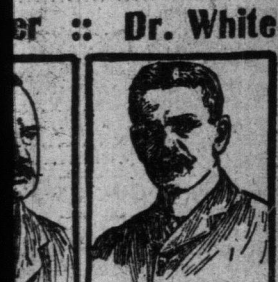

Electric Power Better For the Small Users Than is Producer Gas

Exhaustive Report on a Vital But Technical Subject is Made by Hydro Power Commission.

BUT GAS IN THE FUTURE WILL COMPETE WITH STEAM

Yesterday the report of the hydro-electric power commission on the cost of power production thru the agency of producer gas plants and other prime movers under the conditions obtaining in the Province of Ontario was presented to the legislature.

Estimates are given showing the cost of installing and working suction producer gas plants. Part III is taken up with a discussion of steam plants, part IV, with oil gas, and gasolene engines and the final section contains a discussion on fuel and other conditions in Ontario which are summed up as to their main results as follows:

1. Users of small amounts of power will be best served by electric power where it can be obtained at a price per B.H.P. not exceeding by more than 15 per cent. to 25 per cent. the cost per B.H.P. of power developed by gas, gasolene or oil engines.

2. Users of large amounts of power where the load fluctuates will be justified in paying for electric power per B.H.P. at a price equivalent to 80 per cent. to 85 per cent. of the cost of steam power per B.H.P., as shown in these estimates. If it cannot be obtained for this they will be best served by a steam engine.

3. Power users who require steam for heating purposes will only be justified in paying for electric power per B.H.P. at a price equivalent to 80 per cent. to 85 per cent. of the cost of steam power per B.H.P., as shown in these estimates. If it cannot be obtained for this they will be best served by a steam engine.

4. Where the cost of producer gas power per B.H.P. does not work out to 15 per cent. below the cost of hydro-electric power, it will be inadvisable to use hydro-electric power. Producer gas plants at present are having a fairly steady load and who require fairly large quantities of power, or who use gas for other purposes, such as annealing, brazing, or for other uses, will find it inadvisable to use hydro-electric power.

Judge Perdue sentenced him to four months hard labor and ten lashes.

BECK AND SMITH GO DOWN IN HOUSE

Cabinet Ministers Give Member From Soo Proper "Call" for His Injudicious Remarks.

C. N. Smith (Sault Ste. Marie) got severely called down in the legislature yesterday afternoon. Premier Whitney described the conduct of the member for the Soo as reprehensible. He had attacked Hon. Mr. Beck at forty miles distance, according to him, in a way utterly unjustifiable and beyond the truth, according to habit, again remarked the premier, and then having heard the denial of Hon. Adam Beck and Hon. Nelson Monteth he endeavored to pursue the matter still further. There was a proper place for the matter to be taken up, but it was not at that time.

Mr. Smith intimated that he had understood the position of members in committee of supply as he did after what he had heard he would have asked his question differently.

"You say so, yes," intimated the premier tartly, and the incident closed. It all arose out of Mr. Smith's attack on Hon. Mr. Beck at Hamilton on Thursday evening.

Before the orders were taken up Mr. Beck rose to a question of privilege, and to correct the assertions made, that notwithstanding \$70,000 had been spent on the "fairy scheme" of the hydro-electric power commission, nothing had, or would ever, come of it.

"Will the hon. gentleman say where he got the information?" asked Mr. Smith.

Got the Very Words. Hon. Mr. Beck: I got this information verbatim this time, I say verbatim because a year ago the hon. member made some allegations in the riding of West Middlesex about the provincial secretary, and in the house he intimated the truth of the report published in the papers.

Mr. Beck pointed out that at Ottawa the commission had made a contract for the city and settled a difficulty that worth thousands of dollars to the citizens. The commission was patiently waiting for other municipalities, and had definite information from eleven of these. As soon as four others of the fifteen engaging the scheme sent in their contracts there would be no longer any delay. There was no desire on the part of the commission or the government to delay the project, and he trusted that in the course of next week an announcement would be made of further steps.

He then referred to Mr. Smith's charge, that he (Mr. Beck) had got \$171 from the government, the cost of sending his horses to London to the International Exhibition.

