VISITING WOMEN PLAN CAMPAIGN TO PROTECT HEALTH OF THE PUBLIC

Lady Aberdeen Elected Convener of Committee, Which Will Start Crusade Against Tuberculosis and High Infant Mortality—Overseas Delegates Relate What Their Own Countries Are Doing.

Interest in the Quinquennial Congress gathers in strength with succeeding meetings, and the potency of the international organization grows larger from day to day as one is brought into touch with the personalities leading the great movement whose purpose is exemplified in the motto over the platform in Convocation Hall, "Do unto others as you would that they should do unto you." A clearer realization of what national councils mean to civilization is brought before the mind.

Last night's meeting in Convocation Hall to discuss questions of public health was an awakening to many who heretofore have given the matter only cursory thought.

Health of All Nations.
Her excellency introduced the subject of the evening by referring to the volume of reports, "The Health of All Nations," which had been edited by Mrs. Ogilvie Gordon, honorary secretary, and commended it to the attention of the delegates.

During the past years, said her excellency, they had been consolidating the energies in the various countries where they had councils, they had been forming councils, collecting information and giving adherence to various principles of progress which they urged the councils to promote individually and collectively.

It was a question of international concern and in which combined action by the nations was of the highest value.
"But," continued her excellency, "it remains for the women of all nations to awaken to a sense of their duty in regard to the health of their children and the health of their homes, over which they are the recognized supreme guardians of the world over."

The Alarm Sounded.
"Up to very recently a great apathy has existed everywhere, but thanks to the persistency sounding the alarm, a very great difference has lately been noticeable. As readily it is the place of the International Councils to do everything in its power to help the women workers of the world to take up their proper position in the movement and to further guide it to the utmost of their powers."

The subjects mentioned in the report are:
Tuberculosis—The preventable disease, bred of bad housing, bad air, bad food, dirt, ignorance and intemperance. Infant mortality—With its tale of preventable death, due in large measure to maternal ignorance, bad food, dirt and patent drugs.
The health of schoolchildren.
The instruction of the young in matters of health and in the management of the health of the home.
The health of the women industrial workers.
As the reports are read and the causes assigned, must it not be admitted that the responsibility is in large measure due to ignorance, thoughtlessness and want of training of women, who become wives and mothers without realizing the duties attached to these callings, and to the self-centredness of women who, sheltered from all dangers in their own comfortable homes, will not give their service to the public boards of health, education and local government, whose the formation of a health section with a permanent standing committee was an imperative measure.

"The main responsibility," said her excellency, "is laid on people like with the facts which are established, and to impress these on the general body of people, physicians and surgeons and health authorities need the help of the rank and file.
"It is the hasty eagerness of the public to grasp at every new nostrum, which is impotent of the slow pro-

Notes in circulation totaled \$68,286,223, an increase of over one million dollars, while the reserve stood at \$75,756,488, or practically the same figure as in April.

NEW WESTERN ROUTES SHOULD BE SPREAD OUT

Hon. G. P. Graham Endorses the Principle in Deciding on Several Applications.

OTTAWA, June 18.—(Special).—Several route map applications by railways were made before Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways, to-day. G. A. Magrath, M.P., emphasized the principle that the roads in the west should be spread out as much as possible. Otherwise they could not begin to fill the needs of the people. In one instance he appealed against the diversion of the G. T. P. from Carbon on the branch line to Calgary. The minister, however, agreed, and an order was given that the railway should be built on the Carbon branch. Mr. Magrath also drew special attention to the C. P. R. and C. N. R. route from the east. Instead of running practically over the same ground they should, he said, spread out, and the important settlement of Warner, which required railway facilities urgently, should be brought in.

The minister reserved approval of the route until he had given further consideration. The following routes were approved: G. T. P., Biggar to Battleford; G. T. P., Regina branch; G. T. P., Yorkton branch; C. P. R., Manitowish branch; C. P. R., on behalf of the provisional directors of the Hudson Bay and Pacific Co., applied for approval of a route map for that portion of the company's line from Prince Albert, Sask., thru the Pas to Fort Churchill, N.W.T.

PROVINCE IS REJOICING IN OUTLOOK FOR CROPS
Dollar Wheat With Bountiful Yield Likely—Fruit Prospects Excellent.
The whole province is rejoicing in the outlook for a bountiful harvest. Cereals are all looking well. Next week, the great miracle of nature—the shooting of the wheat heads—will take place in the deep green fields of fall wheat.

COAST TO COAST PHONE LINE
C.P.R. is Installing One—Working on Lake Superior Division.
PORT ARTHUR, June 18.—(Special).—An Allan superintendent in charge of construction on the Lake Superior division of the C. P. R. is here to-day from North Bay. He has a gang of men engaged in stringing telephone lines between Port William and White River.

SOO CANAL OPEN TO-DAY.
SAULT STE. MARIE, June 18.—(Special).—New upper gates were put in position at the Canadian Soo Canal at 10 o'clock this afternoon. The swing dam will be removed during the night and the canal will be in shape to lock boats as usual by noon to-morrow.

