APPLE MARKET PROSPECTS

Mr. Spurr is the Nova Scotian representative of Messrs. George Monro, Co. Ltd., of London, Manchester and Liverpool, the largest fruit brokers in the world. He has just returned from England where he was making an exhaustive study of the market prospects in so far as Nova Scotian apples are concerned for the coming shipping season. In the tollowing article, which should be of interest to every apple grower, broker and exporter in Nova Scotia, Mr. Spurr sets out a thorough summary of the whole apple reporting situation from the point of view of a Nova Scotian apple shipper having a thorough knowledge of prevailing and ultimate market conditions and pros-

Possibly the most important factor relating to the market prospects of Nova Scotian apples for export is the abundance and quality of the English crop.

It is an indisputable fact that the United Kingdom has always been our chief export market. Efforts, however, are being made to open up other markets in Europe, especially in the Scandinavian countries in the North which of course produce very little fruit of their own. Other European countries such as Denmark, Holland, Austria and Germany are large apple producers, and even become exporters themselves to the United Kingdom, when, as was the case last year, conditions warrant it. The scarcity of home grown apples

in England last season, and the high value of the pound sterling in Germany and Southern Europe were the conditions prevailing in the early autumn, which resulted in the flood-
