FRENCH DEAL ENEMY TO DAMAGING BLOWS VERDUN

Complete Plans For Greater Production Campaign in Canada Are Announced

REICH LARGE SCALE RAIDS
ACHIEVE IMPORTANT RESULTS

Allyes Smash Up German Defences in Cheppy Wood and Malancourt, in Meuse Region—German Attempts Produce Insignificant Effects.

On the French front in France, Monday, March 18.—The center of military interest during the past few days has centered on the Champagne to the vicinity of Verdun, where both the French and the Germans have broken into marked activity.

In the Verdun region the corresponding watched the execution of two trench raids on a large scale carried out by the French on Saturday evening and at dawn on Sunday, the results of which exceeded all expectations.

Gen. von Gallwitz's army, acting under the direct orders of the German command, displayed evident nervousness under this pressure, as was shown by the hurried arrival of large reserves in motor lorries. They were too late, however, to hinder the French.

The second day of the Malancourt Wood, was a wonderfully impressive spectacle, in the darkness just before dawn. The correspondent found the objective from which nothing but the occasional rattle of a machine gun could be heard and only a flash of light seen now and then.

Meanwhile the German artillery, which is very strong here, had opened up with a heavy barrage and winter battery fire, but without effect. Soon after daylight the front was again calm.

On the other side of the Meuse the Germans took the initiative in the course of the day Sunday at Samogneux, Besonvaux, and Carrières Wood, executing raids which cost them heavily in casualties and achieved only small results.

GERMANY WILL POLICE RUSSIAN PROVINCES

Courland and Livonia Will Become "Independent," According to Von Hertling.

Copenhagen, March 18.—In his speech before the reichstag, Imperial Chancellor von Hertling partly announced Germany's policy towards the annexed territories of Russia.

In recognizing the independence of Courland he thankfully and joyfully had taken cognizance of Courland's desire to lean on the German Empire which, indeed, corresponds to the old cultural relations.

GREATER PRODUCTION SCHEMES ANNOUNCED

Aims and Methods Decided Upon at Meeting of Provincial Prime Ministers Held Last Month With Federal Representatives.

During February the prime minister of each province, or a minister named by him, attended a conference at Ottawa, held under the chairmanship of Hon. J. A. Calder, and attended by Hon. T. A. Crerar, minister of agriculture for the Dominion, for the purpose of considering plans for increasing production in Canada, so that the greatest help possible might be given to the allies.

As a result of this conference it was decided that the government of each province constitute itself a war committee for production, to work in co-operation with the Canada Food Board.

To increase cattle, hogs and sheep to the greatest possible extent. To secure cultivation of gardens and vacant lots in towns and cities with a view to raising the maximum amount of vegetables. This should be accomplished thru the municipal or existing organizations in such manner as will ensure proper supervision.

By encouraging every householder in small towns and villages to secure and raise one pig thru the season, with a view to utilizing all garbage for food.

Provincial governments to see that the proper quantity of seed is available and distributed in their province.

Provincial governments undertake the work of ascertaining the form of order in which they may be required by their farmers in order to secure seed, breaking, in 1918, of a definite increase of acreage of new land more than would normally be broken for crop next year.

Assistance of provincial departments of agriculture in taking orders for tractors and forwarding these to the Canada Food Board, Ottawa.

Assistance of the provinces thru their educational departments in making teen age boys available by providing that such boys shall not lose their education standing thru absence from school for the purpose of working on farms.

Co-operation by provincial governments in securing the teen age boys as recruits for the Soldiers of the South by means of lectures in every public and high school to show the boys the necessity of getting out on the farms and helping the labor situation.

MURPHY WAKES FIERGE ATTACK UPON ROWELL

Charges That He Represents Same Brand of Commercialized Christianity as Flavelle.

ADDRESS IS ADOPTED

Laurier Charges Parliament Illegally Assembled, and Borden Defends Action.

Ottawa, March 19.—The debate upon the address abruptly closed tonight after the house had listened to speeches from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Charles Murphy, and the address was then adopted without amendment.

Both party leaders were in splendid form and contributed stirring speeches to the debate, but it was, after all, Sir Wilfrid Laurier who occupied the centre of the stage.

The former secretary of state flayed Hon. W. Rowell with a speech that can best be described as vitriolic. He charged that Mr. Rowell had bought his way into parliament by promising mentorship to Hon. Mr. Mulholland. He had never, according to Mr. Murphy, been loyal to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, but had intrigued for years to supplant him.

The debate today was resumed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who charged that parliament had been assembled in violation of law. The speaker said he had no power to amend, and it will pay a very small fraction of the demands.
