A MONSTER PETITION PRESENTED TO THE GOVERNMENT.

Federal Societies to be Excluded from the Provisions of the New Insurance Bill.—The Government and the Treatise Valley Railways—Continuing the Debate on the Budget.

OTTAWA, March 24.—Dr. Rooms had the distinction of presenting to-day the biggest petition that has been presented this session, praying for the removal of the duty on sewing twine, iron and the products of iron.

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FOUND GUILTY OF FORGERY.

The jury went out for five hours, and during this interval there was much discussion among those present as to the probability of the prisoner's release.
