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JUDGE MORRISON DEAD.

HE PRACFULLY PASSED AWAY ON SUNDAY MORNING.

The Career of a Highly Esteemed and Able Man as a Lawyer, a Politician and as a Member of the Bar.

The telephones were in the room in the morning when his many friends forenoon in conveying his many friends about the city the melancholy news that Judge Morrison was no more. He died at 10. Thoroughly Highland name and a Highland sire Joseph Curran Morrison was born in Ireland, where his father, an officer in the British army, happened to be quartered. In the days of his boyhood he and his younger brother Angus, who afterwards represented Niagara in parliament, and who was mayor of Toronto for two consecutive years, attended the Royal Belfast college, where he took many honors and was looked upon as a promising student.

Coming with his parents, brothers and sisters a few years later to "Muddy York." He completed his education at Upper Canada college. In their early life both young Joseph and Angus made up their minds to study law, and thus came to the office of Simon Washburn, who was at that time clerk of the peace for the united counties of York and Peel. In the same office making out the same worn-out old pipe desk, sat William Hume Blake, and the two young clerks are still remembered by the old residents as the two brightest and most successful young fellows in the office. The two were the heroes of many a tale, and to their credit be it said the instinct of the true gentleman always predominated. On the 27th of 1858, a legal partnership was formed under the name of Blake & Morrison, and afterwards as Blake, Morrison & Connor, which partnership continued until Mr. Blake's decease in 1864, from which year Mr. Alexander Macdonald took Mr. Blake's place, and the name of the firm was changed to Morrison, Connor & Macdonald.

While still a member of the firm Mr. Morrison was deputy clerk of the executive council of Upper Canada, and clerk of the court of error and appeal. But young Morrison—he was then but barely past his thirtieth year—had his taste for politics, and in 1847 he threw over his offices under the crown and gave his political matters which at that date under the old family Compact, were becoming pretty warm. After a sharp but decisive contest he was returned member for West York to the third parliament of Upper Canada. This was in 1848. At that time Mr. Morrison was a hearty supporter of Baldwin and Lafontaine—March, 1848, re-acting the Baldwin-Lafontaine government in power, with Mr. Morrison as a prominent member.
