Adulteration of Condensed Milk.

The convenience and cheapness of condensed milk, and its supposed better-keeping properties, have led to its very wide use, in spite of the serious drawbacks to its use as a staple article of food for infants, says a writer in Treatment.

That even the best brands often do great harm by interfering with proper nutrition, and favoring the development of rickets and scurvy, is well established. And this being true of brands that are prepared by the concentration of cow's milk of good quality, it may be imagined that a much more serious indictment could be brought against some inferior kinds in the market.

The mysteries of composition of these have not been satisfactorily revealed, but it is known that milk is by no means the only ingredient. The writer has it on good authority that at the present time a vegetable article is being very largely imported and being bought by certain milk manufacturers for the purpose of adulterating their wares. The adulterant is known commercially as the "Tiger Nut," and has the appearance of rhizomes, is no larger than the last joint of the little finger, and resembles a diminutive centipede. It is strongly suggestive of condensed milk. It is possible in this ingredient we have the explanation of some cases of condensed milk poisoning and dyspepsia. It is stated that it is only used in the preparation of some of the cheaper brands. Comment is needless.

Agricultural.

The Storage of Vegetables.

Potatoes, turnips, table beets, carrots, etc., should be stored in a perfectly cool and dark place and the protection should be afforded as soon as they are taken from the ground.

Potatoes deteriorate in cooking qualities when exposed to light probably more than any other vegetable grown, and should be kept in perfect darkness if the highest quality is to be preserved.

Experience suggests that a pit 6 ft. long, 3 wide, and 3 to 4 deep for general purposes is best, though for mangels the length might be greater with safety.

Cabbage are best kept by turning the heads down on the top of a ramp, placing as closely as possible. After standing in this way for a day or so the heads should be washed in cold water, and then be packed in a dry, well drained out, throw up the earth on each side in the shape of a roof, completely covering the whole cabbage "stamp" and all.

The value of Skim-milk. The deposition of the skim-milk is a problem that does not receive the consideration that its importance warrants. It is for the most part regarded as a secondary product, and as such, convenience has too many to do with its ultimate disposal.