"I never asked, nor received, any money from the government, Ontario for the exhibition or transportation of my horses to the International Horse Show," was Mr. Beck's statement.

Mr. Smith admitted that he had made a reference to Mr. Beck, quoting from page 201 of the Public Accounts, where the amount had been discussed some evenings before, and he had understood the minister of agriculture not delivered. Mr. Beck got the money for his horses.

"I don't recall my exact words," he went on, referring to the power question and the horse business, remembering a similar evasion a year ago. The substance of his statement, he said, was that up to date the commission had not delivered. His horsepower to Galt, Guelph, Woodstock or Owen Sound.

"Nor Winnipeg," interjected the premier. Hon. Mr. Monteth thought the horse items had been fully explained. No money had been paid for the expenses of Mr. Beck's horses.

THIEF ASSAULTS WOMAN THEN ROBS STORE TILL

Bold Robbery on Yonge Street, in Which Mrs. Davis is Seriously Hurt—Another Storekeeper Also Attacked.

Mrs. Davis, mother of Alf. C. Davis, who runs a liquor store at 601 Yonge-street, was knocked down and brutally beaten about the head shortly after 9 o'clock last night by a strange man who escaped by the front door, after robbing the till of about \$27.

The deed was committed in a most daring manner at a time when the streets were thronged with people.

The injured woman states that about 8:55 a man came into the store and asked to see Mr. Davis, her son. There were about four customers in the store at the time, and the man said he would call again. In about 15 minutes he came back, asking if Mr. Davis had returned, and upon being informed to the contrary, asked if he might use the telephone. Mrs. Davis indicated where the phone was, asking at the same time if she could do anything for him. He answered shortly "No."

When she had finished waiting on two customers who were in at that time, she walked to the back of the store when the man hung up the receiver with the remark, "I can't get them," and suddenly wheeled and struck her with his fist, felling her to the floor. YUKON MEMBER DESERTS HIS PARTY

Dr. A. T. Thompson Will in Future Be Out and Out Supporter of R. L. Borden.

OTTAWA, March 20.—(Special.)—"I consider that the bond which bound me to the independent party is now dissolved and from now on I will support the Conservative party and the principles laid down by Mr. R. L. Borden."

In these words, Dr. A. T. Thompson, member of parliament for the Yukon, made a declaration of faith in the course of a brief address on the budget to-night.

Dr. Thompson was elected in 1904 as an independent, defeating the Liberal Liberal nominee, ex-Governor Congdon, of the Yukon.

He was nominated by Liberals and Conservatives as a protest against the Liberal government, but since coming to parliament he has consistently supported the government, and has been ranked as a straight ministerialist.

Dr. Thompson to-night criticized the policy of bounting immigrants, and protested against the enormous budget of the finance minister and the parceling out of the assets of the country among the friends of the Liberal party.

