Girls Wanted.

Just now there is a great demand for servant girls in all parts of the Province of Ontario, especially in the cities and large towns, and some of our contemporaries are anxiously inquiring how the deficiency can be supplied. Some propose sending a special agent to Great Britain, for the purpose of inducing 5,000 or more girls to emigrate to this country. But supposing it were possible to obtain them and that a large sum of money could be raised to assist those who are too poor to pay for the voyage, is it likely that they could be afterwards retained in the Province? It is a well-known fact that hundreds, perhaps we may say thousands, of this class of persons have gone to "the other side" within the past five years.—Why do they go? The remuneration here is about the same as it is there, and there is no difficulty in obtaining situations on this side of the line. What then is the cause of their emigration? We think we have it. In the State of Ohio last year no fewer than thirty thousand marriages were celebrated, while in this Province there was not one-third of that number. The total number of our popution is at least equal to that of Ohio—What, then, occasions the discrepancy in the number of matrimonial alliances? Because, on the other side, marriage is merely a civil contract, and can be annulled with very little difficulty when either party wishes to re-enter the state of single blessedness, or to form new and more congenial connexions. Statistics of British India.—The commercial rise and progress of the British Crown, are very concisely set forth in the statistical of the colonial and other portions of the empire recently published. We find the area of British India is 936, 436 square miles, with a population in 1861 of 163,271,210 inhabitants. The public revenue in 1865 was nearly £46,000,000 sterling, and the expenditure about the same. The public debt is £98,477,000. The total tonnage of vessels entered and cleared in 1865 (exclusive of coasters) was £49,600,000, fince than half of which belongs to British shipping. The total value of imparts, in the same year, was £49,600,000, fince than half of which was bullion and specie. The exports were valued at £69,500,000. Wool exports have regularly increased, 7,-057,161 lbs weight having been shipped in 1852, and 23,482,689 lbs weight in 1865.

THE ITALIAN TROOPS IN PAPAL TERRITORY.

GARIBALDI STILL IN FRONT OF ROME

THE PAPAL TROOPS CONCEN-TRATING IN ROME.

Fenian Trials in Dublin. TWO POLICEMEN SHOT

(MIDNIGHT DESPATCHES.)

Florence, Oct. 31.—The announcement is officially made that the Royal troops which have hitherto been acting as an army of observation on the frontier have received orders to advance into the Papal territory. It was known here late on Tuesday night that one or two columns had crossed the boundary line, but the fact was not made public by the government until to-day. The reports that Gaize baldi was before Rome are confirmed. He has arrived in front of the advanced fortifications of the city with all his forces. His army increased in numbers all along the line of march, and instead of the four battalions with which he entered the Roman territory he has now twenty-two battalions of young and devoted volunteers. No intelligence has been received from the interior of Rome since last Monday, at which time comparative tranquility prevailed. The reactionary policy decided upon by the King's government causes tremendous agitation throughout ltaly. The party of action are greatly exasperated, and violent demonstrations of popular indignation are reported in the principal cities of the kingdom.

Dublin, Oct. 31.—At the session yesterday of the special commission for the trial of the Fenian prisoners, a motion was made by the counsel for the defence that the accused be tried by a mixed panel composed in equal numbers of Catholic and Protestant jurymen the motion was denied by the judges, the prisoner, Gen. Warren declined the services of counsel, and declared that he was a citizen of the United States and refused to acknowledge the jurisdiction of the court in his actions. Dublin, Oct. 31.—Two policemen were shot last night and instantly killed, the murders are directly charged upon the Fenians, and energetic efforts are being made to discover the perpetrators.

London, Oct. 31.—The Fenian Col. Kelly who was rescued at Manchester, has escaped from England. It is reported that he is in France, and that he will soon leave for America.

TRADE AND NAVIGATION.—The annual returns of the Trade and Navigation for the Province of New Brunswick have been published. The returns show a large increase over former years, in the value of imports and exports and the amount of revenue received. The total tonnage entered inwards from ports outside the Provinces at all the ports of New Brunswick in 1866, was 4,429 vessels, measuring 899,202 tons, against 3,900 wessels, 754,876 tons in 1865, and the tonnage cleared in 1866 from the Province, was 4,261 vessels, 960,285 tons, against 3,838 vessels, 807,161 tons, in 1865. The excess of tonnage cleared over the tonnage entered is accounted for from the fact of so many new ships being built in the Provinces, and clearing outwards on their first voyage.—The increase in the tonnage cleared in 1866 over 1865, was principally in vessels to the United Kingdom, Canada, Prince Edward Island. Nova Scotia, United States and Cuba. The tonnage cleared from St. John, was 570,429 tons, and from the outposts 389,856 tons. The bulk of the carrying trade between New Brunswick and the United Kingdom is still performed by British Colonial securing by far the largest share. The Nova Scotia shipping secures a large share of the carrying trade of New Brunswick. No preferential advantage of any kind exists in the carrying trade, in favor of British or Colonial shipping over foreign shipping.


