Eclipses, 1871.

In the year 1871 there will be *Four Eclipses*,—Two of the SUN, and Two of the MOON; but only one of these will be visible in Newfoundland, and that one only partially.

The First—An Eclipse of the Moon, January the 6th. At St. John's, the Moon will rise on the 6th at 4h. 30m., p.m., and thus it will be seen that the two first phenomena will not be visible here.

First contact with Penumbra, January 6th, at 2h. 56m. 35s.

First contact with Shadow - - - - - 4h. 15m. 29s.

Middle of Eclipse - - - - - 5h. 45m. 41s.

Last contact with Shadow - - - - - 7h. 15m. 50s.

Last contact with Penumbra - - - - - 8h. 34m. 47s.

[St. John's Mean Time.]

On June 17, 1871, there will be an Eclipse of the SUN, visible in the North and South Pacific Oceans, Bornea, Australia, New Zealand, &c.

On July 2nd, there will be an Eclipse of the Moon. During this Eclipse the Moon will pass vertically from Longitude 169° W. to 127° E., on the parallel of Latitude 24° S.

December 11th, there will be a total Eclipse of the SUN.—This Eclipse, like that of June 17, will be visible only in the same parts of the globe, New Zealand excepted.

The Eclipses of Jupiter's Satellites (given in the Greenwich Almanac to the nearest tenth of one second of time) afford the easiest means of knowing the Greenwich time, and thence to determine the longitude of whatever place on the globe, the observer may be situated. No calculation is required, but they cannot be observed at sea, the motion of the Ship rendering it impossible to secure that steadiness of the instruments necessary to observe them.

Planetary Notices.

VENUS will set after the SUN, and consequently will be Evening Star from January 1st to February 22nd; from this date to December 12th, will be Morning Star.

MARS will be Evening Star till March 21; from this date will be Morning Star to the end of the year.

JUPITER will rise after the SUN, from January 1st to May 22nd; from this date, he will rise before the SUN for the rest of the year.

The Planets of the Solar System are 29 in number. Of them 11 are *primary*, and 18 *secondary*, or Moons. Of these Moons, our *EARTH* has one, *Jupiter* four, *Saturn* seven, and *Uranus* six. Of the primary planets, two are called *inferior*, viz., *Mercury* and *Venus*, because they are nearer the *Sun* than the *Earth*; the others are called *superior*, because farther from the *Sun* than the *Earth*.

The *Solar year* is the time which the sun takes in passing over the twelve signs of the Zodiac, which is 365 days, 5h. 48m. 48s. The *Civil year* is 365 days 6 hours, or rather 365 days for three years in succession, and every fourth year 366 days.—The *Sidereal year* is 365 days, 6h. 6m. 18·5s. The *Anomalistic year* is 365 days, 6h. 14m. The *Lunar* astronomical year is 354 days, 8h. 48·6m. or 12 lunations. The Anomalistic year is an advance of the orbit as part of the solar system in space, and its excess over the Sidereal or Tropical year, is the stellar measure of the annual advance of the whole system.

NOTE.—The Tide Tables (in the Calendar pages) may be rendered applicable to various other places on the coast, by simply adding or subtracting, as the case may be, the difference between the times of High Water on the Full and Change of the Moon at St. John's, and the time of the full tide at any other harbor; for example, to find the time of High Water at any of the principal harbors of Conception Bay, add 45 minutes to the time at which it will be High Water at St. John's; for Placentia Bay, add 2 hours; for St. Peter's, 1h. 50m.; for Ferrolle, on the French Shore, 4 hours, &c.—See table LVI. of *Norie's Epitome*.

MISTS.—A white mist in the evening over a meadow with a river, will be drawn up by the sun next morning, and the day will be bright. Five or six fogs successively drawn up, portend rain. Where the mist which hangs over low lands, draws towards high hills in the morning, and rolls up to the top, it will be fair; but if the mist hangs upon the hills, and drags along the woods, there will be rain.