TO TAX CAPITAL FOR PENSIONS

How France Hopes to Raise Huge Amount—Tax on Inheritances First Proposed.

PARIS, June 18.—The budget for 1910 was introduced in the chamber of deputies to-day by Finance Minister Galloux and shows a deficit of \$21,000,000. Nine million dollars of this is charged to the budget of 1911. The minister recommends that the remaining \$12,000,000 be raised by a new tax of a cent a litre on the petroleum used in automobiles; a tax on dogs; administrative rearrangement and a stricter enforcement of the taxes on colonial obligations and mines, and a new tax in connection with the inheritance of property.

The minister explained that it was planned to levy this tax on the capital revealed by inheritances, thus paving the way to the institution of a more important progressive tax on capital by which the government hopes to raise the \$20,000,000 or \$24,000,000 necessary to cover the workings of pensions, now being discussed by parliament.

VERSCHOYLE F. CRONYN COMES EAST AS MANAGER

Vancouver Man is Appointed Head of Northern Crown Bank in Ontario.

When Verschoyle F. Cronyn comes to Toronto as general manager for Ontario for the Northern-Crown Bank, the announcement of which appointment has been made, he will join forces with Robert Campbell of Winnipeg, general manager of the institution, who is an old associate of twenty years standing on the staff of the Bank of Montreal.

The west is indisputably loyal to the North-Crown, whose headquarters are in Winnipeg, but a strong man was needed to take charge of the Ontario branches and after much persuasion Mr. Cronyn has been induced to forsake pleasant surroundings in Vancouver and come east.

In his twenty years of service in the Bank of Montreal, Mr. Cronyn has held many responsible positions, in Toronto, Chicago, and other places. For a number of years he has been in British Columbia; was for a time inspector of branches in British Columbia, and lately has had full charge of the business of that institution on the Pacific Coast.

At the time Mr. Cronyn first decided to accept the offer to come east, he was in the City of London, and strong efforts were made to have him reconsider the matter, but the call of the new position was too strong.

CHURCH FIGHT BITTER
Dr. Myers Now Wants Prof. Foster Removed From University.

CHICAGO, June 18.—Having failed in his purpose to have Professor Geo. Burman Foster read out of the Baptist Church, the Rev. Dr. Johnston Myers will next turn his attention to having him removed from his chair of philosophy or religion at the University of Chicago.

MOTHER'S BRUTALITY
Tortures and Starves Her 10-Year-Old Daughter.

OTTAWA, June 18.—Because she resembled a dilkied sister-in-law, Mrs. Nelson Lajoie, of Aylmer, with nine children, is alleged to have tortured her daughter of 10 until she almost died. The child is now in the hospital, her body a mass of bruises, the head being disfigured by five cuts. The neighbors say that Mrs. Lajoie made the child run backward and forward in front of her while she struck her with a stick, also that she tied her hands while hungry and placed her where she could watch others eat. The child willingly ate potato peelings.

Nation's Honors For Inventors of Air Travel

U. S. Government, State of Ohio and City of Dayton Present Medals to the Wright Bros.

DAYTON, O., June 18.—The nation, the state and the city in which they live to-day paid tribute to Wilbur and Orville Wright, the aviators, standing on a platform not far from their unpretentious little airplane factory, and almost within sight of the field where they first struggled with the problem of aerial navigation.

General James Allen, chief signal officer of the army, presented the gold medals authorized by act of congress, and at the same time were given them a diamond-studded medal bearing the official seal of the State of Ohio and another from Dayton, their home city.

Withur Wright said: "It is some receipt the sympathy and encouragement which is their due. This cannot be said of us. Even in the infancy of our work, we received offers of financial assistance from people who could have no hope of reward."
The benediction was pronounced by Bishop Milton Wright, the venerable father of the aviators.

CZAR AND KAISER FRIENDS
They Say So Themselves in 'Most Polite Language.'

REVAL, June 18.—At the banquet on board the Russian Imperial Yacht Standard last night, the Czar said: "I assure your majesty that I cherish the sincere and unchanging wish ever to maintain the traditional relations of hearty friendship and mutual trust that always have united our two houses and the cultivation of which I strongly desire not merely as a pledge of the good relations of our two countries, but of the general peace."
In reply Emperor William said: "I am rejoiced to see, in this hearty reception, a new and valuable confirmation of the traditional relationship of cordial friendship and confidence, which, corresponding to the manifold interests and thoroughly peaceful sentiments of our two countries, exists between our governments."

DEGREES FOR TWO CANADIANS.
ONONDAGA, June 18.—(C.A.P.).—Glasgow University will confer the honorary LL.D. degree next week upon Sir Hugh Graham, proprietor of The Montreal Star, and Rev. S. A. Macdonald, editor of The Toronto Globe. Both are at present in England with the imperial press conference delegates.

LORD BERESFORD COMING.
Information has been received that Lord Charles Beresford will visit to Canada in September for the opening of the Toronto Exhibition.

\$10,000 GIFT.
MONTREAL, June 18.—(Special).—D. Lorne McGibbon gave \$10,000 to the Y.M.C.A. fund to-day, and the total now reaches \$240,000.

