CITY ENGINEER CHILD REPLIES TO HIS ASSAILANTS

Resents Newspaper Imputation That Plans for Plant Were Hastily Prepared

Says Records Will Show That He Has Been Investigating Filtration for a Year

Opines That the Choice Lies Between the Slow Sand and the Mechanical Filter

INCENSED by newspaper charges attacking his competence as the result of the voting down of the filtration plant bill on August 23rd last, City Engineer J. T. Child last evening gave out a statement replying vigorously to his assailants.

Outside of the charge that he is incompetent, the City Engineer most bitterly resents the imputation that "plans for the plant have been hastily prepared."

"The records of the city will show," said Mr. Child last evening, "that I have been investigating the filtration problem for more than a year. On January 8th last I submitted a lengthy report to the city commissioners dealing with the necessity of filtration, and giving the result of my investigations extending over many months."

That the late crops are going to be very heavy, providing the frost does not catch them, is the report from the Acme correspondent of the Alberta Pacific Elevator Company.

Harvesting is Now at Height The reports of the correspondents in detail for last week are as follows:

POPKO.—Weather conditions during first part of past week have been ideal, but has been raining since Friday morning.

RED DEER.—Have had nice warm sunshine all week until last night, when we had some rain. Barley is being cut and wheat and oats will be ready coming week.

MILK.—Several farmers commenced cutting wheat and barley this week and with favorable weather, it will be ready by middle of next week.

STORM.—Considerable rain fell today, which will delay cutting another day or two, as the ground is very moist.

CLIMATE.—Weather conditions for the past two days cool and showery, but no frost yet.

LOUGH.—Weather all the farmers are cutting wheat, but same is not a very good sample.

WEATHER.—We have seen nothing but rain since Friday and Saturday, but no frost yet.

Farmers All Over Alberta are Eager To Join in Movement to Sell Direct to Consumer and Swamp R. W. Pamment With Letters Asking for Information

Organizer of Nightingale Farmers' Supply Association Arrives in Calgary With Another Car Load of the Big Alberta Potatoes for Sale Today

WITH farmers from all point in Alberta clamoring to participate in the movement to sell direct to the consumer, Mr. R. W. Pamment, the farmer instrumental in organizing the Nightingale Farmers' Supply association, is swamped with letters from farmers in this district and from points as far away as Red Deer, Stettin, Medicine Hat and other points.

Mr. Pamment arrived in the city last night with another carload of two hundred sacks of the finest kind of Alberta potatoes, which will stack up against potatoes grown in British Columbia or any other part of the world for that matter.

Plans Permanent Organization With the tremendous success of the movement, it is obvious that some plan of permanent organization must be perfected at once and that is what Mr. Pamment is working on now.

Perfect Inspection Necessary. "It means that we will have to have a perfect system of inspection at every point from which potatoes are produced such as eggs and garden products are shipped.

Dealers Make Strange Excuses. "The dealers who have been hit by the plan are now making the excuse that the soil conditions around Nightingale are such that better potatoes can be grown there than in other parts of Alberta.

Erskine—About 15 hours' rainfall during week. About 10 per cent of the wheat is cut; some fields are badly lodged. Oats are a good average crop, and cutting has commenced in many localities.

Halkirk—Weather conditions during the past week were ideal, but it has been raining all day yesterday and today. Wheat and oat harvest will be general next week.

Langdon—Perfect weather all week. Grain is nearing maturity and cutting will be general this week. Next week will be heavy, providing frost does not catch them.

Stathmore—Weather during first part of week ideal, but last couple of days has been cloudy, with light rains. Barley is nearly all cut. Some fall rye threshed during week and yielded splendidly.

Calgary South—Carman—No rain this week. Some cutting and harvesting will be general but not until next week. Clarendon—Weather conditions during past week were good. Wheat and grain is maturing rapidly.

Medford—Weather during past week has been ideal for harvesting and nearly all the farmers are cutting. Spring wheat is splendid crop, but winter wheat not so good.

