## The Democrats Return to Power

£200,000 Offer to Mr. Bryan.

WASHINGTON, April 4. Amid delirious excitement the Democrat Party began its term of legislative power to-day, when the new Congress was opened in special session. For sixteen years the Democrats have been in the minority, among the 10,000 spectators who thronged the halls and corridors of the Capitol were hundreds who were children when the last Democratic speaker occupied the chair.

The wives and daughters of men being, following the precedent set during the turbulent scenes of the closing of the last Congress, were accommodated with seats on the floor of the House, through which the President, successively passed amid the thunderous applause of the onlookers.

Foremost among them was Mr. W. J. Bryan, the thrice-defeated Presidential candidate, who held a hand shaking reception of new and old members of the party. Mr. Bryan was fresh from an interview with prominent citizens of Memphis, Tennessee, who have invented a novel answer to the problem, "What shall we do with our ex-Presidents and defeated candidates?" Memphis decided to capitalize the popularity of Mr. Bryan for his own benefit and it is known. It proposed to pay him £200,000 if he will consent to transfer his residence and the printing and publishing offices of his weekly newspaper The Commoner from Lincoln, Nebraska, to Memphis. Mr. Bryan has declined the offer, which however, will be repeated at a banquet to be given him on Thursday.—Daily Mail.

Ellaville, Ga., April 8.—Dawson Jordan, Charles Pickett and Murray Burton, negroes, were lynched near here early to-day. They had been accused of the murder of Newton Eason, a white man, on January 2, and were held on a corner's order.

The jailer was awakened by several men who told him they had a prisoner to place in jail. He admitted them and was immediately overpowered and forced to unlock the cells in which the negroes were. They were taken to the outskirts of the town and hanged and shot.

Dredging for a Hundred Millions.

At the bottom of Vigo Bay, on the coast of Spain, lies a field of galleons, and \$100,000,000 in gold, ingots and silver bars. In 1702, after escaping the perils of buccaneer and privateer frigate, this treasure fleet went down in a home port, amid smoke and flame and the thunder of guns manned by English and Dutch tars under that doughty admiral of Queen Anne, Sir George Rooke. It was the deadliest blow ever dealt the mighty commerce of Spain during those centuries when her ruthless grasp was squeezing the New World of its riches.

There, indeed, is the prize par excellence for the treasure seeker of to-day who dreams of doubloons and pieces of eight. No cold pirate hoard have a more blood-stained adventurous history than these millions, rapped by the tide of Vigo Bay, which were won by the sword and lost in battle. During the last two hundred years many efforts have been made to recover the freightage of this fleet, but the bulk of the treasure is still untouched, and \$100,000,000 or more awaits the man with the cash and the ingenuity to evolve the right salvage equipment. At work now in Vigo Bay is the latest of these explorers, an Italian, Galeazzo Eino, by name, inventor of a submarine boat, a system of raising wrecks and a wonderful machine called a hydro-scope for seeing and working at the bottom of the sea.

Record Congregation, to Hear His First Sermon.

NEW YORK, April 2. The first sermon of the Rev. J. H. Jowett from his new pulpit in Fifth-avenue Presbyterian Church this morning attracted such an enormous crowd that the police had to be called to turn back the overflow.

A huge sign, "The Church is filled to its capacity," had been prepared in advance, and this was hung at the door fifteen minutes before the service commenced. The church was then packed to its extreme limit. Purchasers stood in the galleries and on the steps, their pews having been occupied by others in the crush. The attendance was the greatest ever witnessed at a New York church service.

Entering the pulpit, Dr. Jowett read a cablegram he had received five hours earlier from his late congregation at Carr's-lane Church, Birmingham. Similar greetings were cabled in reply from the New York congregation to Birmingham at the close of the service, to be read this evening. There was the utmost enthusiasm at this friendly international exchange.

Before beginning to preach he asked for a collection of \$4000 for departmental work in the church, which he said, must on no account be curtailed for lack of money. The sum contributed was not announced on the ground that all had not been received, but it was said that the total asked for would be forthcoming.

After the service Dr. Jowett held an informal reception in the vestry. Among those who greeted him was Mrs. Andrew Carnegie. All the servants of the Carnegie household sat in a row in the gallery.

The Invaluable Lemon.

There are few fruits which contain so many domestic virtues as the lemon. The extracted juice has soothing qualities for persons suffering from throat and chest troubles. One of the homeliest, but not on that account to be despised, remedies for a cold is to drink a glass of lemonade as hot and strong as it can be swallowed when in bed at night. A profuse perspiration follows, and provided the remedy is taken in time and the patient is kept warm and not exposed to draughts it is a famous cure.

Lemon juice and honey are beneficial for coughs. The ordinary method is to mix the juice of the fresh fruit with equal parts of honey, but the better plan is to bake a large lemon in the oven until it is thoroughly soft, then add sufficient strained honey to the pulp to produce a thick syrup. This should be kept warm, and a teaspoonful taken every quarter of an hour will greatly relieve the patient.