Senator Ferguson's Illness.
Senator Ferguson of Prince Edward Island is recuperating in the Victoria Memorial Hospital, Isabella-street, after a serious operation, which was performed four weeks ago for the removal of a tumor. His condition is such that Dr. S. Cummings, who performed the operation, has every hope that the affection has been permanently removed.

DEBTS DOUBLED ON PAPER

U. S. Senate Vote Down the Amendment to Admit It Free—A Fear of Canada.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The senate to-day defeated Senator Brown's amendment providing for the free importation of print paper by a vote of 25 to only four Republicans, Messrs. Beveridge, Bristow, Brown and Burdett voting for it, thus adopting the finance committee's amendment giving a duty of \$4 a ton on print paper.

Senator Brown again occupied the earlier hours with a speech in support of the finance committee's amendment on paper and wood pulp, declaring that Canada had a vast advantage in the cost of labor over the United States in the production of paper, and urged sharp competition in the United States as the reason why the price of paper had been kept down.

Senator Brown again declared in length precautions that had been taken by England States to preserve their forests, especially in the case of Sweden, which has a vast area of spruce, would enter the United States market.

"If Canada," he said, "gets control of the wood pulp and print paper in the United States, the newspapers will be at their mercy in the matter of price."
He believed the rate of duty recommended by the committee on finance to be too small, and predicted that it would be regarded as a monumental blunder. He preferred to continue the duty of the Dingley law.

Senator Brown again declared the floor and undertook to withdraw his amendment for free paper so as to place himself in position so as to oppose the provision of the house bill, which levied a duty of \$2 instead of \$4 a ton on print paper as proposed by the finance committee, but Senator Aldrich objected.

Explaining that there was a great international question pending before the senate, which did not include the house passed the tariff bill, Mr. Aldrich said Canada had adopted a policy announced by the finance committee, which was intended to effectively prevent the export of logs or wood pulp. This was the result of taking possession of the American market for print paper.

"We ought to make the duty so heavy," he said, "as not to permit the carrying out of such plans."
The duty of \$4 a ton was not, in his opinion, sufficient to cover the difference in the cost of production between the two countries.

Referring to the report that the international Paper Co. had purchased 12,000 acres of land in Canada, Mr. Aldrich suggested that that company might be caught in the Canadian trap preventing them from bringing that wood across the line.

Following closely upon the defeat of Mr. Brown's amendment Mr. Stone offered an amendment providing for a pulp print paper, suitable for books and newspapers" on the free list.

MUSTN'T CELEBRATE '4TH'
Militia Council Refuse to Allow Kingston Regiment to Visit Elmira, N.Y.

OTTAWA, June 18.—(Special).—The militia council has refused permission to the Princess of Wales Own Rifles of Kingston, Ont., to take part in the 4th of July celebration at Elmira, N. Y., and accordingly that regiment has had to cancel its trip.

Grierson, who was in Toronto yesterday closing the deal for his farm to Mr. Noel Marshall, for farm and fallow land. They will summer fallow more and work the soil more as it should be.

More corn seedling planted than was done a year ago. New silos are being erected and preparations for cheaper feeding are being entered into with business-like speed. Mangel swiss is being put in fodder corn. Mangel swiss in June often brings better results than the early crops. Turnips are being sown liberally also for sprouting and roots prevent many digestive troubles in stall fed stock. Roots are germinating well. Beans are a good price, and some farmers east of Toronto have tried potatoes.

BEE SWARMING. June is the month in which the bees may be expected to swarm. A lack of ventilation, an overcrowded hive and large stores of honey are the principal causes for this swarming. It is not a difficult matter to control the swarming by supplying ample bottom ventilation for the hives and plenty of storage room for the honey. Shade is essential in order to keep the hives cool. If the hive does not stand in the shade of a tree or in some sheltered position, an awning or board platform should be constructed over it to ward off the sun's rays. By clipping the wings of the queen many swarms will be prevented. When this is done the bees may swarm from the hives, but they will not fly away from the hives. To clip the queen's wings, lift out the comb on which she is resting, slip a piece of each wing with a pair of manicure scissors and return her to the hive. Then when the bees swarm the queen will be found near the hive. As long as the queen cannot fly away the bees will soon return to their hive again.

CARE OF HORSES. When two horses become accustomed to working together don't change them. In matching up the work teams mate them in size, weight and disposition as nearly as possible. It is very hard on a prompt horse to be obliged to work with a slow and unsteady one. Never tolerate a man on a farm who yanks, kicks or whips a horse. In no case should the collar be allowed to follow when the mare is at work. Sow a good patch of carrot for the horses this year, if you never have before. Do not bang the bits against the horse's teeth. Be patient and he will open his mouth and you can adjust your reins to walk down hill. Now, that may mean that you will have to break yourself in to a long day down hill. It is a bad plan. Don't tug your harnesses up with strings. No sure way to give trouble, have everything stout. Get a first-class horse dental to look over the teeth of every horse in your stable, young and old.—Farm Journal.
