Mexico City, July 18 .- A bold attempt to rob the San Carlos Fine Art School here of six of its priceless paintings, four of which were Murilos, was made Thursday night last by Igacio Martinez, a young Mexican artist, who recently returned from Italy, where he had been studying art.

Senor Martinez hid himself in the San Carlos school after closing hours and shortly after midnight he took down the paintings, which he attempted to steal. Before leaving the gallery with the paintings he started a fire in the hall, expecting it would spread rapidly, and destroy all evidences of the theft.

Luckily the fire was discovered by employees of the school living on a lower floor, before it caused serious damage. The absence of the paintings was immediately discovered, and Martinez was caught while he was attempting to leave the building with the paintings. The latter were restored to their places.





Drying Up Niagara.

"The industrial development of Niagara has so steadily increased that at the ned of the year 1913 nearly half a million electric horse-power was developed and sold by the various companies at Niagara. It is estimated that if every dop of water were diverted from the Falls into powerhouses, from one to two million horse power might be developed. Whichever estimate we take," says the Outlook, "the maximum or the minimum, it is apparent that at present we are from one-quarter to one-half way towards drying up Niagara as a scenic waterfall. It is certainly a proper thing for the people of the United States to consider and determine what general policy, they wish to pursue with regard to Niagara Falls.

"There are only three possible policies. One is that the Falls shall be made wholly a scenic asset of the country and shall not be used in any way, shape, or manner for industrial purposes. The second is that it shall wholly be given up to the utilitarian service of the people, and that all effort to preserve its scenic qualities shall be abandoned except in so far as the power-houses may be made neat, orderly and architecturally respectable. The third policy is to fix absolutely the point beyond which it is not safe to go industrially, and beyond that point to preserve the Falls

wholly for their secenic beauty. "It is physically conceivable that all the power houses may be torn down, and all the machinery deported, and all the wires coiled up and carried away, thus returning the Falls to the condition in which they were in abouiginal days. This, however, is wholly impracticable, and nobody advocates it.

"It is equally conceivable, and much more logical, to advocate the abandonment of the Falls to industrial purposes. There are many good citizens who reason that the utilitarian needs of society demand the sacrifice of Niagara Falls as a phenomenon of natural scenery. We do not share this belief. It is this policy which has destroyed many of our forests, denuded many of our mountainsides, and has made the country around many of our great mines bar-

barous and distressful to the eye. "If the people really want Niagara saved from a complete absorption by those who believe in the utilitarian policy they must make their wishes felt by the President, the Secretary of War, and by Congress. We think ourselves that the danger-point has been reached, and that no further water for hydro-electro purposes can be

used upon the American side, and no further amount of power can be admitted from the Canadian side, without endangering the scenic value of







Building Still Standing Among the Kentish Hills.

A Very Busy Child.

'I have so many things to do, I don't know how I shall get through

In a fold of the Kentish Hills, surrounded by apple orchards and hop gardens, there stands a humble building whose walls are eloquent of the

past. It is almost the only one of its kind left standing-so far as the exterior is concerned-in its entirety. The adjoining land was granted to one of his knights by Edward I., in 1272 and the most reliable antiquarian knight in the matter of building did not despise the record of the past for he adopted the Norman method

The main style of building is that of the transition from Early English to the decorated Oblong in form it has gables north and south and at either end of the long

east wall is a square projection. Ascending the stairs we find our selves in a room of truly noble pro portions, occupying the length, and breadth of the building, twenty-eight feet by eighteen and a half, and light ed by windows east, west, north and south. It is open to the roof, which contains nearly if not quite all its original form and has a fire place and an "membrey" or cupboard in which cooking and table requisites and alms for the poor were kept. In this "aire" or "aitre" the family lived and worked, and here visitors and better class retainers slept. Here, perhaps, from the beams supporting the roof hung the store of dried provisions for winter use, and the herbs collect

ed by the 'squire's dame. It was here in the "aire" that at even the family gathered round the firelight (candles were expensive luxuries in those days) to listen to the dows were unglazed, but glass might be fixed in the shutters, the iron hocks for which still remains. Oaken settees did duty as seats by day and as resting places by night and meals were served on a board placed on trustles-hence, perhaps, the phrase "the festive board."

From the hall a doorway gives admittance to one of those square chambers already noticed as built on the ends of the east wall. It is the "Lord's Chamber" the sleeping room of the women and children. The walls are thick and lancett slits, high above reach, let in a dim light by day while the shutter hooks, still tightly wedged in the wall, show how jealously the retreat was guarded by night. It was the inner sanctum, the most protected part of the house, where those dearest to the knight found refuge in troublous times his wife and children obtained privacy from the more public life of the hall.

It has a long, narrow, early English window, and two smaller ones, and retains on window arch and piscina, tracery of much architectural beauty.