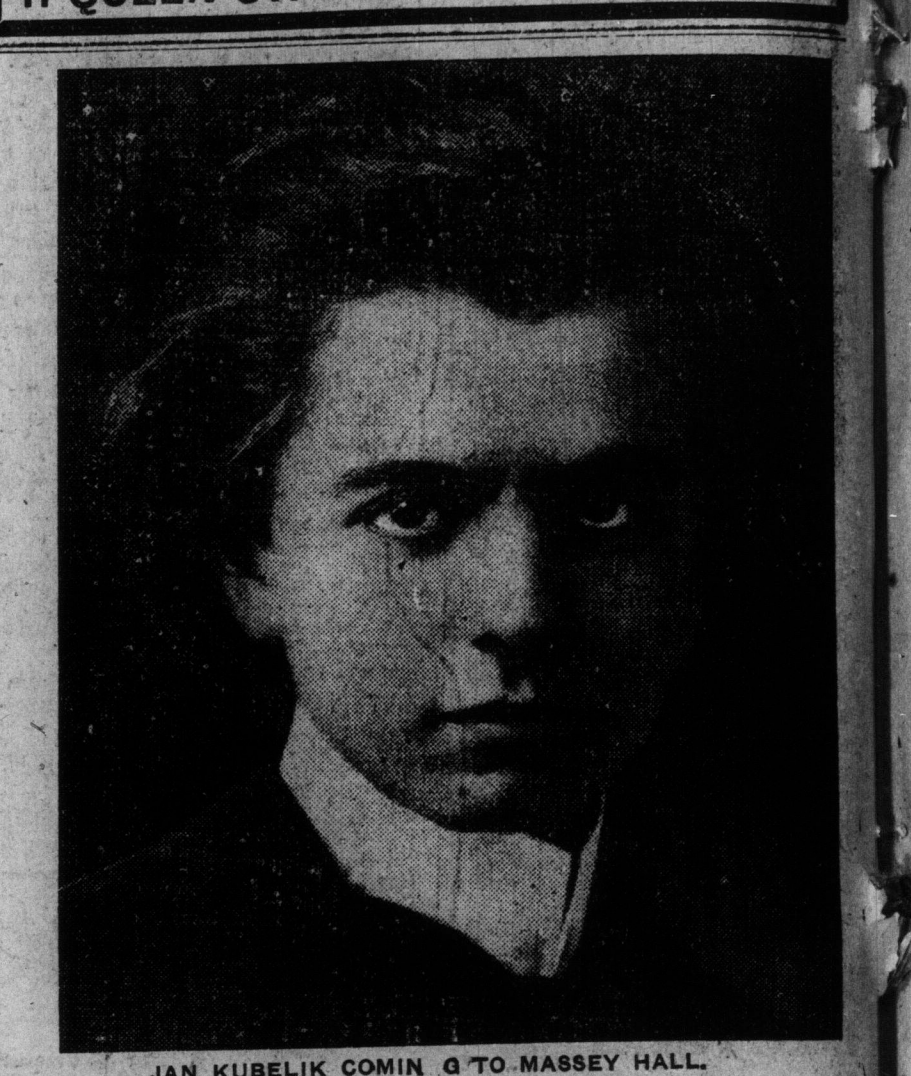

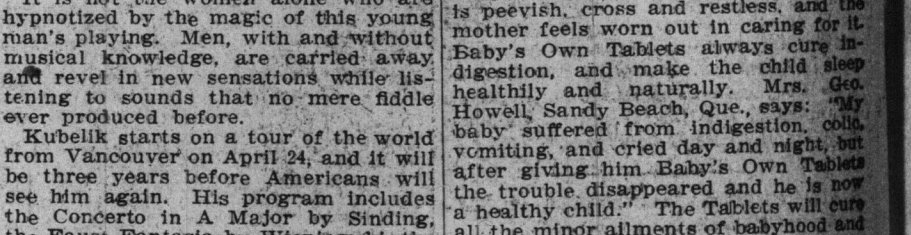

A. KELLY EVANS TO BE REGISLATIVE ASPIRANT

Will Run as Independent Conservative Candidate on Platform of Fish and Game Protection.

After some two years' work throughout the province in organizing the Ontario Fish and Game Protective Association up to its present strength of thirty-seven branches, A. Kelly Evans has definitely decided to contest one of the additional seats which it is thought will be given Toronto in the redistribution bill, on the platform for the most part contained in the petition now being circulated by the branches of the association, with the addition of a few other planks.

Whereas it is generally known that illegal destruction of game fish and game throughout the province is prevalent, and whereas quite 85 per cent. of the catch of food fish of the province is exported and no adequate provision is made for the same as to size or species is provided;

And whereas, in many places throughout the province, the practical impossibility to obtain from either fishermen or dealers Ontario-caught fish for the use of our own citizens;

And whereas, owing to the lack of sufficient supervision and protection, food fish, game fish, and game are disappearing, and the present law is insufficient to enforce the protection of non-observance of law and ineffectual supervision continue, they will cease to exist;

And whereas, a rigid enforcement of the existing laws, and a proper curtailment of net licenses, and supervision of the operation of the fish and game trade, and the supply of food fish for our own people would soon be provided, and a much greater attraction would exist for tourists, and thereby larger sums of money be brought into the province.

