Reading the Scriptures and Prayer by the Rev. WM. POLLARD.

Moved by the Rev. Dr. JEFFERS; seconded by Mr. Recorder DUGGAN:

LAWS AND REGULATIONS
OF THE
UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

*As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City
of Toronto, on the 3rd day of August, 1855.*

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be denominated the “UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,” having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, that is—the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II.—This Society shall endeavour to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III.—This Society shall maintain in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all the Bible Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members; fifteen of whom, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year; five of whom to form a quorum. All ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat, and to vote with the Directors.

V.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Agents of all Bible Societies in connection therewith, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

VI.—At the meeting of the Directors, the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII.—Each person paying annually one dollar, shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying twenty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society; or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII.—That each life member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Company,

duly signed by the President and Secretaries for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depository annually, for distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of one dollar.

IX.—That the Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of Agents, Depository, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and the control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretary, or any three of the Directors.

XI.—A general meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of May, in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors for the time being may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the proceedings for the foregoing year presented; together with the Treasurer's and Depository's accounts, duly audited.

XII.—In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it, shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the Scriptures and the contributions to the funds; together with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting.

XIII.—That the general meeting of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV.—That no alteration in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment; the English copies being of the authorized version *only*.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and a committee consisting of not less than _____ other members; five to constitute a *quorum*.

V. That all ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned Members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener; the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint two of their own members for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Upper Canada Bible Society, to supply this neighbourhood (which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell to members at a reduced price, to others at cost, and to give, *gratis*, to those they know cannot purchase): and that the overplus be remitted, half-yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent institution, with the pure Word of God.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers, be held on the _____ day of _____ in each year, at _____, when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee, if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

LAWs AND REGULATIONS

OF THE
BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

- I. The designation of the Society shall be the **BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY**, of which the sole object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment: the only copies in the languages of the United Kingdom to be circulated by the Society shall be the authorized version.
- II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British dominions; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mahomedan, or Pagan.
- III. Each Subscriber of one guinea annually shall be a member.
- IV. Each Subscriber of ten guineas at one time shall be a member for life.
- V. Each Subscriber of five guineas annually shall be a Governor.
- VI. Each Subscriber of fifty pounds at one time, or who shall, by one additional payment, increase his original subscription to fifty pounds, shall be a Governor for life.
- VII. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.
- VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of fifty pounds, shall be a member for life; or of one hundred pounds, a Governor for life.
- IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of thirty-six Laymen, six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.
- The Committee shall appoint all Officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General-Meetings; and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.
- X. Each member of the Society shall be entitled, under the direction of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.
- XI. The Annual Meeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen,

the accounts presented, and the proceedings of the foregoing year reported.

XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered *ex officio* members of the Committee.

XIII. Every Clergyman or dissenting Minister, who is a member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

XIV. The Secretaries, for the time being, shall be considered as members of the Committee; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society shall have that privilege.

XV. At the General Meetings, and Meetings of the Committee, the President,—or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, then present, and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such member as shall be voted for that purpose;—shall preside at the meeting.

XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener, if necessary.

XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either MEMBERS FOR LIFE, OR GOVERNORS FOR LIFE.

XVIII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating HONORARY MEMBERS from among Foreigners, who have promoted the objects of this Society.

XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every General Meeting shall be signed by the chairman.

REGULATIONS

Adopted at the Annual General Meetings of the Society in 1826 and 1827.

I. That the fundamental law of the Society, which limits its operations to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, be fully and distinctly recognized as excluding the circulation of the Apocrypha.

II. That in conformity to the preceding resolution, no pecuniary aid can be granted to any Society circulating the Apocrypha; nor, except for the purpose of being applied in conformity to the said resolution, to any individual whatever.

III. That in all cases in which grants, whether gratuitous or otherwise, of the Holy Scriptures, either in whole or in part, shall be made to any Society, the books be issued bound, and on the express condition that they shall be distributed without alteration or addition.

IV. That all grants of the Scriptures to Societies which circulate the Apocrypha be made under the express condition that they be sold or distributed without alteration or addition, and that the proceeds of the sales of any such copies of the Scriptures be held at the disposal of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

TWENTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

The Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society are thankful for enjoying to-night another opportunity of meeting their constituents, and the friends of the Bible, for the purpose of reviewing the operations of another year, of conferring together on the position and prospects of the work, and of having their hearts cheered and encouraged for the prosecution of the cause, which it is their privilege in some feeble measure to sustain and promote. As iron sharpeneth iron so a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend, and doubtless many in times past have felt their hearts filled with warmer gratitude and love, and their zeal receiving a fresh impulse from the cheering and impressive exercises of our annual gatherings. Many doubtless have not only felt that it was good for them to be here but have realized, even many days after, the cheering and quickening effect of the great truths and important facts in connection with the word of God, which have been brought forward at such meetings as this. We trust that the effect of our present meeting may be, by the blessing of God equally encouraging and beneficial, and it is our earnest prayer that the friends called on the present occasion to address us may be specially directed and guided by the Spirit of God, so that they may indeed speak a word in season.

The work put into the hands of the Directors has been carried on in the ordinary way without any occurrence or incident of special interest. Few years pass without some breaches being made in the number of the Directors and office-bearers. This year we have to notice the death of one of the Vice-Presidents the late Charles C. Small, Esq. Although an active friend of the Bible Society in its early days, owing to physical infirmities Mr. Small was unable for many years to take any considerable share in the business of the Society or in public matters of any kind, but he enjoyed the high respect of all who had an opportunity of knowing him. As we note

one and another taken from the midst of us, may we all remember that we are hasting apace to eternity; and may each be stirred up to greater earnestness and diligence in doing with his might whatever his hand findeth to do. The time is short, let us be up and doing and doubling our diligence.

In the report of last year, reference was made to the prospect of a union between our Society and the Kingston Auxiliary. We have now simply to state that the union has not been accomplished. In the meantime the Kingston Auxiliary and the Ottawa Society have engaged the services of an agent, who is now prosecuting the work in Central Canada. To the latter Society, Ottawa, we have again granted \$400, for the purpose of carrying on the important work of Colportage among the lumbermen on the Ottawa. When we think of the peculiar circumstances of this numerous class, of their isolated position, of their want of the ordinary means of grace, and of the temptations to which they are exposed, we feel assured that our constituents will not disapprove of this grant. Mr. John Lloyd, Colporteur, was employed in this field for several months last summer and autumn, and latterly another has taken his place. The work is attended with much difficulty, and the Colporteur meets with much opposition. But still some handfuls of the good seed are scattered which the dew of heaven may cause to take root, even in an ungenial soil, and bring forth fruit to the glory and praise of God.

The last report referred to the departure of the Rev. L. Taylor to British Columbia and Vancouver's Island for the purpose of establishing Bible Societies and Colportage in these new colonies. While the appointment was made by this Society, the expense was borne by the Parent Society. With his accustomed energy and power Mr. Taylor has discharged the duty entrusted to him. By God's good hand, he was carried safely through all his journeying both by sea and land and was instrumental in organizing two auxiliaries, one at Victoria and one at New Westminster with several Branches, and commencing a system of Colportage which will no doubt prove eminently useful. Mr. Taylor was welcomed most warmly by all classes and denominations, and received many tokens of their high sense of the ability and prudence with which he discharges the duties devolving upon him.

Our agents have as usual been diligently prosecuting the work of visiting the several branches, and establishing new branches where they are deemed expedient. The Rev. Dr. Thornton, one of the agents, having resigned the office, the duties of which he had discharged with energy and success, the directors appointed as his

successor the Rev. W. Brookman, who, since September, has been assiduously prosecuting the work.

During the year Mr. Johnson has visited about 160 branches and formed three new ones. He travelled upwards of 3000 miles and received \$6,952 63 for the society.

Mr. Brookman began his work at the close of September, 1863. He has visited 125 branches, and has travelled between 3000 and 4000 miles, and received for the society \$6,671 36.

COLPORTEURS.

During the last year, three colporteurs have been labouring in the services of the Society. The following is a synopsis of their labours, and of the results :—

BRANCHES.

There are now connected with the Upper Canada Auxiliary 266 Branch Societies. Several new Branches will be organized as soon as the Agents are able to visit the several localities. Generally speaking, the Branches are in good working order, and are doing a good work in connexion with the Bible cause throughout the land. They depend much however on the visits of the Agents, perhaps too much, for their continued vigour and success. With scarcely an exception, peace and harmony characterize the operations of the Branches. Where there has been anything of an opposite

character, the Directors would only express the hope and prayer that differences may disappear, and that the friends of the Bible may learn more and more to forbear one another and to forgive one another, and to walk together as brethren in the Lord.

MONTREAL AUXILIARY.

The Montreal Bible Society has been carrying on its operations with vigour and success. It has now 168 Branches, and during the past year employed for a longer or shorter time, Six Colporteurs. Its issues were 7,433 Bibles 6,869 Testaments and 611 Psalms, making a total for the year of 14,913 copies, and since the formation of the Society a total of 289,278. Last year's issue exceeded that of any former year by about 1,300 copies. The gratuitous issues 3,217 copies, many of these having been supplied to the Societies carrying on the work among the French Canadians.

We have not received the last reports of the Auxiliaries at Quebec and Kingston, but we believe they are still carrying on the good work with diligence.

OTTAWA.

The Ottawa Auxiliary reports a largely increased circulation, and a very favourable financial statement, the receipts having been \$1,097.05, and the expenditure \$628.41. In the newly surveyed townships in the Ottawa region there is a large and necessitous field for Bible and Missionary effort. The Revd. J. McEwan has been engaged by the Kingston and Ottawa Auxiliaries, and it is believed that his services will be eminently conducive to the interests of both Societies.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society has been making great efforts to extend their operations, both abroad and at home, especially among the soldiers whom the long protracted civil war, so deeply to be deplored, still keeps in the field. They have just celebrated their anniversary, and the past year was reported as one of very marked success.

In the South too, large numbers of Scriptures have been issued for distribution among their soldiers, 500,000 having been procured from the British and Foreign Bible Society. Doubtless these Scriptures are in many cases blessed for the spiritual good of those to whom they are supplied. Some have, no doubt, even on the battle field, found what is better than the crown of earthly victory and triumph, even a crown of life that shall never fade.

THE PARENT SOCIETY.

Our space will not allow us to enter at any length into the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society, otherwise we might fill many pages with interesting details of the work carried on by it throughout the world. As usual, however, we shall publish in our Appendix an abstract of the annual report. We shall here only refer to some portions of their work as presented in the pages of the *Monthly Reporter* for the past year.

France.—The quarterly report received from M. de Pressensé shows that the desire for the Scriptures of truth is manifestly growing among the French. During the months of September, October, and November last there were issued from the Paris Depository, 4,182 Bibles, 15,351 New Testaments, and 100 Psalms, in all 19,633 copies. The larger of this issue was to supply the Colporteurs, but the sales at the Depository amounted to 1,662 copies, many of them being bought by persons who had to take the price from what was almost necessary for their daily subsistence.

It is calculated, we may observe, that through the efforts of the British and Foreign Bible Society, there have been distributed, up to the present time, no less than 4,833,568 copies of the Scriptures, probably seven-eighths of the whole having been distributed among the Roman Catholic population.

Belgium.—The interest in the work of the Bible Society appears to be increasing in Belgium, the audience at the Bible meetings being frequently composed to a great extent of enquiring Roman Catholics. The Ultra-montane Roman Catholic Clergy still perseveringly oppose the circulation of the Scriptures, yet the word makes its way amongst the dense industrious population of the Belgium Provinces.

Italy.—In Italy, too, there has been a very considerable issue of the Scriptures, and many interesting details might be given both of the extent to which the work is carried on, and of the blessed results.

European Turkey.—The report of the Revd. Chas. Thompson, who has been making a tour through some of the Provinces of European Turkey, speaks very encouragingly of the eagerness with which in many cases the Scriptures have been received. In the course of his journey he found a Moodir, or governor of a village, who cordially accepted a copy of the Gospels and Acts, who seemed in some measure acquainted with the Scriptures. Mr. Thompson had opportunities of religious conversation with people of different nationalities, Germans, Servians, French, Turks and Greeks.

China.—The reports from China speak very decidedly, not only of the appreciation of the Scriptures by the native christians, but of the general reception of it by the people at large. There is indeed great discouragement arising from the Atheism, the Materialism, and the general apathy of the Chinese in regard to religion, coupled with gross ignorance and peculiar exclusiveness, but the Colporteurs and Missionaries are not dismayed, and from time to time favourable results are met with, and individuals are awakened to attend the preaching of the Gospel, and give attention to divine truth.

