## Industrial Exhibition Association of Toronto.

## Annual Meeting, Feb. 17th, 1880.

The Annual Meeting of the members of the Association was held at the City Hall, Toronto, at 2 o'clock, p.m., on Tuesday, February 17th, 1880. The President, John J. Withrow,

Esq., in the chair.

The following gentlemen were present: the Mayor of Toronto, Aldermen McMurrich, Close, Mitchell, Blevins, Steiner, Walker, Fleming, Evans, Trees and Crocker, representing the City Council; Messrs. J. J. Withrow, A. McGregor, A. Smith, W. H. Doel, G. Leslie, Jr., J. McGee, Jr.o. Ritchie, Sr., Jno. Dill, W. Rennie, R. Davies, and Dr. E. Bull, representing the Electoral District Society of Toronto; Messrs. W. F. McMaster and W. B. Hamilton, from the Board of Trade; Messrs. G. Booth, D. Lamb and R. W. Elliot, from the Manufacturers' Association of Ontario; Messrs. J. Stokes (Warden), and Jos. Fleury, from the York County Council; Messrs. D. C. Ridout and Thos. Davison, from the Toronto Mechanics Institute; Messrs. J. A. Simmers and Walter S. Lee, from the Horticultural Society; Rev. Dr. Scadding and Mr. John Notman, from the Canadian Institute; Mr. J. T. Duncan, from the Veterinary Association of Ontario; Messrs. E. B. Shuttleworth and Geo. Hodgetts, from the Ontario College of Pharmacy; Messrs. J. P. Bull and John Ramsay, from the Dominion Grange, Patrons of Husbandry; Messrs. John James and J. T. Johnson, from the Toronto Poultry and Pet Stock Association; and Ald. Hallam, representing the Wool Interest.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read and

confirmed.

## The Annual Report.

The President then read the following Report of the Board of Directors for the year 1879, which was adopted:—

#### GENTLEMEN:

In presenting their First Annual Report, your Directors are glad to be able to congratulate the Association on the success which has attended the first Exhibition held under its auspices, and the fact that its permanent establishment is now fully assured.

The number of visitors attending the Exhibition-which was held from the 1st to the 19th September-was larger than had ever attended any exhibition previously held in the Dominion, whilst the number of exhibitors was fully equal to our most sanguine expectations. The causes which contributed most largely to this gratifying result were, we think, the extension of the time usually occupied by similar exhibitions, from one to three weeks; the superior accommodation afforded by the grounds and buildings of the Association-the like of which are not to be found anywhere else in the Dominion; the special advantages which the City of Toronto offers for an exhibition of this character; the extreme thoughtfulness and liberality which characterized the arrangements for exhibitors and the public in almost every department; the very liberal prize list offered; the adoption of a liberal excursion scheme by the railway companies whose lines centre in the city; and the confidence which agriculturalists, manufacturers and the public generally have in the Association.

The Association was fortunate in having the presence, at the opening of the Exhibition, and on several subsequent occasions, of His Excellency the Governor-General, and Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise, and there is no doubt that a knowledge of the fact that the Exhibition was to be under the immediate patronage of their Excellencies was an incentive to many, even from very long distances, to visit it. The exhibitors also experienced much pleasure from being afforded an opportunity to explain to their Excellencies the nature and quality of the various goods, etc., manufactured by them.

### New Buildings, etc.

It was found necessary, in order to successfully carry out the objects of the Association, to erect a number of new buildings for various purposes. The erection of these buildings appeared at first to be a somewhat heavy undertaking, but from the liberal manner in which the efforts of your Directors were furthered by subscriptions from the citizens, no difficulty was experienced in this respect. The total cost of the new buildings erected was \$21,765.22.

The cost of each building so erected will be found in the Treasurer's statement, the principal ones being the Implement Building, for the display of Agricultural Implements in motion; the Amphitheatre and Refreshment Stalls at the western end of the Horse Ring; the Restaurant Building and the Stove Building. In addition to these buildings, a number of smaller ones had to be erected, such as Gate Houses, Railway and Steamboat Ticket Offices, Money Exchange Offices, the "Glass Hen" House, Urinals and Water Closets, etc. The large Implement Building was occupied to its fullest capacity, and its erection gave much satisfaction to the exhibitors. The new Amphitheatre will seat over 4,000 persons, and affords visitors a means of viewing the prize animals, etc., exhibited in the Horse Ring, with comfort.

The erection of the new Restaurant proved a great convenience to visitors, but unfortunately the accommodation furnished was nothing like equal to the demand. It is hoped, however, that better arrangements in this respect can be made for the next Exhibition.

