### Poultry Association Meeting

The April meeting was held last night in the Board of Trade building. The usual routine business being finished, the Vice President, Dr. Tait, read some clippings on "Poultry Culture," as practiced in Australia, which were very interesting. The clippings were kindly forwarded by His Excellency the Governor, who is Patron of the Association. Dr. Tait submitted a letter from the agent of Cel-O-Glass—a new wire and celluloid combination recently invented for use instead of glass in hot beds and poultry houses and the great feature is that the wire is unbreakable, yet easily bent to suit farmers, etc. It was highly approved by the members.

Twelve poultry men submitted their reports for March, of the egg production of their hens, which totalled 4,257 eggs for the twelve flocks. One member reported 1,000 eggs which sold at a good market price. Market price for eggs from the nest direct to the consumer is reported to be 70 to eighty cents per dozen, based on size and weight. Good eggs should weigh 24 to 26 ounces per dozen. One of the breeders of Barr'd Rocks at Topsal reports his twenty birds produced 331 eggs for March. His flock is pure bred and some won prizes at last fall's show.

The Lecture Committee reports having given an illustrated lecture to the students of St. Bonaventure's College this month, and that Rev. Bro. J. E. Ryan has now built a model poultry house and installed some 30 White Leghorns and Barr'd Rocks. This will be an educational feature for lads attending college there, from the Outports.

Messrs. George Tucker, George Graham and Thomas Lynch were appointed a membership committee to canvass for new members.

The President submitted the latest records of the egg laying competition at Truro Agricultural College, N.S. Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds were leading with 423 eggs, and White Leghorns, with 396, second.

The rules governing the Poultry Exhibitions held by the Associations were revised and improved. Fees for entering birds were raised from ten cents per bird to twenty cents, and classes made for exhibitors who are showing fowl for the first time.

Members report an increasing interest this spring on the part of the public and many members are getting big orders for hatching eggs, not alone from the city, but from the West Coast and other sections of the Island. The distribution of these pure bred eggs will go a long way to improving the breeding of poultry, generally, in this country.

### "Bears" Hard Hit

**PAYING FOR ATTACKS UPON THE FRANC—DEADLY NEW WEAPON BEING FORGED.**

The value of the franc continues to excite international interest. Financial pundits are saying that unless France balances her Budget and stops issuing paper money, the franc will relapse to its former condition. While not underestimating the importance of these measures, it is obvious that the rapid and sensational fall in the value of the franc was due to other causes. It is admitted that American and European "bears" were prowling in the franc markets of the world. Our American Correspondent cables that the support given to the franc by Messrs. J. P. Morgan & Co., the American bankers, has dealt a sore blow to at least two other big American financial houses who had been "bearing the franc," and that one large group of European "bears" had been compelled to pay almost exorbitant rates for accommodation to enable them to meet their obligations. Last week we urged that steps should be taken to stop these speculations in currency, which are a new international danger of a terrible and subtle kind. 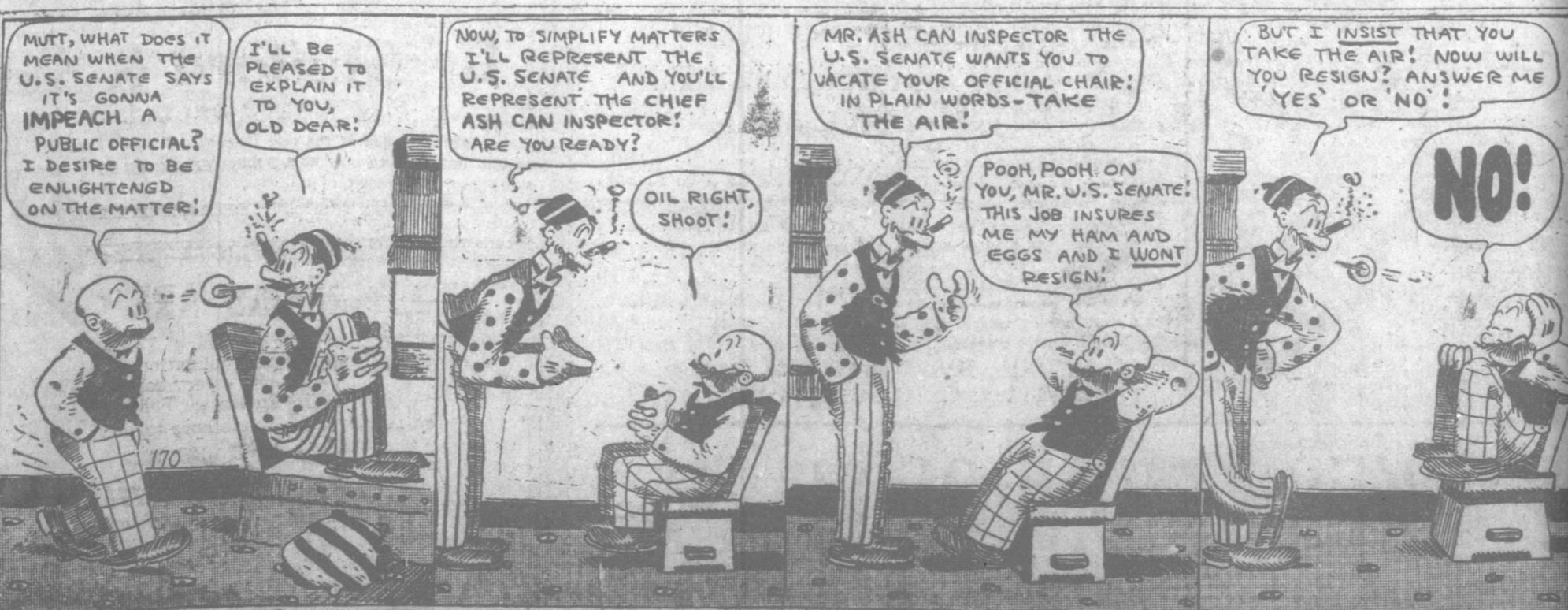