CLOUDS.—Against much rain the clouds increase very fast, especially before thunder. When they are formed like fleeces, but dense in the middle, and bright towards the edge, with the sky bright, they are signs of a frost, with hail, snow, or rain. If they form high in the air, in thin white trains, like locks of wool, they portend wind and probably rain. When a general cloudiness covers the sky and small black fragments of clouds

THE MILKY WAY.—That irregular stream of faint, cloudy light, which may be seen on clear, moonless nights by the naked eye, forming a circle entirely round the heavens, is supposed to be the remoter parts of the group of stars in which our sun is enveloped. To a spectator at a distant point in the heavens it may appear as a small annular nebula, or as a thin

ALEXANDRINA VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, only daughter and heir of the late Prince Edward, Duke of Kent, fourth son of King George III. Her Majesty was born at Kensington Palace, on the 24th May 1819; baptized on the 24th June 1819; ascended the throne on the demise of her uncle, King William IV., 20th June 1837; proclaimed 21st June 1837; and crowned at Westminster, on the 28th June 1838. Her Majesty was married at St. James's Palace, on the 10th Feb. 1840, to her cousin, his late Royal Highness Francis-Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg and Gotha, who died at Windsor Castle, on the 14th December, 1861. LIGHT HOUSEES.

Fort Amherst Light at the entrance of St. John's.—A Light was first established at this station in 1813; in 1850 a new House, Lantern and apparatus were erected. The Light

at an elevation of 114 feet, is produced by a treble argand burner placed in the focus of an annular lens of the fourth order, and in favorable weather can be seen 16 nautical miles. When Cape Spear is enveloped in fog a heavy piece of ordnance is also discharged at this Fort every hour during daylight, to assist vessels in making the harbor. It is situated in lat. 47.33.54 N., and long. 52.40.18 W. John Sheppard, Keeper; Thomas Moore, Assistant.

Cape Spear Light.—This Light was first exhibited on the 1st September 1835; it is produced by seven argand burners and silvered reflectors burning at an elevation of 264 feet—it revolves, shewing a bright Light, every minute, and in favorable weather can be seen 26 nautical miles. It is situated in 47.31.11 N. Lat., and 52.36.59 W. Longitude. James Cantwell, Keeper; David Cantwell, Assistant.

Cape Bonavista Light.—Situated in lat. 48.41.56 N., long. 53.5 20 W.; is a revolving Light, showing alternately every 90 seconds a white and red Light. It is produced by 16 argand burners and reflectors, burns at an elevation above the sea of 150 feet, and in favorable weather can be seen 18 nautical miles. By keeping this Light open with Cape Largent, it will carry you clear of the Flower Rocks; first exhibited 11th September, 1843. Nicholas White, Keeper; Mathew White, Assistant.

Cape Pine Light.—This tower is of iron, built by the Imperial Government in 1849-50, and first put in requisition on the 1st January, 1851. It is a fixed white Light, has 12 argand burners and reflectors—elevated above the level of the sea 314 feet—situated in lat. 46.37.4 N., and in long. 53.31.15 W. In a favorable state of the atmosphere it can be seen 26 nautical miles. George Hewitt, Keeper; Thomas Doran, Assistant.

Harbor Grace Beach Beacon and Light.—First exhibited 11th September 1850; stands on the Point of Beach at the entrance of Harbor Grace. It is a double light, as a distinction from Harbor Grace Island Light, one being placed above the other, preserving that appearance for six miles, exceeding this distance up to ten miles the two Lights appear blended into one. In sailing into Harbor Grace with a fair or leading wind, bring the Beach Beacon to bear W. or W. by S., and by keeping the Light or building a little on the starboard bow it will bring you clear of the Bar, on which at low water there is not more than 8 feet of water. It is situated in lat. 47.41.28 N., and in long. 53.12.33 W.; elevation above the sea level 40 feet; in clear weather it may be seen at a distance of 11 nautical miles. George Brown, Keeper.

