CORONER'S JURY FINDS SPRACKLIN FIRED IN SELF-DEFENCE HOMICIDE WAS JUSTIFIABLE

Windsor, Ont., Nov. 8.—Justifiable homicide was the verdict returned by the coroner's jury conducting the inquest into the death of Beverly Trumble, who was shot by Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin, pastor-license inspector, at the Chappell House at 3.30 o'clock Saturday morning.

POWER CLEAN-UP IS FURTHER DELAYED

Conference Between Government and Mackenzie Interests to Be Continued.

Paris, Nov. 8.—King Alfonso and Queen Victoria of Spain, with Prince Jaime, members of their household and the Spanish ambassador, Count Quiñones de Leon, left Paris for London this afternoon. The three special cars of the royal party were attached to the Calais express.

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TRANSFER POWERS TO TRANSPORTATION BODY

City Council Gives Authority for Management of Motor Buses and Other Transport—Will Obviate Granting of Franchises to Outside Companies—Grocers Again Ask Repeal of Early Closing Bylaw—Action Deferred.

Objection was raised in the city council yesterday to the granting of powers to the transportation commission to manage motor buses and other methods of transportation in the city, but the recommendation of the board of control to confer the powers was finally adopted, after it had been pointed out that the council still retained control of the financing of such undertakings.

The objection was raised by Ald. Singer, who declared that the bylaw conferring the powers was defective in that it had not been drawn in accordance with the act. He also argued that council had no power itself to operate motor buses or transportation without taking a vote of the ratepayers, and therefore had no authority to confer.

The recommendation of the board of control was based on section 10 of the act of 1920, which read: "The council of the said corporation (Toronto) may at any time by bylaw entrust the construction, control, maintenance, operation and management of lines of motor buses or of subways, or of trams, or of any other method of underground or overhead line transportation within the powers of the corporation to the said commission, and thereafter all the powers, rights, authorities and privileges of the said corporation as to the construction, control, maintenance, operation and management of the transportation so put under the control of the commission shall be exercised by the commission and not by the council of the corporation."

Mayor Church said the purpose of the bill was to transfer what powers the city had to the transportation commission, and that no future council could grant a franchise to another company.

Controlled by the commission, the city would give the commission power to grant running franchises to the city to other companies without the consent of the ratepayers.

D'ANNUNZIO TROOPS CLASH WITH SERBS

Rome, Nov. 8.—Just as the negotiations between Italy and Jugoslavia are about to begin, trouble has occurred between the insurgent troops under Gabriele d'Annunzio, in command at Fiume, and the Serbs. On Thursday d'Annunzio sent Captain Piffer, his first aide, from Trent with sailors and Alpine troops to occupy St. Mark's Rock, at the entrance of Morlacca Strait, to prevent the Serbians from occupying the shore on Buccari, promontory from interfering with navigation.

HAS CROSSED PASSAGE FROM WAR TO PEACE

Paris, Nov. 8.—France has shown the same ardor in her work of reconstruction as she did in the war, and has successfully crossed the passage from war to peace, which is always difficult for victors, says Premier Leygues in an interview given today in the Petit Parisien.

MEIGHEN MAY SPEAK IN AYLMER NOV. 20

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—(By Can. Press.)—The prime minister will probably conclude his speaking tour by a meeting in Aylmer, Ont., on Saturday, Nov. 20. On the previous day, Mr. Meighen will speak in Toronto. If the Aylmer meeting is arranged, the prime minister's speech would form a wind-up to the government campaign in East Elgin, in which a county Aylmer is situated.

Attempt at Suicide Caused by Montreal Girl's Love Affair

New York, Nov. 8.—(By Canadian Press.)—Evelyn Smith, of Montreal, who attempted suicide early yesterday morning by swallowing iodine in front of a joss house in Chinatown, will recover, it is stated this morning at the volunteer hospital.

Ratepayers of Kingston Asked to Exempt Factory

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 8.—(Special.)—Howard Kelly and Stanley Driver, of Kingston, are starting a molding factory. The ratepayers will be asked to give the company a free site on Montreal street at a cost of \$2,000 and exemption from taxes for ten years.

BOSTON POLICEMAN TO FREE WITH GUN

Boston, Mass., Nov. 8.—Complaints that Patrolman Alpheus Mascroft stood eight men against a wall at revolver point in the South Boston district yesterday without cause and kept back a crowd of their friends by threats to shoot were followed today by announcements from Superintendent of Police Crowley that the officer had been suspended and from Patrolman Mascroft that he had resigned.

GERMAN SAVANTS REPLY TO OXFORD

Berlin, Nov. 8.—German university professors and members of the Reichstag have drawn up a reply to the appeal for re-establishment of the "friendly intercourse" which existed before the war, which the professors and doctors of Oxford University recently addressed to professors of arts and sciences and members of universities and learned societies in Germany and Austria.

U. S. War Dead Brought Back, Excepting Several Hundreds

Washington, Nov. 8.—All United States war dead have been returned from Great Britain, with the exception of the bodies of about 550 soldiers who are to remain there permanently by request of relatives, the war department announced today.

Flour in Minneapolis Mills Drops to Pre-War Prices

Minneapolis, Minn., Nov. 8.—Flour prices today continued their downward slide and reached what millers said were pre-war prices. At one large mill here family flour declined 40 cents a barrel to a new low price of \$10. This quotation was for car lots in 95-pound cotton sacks.

BRAZIL FIRMS PROTEST LARGE SEIZURE AT FIUME

Rio Janeiro, Nov. 8.—Eight important firms of this city have protested to the foreign minister against the recent seizure at Fiume by Captain Gabriele d'Annunzio of the steamer Corne, which carried a cargo consigned to Brazil. The government is asked to make representations at Rome and to secure indemnity for the goods seized when the ship was taken over by the d'Annunzio forces.

THROWS ASIDE THEORY OF LABORITE'S MURDER

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 8.—Crown Attorney Brennan this morning stated that nothing had yet developed to substantiate the theory that John Taylor, Orangeman, labor man and returned soldier, had been murdered and his body placed on the tracks of Cemetery street car line late Thursday night, before being run over and mutilated by a late car.

Camille Barrere May Be Next French Ambassador at Rome

Paris, Nov. 8.—Camille Barrere, French ambassador at Rome, is being considered by the government as the successor of Paul Cambon, French ambassador to Great Britain, whose resignation has been announced, says The Excelsior.

Keeps Mum on Liquor Source; Goes to Jail for Three Months

Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 8.—Forced to keep his lips sealed where he got his liquor, Jerry Callaghan was sentenced to three months in jail.