An old still-room recipe for the alleviation of an obstinate sore throat is as follows: Strain two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice into a wine glass, add the unbroken yolk of a new laid egg, then more juice, the whole to be swallowed without beating the mixture.

Golfers and women, who indulge in outdoor exercise are often worried with tired and swollen feet. They will derive much relief if they rub their feet with equal parts of lemon juice and alcohol, well blended.

Obstinate corns can be cured by the application of a poultice made of bread crumbs and lemon juice. A thin slice of the fruit takes the place of the poultice during the day, the process to be repeated a softness as necessary.

A small bottle of fresh lemon juice should be kept on every toilet table in summer. It is useful to allay irritation caused by the stings and bites of flies and insects. A dash of it in water forms an excellent mouth wash, whitening the teeth, preventing the formation of tartar, and sweetening the breath.

Women who suffer from torpid liver should take the juice of half a lemon (without sugar) on rising every morning.

Two or three slices of lemon in a cup of hot tea (without the addition of milk) will often cure a nervous or sick headache, and many people find that a lemon is an excellent preventive of train or sea sickness.

### A Public Nuisance.

The Council has put the Government in a fix about the Small-pox Observation Hospital. The present state of affairs is that this building is now a public nuisance under the Municipal Act of 1902.

According to Councillor Martin's statement, Mr. Piccott called on him at six o'clock last Saturday and asked permission to erect a temporary building for one month. He (Councillor M.) gave him temporary permission, pending the decision of Council. Of course, Councillor Martin had no authority under the Municipal Act to give any such permission, and what he did had neither legal force nor effect.

If, however, the Council last night had given permission even on the lines adopted by Councillor Martin in his conversation with Mr. Piccott, and had otherwise conformed with the Act, an invalid permission would have been made valid. But the Council did not endorse Councillor Martin's act. They did nothing but talk. Mr. Piccott put in a formal written application, in which no mention is made as to whether the building was to be temporary or permanent, although it is stated that the hospital is for the benefit of part of the crew of the S. S. Newfoundland.

No action was taken in this application. Therefore the state of affairs appears to be that no valid authority for the erection near Quidi Vidi Road is in existence. That leads to the result that this building under section 36 of the Municipal Act is a public nuisance. That section lays down as law that any building erected without the approval of the Council shall be a public nuisance. The control and management of the local affairs of the town of St. John's is vested in the Council, i.e., in a Board of Mayor and Councillors, and it takes four of them, under Section 21, to form a quorum for the transaction of business. It follows then that Senior Councillor Martin transacted no valid business in giving his single authority to erect a hospital. The only body which can give a valid authority is a quorum of the Council. Any building erected within the city limits without that authority is a public nuisance and as such can be dealt with.

It is "up" to the Council, as soon as the sealers are discharged from the building, to see that the Government Department which has created this statutory "public nuisance" abate it. The law is supreme, and not Senior Councillor Martin, nor the Minister of Fisheries, nor both of them together. The building is an illegal building. Its erection was a lawless act. Its inception was illegal, its continuation is a public nuisance.

It is the duty of the Government to act with humanity to the sealers under observation and to provide them with good food and comfortable housing, but it is also their duty to do this without menacing the safety of others, and moreover to do it without committing a public nuisance.

### Can't Rebuild Stages. Anniversary Service.

The people of Torbay and neighbourhood who have had their stages and flakes swept away are in a quandary as to how they will prosecute the next season's fishery. They have no material cut, and as the snow is pretty well all melted cannot get into the woods to cut shores, longers, etc., to rebuild their stages and flakes. Here is an opportunity for the Government to give practical illustration of their vaunted solicitude for the fishermen by helping them to restore their property. They will be watched by the public, but these unfortunate fishermen expect little aid from the "Picnic Party" owing to their (the fishermen's) adhesion to the Liberal cause, and well they are aware that Govt. are too busy throwing out money in sops to heeled and sycophants to give much heed to them.

### No Drinking Water.

The people of that part of the South Side, west of the Long Bridge, complain that they are utterly neglected in the matter of drinking water. There are no water mains there and they are forced to use what comes off the hill which is often polluted and practically unfit for use. They hope the Council will soon attend to this matter and thereby prevent a possible outbreak of disease.

### Will Stay Out.

The general impression amongst old-time sealers is that the sealing steamers now at the icefields will remain until close time in the hope of picking up a trip of oil fat. Oil seals have been reported in great numbers, and if they could be got on the ice while closely packed, in fine weather, good fares could be procured. They cannot kill after May 1st.