Green Island Light at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay.—Situated in lat. 48.30.16 N., long. 53.2.40 W. This is a fixed white light, burns at an elevation of 92 feet above high water, and in favorable weather will be seen from E.N.E., seaward, to S. W., 15 nautical miles. Vessels bound Northward by keeping this Light open with the North Head of

Catalina until Bonavista Light opens with Cape LeJean, will give the Flowers Rocks an ample berth—or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina, by giving the N. Head a moderate berth, you will clear the Brandies Rocks by steering for Green Island Light. It was first exhibited in 1857. Henry Roper, Keeper; Peter Woods, Assistant.

Cape Race Light.—Exhibits a Revolving white Light, from sunset to sunrise. The light will be visible to seaward from N. E. by E. round by the S.E. and S. to W. The Light is elevated 180 feet above the mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 19 nautical miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the old Beacon, which has been cut down. The Light house is in lat. 46.39.30 N., long. 53.4.30 W., and was first exhibited in 1856. Michael J. Halley, Keeper; George Simms, Assistant.

Doddington Head, Great Burnt Island Light.—This Light was put in requisition on the 3rd August, 1858, and is exhibited every night from sunset to sunrise. It is revolving, catadioptric of the second order, producing a brilliant White Light every minute, with intermediate flashes, at intervals of twenty seconds, burning at an elevation of 430 feet above the level of the sea, and in favorable weather can be seen 29 miles—situated in 47.0.26 North Latitude, 55.8.43 West Longitude. Austin Sheppard, Acting Keeper; John Churchwell, Assistant.

Offer Wadham Island Light.—Was first exhibited on the 4th October 1858, and is lighted every night from sunset to sunrise.—The Light is a steady, fixed lens-light, burning on a circular Brick Tower 100 feet above the level of the sea, and can be seen in a favorable state of the atmosphere 15 nautical miles. Situated in Latitude 49.36.0 North—Longitude 53.45.6 West. Charles Prowse, Keeper; Patrick Hollahan, Assistant.

Baccalieu Island Light.—This light is exhibited every night from the going away of daylight in the evening to the return of daylight in the morning. The Light House is situated on the Northern end of the Island—Latitude 48.8.51 North, Longitude 52.47.50 West—the tower is of brick, the keeper's dwelling a square building detached from the tower, painted white with the roof red.

The light is a catadioptric first class Holophotal revolving white Light, shewing a flash every twenty seconds. It is elevated 413 feet above high water, and can be seen in clear weather 30 nautical miles, and a lesser distance according to the state of the atmosphere. When the Southern end of the Island bears N.N.E., the Light will not be visible when nearer the Island than 8 miles. It was first exhibited in 1858. James Ryan, Keeper; John Ryan, Assistant.

Cape St. Mary's Light.—Was put in requisition on the 20th September, 1860; it is a revolving catadioptric Light of the first order, producing alternately every minute a brilliant red and a white light, burning at an elevation of 300 feet above the

level of the sea, and will be seen in a favorable state of the atmosphere 26 nautical miles from a vessel's deck; situated in 46.49.30 N. lat., 54.11.34 West long. The tower is of brick, and on each side of which stands the dwellings of the Keeper and Assistant, the sides of which are painted white, roofs red. John Rielly, Keeper; William J. Collins, Assistant.

St. John's.—Two red Lights are exhibited every night from sunset until sunrise, intended as leading marks for vessels entering the narrows. The lower Light on the roof of the Custom House—the other 400 yards in the rear, on a white post, within a few yards of the N. E. angle of the Congregational Church, and 180 feet above the level of the sea. These Lights will be readily distinguished from any other Lights in the town; and keeping them in a line bearing N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., will lead in the largest vessel clear of all danger. To serve as leading marks also during the day, the pediment of the Custom House has been painted white; this is to be kept in line with the upper lantern, also painted white. Exhibited 1st September, 1863.

Brunet Island Light, Mercer's Head, Fortune Bay.—First exhibited 27th June, 1865. It is a powerful, flashing white Light, and attains its greatest brilliancy every ten seconds.—It burns at an elevation of 408 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather may be seen at a distance of 35 miles, and be visible in every direction from North round East and South, to W.N.W. Mercer's Head is a bold headland, and situated in long. 55.59.30, W., and lat. 47.16 N. Martin Sparrow, Keeper; James Gaulton, Assistant.