### Produce and Provisions

(Trade Review)  
There is nothing of interest as regards codfish at present. Stocks here are so low that little, if any, is left for shipment in St. John's. It is difficult to even estimate as to what quantity of fish remains here, but of the more prominent exporters believe that no more than three or four cargoes for the average size could not be collected. It is generally agreed that the balance of fish now held in Europe is selling satisfactorily. Dispatch and rates which will leave fairly decent prices on the right side for shipment. The last report received by the Board of Trade from Operto under the 7th inst., is very satisfactory and shows that for the week ending with that date the consumption of N.S.D. fish was exceptionally high, amounting to 7,486 quintals. Stocks recorded as 42,000 quintals. This shows that a few weeks more fish will be at a premium on the market and it will not be long before the other foreign markets will be similarly placed. The outlook for the future is very good and is reason for an optimistic feeling in connection with the season. Since our last report the Norwegian voyage has picked up wonderfully and it is not at all unlikely that it will be up to, if not in advance of, the year's total. This, however, will proceed to having regard to which she shall

of insight and experience believe, that if our fish is extra well cured this year (as it surely should) very profitable prices will be forthcoming. The exports for the week were small, 3,818 quintals being shipped by the Silvia to B.W.I. and the U.S. Two vessels, the Nancy Lee and Olive Moore, are loading for Seville and Brazil respectively.  
**Cod Liver Oil**—Though some little business was done during the week in refined oil the market still remains dull and little rim is noticeable. This however does not discourage dealers who know that the quantity of goods held here is very limited and are content to wait for the better business that soon must occur in this article. Enquiries are coming along fairly frequently, and the general impression is that the small residue of refined oil left will be disposed of at a later date to good advantage.  
**Cod Oil**—During the last week some business was done in common cod oil, and dealers say that sales recently effected resulted fairly well for shippers. Stocks held in Newfoundland now are very low and with the knowledge of this, users of this oil in different foreign centres will likely be making bids shortly for consignments for which they are open. There are a good many enquiries now being received. Though the Norwegian fishery is looking up, and from present indications it will be as good, if not better, than last year, and Norway will produce its average of oils, there will be plenty of room, however, for our profit, and though it is yet far too early to speak of prospective prices, the possibilities are for a good future for all the new goods we may have this year. The exports of cod oil during the week were 3,600 gallons by the Sachem for Boston, and 1,685 gallons by the Silvia, for New York, a total of 5,285 gallons.  
**Flour**—The market in flour during the last few days of the period it became a little firmer. The general impression with dealers in the United States and Canada is that the markets look somewhat stronger and that figures will not be much lower than at present for a while to come. Local dealers say that there is reason to look for an advance over present-day quotations. The prices ruling in the local market, wholesale, for the week, varied considerably, according to grade, and were for the second grade brands, \$7.45, \$7.70 and \$7.75 and for the superior kinds of flour \$7.95 wholesale. The imports of flour for the week were 3,405 barrels by the S.S. Silvia from New York and Halifax, and fair consignments by the Rosalind and Spes from New York and Sydney respectively.