Your petitioners therefore pray that the inspectors, wardens, overseers and officers appointed under the act respecting game, fur bearing animals and fisheries of Ontario, be men possessing the knowledge and physical requirements necessary for the proper performance of their duties, and that the salaries paid to such officials be sufficient in amount to enable them to devote their whole time to their work, and that they be supplied with power boats, launches, and other necessary appliances;

That the province build and maintain hatcheries capable of an output of at least 300,000 fish annually, in order to assist nature in the replenishing of our depleted waters;

That greater care be observed in enforcing the laws relating to the collection of waters, and that all pulp concessions should contain rigid clauses on this point.

That a more effectual supervision be provided for carrying out the objects for which the provincial parks were set apart;

And that to provide the necessary funds for these several purposes, at least all moneys received by the government in connection with the license fees, etc., shall be expended for the above purposes.

In addition to these features Mr. Evans stands for the following: The prohibition of the export of fish from the province; the same for a term of years, with a threefold object: First, to break up the machinery in the province of what might be termed the American Fish Trust and which now practically controls both fisheries and fishermen; Second, to provide our own citizens with legally caught fish at reasonable prices; Third, to insure a complete stoppage of our valuable game fish being illegally caught in nets and shipped across the border owing to the insufficient inspection provided.

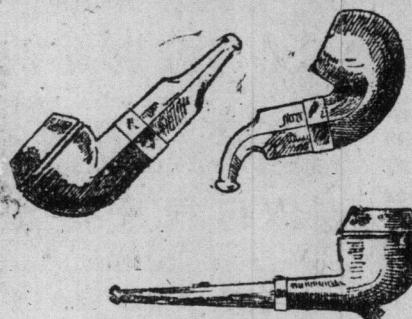

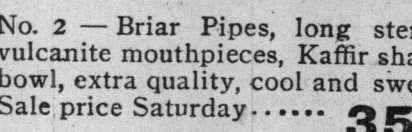

**OFFICERS SWEEP DOWN ON JUNCTION HOTELMEN**

**Big Raid is Skillfully Planned—Centre York Conservatives Meet To-Day—Items.**

TORONTO JUNCTION, March 20.—About 3 o'clock this afternoon, when the town was comparatively quiet, the officers of the law swooped down on five hotels in the Junction, the proprietors of which for some time past have been under suspicion as making infringements on the local option by-law. A considerable amount of booty was captured.

The raid was planned so cleverly, and details carried out so minutely, that the hotelkeepers did not receive the slightest intimation that they were to be attacked in their strongholds.

Associated with Inspector Mackenzie were Provincial Detectives Ayrault, Henson and Adamson. The local police have also been active in perfecting the arrangements for the seizure of the hotels raided were: The Peacock, with Fred Strange as bartender; the Occidental, Joseph Mayhew in charge; the Subway, owned by Alexander Nelson; the Alhambra Quick Lunch, on Dundas-street, owned by Harry Van Ziel, and Robert A. Ferguson's boarding-house at 104 Mulock-avenue.

At the Occidental Hotel were found five bottles of whiskey and fifteen dozen bottles of beer.

In the Subway House two bottles of whiskey were seized.

In Ferguson's house on Mulock-avenue several bottles of whiskey were seized, besides a number of bottles of beer and three kegs of beer, one of which was on top and the other two underneath.

A quantity of beer was found at Vansiel's, and one bottle of whiskey at the Peacock.

The raid was conducted simultaneously by the local police and provincial detectives assisted by three or four constables. The entire booty was brought to police headquarters, and summonses will be issued against the proprietors of the houses in which the beer was found.

duty of parliament to anticipate enlightened sentiment of the country before they were bound to carry out reform. A distinguished graduate of Oxford University had told him that it would be a great blow to that university if the patronage it exercised was withdrawn. Not more than half the graduates of our university men entered professional life. These men ought to enter the public service. Mr. Sifton declared the prosperity of Canada depended largely on the growth of the west. The class of immigrants we had received from the Western States were unexceptionable. In the past year or so there had been a falling off of the movement of settlers from that country, but there was an indication that it was setting in again.