Just previous to the Exhibition, and through the efforts of one of your Directors, Mr. Wm. Christie, and the liberality of a few citizens who take an interest in such matters, your Directots were enabled to enlarge the Horse Ring, so as to secure a half-mile track, and it was otherwise much improved.

By the construction of a wharf on the Lake shore, in front of the Exhibition grounds, a new and most pleasant means of reaching the grounds was secured, and by far the larger number of visitors to the Exhibition were carried from the City by this route.

Your Directors also deemed it desirable to purchase the large engine exhibited by the Thomson & Williams Manufac-

turing Company, of Stratford, and used for driving the machinery in Machinery Hall. This engine is now the property of the Association, and remains in the building for use at future Exhibitions.

This being the first Exhibition under the auspices of the Association, a number of articles, such as turnstiles, flags, locks, coops, etc., in fact almost everything required in the holding of a large exhibition had to be purchased. The expenditure under this head, therefore, was much larger during the past year than it will be in the future.

Although it may be thought that the buildings now erected on the exhibition grounds should meet all requirements, such is not by any means the case. One of the most attractive features at exhibitions of this character, is an exhibit of the processes of manufacture, whereby visitors may see the mode of making goods of various kinds, in actual operation, This is a feature your Directors are particularly anxious to see introduced much more extensively at future exhibitions of the Association, but to do so with any degree of success, it will be necessary to erect a building specially for this purpose, and the early attention of the new Board of Directors to this matter is most desirable.

Profiting also by the experience of the past year, we would recommend to our successors the advisability of enlarging—as soon as the funds of the Association will warrant it—the capacity of the Main Building, which, although by all odds, the largest and best exhibition building in the Dominion, was found much too small for the purposes of the late Industrial Exhibition. The system of classification, inaugurated by your Board, was found to work well, the only drawback being want of space. The construction of this building will allow for an enlargement of the width of the building at a moderate cost, giving four additional floors of 48 x 96 feet, which could be used for specialties, an important consideration.

#### Entries.

The total number of exhibitors was 1617, representing almost every section of this Province, and many portions of other Provinces, and the entries in the various Departments were as follows:—

#### Prizes.

The amount offered in prizes was a little over \$20,000, and the amount actually awarded in cash \$17,407.92, in addition to 12 gold, 17 silver, and 39 bronze medals, and several diplomas. This was a larger amount in prizes than had ever previously been awarded at any exhibition in the Dominion.

The number of prize takers was 896; the largest amount paid to any one exhibitor being \$456, and the smallest amount \$1. The most easterly point to which a prize was taken was St. John, N.B., and the most westerly point Chicago, Ill. Your Board would here desire to acknowledge the presentation of a gold medal by one of its members, Alex. McGregor, Esq., in addition to the prizes offered by the Asso-

ciation in the bag-pipe competition, and a gold medal by Messrs. Davison, Scott & Co., for dairy products, also of several special prizes by citizens, for trials of speed in the horse ring, the amount being included in the appended list of subscribers to the funds of the Association. The example set by these gentlemen is worthy of being followed by many other enterprising citizens in connection with the exhibition in September next.

### Attendance.

As before stated, the number of visitors was much larger than ever previously attended any one exhibition held in this country. The number of persons who paid for admission at the entrance gates, was 101,794, exclusive of those who purchased tickets, and to which must be added exhibitors, attendants, judges, and representatives of agricultural and other societies who were admitted by ticket, and the children and teachers of the public schools in the City of Toronto and County of York, who were admitted free of charge.

# Entrance Fees and Space Charges, etc.

The Association having adopted an entirely different systemin the charge for entrance fees, to that adopted by most Associations, it may be said that they were trying an experiment which was somewhat risky, but your Directors believe from conversation with exhibitors, that the system gave entire satis-The two largest amounts paid by exhibitors for entrance fees was \$18.25 and \$13, whilst the amount received by these two exhibitors in prizes, was \$324 and \$456 respec-

The charges for space in the Main Building were also acceptable to the exhibitors, the amount, 10 cents per superficial foot for all space occupied, after allowing 5 feet frontage, The largest amount received for space was from the new Implement Building, the Stove Building, and the Machinery Hall, the charges for space in which were nixed after consulting the principal exhibitors occupying the same.

We do not consider it necessary to go into details as to the exhibits in each department, but deem it desirable to refer

Implements and Machines, was generally acknowledged to have been the best ever seen in Canada, nearly every manufacturer to any extent being represented. The erection by the Association of the spacious new Hall for the exhibition of Agricultural Implements in motion, afforded visitors a better opportunity than they ever previously had of judging of the qualities of the various machines shown.