Pork—Though the business done in pork was comparatively insignificant this week, it yet marked a wholesome alteration in a more or less depressed line, and is possibly the herald of a change for the better. All along for several weeks past the market has been very dull and very little pork changed hands. Provisions generally always shows a very inactive market at this season. However, trade conditions will soon show increased activities generally incidental to the opening of the supplying season, but will be accentuated this year by reason of the Humber and other interior activities as well as the result of a more or less successful sealing voyage and improved industrial outlook all round. Stocks held in the city are small and with the opening of navigation the imports of this article should show an increase over those of last year. Prices in the local market, wholesale, have undergone no change since last report and stand as follows:—Loin, \$31.75 per hb.; Fat Back, \$31.25; S. C., \$30.25; Family Back, \$30.00; Regular Plate, \$29.50; Bacon Pork, \$27.00; Ham Butt, \$27.50; Spare Ribs, \$22.50. The imports for the week were 475 barrels by the Silvia from

New York and small consignments by the steamers Rosalind and Spes.  
**Beef**—An unchanged market is recorded in connection with this article and though some sales of small lots occurred there was no considerable activity evident, nor will there be for a little while yet. The pickled meat market in its general aspect has much in common with pork and conditions governing the one in a general sense bearing on the other. With the inception of the activities of the late spring and early summer season beef will come into its own and with the peculiar conditions expected to prevail this year should there be a good trade in this line. Prices for meat have undergone no change since our last report. It is difficult to say what may happen in the future, but the expressed opinion of some in the trade incline to the opinion that there will be no immediate decline. The holdings here are not large and the imports for the week were 305 barrels by the S.S. Silvia from New York and small parcels by the Rosalind and Spes. The following were the local quotations, whole sale, for the week:—Boe Flank, \$28.95 per barrel; Extra Family, \$24.50; Family Special, \$22.50; Boneless, \$20.50; Boneless, New York, \$22.75; Boneless, Alderney, \$23.25.  
**Sugar**—In the public despatches of the 9th inst., the following, dated Washington the 8th, appeared:—“A record world sugar crop is forecasted in reports received by the Department of Agriculture, indicating the production of 21,500,000 short tons this year, as compared with 20,000,000 short tons in 1913-14. This year's forecast indicates cane production of 71 per cent. and sugar beet 29 per cent., whereas in 1913-14 nearly 50 per cent. of the total supply was beet sugar, of which more than 80 per cent. was of European origin.” Speaking to some of the more prominent importers of sugar during the week as regards the above wire, they discounted it considerably and attributed to the sensationalism which some sections of the foreign press are prone to apply even to the most prosaic subjects, and sometimes on a very slim basis. They remark that the beet sugar crop has not started to grow yet and there is always the element of uncertainty to be taken into consideration in such cases. News can tell what may happen before a given crop is garnered. Advice recently received in the city from New York are to the effect that prices for sugar are now considered around bottom and that there will not be any further decline in the near future. On the local market granulated is quoted at \$9.35 per barrel, and brown \$8.85 per sack. The imports for the week were 6,455 cwts. by the Silvia from New York.

**YEAR OF 13 MONTHS OF 28 DAYS EACH NEW CALENDAR PLAN.**  
WOOSTER, O., April 10 (A.P.)—The world's calendar may be changed all around in 1928. The year then may consist of 13 months, each of 28 days, with an extra day in regular years and two extra days in leap years.  
Such is the objective of scientists, according to Dr. B. F. Yanney, professor of mathematics and astronomy at the College of Wooster, and the revision probably will be acted upon at a world congress of scientists likely to be held in Geneva, Switzerland, in October. A special committee, of which Prof. M. B. Cotsworth, Vancouver, B.C., director of the International Fixed Calendar League, is secretary, soon will set a definite date of the congress.  
The committee was selected at the Cincinnati meeting of the American Association for Advancement of Science.  
International agitation to change the existing form of the calendar now has reached such a stage that organization to change to a simpler type is under way, Dr. Yanney said. He expressed himself as certain, if the proposed Scientific Congress adopts the thirteen-month style, that sentiment will be strong to bring about its adoption in 1928 by all countries.  
There are many defects in the present calendar, Dr. Yanney asserted. It is of Roman origin with a number of changes by Augustus Caesar and Pope Gregory XIII.  
“There are 14 varieties of yearly calendar,” Dr. Yanney continued. “They depend upon the kind of year, common or leap, and on the day of the week that the year begins. In any cycle of these 14 varieties occur in centuries of 28 years, but by reason of the fact that of centennial years only those divisible by 400 are leap years, it requires a complete period of 400 years for a complete cycle to occur.  
“Due to the number of days in the months, there are eleven varieties in a year. Apart from the year in which a monthly calendar may appear, there are altogether 28 varieties of monthly calendars. The shortest period of time in which these 28 varieties may occur is 24 years and one month, the latter being February if a leap year. In other ways the present calendar is inadequate to meet business and scientific demands.”  
Should the 13-month style of calendar be chosen, the congress would settle details and draft resolutions in legislative form for adoption by the governments. Such a calendar, Dr. Yanney declared, should be good for 3,000 years.