He thought western lands reserved for railways, amounting to about 30,000,000 acres, should be thrown open for homestead settlers, including settlers from the Western States, reserving one-tenth of the land for 10 or 12 years, by which time it would have increased in value as to give the government a fund of thirty million dollars, which would recoup it for outlays that were essential to the prosperity of that country.

Railway were built. To induce a company to build the railway, the government would give enough money to pay for construction.

Mr. Sifton announced his opposition to government ownership and operation of railways, but in an exception in favor of the construction of the railway to Hudson Bay. When a corporation was running a railway, he thought the government should not take it out of their hands. He had no faith in the idea of government ownership of railways, and he would not believe in it, would say so. (Liberal applause.)

Too many were inclined to hedge because they thought public opinion was strong upon the subject, but public opinion would get strong in the wrong direction some times.

The Province of Ontario was justified in building the T. & N. O. Railway, because at that time the value of Northern Ontario was not known. He thought the federal government would be justified in building the Hudson Bay Railway, first taking care to make a reservation of land to pay back to the treasury money used in construction of the road.

The All Red Proposal.  
Mr. Sifton then abruptly turned to the all-red route proposal, with which he had been identified. He detailed proceedings of the imperial conference of last spring with reference to this movement, reading a resolution of that body on the subject. Since then the press had been asking, "What is the theme and what is its origin?"

The origin was the imperial conference and upon the desirability of carrying out such a proposal all the participants had agreed. Before going to England last fall, Mr. Sifton said, he had a conference with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and it was agreed that he (Sifton) should do what he could informally and unofficially to carry out the resolution of the imperial conference, with a view to getting things to agree on details; on what should be contributed by each to carry the plan to completion, and as to the water to make one pint; mix together in a clean bottle. Mr. Sifton then discussed the matter with Mr. Lloyd-George, president of the Board of Trade, and the chancellor of the Exchequer, in an informal way, and he was not at liberty to divulge what took place at those conferences; but he was satisfied the scheme was a success. Details of the Plan.  
But what was the scheme of the imperial conference? It was to build, through the federal government, an equipment to any on the Atlantic, with a speed of 24 knots an hour. For the Pacific the scheme was to build a ship of 3000 tons with a speed of 18 knots. With such a fleet of fast going vessels, the time consumed in passage from Liverpool to New York would be: Liverpool to Halifax, 5 days; to Vancouver, 9 days; to New Zealand, 25 days; so that in passage to New Zealand there would be a gain of 12 days in the mail service. Australia would not gain any time because her mails were carried the other way, but this would, at least, be an alternative route. The calculations of the promoters were based on Halifax as a winter port, and Quebec as a summer port, but they were not committed to those ports. In distance, Halifax would have the advantage over New York of 333 knots, while by the southern route, Quebec would have an advantage over New York of 233 knots, and 225 knots via Belle Isle.

The 24-knot boat would consume 4 days 12 hours from Liverpool to Halifax, 12 hours to Quebec, and 5 days 6 hours to Quebec via Cape Race. The Lusitania's time, when she smashed the record, was 5 days 18 hours, so she had reduced this by over an hour; so that the Halifax route would be faster by more than six hours than the New York route. It was not necessary to construct ships of the size of the Lusitania to secure a speed of 24 knots. The Lusitania would be too big for this route.

Defends Canadian Route.  
Next Mr. Sifton discussed the advantages of the Canadian route. He showed, by reference to hydrographic maps, that there was twice as much fog on New York routes. Even in the Gulf the percentage of fog was not large. The farther north the less fog there is. As to ice, he had the authority of the captain of the Empress of Ireland that there was not much difficulty with this, the danger being obviated by a slight deviation to the

south during the winter months. In regard to loss of ships, Mr. Sifton was able to refute a popular delusion. In the record of losses on the Canadian route, every little coasting vessel of over 200 tons was counted, while this was not the case on other routes. From 1880 to 1897 between Quebec and Liverpool, only Halifax and Liverpool, only five vessels were lost. Three of these were on account of lack of experience or lack of care of navigators; one would not have occurred if proper sounding had been taken, and one could be properly charged to dangers of the route.