High River—Weather during past week has been ideal. Winter wheat is nearly all cut, and spring wheat is turning rapidly. Barley is ready to harvest, and oat harvesting will be general by September 1.

Parkland—Heavy rainfall the night of the 24th, which will delay harvesting for a day or so. Fall wheat practically all cut. Spring wheat harvesting will be general this week.

Rayley—Dry weather at this point. Fall wheat nearly all cut, and greater part of seeding done. Oats and spring wheat still green. Flax well advanced and good crop is looked for.

Coal Shortage in Montreal. Montreal, Aug. 27.—While ordinarily there are stored in Montreal at this time of the year about 250,000 tons of steam coal, local dealers state today that there are not 500 tons of this coal in the city.

The dealers also announced that the price of coal is likely to jump within the next two weeks, stove coal being the selling at \$7.75 a ton and in a week or two will likely go to \$8.25. Egg coal is quoted at \$7.25, and will likely rise to \$7.75, and steam coal being sold at \$5.00, will be sold at \$5.75.

CONTRIBUTION TO NAVY A DELICATE QUESTION

Should Not be Discussed by Public Men of England Until Policy is Announced

That is the Opinion of F. E. Smith, K. C., Noted Leader of the Unionist Party

WINNIPEG, Aug. 27.—"The question of the Canadian contribution to the navy is very delicate," said F. E. Smith, K. C., the young Unionist leader today. "Personally I think that English public opinion has dared express his opinion openly until Mr. Borden's statement in the House of Commons."

Speaking along similar lines, Right Hon. Walter Long, M. P., in addressing a crowd of his own party in the Canadian club, said: "We must come face to face with the great problems which confront the empire. He remembered unflinching firmness that it will arrest attention and command the support of the English and Scotch people."

MONTHLY MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE TODAY

Will Take Up Matter of Returning Visit of British Financiers to Canada

The regular monthly meeting of the board of trade will be held at 3 p. m. today, at which time the report of the grain commission committee will be submitted.

Another matter that will come up for final determination will be the question of returning the visit of the British financiers who toured the Dominion last summer.

A number of other matters of equal importance will come before the board, including that of devising ways and means for preparing the case of the shippers and presenting it to the grain commission in the effort to have Calgary made a routing point.

Dude ranching is proving a calling that is rivalling with that of branding the troglodyte maverick that seeks to elude the law—the tentacle of the mounted man-creature. Under the old regime, in the work of the open range, the horse wrangler was an important functionary. For he it was who looked after the well-being of the herd of mounts. Taking this man as a precedent, the individual who looks after the well-being of the errand tenderfoot who finds himself temporarily in the wilds is known as a "dude wrangler." So has the new industry of "dude ranching" and the new calling of "dude wrangler" come into being.

Location of Dude Ranches. All the West is going into the business of dude ranching. All that region between Glacier park, where the Rockies break over into Canada, and the final extravaganza of grandeur, to Brownsville, where the Rio Grande empties into the Gulf and the Atlantic overruns the plains, is becoming the home of the dude ranch. From historic San Antonio and the plains of Arango, where Tom O'Connell was at home, to the top of the earth at Flagstaff, Ariz., and down to near to Sheridan, Wyo., are scattered schools in frontier life. They find their perfection, however, in the efforts of the Yellowstone National park, where the Rockies of Wyoming still boast regions of greater isolation from the disturbing foot of the locomotive. That greatest of national playgrounds is cut in half a western state full of scenery as good, and furnishes a breeding reserve for more of the wild things of the woods than are to be found elsewhere.

