall be printed at the expense of the parties who are suitors for such Bill and printed copies thereof delivered to the members before the second reading if deemed necessary by the Committee.

40 No Bill for the particular interest of any person or persons, Corporation or Corporations, or body or bodies of people shall be read a second time until all fees be paid for same into the hands of the Clerk of the House

41 No Bill naving for its object the vesting in or conferring upon any person or persons, Municipality or Body corporate the title to any tract of land shall be received or read in the House unless at least four weeks notice containing a full description of the land in question has been published in the Royal Gazette and one other newspaper in this Province of the intention of such person or persons Municipality or body Corporate to apply for such Bill.