## Special Attractions.

To keep up the interest of the public in exhibitions of this character, it is necessary that some new features should be provided each year. The trials of speed by the trotting and carriage horses, at the late exhibition; the review of the prize animals; the hurdle leaping; the display of horsemanship by several ladies in the horse ring; the games of the school children; and the exhibition of the "Glass Hen," were features which attracted considerable attention from, and gave much pleasure to visitors.

## Manitoba Products.

Early in the year, arrangements were made with the Government of Manitoba, for a display of the agricultural and other products of that Province, at the Toronto Exhibition, but from various causes, those having charge of the matter in Manitoba had subsequently to change their original programme and were unavoidably prevented from exhibiting at our Exhibition. Your Directors were successful, however, at a later date, in securing an exhibition of the products of the Northwest, under the auspices of the Association, at the St. Lawrence Hall, in this City, when a large number of persons attended to view the same. A number of Diplomas were awarded by your Board, for the excellence of the exhibits in several of the classes. Mr. Alex. Begg, who was in charge of the exhibit, expressed regret that he was unable to be present at the Industrial Exhibition, but said he had every reason to hope that Manitoba would be fully represented at the Exhibition of the Association for 1880

### Miscellaneous.

It was most gratifying to the Board, and it must have been to the Association, that very few complaints were heard either from exhibitors or visitors. This was due, no doubt, in a great measure, to the presence at all times during the Exhibition, of some of the Directors and members of the Committees of the Association, and the zeal and promptness manifested by them in attending to the wants of their patrons. It is true there were a few complaints, arising principally from the fact that the articles of some of the exhibitors were overlooked by the Judges. This was occasioned by a want of proper classification in some of the Departments, and a lack of space in the Main Building, on account of which many articles coming in late had to be placed wherever there was room, irrespective of class.

The exhibitors, on the whole, were well pleased with the result of the Exhibition, and expressed their intention of again being present at the Exhibition of the Association in 1880. Since the close of the Exhibition, communications have been received from several agriculturalists and manufacturers in various parts of the Province, who did not take part in the late Exhibition, stating that it is their intention to exhibit at the next. There is, therefore, every reason to anticipate that the number of entries for the Exhibition of the present year will far exceed those for 1879.

The Association is very much indebted to the members of the press of the City, for the liberal support which they have given it during the year, and to which support the success of

the late Exhibition was in a large measure due.

To the various railway companies of the Province are the thanks of the Association also due, as without their co-operation, a successful Exhibition could not possibly have been held. They met the Association with a liberal spirit, and as a result, did a very large business during the Exhibition. The arrangements for excursions and cheap fares over all the lines were complete, and there is every reason to believe that the result to the companies themselves was entirely satisfactory, and that the railway arrangements for the Exhibition of 1880 will be equally, if not more liberal, systematic and complete.

In preparing the Prize List for the next Exhibition, your Board would strongly recommend that consideration be given to the question of discontinuing prizes in nearly all classes for manufactures. Your Directors find that this is the desire of a large number of the exhibitors, as no matter how much care is taken in the selection of Judges, it is impossible to give satisfaction, and in many cases an injustice is often unintentionally

done to the exhibitor.

The practical working out of the past Exhibition, would indicate to us the desirability of appointing as one of the officers of the Association, a person to be known as "Superintendent of Grounds." His duties should begin about a week or ten days previous to the opening of the Exhibition : he should see that the buildings are all ready for the reception of the exhibits; receive and attend to the proper placing of all goods sent by express, and see that the various exhibits are located in accordance with the classification decided upon by the Committees of the Board. He could attend to the collection of charges for space, and in a variety of ways be of assistance to the Manager at a time when the latter's duties as Treasurer fully occupy his attention. Mr. J. L. Skirrow, who performed similar duties to these at the last Exhibition, to the entire satisfaction of your Board, would be a good man for the position.

The Board have much pleasure in testifying to the manner in which the duties of the officers of the Association, viz., the Manager-Treasurer and the Secretary, have been discharged by those gentlemen. It might have been expected that for the first year some difficulties might have occurred from a want of experience, but such was not by any means the case. On the contrary, the important and laborious duties of both departments have been carried out to the entire satisfaction of your Directors, and greatly to the advantage of the Associa-

tion.

In conclusion, the retiring Directors would direct the attention of those who may succeed them, to the advantages which followed the daily attention, during the Exhibition, of the several Committees of the Association to the important duties devolving upon them, as in a great measure the success of future exhibitions will depend on the facilities offered to the exhibitors, and that prompt and energetic action, which is sometimes called for, and which can only be effected by the daily attention above referred to. We would venture to express the hope that the success which has attended the labors of the retiring Board will prove an incentive to those who may succeed us, to make the Industrial Exhibition of Toronto known all over the Dominion and beyond, as "Canada's Great Fair."