We have to thank the Parent Society for many tokens of continued confidence and favor. As a means of drawing closer the bonds of union between us and the Parent Society, we may mention that we are now receiving 3,200 copies of the *Monthly Reporter* for our Branch Societies.

The Directors feel assured that the increased information thus brought before our friends in Canada will tend to deepen their interest in the great work which the British and Foreign Bible Society is carrying on all over the world. The Directors beg also to thank the Parent Society for the appointment of the Rev. Mr. Gill as deputy to visit the various Auxiliaries in British North America, and they feel assured from what they have seen of Mr. Gill that his visit will be productive of good results.

We now leave in the hands of our constituents, the members of the Upper Canada Bible Society, the trust committed to us during the past year. We hope and pray that grace and wisdom may be given to the Officers and Board of Directors for the ensuing year, that with greater zeal, faithfulness and devotedness they may carry on the good work. These are no days to slacken in our efforts in behalf of the Bible. Let us therefore seek firmly to bear aloft the standard of divine truth, to avow our own adherence to it, not as the voice of even devout reason, but as being indeed the voice of God himself, the divinely-inspired record of his dealings, the authoritative revelation of his will, which alone can make wise unto salvation through faith that is in Christ Jesus, and to aid the noble efforts of the Parent Society, and of kindred institutions, to promote the circulation of the word of God in every land wherever there is an open door. Both secretly and openly the authority of the Bible is assailed. Human learning and reason have attempted to cast discredit and ridicule on many of its statements. Its prominent doctrines are either denied or explained away. Bold hands have even dared to tamper with the perfect representation presented in the Scriptures of the character of our gracious Saviour. But God can bring good out of evil, and can make even the wrath of men to praise him. Already in various ways has good resulted from the recent assaults upon the

foundation of our faith, and greater good will no doubt still result. May we be all therefore led with greater earnestness to search the Scriptures for ourselves, and with growing assiduity and perseverance and faith to promote its circulation throughout the world, assured that, although there may be many gainsayers, and some may arise even in unexpected quarters, the word of God will commend itself to the consciences of many, as the power of God and the wisdom of God unto salvation, and be ultimately vindicated as the "Truth," the word of Him who is the same yesterday, to-day, and for ever. Heaven and earth may pass away, but the word of God shall not pass away.

REPORTS OF AGENTS.

FROM

REV. LACHLIN TAYLOR,

Abstract of a Report by the Rev. LACHLIN TAYLOR, of his Mission to Vancouver Island and British Columbia, to explore and organize Branches in those Colonies, auxiliary to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

We sailed from New York on the 11th day of April, 1863, and after a very unpleasant passage, from the over-crowded state of the ship, and the wretched arrangements of the Vanderbilt Line, we arrived at Aspinwall on the 22nd—a voyage of 2,600 miles by the long route, *i. e.*, the west side of Cuba, which was the course taken by our captain, for fear of being overhauled by the notorious *Alabama*, and measuring arms with her daring and inflexible commander.

The moment we landed on the Isthmus of Panama, the Palm, Cocoa nut, and Banana trees, with their rich and luxuriant foliage, reminded us that we were in a tropical climate; and I almost imagined myself again in Egypt, and walking out from Cairo to the palace at Shoobra. We crossed the Isthmus on what is probably the most romantic railroad on the globe, but which from its slowness deserves the American epithet of "a one-horse concern;" for although it is only $47\frac{1}{2}$ miles long, we were nearly five hours crossing. We felt the delay all the more tedious from the oppressive heat of that torrid region, the glass standing during the day at 92° in the shade. We sailed for San Francisco at nine o'clock in the evening, and after a tedious passage of 17 days from Panama, we arrived at the great emporium of the Pacific on the 9th of May, having steamed 3,258 miles; and from New York, nearly 5,900 miles. As the steamer for Victoria had sailed before our arrival, I was obliged to remain in San Francisco for nine or ten days, which was doubtless providential on account of the state of my health. My natural tendency to bilious complaints rendered me a fit subject for what they term in California "The Coast Fever;" and a slight attack, which I would have easily thrown off at home, was much aggravated by the miasma of the Isthmus and the Mexican coast. My fever continued without any abatement during my stay in San Francisco;

but by the judicious treatment of a kind and able physician, and following the course he prescribed after I left the city, I was quite restored before the end of the first week on Vancouver Island. The distance from San Francisco to Victoria is about 800 miles, which was accomplished by the slow and sure craft, the *Brother Jonathan*, in a little over four days; but if she had been a true representative of the go-ahead qualities of her illustrious prototype, she might have performed it in a much shorter period. Gold seekers and emigrants to those colonies have been subjected to all sorts of ill-treatment and inconvenience; and matters are not likely to mend until an efficient line of British steamers is put upon the route between Panama and Victoria.

In Victoria I received a most cordial and flattering welcome from all classes of the community, including His Excellency Sir James Douglas, the highly esteemed Governor of the colonies. Having had the good fortune to meet the Bishop of Columbia in San Francisco, he gave me letters of introduction to his clergy, by which my way was opened at once to the confidence and support of their ministers and missionaries, who are stationed at every point of importance in both colonies. I spent a couple of weeks after my arrival in making known, through the Press and by numerous personal interviews, the object of my mission, and enlisting the influence of leading members of the community on its behalf; and then held a public meeting in the Victoria Theatre, which was the only place in the city large enough for our audience, and which was generously placed at our disposal by the proprietors free of charge. The attendance was beyond our highest expectations, and the Governor stated "that it was the largest assembly he had ever seen convened in the town for a public object, not even excepting the popular gatherings in that building." His Excellency presided with much ability, and introduced the object of the meeting with an appropriate and forcible address. All the Protestant ministers of the town were on the platform, and the citizens then saw, for the first time, all the churches uniting to promote one grand common object; and the evangelical catholicity of our noble Institution was the theme of friendly comment, and the admiration of all. As I stood on the platform, I stated to the large assembly, with all the emphasis of which I was capable, "that we had the high honour that evening of first planting on the shores of the Pacific, in British territory, the standard of a society whose motto had ever been: 'The Bible, the birthright of every child of Adam—the Bible as it is, without emendations or corrections, in the vernaculars of humanity for the world.' And we were desirous of enlisting in this great and important work all the energies of this fair and lovely daughter,

latest born, but not the least of the great colonial family; and uniting her not only to the Great Parent, but to the other powerful members of the noble sisterhood to the eastward, not by a link of Cariboo gold, 'which perisheth,' but by the bonds of the incorruptible Word of God, which liveth and abideth for ever." All my helpers spoke with appropriateness and effect, and the assembly responded in a subscription and collection exceeding our most sanguine expectations. Here, I may be allowed to say, that I question whether an instance can be found in the entire history of the Parent Society, that (with the same population) will equal our commencement in the youthful capital of Vancouver Island. But of course queenly things were to be expected from thrifty, spirited, progressive and royal Victoria. I spent the week after the meeting in making arrangements with the Committee for the systematic working of the field, and procuring a suitable place for the Depository; and sailed from Victoria on the evening of the 16th of June *en route* for Cariboo, the great gold field of British Columbia. We crossed the Gulf of Georgia on one of the loveliest evenings of the fine summer of that coast, and entered the majestic Fraser early in the morning, and steamed up to New Westminster, which is some 16 or 17 miles from the mouth of the River. The little capital of British Columbia is located on what, five years ago, was a grove of magnificent monarchs of the forest—Cedar and Fir—whose majestic and stately proportions would defy competition with those of any forest, perhaps, in the world, the far-famed California trees only excepted. I measured a stump still standing within the limits of the town 37 feet in circumference; and the Wesleyan minister, in entering the vestry of his church, crosses over one 11 feet in diameter. As may easily be inferred, the clearing, grading and paving or macadamizing streets on such a site is a work of colossal magnitude. And yet the little city, with its present progressive, spirited, and nobly enterprising people, is making rapid strides in all public improvements.

We embarked at 4 o'clock, P.M., *en route* for Douglas, where we arrived at 6 o'clock next morning, about 95 miles from New Westminster. The valley of the Fraser grew narrower as we ascended the river, and as the night approached, the mountains rose around us with their snowy slopes like giants in grave clothes. Sometimes the river was like a mere glen, whose towering granite walls would look down on the Scottish Glencoe from their superior altitude. Mount Baker, the Ben Nevis—the Mont Blanc—the majestic monarch of the entire range, rose nearly 12,000 feet above the level of the sea; and reminded us of other scenes and other days, when we gazed with awe and rapture at the peerless giant of the

Alps, the matchless Ghebel-es-Sheikh (Hermon), or the sublime and awful Horeb.

We journeyed from Douglas in a lumber waggon, on the new government road, and reached the 29 Mile House about one o'clock, and as the steamer was gone, we were obliged to remain at our quarters over the Sabbath, that we might enjoy the rest of the sacred day, free from the ungodliness and annoyance to which we were sure to be subjected at the next stage of our journey; for alas! after leaving New Westminster, there is a Sunday known in British Columbia, but no Sabbath. And at the Mines Sunday is known by its being the great day for *marketing, making bargains, paying off workmen*, and especially for drinking and carousal.

The Rev. Dr. Evans, my fellow traveller, preached to a small congregation, composed principally of a party of Welsh miners that were on their way to Cariboo, and we had a profitable service.

The Lillooet Indians on both sides of the Lower Lillooet River, having ascertained that two priests (whom they call Sachle-Tighe, that is, Chief of the Great Spirit, or God's Great Man) were at the inn, besieged the house to have an interview. They gave us a public reception, which was of a most imposing character. The Chief placed himself at the head of the assembled tribes, and as we stood on the bank, he addressed us in a strong, emphatic, and fluent voice, and exhibited all the marks of powerful oratory, while he presented to us their united and cordial welcome. How ardently we longed to know their language, so as to be able to convey to them in their own tongue the glad tidings of salvation. From that point messengers went on to Pemberton, over the Portage, and Anderson, and Seaton lakes, and to Lillooet, to gather the tribes, so as to give all an opportunity to see the priests and get their blessing. They want education and the Word of God to make them a noble and devoted people. Though they are all in that district Roman Catholics, yet they have but the very faintest glimpse of the way of salvation, and know nothing of the privileges of the children of God.

We voyaged on the fine little steamer *Prince of Wales*, over the two little Lillooet lakes 26 miles to Pemberton, and thence by stage 28 miles to Lakes Anderson and Seaton. When we had proceeded some eight miles on the Pemberton Portage, we came to water from two to five feet deep; and as the logs of which the corduroy road was made had floated off, we had a job of some two hours over the knees in snow water, dragging the stage waggon and carrying our own budgets, thus getting a strong taste of British Columbia life and the self-denial of travelling towards Cariboo. We walked from Port Seaton three and a half miles to the Village of Lillooet, which is beautifully situated on one of the upper banks of the Fraser, and

contains upwards of 200 inhabitants. From Lillooet we proceeded by stage waggon 165 miles to Frank Way's, and thence 12 miles to Soda Creek, the lower landing of the steamboat on the upper Fraser. The road, for a new country, is alike creditable to the Government and the contractors. Our lodgings the first night of our stage travelling were with a worthy countryman, a Scotch Canadian; and though his log house was of small dimensions, yet by a little good management he made us exceedingly comfortable. The second night we lodged with a selfish, rough Oregonian, who made no apology for subjecting us to the misery of the following treatment. I was obliged with my own hand to sweep a rough, dirty floor, which felt the pressure of the besom but seldom, on which I laid down in my own blankets without mattress, hay or straw, and the floor so uneven, that when the one shoulder was in a hollow or depression, the other was in contact with the sharp edge of two planks; and though it was not exactly like the Prophet's bed, "shorter than that a man could stretch himself on it," yet if the latter was more uncomfortable than that of the Agent of the Bible Society, I do not wonder that the Prophet's figure was so strong and expressive.

On this point, suffice it to say, that a bedroom in a first class hotel or saloon, in the mining country, is, the breadth of your back on a dirty floor, without mattress, pillow, blankets, or sheet; and the last sound you hear at night, and the first in the morning, is some immortal, accountable being, asking God either to damn his own soul, or the soul of one of his fellows. And yet where can there be a more important field for Bible circulation than among these very men, for a large majority of them are members of the great Anglo-Saxon family, and not lacking either in intelligence, courage, or application. Many of them also have been the subjects of early religious education; and when you can get them to listen, they will confess how flagrant has been their departure from the path in which they were once taught to walk, and will throw the blame on the society with which they are now surrounded. And it is affecting sometimes to hear some of the most profane among them say, "I would not have my mother know it for all the world."