### Narrowly Escaped Being Drowned.

A man named Murphy, of Torbay, narrowly escaped being washed off the rocks and drowned there yesterday while trying to save some of the material belonging to his stage which was swept away by the sea on Wednesday. A high sea is still running here, and the man was swept from the rocks on which he worked into the water. Fortunately a comrade was near and thrusting a boat hook into his clothing got him ashore after a desperate struggle. Murphy when rescued was exhausted and chilled from his immersion.

### Post for Dr. Robertson

Ottawa, April 4.—Since the announcement of the appointment of J. I. Gridale to the position of director of Dominion experimental farms, speculation has been active as to what will be the nature of the appointment of Dr. W. J. Robertson, now chairman of the Technical Education Committee.

It has been known for some time that the Government does not intend to let his services slip out of reach, and he was rumored as the probable appointee of the farm directorship. It is hinted in Government circles, however, that he is in line for something bigger, probably commissioner of Dominion agriculture, a new post.

At present the Department of Agriculture includes branches diverse from that industry, such as patents branch, director general of public health, Dominion archives, census branch, and registrar of trade and commerce. It is said that Dr. Robertson may be placed at the head of the purely agricultural branches, and the others put under the management of the present Deputy Minister of Agriculture.

**LONDON, April 22.**  
 The Government's Copyright Bill passed its second reading in the Commons to-day. The measure not only sets forth an amendment based on the Copyright Convention of 1908, but codifies the common law on copyrights and existing statutes. Copyright under the amended law runs during the life of the author, and fifty years after. Foreign authors may acquire copyright by making the first publication within the British dominions, but may be deprived of it by the Government, if the country to which they belong refuse adequate protection to British authors. Imprisonment is substituted for fine as punishment for piracy.

**LONDON, April 22.**  
 The Council of the London Chamber of Commerce has passed a resolution, according to the request of the New York Chamber of Commerce to co-operate with it to bring about the treaty of arbitration between Britain and America, proposed by President Taft.

**WASHINGTON, April 22.**  
 The Reciprocity agreement passed Congress to-day by a vote of 264 to 89.

**LONDON, To-Day.**  
 The row over the general election in Exeter last December was brought up in the House of Commons to-day. When the result of the poll was first declared: St. Maur, Liberal, had 4,786 votes, and Duke, Unionist, 4,782. The latter petitioned for a recount. St. Maur in the meantime taking his seat in the House of Commons. Justices Ridley and Channel were appointed to conduct the recount. The investigation revealed illegal practices. The finding on the recount was Duke, 4,777 and 4,776 for St. Maur. The Speaker laid before the House the report of the Judges on the recount. A motion was put and carried that the name Duke be substituted for St. Maur on the roll of the House.





## Council Meeting.

Councillor Martin presided at last night's meeting, which opened at 7.30 and did not close till 11.45, a quarter to midnight. Councillor Channing, who is laid off with a cold, was not present.

A passage at arms began at once between Councillor Mullaly and Councillor Martin about the alleged lack of punctuality and courtesy in replying to the letters of Inspector General Sullivan on general civic matters. The East End cart stand was a case in point.

The sanitary employees asked to be paid at 2 p.m. Saturdays instead of 6. Councillor Cooker was in favor of doing so but the others were against the petition.

The work of getting quarry spawls will be divided up amongst all those who tendered at 50 cents per ton.

A protest against the erection of the hospital on Quidi Vidi Road from P. Collier and others was laid on the table. A hot discussion followed. In reply to an enquiry from Councillor Cooker the Acting Mayor said that the building was a temporary one and permission had been given for one month.

A letter from Mr. Piccott asking permission of the Council in the usual way was then read. He referred to the emergency and to having got permission from Councillor Martin.

Councillor Mullaly and Councillor Martin followed in a hot cross-fire for

over an hour on this subject. To sum up in a few words, Councillor Martin tried to justify his action in giving permission for the erection of the hospital on account of the emergency, and Councillor Mullaly argued that he and the other Councillors were ignored and made little of; the permission was illegal, and permission hereby applied for by Mr. Piccott should be refused and the building torn down as soon as the sealers' quarantine had expired. Motions formally put by Councillor Mullaly on these two questions found no second and were accordingly lost.

When Mr. Piccott's application was read, Councillor Mullaly said: "For cool audacity this letter of Mr. Piccott's is the limit."

"How's that?" said Councillor Martin. "Don't you know that permission under similar circumstances has been given before?"

"I'm not now talking of what was done before," said Councillor Mullaly. "I would ask you to drop the discussion of Mr. Piccott's application and his offer to help the Council at the present time, and for you, sir, to give us an explanation of your conduct in the premises. You have ignored the members of the Council and substituted the Engineer and Secretary for them in your consultations. Mayor Ellis, if he were here, would not do such a thing. We all would not do such a thing as you have and still we are kept in the dark about an important matter like this that may involve life and death and the man on the street has to first tell us

about it. Such a thing was never known in any civic body before. You have indeed, sir, made a record for yourself. 