Harbor Grace Island Light.—The fixed Light for many years past exhibited at Harbor Grace Island, in Conception Bay, was discontinued on the 1st December, 1869. The Light at that station is now revolving, showing in every direction two white flashes, followed by one red flash. The interval between each flash in attaining its greatest brilliancy will be 30 seconds. This Light, in a favorable state of the atmosphere, will be seen 25 nautical miles. It is situated in lat. 47.42.45 N., and long. 53.8.15. Austin Oke, Keeper; Charles Snow, Assistant.

Galantry Head, Island of St. Peter's.—The Fixed Light on Galantry Head, (Island of St. Peter's), since the 10th August, 1862, has been replaced by a Flash Light, with intervals of twenty seconds, and by one red flash after two white flashes; situated in lat. 46.45.30 N., long 58.27.0 W.; elevation above high water 64 metres. Distance at which the Light is visible 18 miles. The Light is hidden at the Northward by the high land of St. Peter's.

Light at the South Entrance of St. Peter's.—Since 1st October, 1862, the entrance of the harbor of St. Peter's, called South Channel, has been marked by two small fixed Lights, one of which is a white Light illuminating three fourths of the horizon, and placed on the Battery—and the other a red Light,

on the plain at the North of the town. The white Light has an elevation of 11 metres, and is visible 6 miles. The red Light is elevated 19 metres, visible 3 miles distance. The line connecting these two Lights indicates the Middle Channel.

The position of the red light has also been so determined that as soon as it is seen on the left of Cape Eagle, vessels coming from Columbier in beating into the N.E. entrance will have nothing to fear from the shoals of Cape Rouge.

Light Dues.—One Shilling per ton on all vessels entering any port or harbor of the Colony, except coasting, sealing, or fishing vessels; but not to be levied more than once in any one year.—Sealing and coasting vessels—Sixpence per ton on registered vessels of 40 tons and upwards; Fifteen shillings per annum on all vessels less than 40 tons.

The 19th of Victoria, Cap. 5, Sec. 5, enacts—"That no greater sum than £25 sterling shall be in any year levied for Light Dues on any steamer or vessel entering any port of this Colony; and no Steamer plying between Europe and any port of North America, and entering any port of this Colony as a Port of Call, shall be liable to pay any Light Dues or other port charges except pilotage.

*Between Burin, Corban, Little and Great St. Lawrence, Lamaline, Fortune and Grand Bank, by messenger.

*Between Garnish and Harbor Breton, calling at English Harbor, by boat.

*Between Harbor Breton, Burgeo, LaPoile and Channel by boat.

Besides the above-mentioned routes, intermediate mails are made up and despatched by Steamer *Ariel*.

Routes marked thus * are fortnightly during Summer, and monthly during Winter months.

Newspapers posted in this country, when addressed to any place in the Dominion of Canada, P. E. Island, Bermuda, the United States or elsewhere, must be prepaid, by Mail, otherwise they cannot be forwarded. Foreign Newspapers re-posted for transmission to outports are charged one cent each, prepaid by stamp; unpaid 2 cents.

All correspondence addressed to the United Kingdom, United States, Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island must be prepaid, or it cannot be forwarded.

For book packets, pamphlets, magazines and periodicals, not exceeding three pounds in weight, transmitted by post within the Island are charged 5 cents for every quarter pound of their weight. The Pillar Letter Boxes are cleared at 9 a.m., and 2 p.m., for town delivery, every day, (Sundays excepted,) and also, two hours before closing the mail by the Halifax Steamer. Newspapers dropped in the Pillar Letter Boxes will not be delivered.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides may be posted at any Post Office in Newfoundland for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office) in the Island, at a rate of postage subject to the following conditions:—

1—No letter or letters shall be concealed.

2—The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance.

glass, liquid, or other matter, likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of the forfeiture of the parcel.