At Frank Way's, I found the barn, both going and returning from Cariboo, the best bedroom; and although meals at that point were \$1.50 each, the proprietors generously refused any payment from a clergyman.

From Soda Creek to the mouth of Quesnelle, we voyaged most comfortably on the steamer *Enterprise*; and thence on foot between 60 and 70 miles to William Creek, the heart of Cariboo, or the great gold field of British Columbia. The last day I walked 26

miles, although the mud for more than half of the way was over the ankles, and sometimes to the knees, and arrived at Richfield at ten o'clock in the evening. Wearied with the roughness of the trail, more than the length of the journey, I laid down in a bed vacated by a friend, for I could not get one for money, and endeavoured to cultivate unfeigned gratitude to God, for all the mercies of the way. When Dr. Evans arrived, we erected our Crimean tent, which was to be my lodging-place during my stay in Cariboo. The tent, together with our blankets, we were obliged to carry with us from Victoria, on account of the enormous price charged for all these articles at the Mines; and with a small mattress of Palow laid on several thicknesses of green boughs, and pillows made for the occasion, we enjoyed sweet and refreshing slumber. Our establishment looked somewhat picturesque from its elevated position on the mountain side, overlooking the cabins, or log houses of the Chief Justice, Gold Commissioner, Attorney General, and other officials; the Court House and Jail, Bank, &c., &c., and all the other buildings of note or otherwise, comprising the youthful log city of Richfield. As the nights were almost invariably cold, the last evening of July giving us a beautiful fleecy covering of snow, at least an inch deep, we were obliged to make a large log fire in front of the tent every evening. As we could not hire a chopper for less than \$10 a day, the Dr. and myself put our Canadian experience into practice, and with the exception of one day's help, we chopped and drew to the tent with ropes, all our own firewood. Although some of us could shew, by blistered hands, the proof of our industry, we were not the less sparing of our fuel, and our blazing fire, on our novel hearth-stone, used to attract the attention of our neighbours, so that we had frequent visitors to spend a social hour, and warm themselves around the Parson's INGLE.

The great Mining Region of British Columbia, now known by the name of the noble animal, which, but a few years ago, was monarch of all he surveyed, is several hundred square miles in extent; of which the following are the principal creeks that have yet been either partially or extensively worked, as alluvial, or placer diggings, viz.:—William, Lightning, Lowhee, Antler, Jack of Clubs, Grouse, Keithley's, Chisholm's, Snow-Shoe, and Sugar Creeks, &c., &c., besides several minor creeks or ravines, called gulches, which are generally named after the persons that first discovered them. It is, however, believed by *all*, that the region known as Cariboo, has not yet been half prospected.

In a circle, described by a few miles around William Creek, some 4,000 persons were actively engaged during the past year. To get acquainted with the Miners, who are generally a little shy of par-

sons, it is necessary to visit them at their work, and if possible gain their confidence. I took much pains to accomplish this object, and preached a sermon before I ventured to ask their attendance at a Bible Society Meeting. My audience on the Sabbath was not less than three hundred persons, being the largest congregation that assembled at a religious service during the season, and gave me a capital opportunity to announce for our meeting to be held the following Thursday evening. Chief Justice Begbie presided with great ability, and gave us a good address. The Rev. Dr. Evans, and the Rev. Messrs. Sheepshanks and Brown, gave their countenance and aid; and the audience manifested their interest in the most enthusiastic manner, and gave us a most substantial token of their approval in a collection of \$131.75. All felt that the meeting was a great success, and the Bible Society an institution worthy of the support of every Christian and lover of his race. On the following week, I visited Van Winkle, a small village located on Lightning Creek, preached on Sabbath, and held a public meeting on Monday evening. Owing to local obstacles to mining, the number of men on this creek, has been comparatively small during the past season. Although the night was dark, we had an audience of over one hundred persons, who gave us a collection of more than \$40. An early friend of the Bible Society, a noble Welshman, presided; and a more interesting or enthusiastic meeting I have not addressed in that or any other land. I subsequently visited Lowhee Creek, and preached to a small audience; and several other creeks were visited afterwards, to ascertain for myself the character and extent of the field to be worked by our Society; and notwithstanding the fearful profanity and ungodliness of a majority of the miners, I was always treated with respect, and received a kind and friendly welcome.

I never practised as much self-denial, during the same period, in all my travels, as I did during my two months in Cariboo, and yet I look back with intense interest to the opportunities I had to speak a word for Christ and His cause, when my church was an unfinished saloon and my pulpit the rudely-shaped bar-room counter. Never, by the grace of God, have I delivered a more faithful message than to those people, and I cherish a confident hope that, like "the bread cast upon the waters, it will be found after many days." However unpromising the field now looks, I doubt not but that our colporteur will reap a rich harvest from its cultivation.

Having returned by a different route, and passed on the Fraser and Thompson rivers through scenery of unparalleled grandeur, I would fain here attempt a description of it, but these rambling sketches are too copious already, and I must therefore reserve it for another time and place.

Having enjoyed a few days' rest in Victoria, and scarcely ever did rest seem sweeter, or quiet and cleanliness more acceptable than after the toils and privations of life in Cariboo; I embarked on board of a coal schooner for Nanaimo, which is a flourishing village on the coast of Vancouver Island, 70 miles north of Victoria. At this important little town the best coal mine on the Pacific is located, and worked with great success, and another mine is being opened by a new company with every prospect of the yield being equal to its neighbour. I preached on Sabbath to a large audience for the population, and held the meeting in the Mechanics' Hall on Monday evening. The hall was densely filled, and the meeting a glorious success. Captain Franklin, the local magistrate, presided with ability. The resident ministers, the Rev. Messrs. White and Good, and my fellow voyager, the Rev. Mr. Lucas, from Victoria, made appropriate remarks; and the agent brought up the rear by giving a synopsis of the history of the Great Parent Society. The assembly responded in a liberal subscription, and the Society was thus inaugurated among that enterprising people under the most favourable auspices.

I intended to visit Comax, a settlement of considerable importance towards the north end of Vancouver Island, but the season was too far advanced, and the travelling too dangerous to attempt it. I was therefore obliged to leave it to be visited by the colporteur at a more convenient season, which I deeply regretted.

My next point was New Westminster, the capital of British Columbia, at which, in accordance with the advice of the clergy and other leading friends, our organization had been postponed till autumn, to secure the attendance and influence of a large number of our patrons who are engaged in mining, and return at that season from Cariboo. Having secured the co-operation of all the clergy, and the influence and cordial support of the chief commissioner of public works, Col. Moody, together with a stirring appeal from the editor of *The Columbian* newspaper, we made every preparation for a popular and effective meeting, and were not disappointed. Although we had a moist, dropping evening, so peculiar to that climate, and so like that of old England in the beginning of November, the Fireman's Hall, nevertheless, was densely filled with an enthusiastic audience. I may here say that the influence of our noble chairman, then on the eve of his departure from the colony, was invaluable to our organization. Ever since the arrival of the Royal Engineers in the country, the name of their distinguished commander has been associated with every movement for the promotion of its best interests, and will ever remain fresh in the grateful memories of the noble band of pioneers who led the way, and laid the foundations of

its institutions, as *preëminently* "the friend of British Columbia." After a short address from the Colonel, the Venerable Archdeacon Wright moved the first resolution by an appropriate speech; and was followed by Revs. A. Browning, Wesleyan, R. Jamieson, Presbyterian, J. Sheepsbanks, M.A., Church of England, and the agent. A noble sum was then subscribed, which was increased subsequently to something over \$400. The remarks of all the speakers were telling and effective, and the enthusiastic applause of the audience reminded us of similar seasons in our beloved Canada, or the hearty bursts of applause so signally characteristic of an English audience. Thus, while the foundations of their institutions are being laid in those youthful colonies, we have planted our standard, and engaged in the circulation of the Book which is at the basis of all true and lasting national greatness.

From New Westminster I proceeded by slow stages to Lillooet, travelling by steamboat, canoe, coach and horseback, which occupied several days, though it is only a little over two hundred miles. There I received a most cordial welcome from the Rev. R. L. C. Brown, M.A., the minister of the village. As the Bible Society was comparatively unknown to many of the villagers, he advised me first to deliver a lecture on Palestine, which would introduce me to the inhabitants, and the result proved the wisdom of his counsel. They were most enthusiastic in their reception of the lecturer, and at the close we took up a collection of \$43 for the Society, and announced for the meeting on the following evening. The attendance was good, the subscription very liberal, and they entered into the design of our organization with a heartiness and spirit truly commendable. We appointed the district judge President, and the Rev. Mr. Brown Secretary and Treasurer, aided by a small Committee; and left, praying that the incorruptible seed of the kingdom might yet take root among these people, and bring forth fruit to the honor and glory of God.

On my return trip, which was attended with considerable inconvenience and self-denial, I delivered a lecture on Palestine in the village of Douglas, and took up a collection of \$19 for the Society. I intended to open a Depository in the village, but was informed that there was no person in business, or occupying a public place, that would take charge of our Bibles. I was obliged, therefore, to leave it with our efficient Committee at New Westminster, who will move in the matter whenever there is an opening.

The village of Yale, which was my next point of operation, is located in a spot surrounded by scenery of such stern and sublime grandeur, that no description could do it justice, and afforded me a continual feast during my stay. I was received with great cordiality

and fraternal affection by the Rev. Mr. Reeves, formerly a missionary in China, and the Rev. Mr. Robson, of the Wesleyan Church. Here also I gave a lecture on my travels in the East, and took up a collection, and held the meeting on the following evening. Judge Saunders occupied the chair; my ministerial brethren delivered powerful addresses, and the audience responded to our appeals in a liberal subscription; and we trust our little organization will be as enduring as the everlasting hills with which that wonderful spot is surrounded.

As the inhabitants of both colonies are so extensively engaged in mining operations, and many of the citizens are away in the gold fields during the summer months, looking for the hidden treasure, the Committee in Victoria decided that December would be the best month for holding their Anniversary; and as we organized in June, they resolved to have their first regular meeting before I left the colony. As we could not obtain the theatre, in consequence of its occupancy by a popular troupe of mountebanks, we held the meeting in the Wesleyan church; and the Rev. Messrs. Dundas and Woods, and Commander Verney, of the Church of England; Rev. Dr. Evans and Mr. Lucas, of the Wesleyan; Rev. Mr. Hall, of the Presbyterian; and Mr. Scarby, of the Congregational Church, addressed the audience with appropriateness and power. Chief Justice Cameron presided with ability; the Agent brought up the rear; a good collection was taken up; and all felt that our glorious institution furnished a platform on which all could meet in Christian harmony, to promote the circulation of the pure Word of God.

The next point of importance which demanded my attention, was the selection of a suitable person to act as colporteur, which, considering the strange mixture of the population—the ungodliness and immorality which generally characterize all mining countries during the first stages of their history, (Cariboo presenting some of the roughest specimens of the *genus homo* that I have met in all my travels)—and the extent and physical difficulties of the field to be traversed, all constitute a scene of labour which requires in such an agent *special* qualifications and a peculiar adaptation to the work, to engage in it with any hope of success. Having stated to the committee of both auxiliaries that we must try to find such a person in the colonies to save the expense of importing one from Britain or Canada, I was delighted to find, on visiting New Westminster, that their large committee had unanimously agreed to recommend a member of the congregation of the Rev. Mr. Sheepshanks as a person well qualified for the office. Although we had obtained the full consent of the said individual to accept the office, and the Vancouver Island committee, with equal unanimity, sustained the nomi-

nation, physical debility supervened during the negotiations, and we were disappointed. I name this circumstance because it detained me more than a month beyond the time I had expected to leave the country. Another suitable person, however, was found, a brother to the highly esteemed and talented minister of the Presbyterian Church of Victoria, a young man of good education and great moral worth, and in whose faithfulness and success we have the utmost confidence. In accordance with their accustomed generosity, the Parent Society has made the necessary grant to meet his salary; and before I left the Pacific I had information from one of the secretaries that Mr. Hall was prosecuting his work with vigour and success.

In summing up my labours and work in those Colonies, I desire to record my unfeigned gratitude to Almighty God, for the success with which He has been pleased to crown my efforts for the advancement of his cause, and the promotion of His glory; a success, vouchsafed to the particular work which I went to organize, beyond my most sanguine expectations; and whose fruit I trust will be found after many days.

