Altho the recent United Free Church neral Assembly rejected the proposal form, it was only to pass a resoluon which more than met the Church Scotland in spirit. Holding that there were considerations which to their mind rendered co-operation difficult, if not impracticable, the United Free Churchmen approved a motion declaring their readiness "to enter into unrestricted conference with their brethren of the Church of Scotland on the existing ecclesiastical situation and on the main causes which keep the churches apart, with the earnest hope that by God's blessing, misunderstandings and hindrances may be removed, and the great object of Presbyterian reunion in Scotland thereby advanced." To this declaration the Church of Scotland will no doubt respond sympathetically and a conference carried out in the spirit of the resolution quoted cannot fail to be helpful, even if it prove unsuccessful. For it cannot be ignored that the one formidable difficulty in the path of union is the connection of the Church of Scotland with the state. Many of the applicants for grants were dummies for the corporations, and was evident that there was a 'hurry-up' rush on foot to grab, before the people woke up, the

"Nor was the importance of this to be seen at once, or to be realizto be seen at once, or to be realized until first the president and then the people could be made to grasp the tremendous importance of water power. For generations we had used it sparingly, turning with it no machinery which could not be reached from the water-spun turbine by a belt or shaft. Suddenly in a worderfully short time, we worderfully short time, we have entered and advanced far in a new series of inventions by which we are able to develop power at any falls, in the form of electricity, and carry it even hundreds of miles, with but slight loss, to be used for commercial purposes wherever needed. In ten years we will be sending power one thousand miles, and the most remote mountain streams will be contributing to run our railways, to light our cities, to take the smoke from our factories and even to do the ordinary work about our farms and homes—lighting, heating, plowing, milking, churning, ironing, cooking and all that coal and animal power

"There is in the United States developed and unharnessed in our rivers and brooks more than fifty million horse power in water cap-able of being turned into electrical energy and transmitted to homes, farms and factories. This can per-haps be increased 50 or even 100 per cent. by proper conservation. Yet even in the original figure it means the equivalent of six hundred and fifty million tons of coal every year mined, transpo consumed; or, as we waste half of our coal in getting it from the ground, it represents the diminu-

tons in our available supply of coal. "We actually mine and ship each year about five million tons of coal. So the water power, the bulk of which we are giving over to monopoly, represents more than the equivalent of all our coal; represents the only hope for cheap liv-ing; represents a fuel or source of power which while controlled by the people can be used for, public income and for regulating costs; but which when alienated, as we are alienating it, will create a trust that will make of the meat trust a pigmy and that by simply adding pennies to its charges for power will reduce us to a slavery which would make the Standard Oil magnates gasp with envy. Such a state of affairs would surely produce a revolution. Only a sane and radical action can avoid such a con-







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# TORONTO CLUB LOSES SUIT AGAINST BANKS

Chancellor Boyd Finds Harbottle Had Power to Enderse Negotiable Instruments.

At Osgoode Hall yesterday Chancelor Boyd dismissed the action of the Toronto Club against the Imperial Bank, the Dominion Bank, and the Imperial Trusts Company for a return of the money paid b ythese institutions to Capt. Colin C. Harbottle, the chib's ecretary, who absconded.

The plaintiff sued the Dominion Bank for \$1583.01, the Imperial Bank for \$10,022.60, and the Imperial Trust Co. for \$2805.35. The judgment follows: The result of all the evidence, oral and documentary, leads to the belief that the secretary of the club had all along power to endorse negotiable instruments exercisable acocrding to the discretion and honesty of each individual secretary. The secretaries before Harbottle acted honretaries before Harbottle acted honestly and kept the club moneys separate in the club's bank subject to the
centrol of the head and certain officers of the club as indicated in Mr.
Osler's letter of Sept. 19, 1900. Former
secretaries appeared to have used two
kinds of rubber stamps for endorsement, one simply "The Toronto Club"
and the other "Pay to the order of the
Dominion Bank for the Toronto Club"

used the signature of the secretary
was the completion of the endorsement
and it was still open to him if he
chose on either endorsement to draw
the money for the cheque instead of

Harbottle departed from the practice of the earlier secretaries by paying only part of the club cheques received into the company's bank. The larger part were so applied, but a minor part he cashed or handled so as to have the amounts deposited subject to his own control. The officers and members knew or had the means of knowing that he was in the habit of depositing and cashing members' cheques to the club for the accommodation of the members, and it was apparently left to his own discretion as to how far or to what extent this should be done. The defendants were not aware and were not informed that any re-

done. The defendants were not aware and were not informed that any restrictions were placed upon him in this respect, and none in fact have been made to appear, and in the usual course of business they received cheques properly endorsed by him and credited him with the proceeds. It think he had authority to endorse in the general way and that his acts. think he had authority to endorse in the general way and that his acts were not conversions of the property as between him and the club. The meneys so deposited may be regarded as trust money of the club and the defendants were not cognizant before or after of any breach of trust by him. \* \* \* \* It is not necessary to dwell on the special features of the defence of the Imperial Trust Co. As to the greater part of the claim I think the fair inference from the evidence is inference from the evidence is that the breache sof trust as between the secretary and the club were repaired by the repayments made by him to the club, but upon the whole of their liability they are on the same footing as the other defendants. The result is that the actions stand dis-

missed with costs.