So it is in Wyoming that dude ranching has seen its highest degree of development. At Sheridan, skirted by the Big Horn mountains, which witnessed the massacre of the last remnants of the Crow and Sioux Indians and boasted the Hole-in-the-Wall, the last stand of the desperate adeos of the Northwest—dude ranchers outfit for trips through these regions of romance. At Cody, that town that took its name from Buffalo Bill and which rests in the shadow of a "hog-back" mountain, which is to be the tomb of this frontiersman when he dies, are fitted out other parties that outfit for journeys up the Shoshone river and into the national park by Sylvan pass, a trip that is unsurpassed beauty. From Lander, where may be seen sunning himself the original Tramp, the gambler who took issue with the Virginian, the plume may be made into the wilds of the national forest and the park in the South. Rock Springs gives another opening into the park from the south and into Jackson hole, the last nook into which drift 50,000 of Uncle Sam's elk each winter in flight from the greater cold of the mountain tops.

In the vicinity of all these towns there have been great cattle ranches where white men first took up his home in the West. These ranches are still great in their production of cattle and sheep. But the barbed-wire fence is crowding in upon them, the avocation of the men who rode the range is being in a degree usurped and another use is being made of these sons of the West.

As the railroads came to reach more nearly all points in the west and those who travel were thus brought more easily in touch with the romance that hovers about its free life, there grew up a demand for men to show those charms to the untutored. Gradually accessible ranches became resorts to which occasional travellers came to sojourn for vacation purposes. These resorts of the wondrous life saw and vacation seekers began to knock at the doors of all the ranchmen of the West. These, numbering in their ancestry many a frugal yankee, yielded to this chance of profit.

First, a few ranches arranged to exhibit the West undressed to a few travelers. Others followed suit. Soon it came to pass that no cattle ranch was complete without a well-developed tourist department, and this summer a hundred thousand people are taking post-graduate course in the wild and woolly West before the opportunity is really gone forever.

These ranches are still ranches. The cowboys who live upon them are the real thing. Every season they mount up, rope and brand thousands of head of cattle. The dude is given the privilege of seeing it done. He may

Even participate in the work of the branding pen. The wild horses of the Big Horn country lead past the greatest caught, tamed and ridden. These men of the West go out into the brush and bring back beaver and elk and antelope and deer as prizes of the hunter. The guest may be likewise if he aims true and he falls not a victim to "buck fever." Pack trains, such as followed Lewis and Clark when they first pushed into this unknown, are made up and excursions lasting weeks are made into the mountains of the Tetons, of Yellowstone park, of the Tetons, of the Big Horn, are revealed. The deeps on up, the banks of the waterfalls and hears the scream of the prevailing mountain lion.

What the Dude Does The man of the East arrives at his selected resort after days on the train crossing the great prairie states, after a night in a borderland hotel of a small cattle town, and after three hours' ride from the station, he is met by the painted face of an Indian or two from a car window and suspects that this is no hotel. He has heard of the cowboy galloping into town with his leggings and his swinging lariat, and is so quiet and the town was not immediately shut up. Here he is assigned a comfortable bed in a log cabin or a shelter tent. The man's dinner of fresh meat, boiled vegetables, preserved fruit and milk, is so quiet and the town was not immediately shut up. 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Probably a roundup is on at this time. As a preliminary to that annual gathering of the herds for branding, the horses must be brought to the corral. Great numbers of horses are rounded up and the season of the roundup of these run wild upon the range during the remainder of the year. After 10 months' freedom most Western horses are as vicious as when, in their youth, they first fought the bull of the rope. It is the best sort of wild west show to witness the catching and the riding of these range horses. Live with them there young horses to be broken each year, and the dude sees the whole process as it approaches the quality of its first setting.

On his gentle job the tenderfoot joins along after the cowboys as they circle through the sections of the mountains on their drives for the cattle. He witnesses the concentration of the cattle at given points, he sees the men of the range ride into the herd, single out the animals for branding fire. The second cowboy ropes the yearling by the hind legs, the animal falls and is held taught between them. The third cowboy seizes the animal by the side. Such is the work of the real life of the West.