In my report to the Secretaries of the British and Foreign Bible Society, I have given a sketch of the religious state and evangelism of the Colonies; but the limited space of the Report of the Upper Canada Bible Society, will be exceeded, by what I have written already; and however gratifying it might be to myself, to enlarge on this, and some other points, I must forbear. A paragraph or two, however, on the present condition and probable future of the Colonies, cannot be omitted. Should their mineral resources continue to be developed, as the present indications give promise, thousands and tens of thousands will yet be attracted to their shores in search of the shining treasure; and with that sudden expansion and growth the field of religious and evangelistic culture will thereby be proportionately enlarged, and the primitive call will be heard with renewed emphasis, "*Come over and help us.*" But should the minerals fail, or as the miners say, "*the claims peter out,*" their main and only reliable source of growth and expansion will be cut off, and their population must necessarily be limited; for their lumber, fisheries, and agriculture combined, will not be sufficiently remunerative to support a large population, at least for years to come. All the friends of the country, however, are quite sanguine that British Columbia and Vancouver Island, as a part of the great auriferous and mineral belt that stretches from Mexico to the Arctic Circle, are not inferior to any section of the said belt, in the richness of their deposits.

Direct communication with Canada and the Red River, by tele-

graph, and a stage or waggon road, would be of incalculable advantage to those Colonies; and would at the same time develop and direct attention to the vast resources of the valley and plain of the Saskatchewan, as well as that of the head waters of the Columbia River, furnishing as they do, a rich and magnificent region for culture and settlement.

It is to your Agent a glorious reflection, that he has had the honor of first planting the standard of our noble institution on the shores of the Pacific, the banks of the majestic Fraser, and the sublime glens of Cariboo; and fain would he be employed on a similar mission in planting at no distant day our posts from Cariboo eastward, until the last would be set up within hail of that of the Upper Canada Bible Society, on the mighty Huron or Superior, thus making, through the other colonial auxiliaries, the chain complete from Victoria to Halifax. Then the field to be cultivated by the United Societies of British America would be described as extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific—from the grand line that separates us from our great American cousins, to the Arctic regions. Whether to the nomadic tribes that like a dark cloud skirt and hover around the great North and Northwest, in their varied and rude vernaculars, or the enterprising emigrants from the different European nationalities, who shall people its rich table lands and vast plains, our auxiliaries must and *will* present every man, in his own tongue in which he was born, with the sacred oracles of the living God.

Hail the day when British America (territorially nearly as large as Europe) shall be thus visited and blessed, and its numerous and diversified tribes shall know the joyful sound, and walk, O Lord, in the light of thy countenance!

DEAR SIRS,

In presenting my report of labours on behalf of your Society, I am glad to notice in general the same hearty spirit of earnest co-operation that has so long characterized the friends of our Society.

My first visits were paid to a number of Branches in the north-

west section of the Province. Commencing with Drayton, an interesting village in Peel, where an interesting meeting was held, and the Society is well sustained, I proceeded to Walkertown and Kincardine, where I found a lively concern manifested in our glorious work.

At Teeswater the Society was somewhat behind, and requires more energy among its committee. Paisley is doing well.

Trowbridge and Gorrie are usefully holding on.

Port Elgin has been, since its organization, most usefully and energetically at work, and has been, for its resources, one of the most liberal of our country branches.

Saugeen has not displayed the liberality or exertion of former years, and requires some fresh spirit of activity to reach its former position.

Owen Sound is as usual an important ally, and has an excellent sphere in which to carry on its operations.

Meaford is doing well. An interesting meeting was held in Thornbury, a new branch formed with promise of future usefulness. In consequence of the removal from Meaford of one of our active friends to Eugenia, a small and new village, a branch has been formed with promise of usefulness, and though large pecuniary results cannot be expected, a good beginning has been made.

My next visit was paid to Carlisle, where, after a good meeting, I received a small balance on purchase account.

Ontario.—From this small branch I received, after a rather small meeting, the sum of \$8 as an instalment of their free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Grimsby is doing well. After a Sabbath appointment, the annual meeting was held on Monday evening. I received \$20 free contributions to British and Foreign, and \$16 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Beamsville gave us a better meeting than for some time past, and I trust is on the way to some improvement.

Bridgeport.—From this small branch I received \$8.54, being their purchase account in full.

At St. Catharines the meeting was one of the best I have ever attended in this fast rising town. We had excellent addresses from the resident clergy, and from my esteemed colleague, who happened to be there for his health.

Thorold still nobly sustains us by a contribution of \$50.

Chippawa was next visited, and is still usefully engaged in the good work. Contributions have been since forwarded.

Clifton, under the presidency of our warm friend, Rev. Mr. Bell, is still doing well. After a good meeting, I received \$50 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Drummondville.—In this beautiful village we number some devoted friends. I received \$50 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

I was glad to find that our friends in Port Robinson had shewn continued interest in the work; I received \$14.50 and \$17.52 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Welland and North Pelham I found usefully holding on, and at Humberstone, after an interesting meeting, I received \$19 to credit on purchase account.

After a long ride through the pouring rain, I reached Niagara in time for the meeting, which was an excellent one. Here I was delighted to meet with my former colleague, Rev. Mr. Ball, who gave us an admirable speech. Niagara, through many adverse influences, keeps faithfully to promote the objects we have in view and is liberal as ever.

I next formed two new branches at Port Dalhousie and St. Ann's, where there are good openings for future valuable assistance.

Bertie contributed, in addition to a payment for stock, \$16 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible society.

At Smithville matters are, I trust, improving. I received a payment on purchase account; free contributions to be forwarded.

Waterdown.—This Society I found in vigorous operation. After a successful meeting, I was gratified in receiving their purchase account in full, and the following donations: \$20 British and Foreign, \$20 Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Our little branch in Glandford has done well; \$48.50 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Caledonia, I found, shews an improvement; \$60 free contribution between British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies.

York, too, maintains her ground; \$40 free contribution divided between the Home and Foreign field.

Oneida, though small, is not to be overlooked. Purchase account

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in full, \$15 to British and Foreign, and \$15 to Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Jarvis shows an interesting improvement; a considerable payment on stock, and a free contribution of \$44.03 between British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies.

At Nanticoke the subscriptions had not been taken up; I received their purchase account in full.

Selkirk gives \$12 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

South Cayuga, a small branch, but active and generous in co-operation, a payment on purchase account, a free contribution of \$20 to British and Foreign, and \$20 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Cayuga.—In this little town we have long had a well sustained branch; I received \$40 to British and Foreign, and the same amount to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Dunnville I found in a healthy and prosperous condition; after a good meeting I received a considerable amount for stock and \$25.29 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Caistorville holding on; returns to be forwarded.

Binbrook is doing well; a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign, and \$15.07 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Georgetown has for years with much energy contributed liberally to our various objects. The night was very unfavourable, and the attendance, in consequence, much smaller than it would otherwise have been. I received the following liberal contributions, which have been since supplemented \$50 British and Foreign, and \$21.88 Upper Canada Bible Society.

Norval may be characterized as retaining a foremost position among our best rural branches. A free contribution of \$40 British and Foreign, \$40 Upper Canada, and 14.43 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society.

Streetsville shows an improvement this year.

Brampton is considerably in advance, and has done nobly.

Hamilton.—A large meeting was held in this city, which has for years been zealously and liberally contributing to aid the good work. Unfortunately some differences in the working of the Society have arisen, which, it is to be hoped, may soon be brought to a happy termination.

Dundas is still liberal and effective:

Jerseyville has, owing to local expenditure, somewhat gone behind. I received \$24.42 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society.

Alberton is doing well.

I visited Lynden, a small branch, for the first time, and after an excellent meeting, I received \$10.22 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$23.31 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Wellington Square is scarcely so liberal as we might expect. I received \$30 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society.

Oakville shews no signs of retrogression, but steadily aids us, this year by a payment of over \$60 for stock, and a free contribution of \$20.62 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Ancaster faithfully and liberally contributing as usual.

Cumminsville has for the last few years extended its operations, and, in conjunction with Lowville, has liberally sustained us. In addition to a considerable payment on purchase account, I received \$15 to British and Foreign, \$15 Upper Canada, and \$12 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Cheltenham within a small circle is nobly engaged. I received in addition to a considerable payment for stock, \$21 British and Foreign, and \$20.45 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Campbells Cross has distinguished itself this year. We gladly record \$2.50 from the Sabbath school in this place, a free contribution of \$40 to the Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Chinguacousy East, Derry West and Cooksville are still usefully engaged; from the latter I received \$12.50 to Upper Canada and \$12.50 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Weston is still doing well; we were favoured with the presence and aid of our respected friend Rev. Dr. Richardson. I received \$20 to British and Foreign, \$20 to Upper Canada, and \$10 to Montreal Auxiliary.

Richmond Hill still a vigorous and liberal ally. I received \$30 British and Foreign, \$50 Upper Canada, and \$10 Montreal Bible Society.

Thornhill gives \$30 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Vaughan is still active and liberal as usual.

North Etobicoke.—The returns not complete. I received \$29 British and Foreign, and \$29 Upper Canada Bible Society.

Egmondville.—A pretty good meeting; contributions since forwarded.

My first meeting east of Toronto was held at Dumbarton, an active and zealous branch, which, though very circumscribed as to limits, is no where exceeded in liberality.

I next proceeded to Duffin's Creek, and received \$14.58 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Cedar Groves.—Owing to the absence of the Treasurer from the meeting, the funds, though collected, were not to hand.

Claremont is still as vigorous and active as ever; the meetings of this branch are always crowded, and no diminution was witnessed this year. Long may the activity of our friends here continue.

Whitby is not behind in liberality; I received \$86 free contribution in addition to a considerable payment for stock.

Oshawa has considerably improved this year; after a very interesting meeting I received \$40 British and Foreign, \$40 Upper Canada and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Bowmanville is still somewhat in advance of its neighbouring societies. A free contribution of \$50 British and Foreign, \$40 Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Bible Society, as well as a considerable amount paid for stock.

Zion.—While visiting this branch I was overtaken by a storm so severe that notwithstanding every endeavour to push through I was obliged to leave Hampton, Orono and Kendall, as I found it impossible to break through the snow, although a kind friend put to his horses to break the road if possible for me. I received \$27 as a free contribution. The meeting was held in Orono; I received nearly \$50 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$40 between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Newcastle, in addition to the purchase account paid in full, gives a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign, and \$19 to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Newtown.—This branch has been, since its formation, always liberal. The meeting was a very interesting one; I received \$35 British and Foreign, \$20 Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Hope.—Vigorous and effective as ever; \$40 British and Foreign; \$20 Upper Canada, and \$19 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society.

Port Hope.—The meeting, as usual, was a very large and enthusiastic one. I received \$138.28 purchase account in full. A free contribution from Miss A. J. Mulligan of \$20, and a further donation of \$83.25.

Coldsprings.—The returns not complete; a good meeting.

Baltimore.—Vigorous and active as ever; a payment on account, a free contribution of \$30 Upper Canada, and \$15 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Grafton.—After a Sabbath appointment, the meeting was held on Monday evening, and though the returns were not complete I received \$26.64 on purchase account, and \$3.59 free contributions to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Colborne.—An excellent meeting in connection with this branch which is doing well. I received about \$25 on purchase account and \$25 free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Brighton is usefully holding on. I received upwards of \$40 on purchase account, and their balance in hand as a free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Belleville.—This vigorous association is nobly pursuing its way. On the platform we were rejoiced to meet with the clergy of all the Protestant churches, with the exception of the Congregational minister, who was obliged leave town the day before the meeting. The Society is strong in the affections of the inhabitants of this beautiful and prosperous town.

Frankford.—The collections had not been made.

Percy is still doing well.

At the suggestion of our excellent friend, the Rev. Mr. Alexander, I accompanied him to the rising village of Campbellfield, where a depository will be established, and a branch formed as soon as circumstances will permit.

Hastings, Norwood and Alnwick all doing well. From the latter I received \$22, free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society.

I was rejoiced to find that our friends in Keane had exerted themselves on behalf of the Society, so that everything was duly prepared for the visit of the agent. After a Sabbath appointment, and an excellent public meeting on Monday evening, I received \$25 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$25 to Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Peterboro was next visited, and maintains its former character for zeal and activity, while a deep interest is kept up in colportage among themselves, the general objects of the Society are also remembered; an excellent meeting.

Lakefield, which for some years has had a visit from the agent, which has still recently contributed in connection with Peterboro, was this year organized into a separate branch, with the prospect of much usefulness. We are greatly indebted to the liberality and exertion of Col. Strickland and family for the aid they have rendered the Society in this place.

South Monaghan.—Still active and zealous, *as always*; \$40 free contribution to Upper Canada, and \$40 to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Cobourg.—A good meeting and excellent speaking; \$30 British and Foreign, and \$30 Upper Canada, in addition to a large payment for stock.