3.—The weight of the parcel shall not exceed 3 lbs. nor the size exceed one foot in length or breadth, or six inches in thickness.

4.—Parcels must be prepaid at the following rates:—

Under $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. - - - - - 5 cents.

Over $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. - - 10 cents.

Over $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. and not exceeding $\frac{3}{4}$ lb. - - 15 cents.

And so on, adding 5 cents for every $\frac{1}{4}$ lb., or fraction thereof.

5.—The parcel may be registered on payment of a fee of five cents in addition to the postage.

6.—If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate of 20 cents for the return conveyance.

7.—The parcel should have the words "by Parcel Post," plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Office address of the intended receiver, including the name of the district in which the Post Office is situated. The following is an example of the mode of address recommended:—

PROHIBITORY CLAUSES.

No written communication shall be enclosed in any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book parcel, or parcel for the Parcel Post; and no communication shall be written upon any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book package, or parcel.

No letter, or any writing, or any marks to serve the purpose of a letter, shall be written upon or enclosed in any newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper.

Prepaid books, pamphlets and magazines, for Great Britain, are charged the following rates, when exceeding 2 ozs. in weight:—

For a packet above 2 ozs. and not exceeding 4 ozs. 6 cents.

not exceeding 8 ozs. 12 cents.

over 8 ozs. and not exceeding 1 lb. 24 cents.

And so on, adding 6 cents for every additional $\frac{1}{4}$ ozs., or fraction thereof, when the packet exceeds 2 ozs. in weight.

Books, trade patterns, or samples, and all printed papers, other than newspapers, not exceeding *Two Ounces in weight*,

are forwarded to the United Kingdom, at the reduced rate of--

Unpaid Books for the United Kingdom, are forwarded, charged with double the prepaid rates of postage.

Letters for Officers serving in H. M. Service abroad, are chargeable with the ordinary rates of postage.

Rule of Rating Letters by British Packet.

For the United Kingdom, West Indies, Dominion of Canada, P. E. Island, and United States, under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. one rate; under 1 oz. two rates; under $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. three rates, and so on adding one rate for every $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

Letters posted in Newfoundland for delivery at any place within the Island, are charged 3 cents for every $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., if prepaid, and 6 cents unpaid.

By the Act 28 Vic., Cap. 2, all letters sent from this Colony, and all local letters deposited in any Post Office in the Colony for delivery or transmission within it, shall be prepaid by Stamps, or otherwise such letters shall be chargeable with double postage to the receiver.

Parties desirous of vending Newfoundland postage stamps, will be allowed a commission of five per cent. Stamps, in all cases, to be paid for in advance.

REGISTRATION.

Any Letters found to contain Coin, as well as any having the word "Registered" written upon them, which may be posted in Newfoundland, will be forwarded charged with a double registration fee.

Money Orders are now interchanged with the United Kingdom, Dominion of Canada, and P. E. Island, at the following rates of Commission:

Scale for United Kingdom—Orders up to £2 stg., 1s. stg.; from £2, up to £5, 2s.; from £5 up to £7, 3s.; from £7 up to £10, 4s.

Scale for the Provinces—Orders up to £5, 1s.; from £5 to £10, 2s.; from £10 to £15, 3s.; and from £15 to £20, 4s. No single Order can be granted for more than £20. No half-pence to be introduced in the Orders.

Business of Money Order Office closes one hour before closing the Mails by the Halifax Steamer.

SYSTEM.

1—Money Orders are made out in forms supplied for the use of the Money Order Offices.

2—Persons applying for Money Orders are recommended to use printed "Application Forms" printed for that purpose.

3—Place of payment of a Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

4—Alteration of payee's name may be effected, by issue of a new Order and payment of commission thereon.

