IRELAND.—Earl Russell in his recent letter on the condition and claims of Ireland, asserts that it is the duty of the Gladstone Government to introduce large measures for the relief of the sister kingdom. He defends Mr. Gladstone against the accusation of having started the Irish question from a desire to obtain office, and advocates the disestablishment of the Irish Church, and the partial endowment of Free Protestant, Presbyterian and Roman Catholic Churches. Lord Russell urges the maintenance of the present system of national education, and, in dealing with the land question, expressed his conviction that a part of the ecclesiastical property should be devoted to carry out improvements in the cultivation of the soil.