Millbrook, Manvers and Mount Pleasant are all doing well.

Omeme is a little behind this year; a good meeting, after which I received \$25 to British and Foreign Bible Society.

Lindsay.—I was glad to find that our friends had diligently set to work this year, and that the Society shews a gratifying improvement; I received nearly \$60 for stock and a free contribution of \$10 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Nor must Mariposa be forgotten, our feeble branch in this excellent township has at last done something, thanks to the ladies, beyond supplying the word of God to its own inhabitants, a promise was given at the meeting that at least \$25 free contribution should be forwarded, which, we rejoice to notice, has been forwarded. May they go on till they become strong and abounding in the good work.

An excellent meeting was held in Beaverton; a good payment for stock, \$15 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$15 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Woodville.—Here I met with the esteemed agent of the French Canadian Missionary Society, and the collection amounting to \$6 50 was through us handed over to him, I also received \$21 free contribution to British and Foreign Bible Society.

Cannington.—I received \$3.10 on purchase account, and \$14 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Prince Albert.—A liberal branch, nobly sustained: a large payment for stock, \$23 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$23 to Upper Canada, and \$4 to the Montreal Bible Society.

Cartwright is still at work, though with scarce the energy of the first year's action. I received \$11.20 purchase account, and \$18.49 free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Columbus.—Here we held a good meeting; contributions since forwarded.

Brooklin is a valuable ally in the cause. I received, after an excellent meeting \$22.60 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$8.46 to the British and Foreign, and the same amount to the Upper Canada and Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society.

Uxbridge—The Meeting was held in the New Baptist church, which was crowded to the doors, an excellent choir was in attendance, a good staff of speakers, and best of all a liberal contribution of nearly \$40 for stock, and \$40 between the British and Foreign, Upper Canada and Montreal Bible Societies.

I next visited a new branch in West Brock, and received their first fruits in a payment on account of \$31.

Stouffville, in addition to nearly \$20 for stock, gives \$10 to British and Foreign, and \$10 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Markham.—Here the Society is also doing well, over \$30 for stock, \$20 British and Foreign, and \$20.86 to Upper Canada Bible Society.

Scarboro.—This well managed and liberal branch has more than sustained its reputation this year; an excellent meeting, \$40 British and Foreign, \$40 Upper Canada and \$39.35 to the Montreal Bible Society.

East Caledon, in addition to some necessary local expenditure, gives \$37.56 as a free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

And West Caledon is not behind; a vigorous action has been maintained by the committee, in consequence of which \$45 was donated to the Bible Society.

Mono Mills gives \$9.25, which is behind a less able branch at Mono Centre, which in addition to \$11.22 on purchase account gives \$10 as a free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society.

Orangeville, last, though not least, still generously supports us. An excellent meeting; nearly \$20 purchase account, \$15 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$15 Upper Canada, and \$7.44 to the Montreal Bible Society.

I close this report, which I have made as brief as possible, with the earnest prayer that the God of our fathers may continue to bless and honour the work in which we are engaged.

FROM THE REV. W. BROOKMAN,

GENERAL AGENT OF THE SOCIETY.

TO THE DIRECTORS OF THE U. C. BIBLE SOCIETY.

LONDON, C. W., May, 1864.

DEAR SIRS,

In presenting my report of work done since I entered upon office, in September, I would first own the good hand of the Lord, who hath kept me in health and strength; and by whose grace I have been enabled to carry on His work. Unto Him be thanks and praise through our Lord Jesus Christ.

I set out on Saturday, 19th September, and after preaching at Ingersol on Sunday evening, continued my journey to Burford on Monday morning. Here I found the meeting was postponed, being, as they said, too early for them, as no collections had been made. I visited this branch again in January.

At Scotland we had a fair meeting; collections not yet made; this was also the case at Mount Pleasant and New Durham.

At Norwich there was a good meeting, and an excellent spirit shewn.

On Sunday, 27th September, preached three times in Tilsonburgh and the neighbourhood. At Springford I found the branch was all but dead; endeavoured to invigorate it. At Culloden we formed a new branch under very fair prospects. There was a capital meeting, and the people entered into the matter with spirit, and, I trust, with some understanding also.

At Tilsonburgh no collections had been made for two years, and things were in a very bad state; however, we formed a new committee, and placed the secretaryship in the hands of the Presbyterian minister, and hoped for better times.

Straffordville.—Here there was no meeting; the committee had called none, and nothing had been done; they said some previous disappointment had fairly upset all hope of another meeting, though I could not understand why it should. I fear no interest was felt in the great work of sending the Word of God to the world. I called on some of the committee, and the Wesleyan minister of the place, and induced them to make a start again. A few days afterwards I again visited them, and spoke to some of the office-bearers.

Port Burwell.—A fair meeting; will forward their collections when made.

Preached on Saturday evening at Vienna, and also three times on Sunday at Vienna and Port Burwell, and had a capital meeting on Monday at Vienna.

At St. Williams we had no meeting; it was a pouring wet night, and being rather late, getting through 20 miles of muddy roads, with a baulky horse, they thought I would not come, and the few who had assembled went home. Really, I do not know anything that would test a man's patience more than a baulky horse in muddy roads—I mean real good Canadian mud—you anxious to get to a meeting, the rain pouring down, and your watch denoting a most alarming proximity to the time appointed. I met a few of the committee on the ensuing day, and I hope to hear good accounts by the next annual meeting.

At Port Rowan, though a branch had been formed, nothing had been done. Started a committee, held the meeting, at which 10 or 12 people only were present, as it was a rainy night. \$10 were subscribed and promises of earnestness held out.

At Vittoria and Port Dover there were poor meetings, though at the latter an excellent spirit was shewn, and large subscriptions taken up for the next year.

Preached at Simcoe on Saturday evening.

On Sunday preached twice at Simcoe and once at Waterford, and on Monday had an excellent meeting at Simcoe, in which place the Bible Society is well supported. The Ladies' Association, both here and at Port Dover, is working well, and whenever I have been able I have organized those most valuable associations. A good spirit was manifested at the meeting, and \$107 subscribed for the next year, which was something more than had been collected altogether during the year.

At Waterford and Delhi poor meetings; no collections made, and the Society almost dead. Tried to rouse them up.

Lynedoch.—Here we had a good meeting, and very fair collections.

At Richmond we organized anew, in the hopes of reviving the work which had died out.

Preached at Aylmer on Saturday, and also three times on Sunday, and held a good meeting on Monday evening, at which the subscriptions taken up exceeded that which had been collected for the year. This, I am thankful to say, has often been the case at different places.

At Sparta and Port Stanley good meetings and fair collections.

At St. Thomas a very poor meeting; I trust there is a good time coming.

At Fingal and Southwold we had good meetings: at the latter place they are stirring in the good work.

At Iona found all the office-bearers away, I suppose by reason of the court being held at St. Thomas. No committee to meet; treasurer dead and money lost. Could not regard it as an annual meeting, so preached from Matt. vi. 10, and may the Lord bless his truth.

Tyreconel.—Stormy night, so but few out. Found them keeping up this branch well. Went in Largie on Saturday, and held a meeting to stir up the people in the bush about the good work.

On Sunday, preached twice at Tyreconel.

At Aldborough I found the former pastor, who had taken great interest in the work, had left. Bad roads and wet night. They thought the agent would not come, so they would not come, and thus we had no meeting.

At Orford, found they needed stirring up badly; poor meeting; but the president said, "I don't think you'll have to blow us up next year." I hope not.

At Ridgetown and Morpeth, found things stirring, under their energetic officers. How important to get thorough-going office-bearers. Those half-hearted people are like the "dead fly in the ointment."

At Harwich—very backward, but gave their promise to do better.

Sunday.—Preached at Chatham twice, and had a capital meeting the next evening; this branch is working up well.

Windsor, a thriving place as to commerce, but not much stirring in regard to the Bible Society.

Wednesday, 11th November, Thanksgiving Day, preached at Chatham and then returned to Sandwich.

At Windsor Station, the minister appointed to meet me, missed me, and went on to Sandwich, informed the meeting that I had not arrived, and then dispersed them, instead of addressing them on the work; so that when I got there the hall was empty. Not much done at Sandwich.

At Amherstburg, things were doing well; they will send in their collections, which are always taken up after the agent's visit.

Returned to Chatham, preached there on Saturday evening, and also three times on Sunday.

At Dresden, we had a pretty fair meeting, considering the state of the roads: many of the coloured population were amongst the audience, which was addressed also in a sensible scriptural manner by a coloured minister. The roads from this time began to break up.

Found Wallaceburg, Thamesville, Florence and Bothwell doing well, some increasing their subscription list for the ensuing year at the meeting.

Went on through heavy roads, on Saturday afternoon, to Mosa, a country settlement; doing well and increasing. Returned to Wardsville and preached in the evening. On Sunday, preached three times in Wardsville and the neighbourhood, and had an excellent meeting on Monday: this branch is flourishing.

At Ekfrid East and Ekfrid West, we had good meetings, and all were doing well.

Found Komoka had almost determined to give up work, because they could not get office-bearers who would interest themselves therein; a complaint made, I am sorry to say, in more places than Komoka. However, we had a good meeting and tried the thing once more.

At Belmont and East Westminster, things were encouraging, especially at the latter place. Lambeth, a poor meeting: I trust for better accounts next year.

At Delaware, we had an excellent meeting, things working well; and I preached, also, twice on Sunday. At Strathroy and Metcalfe we had poor meetings, owing to the roads.

Napier.—No meeting had been called, as they did not wish to continue the branch any longer, having considered it a failure. Found the branches at Adelaide and Warwick in good working order; the colportage had been well carried on. One could wish there were more colporteurs employed by the Society, for thereby numbers of people are put in possession of the Scriptures who would otherwise remain ignorant of them.

On Sunday, preached at Strathroy and the neighbourhood three times. At Arkona, a few earnest spirits had ventured out in a pelting storm; their collections are made after the annual meeting.

Widder.—Bad weather; few out; an excellent spirit shown in this branch. They have meetings in each school section, a practice I have recommended much, as thereby information is diffused, and an interest excited amongst persons who never attend meetings,

because held in some central village or town from which distance excludes them. In one school section in the country, for instance, I was told of a man who had never given anything to the work when called upon; but who, at one of these meetings, put down \$1 as his annual subscription, because, as he said, he felt it was indeed a good work in which the Society was engaged. Thousands of fly-sheets or pamphlets, shewing the work of the Society, should be sown broadcast over the land: information is very much needed to carry on the work successfully.

Sarnia and Corunna.—Excellent meetings and a good spirit shown; returns to be sent in when taken up. I did not go to Errol, for the state of the roads was worse than I had yet encountered; a foot deep of cut up, half-frozen mud. I purpose a summer meeting here. Preached on Sunday evening at Sarnia.

Found at Williams, that the committee had altered, unknown to me, the hour of meeting from 7 to 2 o'clock, in order to have a meeting also at Carlisle, so that I might be present at both places; in consequence of which I was not able to be present at either. These branches are working well: many Romanist families in this neighbourhood, London Township, &c., have been supplied through colportage.

We had excellent meetings at McGillivray and London Township, both of which branches are well sustained. I hope to see London Township divided into more branches. I addressed a meeting, also, on the 13th concession.

Preached in Nissouri township, on Sunday, thrice, and had good meetings at Thamesford and Embro', where the work is progressing. preached at Hamilton thrice on Sunday, and proceeded to Ingersoll, where we had a good meeting and good collections, thanks, under God, to the Ladies' Association.

At Salford, the work has been going down; and, at Beachville, I might almost have read the funeral service over the branch, but for the president still alive. No committee, no secretary, no treasurer (certainly there had been no need of one, seeing there were no collections), the meeting but poorly attended, but things looked somewhat more encouraging at the close, and good times are promised.

Woodstock.—Things not looking very bright. The notices and placards had not been well-worked, so there was a small meeting.

Princeton.—Crowded meeting and much interest displayed in the good work; and though but a small branch, nearly \$100 free

contribution received. When the parsons stir up their people their good influence is made to tell for the Society.

A stormy night at Burford, which is doing pretty well.

At Brantford, Paris and Galt we had excellent meetings, and found well worked branches and liberal contributions, as also at St. George, though there the meeting was not so good. Brantford will forward its collections when made.

Glenmorris.—This cannot be called a branch, as they do not wish to form a committee and collect, &c., but merely to hear from the agent what is doing, &c., and to take up a collection at the meeting. I tried to induce them to form a branch, but they declined.

