The waves, according to the five survivors, were at least ten feet

high. George Gray, who came recently from Toronto, to accept a position with the Toronto and Niagara Power Company, at Niagara Falls, Ont., was the first to reach shore. While swimming against the bigh waves, he tore off all his clothing except his undershirt, and was almost exhausted when he reached the shore.

He at once spread the alarm among the campers at Crystal Beach. Campers and residents of the summer colony lost no time in setting out in boats in an effort to save the young men.

The Cannon brothers, William and Joseph, were found a short distance their mother met them.

It should never be kept in a damp place, like a cellar, nor where wind strikes it, nor against the sunny side of the kitchen. Neither should it be too near the range. It must set level so the doors will close tightly and the water run properly thru the waste pipe.

The new porcelain-lined refrigerators are easily kept in sanitary condition by cleaning with warm water and soda, but the old-fashioned ones must be well scalded every week or there will be trouble.

It is easily removed and must be cleaned when the refrigerator is.

BOUND TRIP

Another warning is: Do not permit your refrigerator to be connected to the sewer pipe, as it is impossible to prevent noxious odors and sewer gas from entering and tainting your food.

The dangers from this are terrible and well-known to landlords, yet almost every built-in refrigerator is connected to a sewer waste pipe.