As to cost, the conclusion arrived at was that a 24-knot weekly service between Canada and Great Britain, and a fortnightly service between Vancouver and New Zealand and Australia would cost in subsidy one million pounds yearly. The allocation of this would be as follows: Australia, 475,000; New Zealand, 210,000; Canada, 235,000, and Great Britain, 100,000, or half the entire subsidy.

Mr. Sifton said he was convinced that Great Britain only awaited definite conclusions on the part of the colonies to take the project up in a practical way. At present Canada paid in subsidies to Pacific and Atlantic steamship services \$80,000 a year, so that the difference between the present and proposed service would be between \$90,000 and \$95,000 a year in additional subsidy contribution.

The establishment of such a service would mean the putting of Canada on the main thoroughfare instead of a side street, as at present.

Mr. Sifton said that he had strong hopes that the C.P.R., Grand Trunk and Canadian Northern would all join together to make this all-red scheme the magnificent success that it ought to be.

In conclusion he expressed hope that the government would feel itself justified at an early date in taking up this most important project.

Mr. Bergeron followed, remarking that the moderate speech of Mr. Sifton indicated a disposition to cut loose from the party. **Smokers Important**

The Government have decided to rearrange duties on tobacco, so that all manufacturers may use one black stamp, whether cigars or tobaccos are made up of home-grown Canadian leaf or imported stock.

In the past cigars or tobaccos made of Canadian leaf had a green stamp. Anyone who has used Canadian leaf knows it is not equal to imported stock. Now, a few men want to have a black stamp on, so neither the dealer nor the public will know by the stamp whether they have inferior stock or not. The Government have yielded to a few men, while the majority desire that the public shall be protected from fraud. Not only that, but the Government encourages this by making the manufacturers who want to use good imported tobacco pay on cigars \$5.60, against \$1.00 on Canadian leaf, on 1000 cigars.

To the public I appeal. Deputations have waited upon the Government, and more are to go, but they have not heard our appeals. Now, I want 4000 men to sign petitions against this injustice. Send to me and I will send you a petition. This must be done at once, or else one of the worst forms of fraud will be put upon every smoker, whether he likes it or not.

You will have to pay more for your tobacco and cigars if this legislation is allowed to pass.

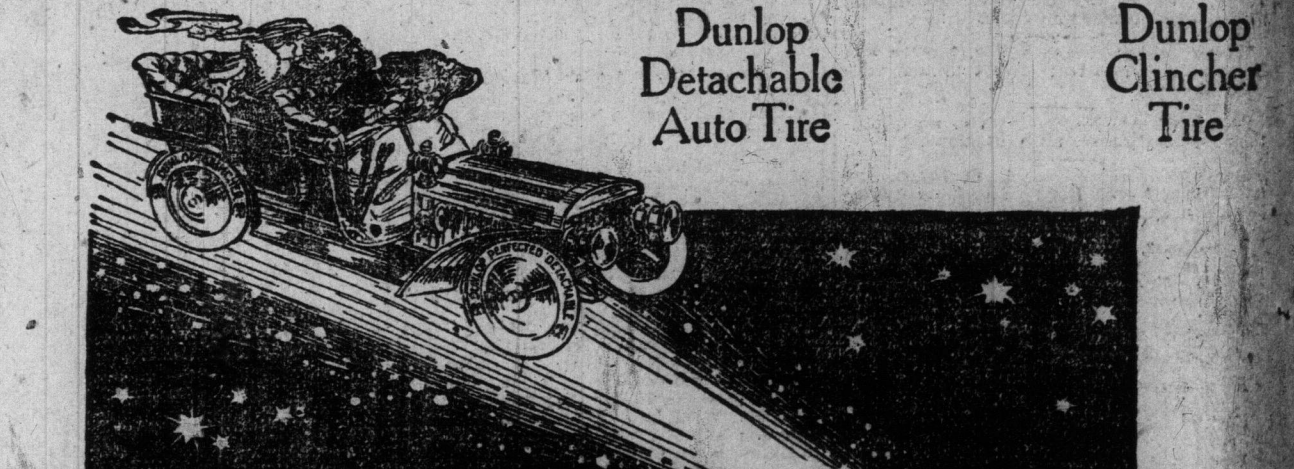