Preached twice on Sunday at Galt, and on the morrow proceeded through a heavy snow-storm to Beverley, where, nevertheless, a capital meeting assembled, and much substantial interest was displayed. All that day and the next it snowed heavily and was blocked up three miles from Freelon, and took refuge for the night at a farm house. Afterwards I arranged for a meeting here on Saturday.

West Puslinch.—Collections not all made. I did not hold a meeting here, because I found that they had mixed up the Bible Society with a soiree. I acknowledged their kind intentions, but could not lower the Society to a soiree yet. The sooner Canada gives up soirees and trusts to the inculcation of right scriptural principles for raising funds the better for God's work. Better a little from sound principle which will increase, than much for the present from impulse which will decrease.

Had a poor meeting at East Puslinch.

At Rockwood an excellent meeting and good work done by this branch.

Preached at Galt on the Sunday. Somewhat poorly on the Monday, and did not go to Eden Mills.

Guelph.—We held a most excellent meeting, and received nearly \$350 free contributions. A local paper well said, "the friends of the Bible may congratulate themselves on the largest and most enthusiastic meeting of the Bible Society ever held in Guelph."

Everton.—This branch has ceased to be a separate one, and attached itself to Rockwood, not desiring to abate any of its interest in the cause; still, I think, it should have an annual visit.

Eramosa.—Good meeting and good contributions.

Fergus.—Stormy night and few out. Working well, and though a small branch, received \$140 free contributions.

Went back to Freelton and held a meeting on Saturday evening and preached three times there and in the neighborhood on Sunday.

Garafraza.—Good meeting and fair contributions.

Elora.—As usual all alive ; crowded meeting, with an enthusiastic president, who wanted "to make a night of it" as they "only met once a year." The good man "with the cap" as earnest, and the people as liberal as ever.

At Winterbownie an excellent meeting and good contributions.

Berlin.—Not many out through stress of weather. I have often been reminded of the old adage as regards turning out to a meeting. "where there's a will there's a way." This branch has not been so well worked up, as I trust it will be in future.

At Shakespeare the meeting was not good, but the subscriptions were very fair for a new branch, and when the people have become well acquainted with the operations of the Society I trust a good spirit will be shewn, as they have started with good promise.

Sunday, Feb. 7.—Preached morning and evening at St. Mary's, and on the ensuing days held most excellent meetings at Stratford and St. Mary's, both places working well.

Feb. 15.—Scraped out in the cutter from London towards Exeter, and was obliged to heave to after some twenty miles of road without snow.

At the Adair Post Office I found a change had been made between Exeter and Warrensville branch, which prevented my being present at the latter place, so they had their meeting without me ; and the next day I proceeded to Exeter where we had a poor meeting on account of the stormy night. This branch, however, is working well.

Obliged to delay my visit to Egmondville, as there was no snow on the ground, and another fifteen or twenty mile scrape was hardly worth while, considering the day was bitterly cold and stormy ; however, by the next day considerable snow had fallen, and we held our meetings at Brucefield and Bayfield, at which places they are doing well.

Preached twice at Goderich, and proceeded next day to Manchester, where the people turned out well, and this new branch promises to be sustained.

Clinton.—Things not looking very bright, but they rubbed them up a bit.

A good meeting at Harpurhey; collections not all in. Also called at Egmondville, whose collections will be forwarded.

At Blythe and Mitchell had good meetings, and a lively interest taken in the work.

Returned to Goderich, preached three times on Sunday, and next day held a good meeting, though not good enough for such a place as Goderich; the contributions were better than I had been led to expect.

Did not get to St. Helen's on the Tuesday, being detained in Goderich through want of snow, and I was not able to get my cutter carried out in time enough to the nearest sleighing point, so must visit this branch in summer.

Found things at Teeswater, Walkerton and Riversdale in a very backward state.

Preached on Sunday twice at Walkerton, and proceeded on to Kincardine where there was an excellent meeting, but nothing had been done for the Society.

At Tiverton and Paisley but little interest had been taken in the work, but they have roused up now.

At Port Elgin they had been going back; the school section meetings had not been kept up, and so the interest had declined.

Southampton was all but dead; however, promises were made which I trust will be maintained.

Preached twice at Southampton; in the evening pleaded the cause to an overflowing audience in the Town Hall, and I hope the people will be wakened up to a sense of their duty and privilege.

We had but a poor meeting at Owen Sound; the collections were pretty fair; but things are not as warmly wrought out as they should be.

Meaford and Thornbury.—Poor meetings and nothing done.

Eugenia.—In this wild and most picturesque little spot in the woods where the beautiful falls add wondrously to the pleasant scenery, in one of the half dozen houses which have been built there lives a friend of the Bible Society who has the meeting in his house, and takes a warm interest in the work. We had a few friends to stir up.

At Durham we had a poor meeting, though it was fine frosty moonlight night.

Preached on Sunday in Durham and the neighbourhood.

Mount Forest, Arthur and Drayton were next visited, and though we had but poor meetings, yet some amount of interest had been displayed in the contributions.

At Glen Allen, there was a poor meeting and nothing had been done in the way of collections.

Preached the next day, being Good Friday, and proceeded afterwards to Milbank, where some interest is shown in the work, though the meeting was poor. From thence proceeded home, as the snow was fast melting away, it being now the end of March, and the six or seven places yet unvisited had to remain until the roads once more were in good condition.

On May 18, attended the meeting in Toronto, of which I suppose the Annual Report will make mention; and on the 19th returned to London, where a capital meeting was held, and an interest has been, I hope, revived in this city. One paper spoke of the meeting as "a display of whole-souled zeal:" I hope the paper will not have any reason to recall such expression. A good collection (of over £10 was taken up, and the city is to be canvassed for the usual subscription, which has been, some how or another suffered to fall into arrear. I am now about to take a seven or eight weeks' tour with the Rev. Henry Gill, the deputation from the British and Foreign Bible Society, whose visit, I trust, will prove most beneficial to the great work of the Society. I feel we need to put in motion some of the excellent means which they use at home to increase the Society's funds, such as fly-sheets, circulars, &c., containing appeals to ministers, people, committees, &c., with information, &c., and I hope that the good step lately commenced, of issuing among the branches the *British and Foreign Bible Society's Monthly Reporter*, is but the first of a series of means whereby much substantial interest will be awakened and set in motion.

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BRANTFORD
BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

JANUARY 11, 1864.

The Committee of this Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society respectfully submit the following account of their operations during the eleven months which have elapsed since our last anniversary.

In consequence of the unfavourableness of the evening, together, perhaps, with other causes which, it is hoped, may not again occur, the attendance at our last Annual Meeting was much smaller than it has been for some years past. But as Mr. Johnson, the agent who was present on that occasion remarks in his report of the meeting, “the speaking and spirit were admirable;” and not the least admirable among the addresses delivered was his own most forcible, logical, and instructive presentation of the claims of the Bible cause upon a nation, or a community indebted as we are to its civilizing and christianizing influences.

Though somewhat discouraged, your Committee determined to make up, if possible, by the vigor of their personal efforts for the loss occasioned by the diminished interest of the anniversary, and, they are happy to say, not without effect.

The following are the amounts obtained by the gentlemen who undertook the arduous, and not always agreeable, work of collecting:—

Several other meetings were held, but, from various reasons, no contributions were obtained. The total amount thus placed at the disposal of the Committee, including several private subscriptions, a balance from last year of \$70 32, and the very handsome collection of \$89 at the annual meeting, was \$452 84; or including \$62 72 for sales at the Depository, \$515 56. Of this sum, \$12 97 were required for incidental expenses, \$117 90 were sent to Toronto to settle for the last invoice of books, and \$300 as a free contribution for the general purposes of the British and Foreign Bible Society—the largest amount remitted, with one exception, by any branch society in Canada West—leaving a balance on hand to next account of \$84 69.

The issues from the Depository during the year have been small, amounting to only 405 volumes—119 Bibles and 286 new Testaments—of which 29 have been given away; chiefly by Mr. Bellamy to prisoners in, or about to leave, the jail. The total issues from this Branch, from the period of its organization to the present date, have been 11,944. Our stock of books on hand consists of 193 Bibles, and 151 New Testaments, worth, at cost prices in Toronto, \$86 70. The Society is entirely free from debt.

The Committee of the Buxton Branch of the Bible Society, in presenting their Annual Report for the current year, have occasion to express their sorrow that the subscriptions to so worthy a cause have been so small. Many in the district have yet to learn their duty in respect to giving for the cause of God; but by calling upon them annually and urging the claims of the Bible, the Committee hope to bring them to a proper sense of their duty. The collectors, in going their rounds, have ascertained that most of those in the district have during the last ten years been supplied by the Rev. Wm. King with bibles and testaments containing psalms. Those sent by the Society obtain but a very limited sale. The sales effected during the last year are as follow: six bibles and seventeen testaments.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BELLEVILLE BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY.

Mr. PRESIDENT AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS.—You will be pleased to learn that although no special effort has been made during the past year, as in former years, to circulate the Bible through the agency of colportage, still your Committee has not been idle. They have felt that the work confided to them was of too solemn and important a nature to be treated with carelessness or neglect; and hence, while they did not feel justified in incurring, so soon again, the expense of an agent to canvass the country, and go from house to house with the open Book of Inspiration, and pointing to the solemn enquiry, “know ye the Lord,” they did feel that they ought in some way to

possess themselves of further information regarding the Bible wants of the country. Therefore, after due deliberation, your Committee decided to issue the following circular, hoping thereby to gather in such data as would suffice to guide them in future operations; and at the same time to awaken the sympathies and secure the co-operation of friends of the Bible cause throughout the country:

(CIRCULAR.)

SIR,—The Committee of the Belleville Branch of the Bible Society has employed Colporteurs during portions of the two past years, to go from house to house in the surrounding country, and ascertain and supply the wants of those who were destitute of, or required additional copies of the Holy Scriptures. The Committee has reason to be gratified with the results of the labours of these Agents, but think that still more good may be accomplished through the aid of parties residing in different parts of the country friendly to this good cause, and who are duly impressed with the necessity of circulating God's holy Word as the great means of promoting the best and highest interests of mankind. With the view, therefore, of extending the usefulness of the Society, you will confer a favor on the Committee by answering the following questions, so far as it may be in your power so to do, and at the same time state whether it will be convenient for you to aid the Society in carrying out its views:—

1st. Are you aware of any families or individuals in your neighbourhood who have not copies of the Scriptures, who would be willing to purchase the same if sent to them—or any one who would wish to possess a Bible or Testament, but in such destitute circumstances that you would recommend a copy to be supplied gratis?

2nd. How many Sabbath Schools are there in your neighbourhood and how are they supplied with Bibles or Testaments?

3rd. Have you reason to believe that there would be more Sabbath Schools around you, or that those in existence would be better attended, if the supply of Bibles and Testaments were more liberally furnished to the scholars?

4th. Do you think that free grants of Bibles and Testaments from this Society would facilitate the formation of Sabbath Schools where none are at present, or in any case promote the advancement and prosperity of those already formed?

This Society would not object to furnish Bibles and Testaments free of charge in particular cases, provided it was satisfied that circumstances warranted such gifts. And to meet these and other demands, the Society has recently made large additions to its stock of Bibles and Testaments.

Hoping to receive an early reply from you, I remain, dear Sir, yours very sincerely,

The facts developed by this means seem to be, first, That the number of persons coming within the circuit of your operations, and being destitute of the word of God, is now, happily, very limited; for, although this circular has been widely distributed, from two localities only have the replies, thus far, implied a want, and a desire for aid, in this respect; while, second, From several other localities the replies go to show that the people are either trying to help themselves, or are being supplied by your active and zealous co-laborers in this good cause, from the Kingston Auxiliary. But

while your Committee rejoice to find that the Bible wants of the people are being so well and so generally cared for, they do not fail to perceive that the field from which these calls for aid have come (Marmora, Madoc and northward) is a most important one—one which it behooves them to proceed at once to occupy.

In reply to the enquiry of your Committee as to whether the party addressed is aware of any families or individuals who have not the Scriptures, one writer, a devoted missionary of the Church of England, says: "As I am frequently up and down the Hastings Road, fifty miles back of Madoc, I come across many families, where to leave a Bible or two would be a boon and blessing. They are not, however, most of them, in a position to purchase. A few copies for this road I should have much pleasure in circulating." In reply to the second inquiry relative to Sabbath Schools, he says there is "at present only one from want of funds to obtain Bibles, Testaments and Catechisms. At the present time I could open three Sunday Schools if supplied with books."

