That men who have volunteered and have been rejected for military service on or before May 11th, 1918, and who have reported for service as required by the Act on forms prescribed, will not be called for medical reexamination before the 31st of October, 1918. Number of Rejection Badge or date of Rejection Certificate should be given on the printed Report sent in to

the Registrar. Any person wishing to claim exemption in respect of a Rejected Volunteer coming within Class 1 must do so within the time appointed by the Proclamation of the 11th of May, 1918, or such further time as may be allowed by the Exemption Tribunal.







Bostock were buried in Deal Cemetery with naval honours. At all the places of worship at Deal pulpit references were made to the naval raid, and stirring tributes paid to the gallant men who gave their lives.

A memorial service was held at St. James's Church, Dover. Bluejackets and marines were present, and Sir Roger Keyes and Rear-Admiral C. F. Dampier also attended.

HOMECOMING OF THE MARINES. Men of the Royal Marine Battalion who took part in the attack left Deal and Dover for Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, and on leaving the depots were given a rousing send-off. At Deal, headed by the depot brass band, the men marched to the station, carrying the large Union Jack beonging to the Vindictive fixed on poles and bearing the ___rds, "Vinlictive, Zeebrugge, 1918." All the men, many of them still bandaged, were carrying small flags painted

with the name of the vessel which took them across the Channel. At each of the ports to which the ontingents returned they had an enhusiastic homecoming, being loudly cheered by their comrades and by great crowds in the streets. At Chatham the marines were welcomed by Brigadier-General Graham commanding the division, and by thousands of people. Carrying their full equipnent, the men were headed by the band of the corps, preceded by a large Union Jack. They had a rousing reception when they marched into