Should the outsider select some remote near Ranches during the summer, he will find many a trip that is filled with the interest of the big live of the early West. An excursion may lead to the Crow Indian reservation, where each fall the annual festival is held at the agency and the old traditions of the tribes are again called into being. In Buffalo Bill's Country All this is but preparatory, however, for "Dude Wrangling" is the refinement of the whole. It is the summer as the senior course in the visitor's education. He who wrangles dudes looks after their well-being on an extensive overland trip. The best type of the Western town that today exists is Cody, Wyo. Here is a town of 2,000 souls pitched in the midst of a vast expanse of plain and hill and mountain, and inhabited by as choice an assortment of those active spirits that go to make up the new country as were ever gathered together. Cody is the gate to the Yellowstone park from the east. Around Cody are dude ranches innumerable, and from its vicinity annually wind scores of cavalades, the membership of which comes from all the world and the object of the wandering of which is the viewing of that array of natural wonders which are appalled to Uncle Sam that he has set it apart as a playground for his children to the end of time.

All the folks that gather at one of these dude ranches during the summer and have served their apprenticeship in the ways of the West and acquired sufficient vigor to ride a mile a day on horseback, take up this pilgrimage of wonder seeing toward the end of the season. Such a party may be traveled but five miles out of Cody until it is in wonderland. It enters that perpendicular canyon of the Shoshone river which, a few miles further up, is blocked by a vast dam, the highest in the world which was erected by the reclamation service and which impounds the floods of the Shoshone river that they may irrigate the fertile valleys below. A day's ride further on is Pahaska, the home lodge of Buffalo Bill. Yet another day and the party mounts to snow-crested Sylvan pass, 8,000 feet above the sea, and the center of the wonderland of the world. The party is now in Yellowstone Na-

PRICE OF DIAMONDS STILL GOING UPWARD

Indianapolis, August 26.—Diamonds this year are 7 1/2 per cent. higher in the rough and about 15 per cent. higher or cut than last year, and the market in Amsterdam, Holland, is decidedly the hardest for the buyer in its history, according to J. C. Sipe, an Indianapolis importer, who has just returned from Amsterdam.

"The trouble with the market is that none of the mines are producing heavily, with one or two exceptions, and from those mines where the production is large a poor grade of stone is being taken," Mr. Sipe explained. "In fourteen years the price of diamonds has advanced 100 per cent. They began going up in 1898, and each year since there has been an increase. Only a short time ago I allowed a woman \$25 on a pair of earrings she bought from me fourteen years ago for \$150. Her husband had objected to her buying diamonds, she said. Though she knew the stones had advanced considerably in value, she was much surprised at the amount.

"I have made about \$10 a year for wearing these earrings," she said, and my husband has bought four or five automobiles in that time," each of which he has traded back for considerably less than he paid for them. I guess my investment will compare very favorably."

Mr. Sipe spent four weeks on his trip, allowing a week for the journey each way and two weeks for buying in Amsterdam.

"In London many persons with whom I am acquainted said that prices are going up at a great rate, and I observed that in the hotels I paid considerably more for food than ever before. For example, a piece of melon, for which in former years I never paid more than a shilling, cost me two shillings this year.

"It seems that that knocks out completely the argument that the high cost of living in this country is due to the tariff, for if free trade England is finding its cost of living advancing at a greater rate than it is in America, certainly tariffs have little to do with it."



A BAD ARBITRATION IS BETTER THAN MOST SUCCESSFUL WAR

While England Thinks of Armaments, Canada Thinks of Railroads and Public Works

Opines That British and Canadian Diplomacy Will be Able to Settle Panama Dispute

Says Germany is Seeking Territory for the Purposes of Colonization

Ottawa, Aug. 27.—At a luncheon given today to visiting British financiers and legislators at the Chateau Laurier, the guests included several members of the Dominion cabinet and the former Liberal government, among them being Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. W. T. White, Hon. W. T. Crothers, Hon. W. B. Nantel, Hon. J. D. Reid, Hon. W. J. Roche, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, and Hon. W. S. Fielding.

In proposing the toast to the guests, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in pointing out how Canada's differences with the United States have been settled during the past hundred years, without resort to arms, said a bad arbitration was better than the most successful war.