Another correspondent says: "I thank you for your circular. I have often felt grieved in bygone years that there was not more done in these parts to circulate that greatest boon o mankind—the Bible—but am full of 5ratitude to Almighty God to see that the Christian friends of Belleville are being stirred up to duty and diligence in this important business. I am acquainted with several families where they have no Bible; and the reason with some is poverty, with others, Satan finds them so many things to amuse that they are living in utter carelessness with respect to Divine things, and are saying by their actions, 'Let us alone.' I have four regular Sabbath Schools, and several that I teach by the way as I travel into the very back bush. Much more good might have been done had I a proper supply of Bibles and Testaments. I have been so very anxious to get Bibles that I have written to England begging for them, and was thankful to find that they were so very deeply interested in my missionary work that they sent me out many good books but stated that I would get Bibles in this colony by applying to the Bible Society."

Another friend of the Bible cause, writing from Marmora, says: "Many families here are without the Word of God—many are unable to read it, and many of those who have it care little or nothing about its sacred contents.

"I think the system of colportage would be the best; that is, that some pious and devoted person be found to go from house to house with the Bible—one who would be able to speak a word in favor of it and of its Divine Author; and especially I would recommend that united and fervent prayer be made for the outpouring of the Spirit of God on the inhabitants of Marmora and the district around here."

To such appeals as these your committee cannot turn a deaf ear. The correspondence referred to has already received their most earnest and attentive consideration, and steps will be taken at once to place both Bibles and Testaments within the reach of all, on the easy terms of the Bible Society. For reasons already assigned, you are, doubtless, prepared to expect that the number of copies of Scriptures disposed of during the past year will fall considerably below that of former years. Accordingly, as you will learn from the Depository's Report, the number of Bibles disposed of amounts to only 128 copies; of Testaments 219 copies, or 347 total, being a decrease of 702 copies from the Report of the previous year. These, however, have all been sold at your Depository in town, and in this respect the transactions of 1863 will compare favorably with those of former years.

In this connection your committee would make mention of the zeal and devotion of those ladies who so kindly undertook and so well performed the labour of canvassing the town for contributions in aid of the funds of your Society. Your committee trust that every possible assistance is cheerfully rendered them in prosecuting their work by the friends of Bible circulation, for where so much remains to be done surely none will allow to pass unimproved the opportunity of discharging, in some small measure, the debt of gratitude they owe to God for Bible influence.

It has been stated in the public prints that within the last half century 72,000,000 copies of the Holy Scriptures have been circulated throughout the world; but of this immense issue Great Britain and her dependencies have taken 26,000,000, the rest of Europe 25,000,000, and America 16,000,000, leaving but 5,000,000 for the Jew, the Mahomedan, and the whole heathen world—a mere crumb for the millions starving for the Bread of Life.

But while this statement presents to you an idea of the vast work still to be done before

“The Angel reapers shall descend,
And Heaven cry ‘Harvest Home.’”

It may be stated, also, for your encouragement, that at the beginning of the present century the Bible, through forty translations, was only accessible to one-fifth, or 200,000,000 of the human race. It is now printed in 196 different languages, 146 of which were versions of languages that never had an existence till the translations were made, and it is thus rendered accessible to 600,000,000, or three-fifths of the population of the whole world. Nevertheless this, the most encouraging aspect of the whole question, is one upon which you will not reflect without deep concern. That the Book of Inspiration is, through diversity of language, still sealed to 400,000,000 of our fellow beings, or two-fifths of the whole population of the earth, is a painful truth, and one which your committee will rejoice to find having its due weight with you on this occasion.

GENTLEMEN,—In presenting to you the results of my endeavours to carry out your wishes, viz., to visit the members, families, and friends in the west of the township, I have done so, as far as time and circumstances would permit. The principle that prompted me to this laborious and self-denying work has been the great fact that the Bible is absolutely essential to the welfare of the human family, both for time and eternity. I have made a hundred and twenty-five visits, read and prayed with twenty-one families; circulated twenty copies of the Scriptures; also, two hundred tracts; collected \$10 45 in money. I gave two Bibles to John —, a very poor man, lately from the old country, with a wife and six children; also, one Bible to Jane —, a poor orphan girl, thirteen years of age, destitute of the Scriptures. In order to complete this work of visiting, it will require some time yet to come. I think it probable that from twenty to twenty-five dollars more may be collected.

FERGUS BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT—ADOPTED 29TH
JANUARY, 1864.

The Committee of the Fergus Branch Bible Society have to report as follows:—Their labours are directed towards receiving contributions in aid of the Society, and disposing of copies of the Holy Scriptures. Their range for collecting, outside of the village of Fergus, comprises the township of Garafraxa as far as the 3rd and 4th concessions, and the township of Nichol, except such parts of it as are visited by the Elora Branch collectors. In Fergus, six female collectors have now for four years visited the inhabitants, receiving their contributions, while hitherto the country portion of the field has been entrusted to thirteen male collectors. Whether a change in the arrangements by which the collecting work should be performed exclusively by females is demanded, the Committee would not of themselves positively say. The opinion is, however, entertained by not a few of the collectors themselves, that ladies would be more successful, and in deference to suggestions made on the subject, the Committee desire to lay the matter before the members at the annual public meeting of the Branch for their own future guidance, in carrying out most efficiently the objects of the Society. Whatever means would prove instrumental in arousing that amount of interest in the institution which would lead to contributions being given generally, on a scale more in accordance with the issues involved, taken in connection with the real ability of the donors, the Committee would rejoice to employ them for the purpose. On this account it is with satisfaction that they find that the Upper Canada Bible Society is to supply its Branches, in future, with a certain number of copies of the *Monthly Reporter* of the British and Foreign Bible Society, a small publication giving recent interesting missionary intelligence connected with Bible circulation. By the circulation of this periodical among the people, especially among stated contributors to the operations of the Society, the Committee believe the best results may naturally be anticipated by a really intelligent interest being awakened among the contributors, and of such a kind as will lead to an anxious desire to help towards spreading the everlasting Gospel among heathen nations, and supplying the destitute places and populations of our own land and other nominally Christian but really unenlightened countries with the bread of life. The Committee believe that the collectors have cheerfully and faithfully acted so far as their ability went, and that their services merit the warm gratitude of the friends of the cause. They desire to acknowledge the goodness of the Almighty in making no breach in their numbers, and in allowing their proceedings to go on, not merely without dissension of any kind, but with harmony and comfort, and they would pledge themselves to renewed diligence in the cause of the Bible Society, so far as their influence in the future can be brought to bear.

Of the Holy Scriptures, 135 copies have been sold during the year—49 Bibles and 86 Testaments, and a considerable stock remains on hand in the Depositories, and to replenish them so that it may be unnecessary to expend so much this year as during the past season in purchase of stock, and thus allow of a larger donation a year hence than can now be made to the funds of the Parent Society. A statement of receipts and disbursements for the past year is subjoined, shewing a balance after discharging all liabilities of \$189 13 $\frac{1}{2}$. The Committee have accordingly resolved to devote \$140 as a donation to be divided equally between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Societies.

Your Committee would thank God, that the cloud which for two or three years hung over and seemed to threaten the life of our little Branch has passed away; while peace and prosperity once more smiles upon us,

and our old friends, with few exceptions, have again joined our ranks, so that we have abundant reason to thank God and take courage.

Your Committee regret that so small a sum has been collected this year, which is owing to the shortness of the notice of our anniversary, and the bad state of the roads when the collectors went round, so that some of them did not go at all.

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ABSTRACT

OF

THE FIFTY-NINTH REPORT

OF THE

British and Foreign Bible Society,

1863.

THE object of the British and Foreign Bible Society is the same in its importance and simple grandeur on this, the Fifty-ninth Anniversary of your Institution, as when it drew together in holy counsel and loving sympathy and united action the little band of Christian men, who, with strong faith and much prayer, laid the foundation of the work which their successors are permitted to carry forward, and whose present features and successes infinitely surpass the most brilliant anticipations that were formed by its original promoters.

The year, whose results are now reported, has had its peculiar features of encouragement and responsibility; and if your Committee have to announce a diminished income, they do not deduce from this fact any unfavourable inference, as, in common with other large Religious Institutions, your resources have been affected, not by alienation or waning zeal, but by a crushing distress, which, in its effects, has involved a large class of the community, and for the relief of which the streams of Christian liberality have been partially diverted from other benevolent channels.

FRANCE.—The circumstances which have marked the operations of your Society in France, have been somewhat varied in their

character. That symptoms of an increasing distrust of Popery may be traced in various circles, few will question. Nor is it less evident that the leaven of Protestantism is working in the minds of many, who perceive in its character and genuine influence that which places religion on the true basis of a service rendered by the heart and life to God. Circumstances such as these cannot fail to have a beneficial influence in creating a desire for the Scriptures, and in facilitating their circulation.

The Paris Depôt has issued, since the last Report, 83,893 Bibles and Testaments.

BELGIUM.—This is a country in which the work of your Society has had to struggle, not only with difficulties, but against active and persevering hostility. Mr. Kirkpatrick, who has charge of your Depôt, expresses his regret that the Report of the year is marked by issues inferior to those of the preceding year; yet that 4,749 volumes have been spread in one of the most intensely Popish and bigoted lands of the Continent, is something, surely, for which to thank God.

HOLLAND.—From your Depôt, at Amsterdam, 31,151 copies have gone forth into various parts of Holland.

COLOGNE.—The district of the Cologne Agency includes North-west Germany, ranging over a widely-extended sphere, and containing a Roman Catholic population of very strong prejudices, as well as a numerous Protestant community. The issues have amounted to 64,944 copies.

FRANKFORT.—Central and Southern Germany, French and German Switzerland, constitute the geographical boundaries of the work committed to the superintendence of the Rev. G. P. Davies in this division of his agency, and a circulation of 91,836 copies has been effected.

BERLIN.—The population for which the Scriptures have to be provided from this centre is more mixed than that embraced by the other German Agencies; for it spreads from the shores of the Baltic to the Adriatic, and from the Alps to the Danubian Principalities. Servians, Wends, Lithuanians, Poles, Hungarians, &c., as well as Germans, come within the range of your Christian efforts, and gratefully receive the Scriptures furnished through your agency.

Mr. Millard announces that his circulation for the year has included 32,484 Bibles, 91,883 Testaments, and 9,623 Parts; or a total of 133,990 copies.

DENMARK.—COPENHAGEN—The members of the Agency acting on behalf of the Society, report an issue for the year of 16,136 copies, being 4,740 in advance of the previous year.

NORWAY.—The supply of Scriptures in many parts of Norway is still very insufficient, and much remains to be done, especially on behalf of the poor.

The issues for the past year from the Depôts at Christiana, Christianssand, Stavanger, Bergen, Drontheim, and Tromsö, have comprised 19,582 copies.

ICELAND.—The edition of 10,000 copies of the New Testament and Psalms in Icelandic, to which reference was made in the last Report, has now passed through the press, and will shortly be ready to forward to its destination.

SWEDEN.—It is not with less thankfulness than surprise that your Committee have again the privilege of reporting progressive action on the part of the Agency entrusted with your work in Sweden.

It appears that the yearly circulation effected is now gradually verging towards 100,000 copies.

RUSSIA.—ST. PETERSBURG.—The most important and interesting fact to be stated in connection with the spread of the Gospel in Russia, is the publication last summer, in a complete form, of the translation of the New Testament in the vernacular dialect.

The Society's St. Petersburg Agency confines its operations almost entirely to that part of the Russian population which belongs to the Foreign Confessions.

The circulation effected during the year on behalf of your Society, was 17,700 copies.

ODESSA.—The issues of Scriptures from Odessa have been declining for some time. The past year shows no improvement: only 1,799 copies have gone forth, and these principally amongst the German colonists.

ITALY.—Your Committee have endeavoured to prosecute their labours in this land with all the vigour and appliances at their command; and they believe that their excellent Agent, Mr. T. Bruce, has been indefatigable in his journeys, correspondence, and general efforts, animated by a sincere desire to carry out, in the most effective manner, the responsible trust committed to him. Results, however, during the past year, have not equalled those which it was the privilege of the Committee to announce in their last Report; and, in partial explanation of this circumstance, it may be observed, that there are

retarding causes still operating with prodigious force in many parts of Italy which cannot fail to have an adverse influence on the circulation of the Scriptures. It is nevertheless matter of devout congratulation that your Society was permitted to scatter nearly 27,000 Bibles and Testaments, and to have an average of twenty-nine Colporteurs constantly engaged in its service.

TURIN.—The operations of your Society at this place, have had little to interrupt or vary their usual character. In the Dépôt 526 copies were sold. The Colporteurs, to whom the adjacent district is assigned, disposed of 3,159 copies.

