FATAL END OF HAPPY DAY

James Palmer Attends Stonecutters' Picnic, Loses Way Coming Home—Struck by Train, is Killed.

Toronto Junction, Aug. 20.—The body of James Palmer, stonecutter, 513 St. David-street, Toronto, was found lying in the ditch at the C.P.R. crossing on Dundas-street, Lambton Mills, this morning. The dead man's skull was fractured and his right arm was broken in two places. It was quite evident that he had been struck by a passing train, probably the 8:35 p.m. C.P.R. express from the west. Dr. Emerson Bull examined the body and had it removed to Cummings & Co.'s undertaking rooms at Toronto Junction. A paper found in the dead man's pocket led to his identification. It appears that he attended the annual picnic given by the Stonecutters' Union at Lambton Mills yesterday afternoon, and in starting for the street car to go home in the evening he took the road leading to Islington. Instead of that leading to Toronto Junction, he reached the C.P.R. crossing just as the train came along. He leaves a wife and three children. Dr. Bull, coroner, did not deem an inquest necessary. The funeral will take place at Mount Pleasant Cemetery on Tuesday, at 2 p.m.

The beautiful and impressive ceremony was conducted with a solemnity befitting the occasion. The bishop's words of wise counsel and advice following the ceremony created a profound impression. ARRESTS FOLLOW CARNIVAL

Promoter of Brantford Show Fined \$100—Companion in Trouble.

Brantford, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—The Brantford lacrosse club carnival came to a sensational close on Saturday night when the manager of the show, J. Frank Hatch, and his former special representative, Dr. Horace Grant, were arrested.

Manager Hatch was brought to the police court on a charge of neglecting to pay a provincial fee of \$100 for shows of this nature. His arrest came just after he had returned to Ontario. He promptly paid and was released.

The more serious arrest was that of Dr. Horace Grant on the charge of perjury. It seems that Grant swore out an attachment for \$100 salary due him under contract, and in retaliation Hatch brought out a charge of perjury against Grant for swearing that any salary whatever was due him.

Grant was subsequently let out on bonds furnished by his solicitors. The preliminary hearing will be given Monday morning before the police magistrate.

CROSSES OCEAN AT 107.

Centenarian Surprises Londoners by Visiting Sons in Canada.

London, Aug. 20.—A remarkable personage has arrived from Canada. He is Lajos Popeliger by name, a Rumanian Jew, who has reached the patriarchal age of 107 years.

Popeliger has the distinction of having lived in three countries. His extraordinary vitality is shown by the fact that some time ago he determined to go to Canada to see his three sons, who he settled there many years ago.

The oldest of the three has passed his eighty-eighth year. This old father and physical vigor, was accompanied from Canada by Dr. Gregory, who also is being looked upon by the centenarian as quite a young man.

Dr. Gregory states that the patriarch stood the voyage remarkably well, enjoying his meals and taking an interest in what was passing on the liner. Every day he appeared on deck, where he lay dozing in the sun. After a short stay in London, he will proceed to Jaffa and thence to Jerusalem, in fulfillment of an ambition he long has cherished to end his days there.

YOUTH'S N. BOLD HOLD-UP
MAINTAIN CHICAGO'S FAME

Chicago, Aug. 20.—Two boys, neither more than 20 years old, held up and robbed H. G. Board, assistant treasurer of the Cross Sign and Pass Company, of \$1025 shortly before noon yesterday while more than a score of teamsters and pedestrians watched.

Board, who is but 21 years old, had gone to the Bankers' National Bank and drawn \$1025 to pay off the men at the factory. He returned on the Northwestern elevated road and leaving the train at the Halsted-street station, was walking to the factory when the robbery occurred.

As he passed an alley 200 feet from the factory two youths sprang out and stopped him. One of the boys placed a revolver behind his head, shielding his eyes with his hand, and the other held a pistol to his head.

Altho Board carried a revolver in his pocket and was not surrounded by several men, he did not make any effort to capture the robbers, but ran into the factory. A policeman from the Larabee-street station, who is detailed in the district on pay days, to guard against just such occurrences, was standing by a block away.

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Several men whose descriptions corresponded in a general way to those of the boys looked up at the Chicago-avenue station, but it is not believed that the men who committed the crime have been found.

SARDINE FAMINE IN BRITAIN.

Great Distress Expected to Result From Poor Catch.

Paris, Aug. 20.—Three years ago there was a famine among the fishing folk of Brittany owing to the total disappearance of sardines from the French waters. This year the distress will be terrible again, for the sardine catch has been only about one-third of the normal.

Six hundred boats were expected to return to Douarneau full of sardines, but only about one-third of the boats returned, and the catch was only about one-third of the normal.

It is now thought the present sardine fishing season will be the worst ever experienced by the fishermen of Brittany.

STEAL LIQUOR FROM BONDED CAR

Two Kingston Young Men Yield to Their Cravings.

Kingston, Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Early this morning two young men of this city, McConville and Kelly, 24 and 19 years, respectively, were arrested at the depot in a half-drunk condition.

They had got on a freight train at Kingston, and were found by the police when the city they began throwing the bottles out, intending to gather them up and sell them. There were no other men near the city, but they escaped, being afterwards recaptured as they started drinking the stolen liquor.

SAME OLD MISTAKES.

Woman Attempted to Alight From a Moving Car—Was Stunned.

Ingenuously Contrived Infernal Machines Mailed to Prominent Hebrews and Police Are Puzzled.

New York, Aug. 20.—What one man or group of men would have a motive for killing or maiming: Jacob H. Schiff, banker, of the firm of Kuhn, Loeb & Co., 53 William-street, Simon and Murray Guggenheim, proprietors of the American Smelting and Refining Company, No. 71 Broadway, Edward Wasserman, broker, of No. 42 Broadway?

This is the problem which the police, detectives and postoffice inspectors are called upon to solve in connection with the sending of infernal machines to the persons named.

All of these men are millionaires, prominent in the financial world. All the Hebrews, who have taken an active interest in the welfare of their race here and abroad. Their names are as prominent as those of the Guggenheim family, who are with business enterprises.

Robbing the police are convinced, and that is that the sender of the packages was not an ordinary crank. The design of the machines is ingenious and the workmanship is of a good order. There is nothing about any of them—not even a single word or letter of handwriting—to suggest a clue to the sender. The manner of addressing the wrappers indicates that it was done by a man of some intelligence and education. The fact that at least two of the machines were mailed in the Wall-street postoffice and that in the Schiff machine were scraps of paper containing stock quotations, would suggest that the machines were made by some one in the financial district.