5—Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in the examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping; defect in Orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

6—Postmasters should be particularly careful to obtain from the person who presents a Money Order, whether the rightful owner or not, full information as to the Christian name, surname and address, of the party who originally obtained it, unless such party be a firm, when the name of the firm will suffice. *The only exception to this rule is—When an Order is presented through a Bank, in which case it will suffice that the Order, being properly signed, be also crossed with the Banker's name.*

7—As, however, *after once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the Office will not be liable to any further claim,* the public are strictly cautioned.—

1st—To take all means to prevent the loss of the Money Order.

2nd—To be careful, on taking out an Order, to state correctly the Christian as well as the surname of the person in whose favor it is to be drawn.

3rd—To see that the name of the person taking out the Money Order is correctly known to the person in whose favor it is drawn.

8—Payment of a Money Order must be obtained before the end of the sixth calendar month after that in which it was issued, otherwise a new Order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the Order be not paid before the twelfth calendar month after that in which it was issued, all claims to the money will be lost.

Neglect of the foregoing instructions will risk the loss of the money, besides leading to delay and trouble in obtaining payment.

9—Postmasters should recommend the use of Money Orders for the transmission of money, in preference to such transmission otherwise.

Suggestions to the Public.

Facility will be given to the Post Office in the discharge of its daily duties, and greater security afforded to the Public, by careful attention to the following recommendations:—

Post all letters and newspapers, &c., as early as practicable, especially when sent in large numbers.

When a number of newspapers are addressed to the same office, put them up in one parcel.

When a number of circulars are posted, tie them up in a bundle, with the addresses all in one direction.

Address letters, papers, &c., in a legible and complete manner, always giving the name of the Post Office; and if there be more than one Post Office of that name, the name of the county in which situated. In case of letters going abroad, the name of the country, as well as of the town and city, should be given in full. Letters, for example, intended for London, England, if simply addressed "London," would be forwarded to London, Canada West, and thus be delayed.

See that every letter, newspaper, or other packet sent by post, is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or some other material which will not readily tear or break.

Fasten the covers of newspapers firmly, so as to prevent them from slipping out.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter-box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies and other hot climates, with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenience, and frequently with serious injury, in consequence of the melting of the wax, and the adhesion of the let-

ters to each other. In all such cases use either wafers or gum, and advise your correspondents in the country referred to do the same.

Never send money or other articles of value through the Post Office, except either by means of a money order or in a registered letter. Carefully secure every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing-wax, on which make the clear impression of a seal.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted.

When letters or papers are delayed or missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster of the division in which is situated the Post Office at which the delayed or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclosing value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or wrapper in an entire state, in order that the place of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the post marks.

Trouble and loss occasionally arise out of the carelessness or dishonesty of parties employed in the Post Office service: yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satisfaction even of the complainants, that the fault at first attributed to the Post Office, in truth rested in other quarters.—Thefts by private hands, although very difficult of proof, have not unfrequently been brought to light; and it is greatly to be desired that those who suffer loss should, in the first instance, and while the circumstances are fresh, endeavour to ascertain with the utmost precision all particulars respecting the despatch or receipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating this information to the Postmaster. Indeed, generally speaking, it is only by careful enquiry into minutiae details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a servant of the Department or not.

The Post Office is a department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster General, clear and correct information respecting faulty arrangements, may materially benefit the service. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cautiously and with much previous consideration.

Time is generally required to carry out any material change in postal arrangements; for even when decided upon, contracts, requiring notice of termination, may have to be given up, and tenders for new contracts invited by public advertisement, before the decision can take effect.

New Post Offices are established by the Department wherever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can

conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the township and the number of the lot and concession on which it is desired the office should be established; the distance from the neighboring offices; whether at the sight of the proposed Post Office there is a village; the number of mills, stores, taverns, and houses thereat; the extent of the settlement to be served and the probable cost of the mail; together with any other facts which may form any ground for the accommodation applied for.

It shall not be lawful for any Importer of dried Fish to Warehouse the same in any of the Ports of this Colony or its dependencies, without the payment of the duty hereinbefore imposed; and the provisions of any Act of this Colony with regard to the Warehousing of Goods on the first entry thereof, or to the allowance of Drawbacks upon exportation, shall not in either case apply to or be construed to apply to such fish.