Touching on the race for armament in Europe, he said: "Thank God, Canada shall never go into it to settle her difference by such a race. In England, you think of armaments and wars in Canada we think of canals and railways and public works."

As to the German peril, he believed that Germany was only seeking territory for colonization. He believed there was enough for Germany without embroiling Great Britain into a national war.

He mentioned the present Panama canal dispute to say that he believed that British and Canadian diplomacy would be able to settle it to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Sir Arthur Lawley, a former governor of South Africa, said that he had recently taken part in the reception to the Canadian premier at the Royal Colonial Institute in London. He said that Mr. Borden told of his work in settling together a nation in Canada. He stressed the heart of every Briton, however self-centred and emotional he might be.

Our welcome to Mr. Borden was no mere act of courtesy, but it was the hand-pressing of citizens of a common empire.

Touching on the matter of imperial union, he said that at the present time the union of British self-governing dominions was being promoted for the purpose of defence. He proceeded to testify this way of looking at the world situation.

Europe was just now "hot" with armed camps. Germany, the world's greatest military power and the second greatest naval power, was arming herself prodigiously for all possible reason.

Britain might find herself embarked upon a colossal fight, and he would insist the intelligence of his audience by pointing out the inevitable effect on Canada of a great continental war.

How more comfortable at the present time to prattle about perpetual peace," said the speaker, "but the most potent factor in the world's peace today is the British navy."

Green Corn Relish

At this season of the year there is usually a lot of green corn relish. A friend of mine makes the following, which is a great favorite in her family.

Green Corn Relish—Park 1: Four large onions, one large cabbage eight red peppers, twenty ears of corn, one cup and a half of sugar, one-half cup of salt, one quart of vinegar. Bring these to a boil in a large kettle. Three tablespoons of mustard, one tablespoon of turmeric, one-half a cup of flour, one level tablespoon of celery seed. One scant quart of vinegar. Dissolve the mustard, flour, and turmeric in the vinegar until there are no lumps, add to the other ingredients, and cook all for thirty minutes. This makes six quarts. Recipes for this relish are rather rare. There is not one in any of my collection of cook books, standard or other.

Sweet corn for any purpose is best cooked as soon as possible after picking, as it heats and loses its sweetness, which some cooks restore artificially by making a sugar water in which it is boiled.

One of the agreeable dishes is succotash. The addition of beans gives this the higher food value that has corn alone. Fresh green corn, cut from the ear and combined with shell beans, makes succotash as different from the dish ordinarily presented under that name as is imaginable.

In New England succotash has usually been made by combining the corn scraped from the cob in such a way as to get all the milk and shell beans of a variety that grows on poles, making the highest food value that has corn alone. Preserving and Canning. The annually recurring problem in all well regulated households is how, when, what, and how long to put up, and whether to preserve or can it. Our assumed authority on how to keep what the housewife should put up, is to do during July, August and September is to pick up bargains in fruits and vegetables, when the right season, so that when cold weather comes and fresh fruits are high, we can get a lavish menu for the household.

With the best of markets, with recurring frost even in the winter season, there is a distinct place for canned fruits and vegetables. The canned fruits are excellent for pies, puddings and other desserts, and as but little sugar is required for them, the expense is small.

The art in preserving and canning is connected both with the cooking and the choice of fruit. It is perfectly possible to connect with great care. It must be at the right stage of ripeness or unripeness—just before it is perfectly ripe, the best in many cases, since, in all soft fruits, the fermentation stage follows closely upon the perfectly ripe stage—and particularly at the right stage of preservation. Decay and blight usually follow upon the perfectly ripe stage, and so much has been written on this subject, that a housewife has only herself to blame if her fruits ferment. When but little sugar is used, the cans be thoroughly sterilized. Sugar prevents some bacterial growth.

Heat is the sterilizer, and it must be applied to the cans, and at the beginning of the process of canning. When fruit is cooked in jars, the cooking and sterilizing go on at the same time. But even so, great precaution must be used to have the jars clean before they are filled.

The surest method of sterilizing all utensils is to put them in cold water.