MILAN.—In this crowded, busy capital of Lombardy, the work of the Society is making progress. The Scriptures may be obtained at several Dépôts in Milan. The Colporteurs disseminated 2,696 copies over a wide extent of country.

GENOA.—The issues from the Genoa Dépôt have not been so large as those of the previous year; but 5,876 copies have gone forth on their heavenly mission, and are drawing the serious thoughts of multitudes to the things which belong to their eternal peace.

LEGHORN.—More than usual success has been realized at this place. The sales, both by Colporteurs and from the Dépôt, have been very considerable, and far in advance of previous efforts.

FLORENCE.—The issues, though amounting to more than 4,000 copies, show a falling off as compared with 1861.

NAPLES.—The sales effected at the Dépôt, and by Colportage, have amounted to 3,879 copies, and places never before touched by any Agency of your Society, have been visited and supplied with the Bible.

SICILY.—The circulation in this island has not been great, scarcely amounting to 1,000 copies; yet the Scriptures have been offered widely amongst the people.

The review which your Committee take of their Italian field of labour, by no means fills them with discouragement. If the copies of Scriptures circulated during the year have fallen below the issues of the preceding year, it must not be argued that the work has been in reality checked, or that the antagonist powers which your Agency has to combat are recovering their former domination. If the labourers could be found in sufficient numbers through the length and breadth of the land, then there would be a more rapid distribution of the Sacred Volume, and your Colporteurs, as the pioneers in the great work of arousing attention to the Gospel of Christ, would

prepare the way for those Evangelical Agencies which would follow in their steps, and, by providing the means of permanent religious instruction, build up the people in the pure faith of Christ.

MALTA.—Your important Depôt at Malta stands related to operations in North Africa, Egypt, and Syria, as well as in the island of Malta itself. The return of issues shows a circulation during the year of 8,788 copies, in seventeen different languages.

EGYPT.—From the Bible Depôts at Cairo and Alexandria 7,000 copies of the Scriptures have been issued during the last five years, and other supplies have been dispersed in various directions.

ABYSSINIA.—The subjoined brief communication was received by the Lord Bishop of Jerusalem for transmission to your Committee. It conveys the thanks of natives of Abyssinia for the Amharic Scriptures with which they have been furnished by the Society, and requests that prayers may be offered for the progress of the good work now commenced in their country :

“Literal translation of a Letter of Debterah Saneb and his brother Debterah Mascal to the British and Foreign Bible Society.”

“May this letter, sent by us, Debterah Saneb and Debterah Mascal, reach the Bible Society in London.

“We wish you health and grace in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. The brethren sent to our country with the Bible, by Samuel Gobat, Bishop of Jerusalem, have caused the love of Christ to enter and to dwell in our hearts. Formerly we were in great darkness; now we rejoice in the light of the Gospel. We are still very wicked; but we beg you not to reject us, but to pray the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, that His cause may prosper and be honoured amongst us, as it is honoured amongst you. We know that you pray for us; but we write this in order that you may pray for us still more fervently.”

SYRIA.—At Beyrout there is an increasing demand for the Scriptures, and the copies obtained are carried into the various towns and villages on the Lebanon range.

TURKEY.—Your Committee have received a voluminous report, replete with valuable materials, from their Agent at Constantinople, the Rev. A. Thomson. The aspects of your work are fully illustrated, and circumstances presented which form no mean or inconclusive evidence as to the success which has attended the dissemination of the Scriptures amongst the mingled creeds and races under Turkish sway.

The circulation of Scriptures during the past year, exhibits an increase of 1,530 copies over the issues of the preceding year, and a total of 16,046 volumes.

BULGARIA.—The circulation of the Scriptures in this Principality, has not been equal to that of the previous year. The temporary falling off is partly attributable to the political excitement which has prevailed, and partly to the interruption of Colportage labours.

WALLACHIA AND MOLDAVIA.—In these interesting but deeply neglected provinces, the circulation reached 4,020 copies as against 2,786 in the preceding year, showing an increase of 1,234 copies.

GREECE.—The issues of Scriptures for Greece Proper from the Depots at Athens and Calmata, are nearly 100 copies in excess of the previous year, and amount to 1,396.

INDIA.—The Committee are deeply sensible of the great importance of enlisting as much Agency as is available, and continue to press the subject upon the several Auxiliaries, with the offer of whatever funds may be required to spread the Word of God to the widest possible extent; and they rejoice to observe, that though their hopes and wishes are far from being realized, there is now apparent, from year to year, an increased circulation of the Scriptures, combined with encouraging testimony as to the good effects which can be traced in connection with the work.

CALCUTTA.—The Report of the Calcutta Auxiliary dwells at considerable length on the progress made during the last ten years in providing the Scriptures in the vernaculars of India. Not only have new translations been effected, but versions previously issued have undergone careful revision and improvement, rendering them more exact reproductions of the inspired text, and more in accordance with idiomatic principles. It is stated that although large subscriptions are raised in India by the friends of the Auxiliary Societies, the chief ability to proceed, on a scale of such magnitude as described, is supplied by the Parent Society, which, in the same period of ten years, has remitted to India 70,000*l.* in money and 30,000 reams of printing paper.

The circulation of the year has amounted to 28,504 copies. The greater proportion of the copies have been sold, and realized more than 520*l.*

ALLAHABAD.—The North-India Auxiliary at this place, in reporting the operations of the year, states that 13,010 copies have been circulated by the Auxiliary, of which more than 10,700 were vernacular Scriptures, intended chiefly for the use of natives.

MADRAS.—The tidings from this Auxiliary in one respect are most cheering, as they announce a circulation of Scriptures surpassing by

7,000 copies any issue effected since its establishment, and amounting to 76,000.

BOMBAY.—In reference to the past year's operations, the Auxiliary Committee state that they have sought to embrace every opportunity of usefulness presented to them, maintaining their Agencies for the sale of the Scriptures, and making free grants for distribution by members of their own body, or by friends in different parts of the Presidency. The issues have again increased, being 2,163 against 7,935 in 1961.

CEYLON.—COLOMBO.—A grant of 1,944 copies of Scripture has been made to the Auxiliary during the year.

JAFFNA.—The total circulation effected has been 4,806; but the greater proportion of these issues consist of Parts distributed through the agency of Colportage.

Your Committee were induced to make a grant of 125*l.* to assist the Jaffna Auxiliary in carrying out plans of Colportage amongst the towns and villages of the district.

CHINA.—Although your Committee would rejoice if they could report a more effectual and widely-extended work in the vast empire of China, they thankfully observe some features of progress and improvement, and believe that they may reasonably entertain the hope of a gradual, if not rapid enlargement of the Society's operations.

SHANGHAE.—The past year has witnessed a very considerable issue of Scriptures from your Depôt at Shanghae. Operations in the surrounding district have been somewhat difficult, owing to the proximity of the insurgent forces; but in the city itself, and immediate suburbs, there have been many opportunities of diffusing the Word of God.

CANTON.—The Corresponding Committee at Canton lament the lack of adequate Agency for the expansion of the work, but give the assurance that, so far as means are available, no fitting opportunity of distributing the Bible is neglected. The entire issues from this Depôt for the year have been 9,025 copies.

HONG KONG.—The work of your Society from this centre is giving signs of gradual enlargement, and the Corresponding Committee announce an issue of 9,341 copies.

TIENTSIN.—Large supplies of Scriptures have been sent to this place from Shanghae, and the Rev. J. Edkins, in referring to the ef-

forts of the Corresponding Committee, describes the vast range of action which it is hoped gradually to occupy.

AUSTRALIA.—The Committee continue to receive satisfactory accounts of the journeys and operations of the Rev. J. K. Tucker, the Society's Agent for the Australian Colonies. The magnitude of the district to be superintended, the immense distances to be traversed, and the inconveniences to be encountered, render frequent visitation of the same Auxiliaries a matter of impossibility.

SYDNEY.—The issue of Scriptures from the Sydney Depôt during the past year has been satisfactory; but as influential Branches are formed into independent Auxiliaries in direct correspondence with the Parent Society, the circulation of the Auxiliary at Sydney will be necessarily affected. The Committee have the gratification of acknowledging a Free Contribution of 500*l*.

QUEENSLAND.—Two Auxiliaries are organized in this colony, at Brisbane and Ipswich. Brisbane is the capital of the colony, and has a population of more than 6,000 inhabitants. The work of the Auxiliary at this place has been greatly promoted by its active Secretary, the Rev. E. Griffith.

VICTORIA.—The chief auxiliary in this thriving colony is at Melbourne; and there are affiliated with it five Ladies' Associations and thirteen Branches, giving proof of vigorous activity in their several localities.

The issues for the year, exclusive of grants, have been 9,286 copies, being 2,285 in excess of the previous year; and the sales have realized £430.

GEE LONG.—This Auxiliary has eight Branches. The sales and grants of the year have reached 1,338 copies; and the total issues of the Auxiliary have amounted to 17,678 Bibles and Testaments.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.—ADELAIDE.—The South Australian Auxiliary is encompassed by a circle of efficient Branches, twenty in number, all co-operating in its general object, and all contributing to its funds.

The total issues of the year were 7,286 copies, or 1,226 beyond those of the previous year. The Committee have to acknowledge a Free Contribution of £600.

TASMANIA.—HOBART TOWN.—Your Committee desire to acknowledge the continued liberal assistance derived from the Tasmania Auxiliary. A contribution of £250 has been received during the year. The circulation of Scriptures has been 1,547 copies.

LAUNCESTON.—The circulation effected during the year was 864 copies; and from this Auxiliary, since its foundation twenty-eight years since, more than 20,000 Bibles and Testaments have been distributed over that part of Tasmania embraced within the range of its operations.

NEW ZEALAND.—At the earnest solicitation of Missionaries, and with the concurrent recommendation of the Church Missionary Society, your Committee have cordially consented to prepare a complete Maori Bible in a single volume.

AUCKLAND.—This Auxiliary endeavours to meet its responsibility with corresponding earnestness. During the year, 1,501 copies have been scattered in no fewer than nineteen different languages; so that, while the wants of the Christian natives are met, the miscellaneous population drawn from various parts of the world is not neglected.

SOUTH SEAS.—TAHITI.—The printing of the complete Bible in Tahitian, has been brought to a successful conclusion. The edition comprised 5,000 copies, 2,000 of which were immediately placed at the disposal of the London Missionary Society.

NAVIGATORS' ISLANDS.—SAMOA.—The new edition of the complete Samoan Bible, with marginal references and chapter headings for the first time appended to text, is now completed. The Committee have voted 6,000 copies to the London Missionary Society.

LOYALTY GROUP.—SAVAGE ISLAND.—The translation of the Scriptures into the language of Savage Island, is proceeding most satisfactorily, and the desire for the Word of God which prevails, is indicative of the genuine work of grace so largely experienced.

NEW HEBRIDES.—ANEITEUM.—The Aneiteumese New Testament is now issued from the press, and in a state which inspires great confidence as to the accuracy of the translation.

FRIENDLY ISLANDS.—TONGA.—The Committee have the additional satisfaction of stating, that the new and complete edition of the Tongan Bible is finished. The edition will be confided to the Wesleyan Missionary Society.

FIJI ISLANDS.—The sum of 215*l.* 7*s.* 10*d.* has been remitted from Fiji through the Rev. J. Eggleston, of Sydney, in payment for Scriptures sold to the people.

MAURITIUS.—The number of volumes distributed and sold amounted to 2,108. Of this number, 560 were in the languages of Europe, and 1,548 in the Indian dialects.

MADAGASCAR.—It was stated in the last Report that such Scriptures as were prepared had been despatched to Madagascar to meet the urgent wants of the people. The joy excited when the case reached Antananarivo was very great, and the distribution speedily commenced; and so eager and numerous were the applicants, that within three days nearly 2,000 copies were issued.

It was also stated in the last Report, that a Bible, suitably bound, had been forwarded from the Society to the King of Madagascar, accompanied by a congratulatory letter. It is gratifying to your Committee to know that their gift was received most favourably, and that the Volume is in frequent use in the royal palace. The following letter of acknowledgment has been sent by the King, conveying his thanks for so seasonable a mark of interest and regard on the part of the Society.

“ANTANANARIVO, December 15, 1862.

“MY LORD AND GENTLEMEN,—I have duly received from the Rev. W. Ellis the very handsome Bible which you were so good as to send me, together with the letter by which it was accompanied.

“I thank your Lordship and the Officers and Committee of the great Institution over which you preside, for the good wishes expressed in your letter towards myself, and for the interest you manifest in the prosperity of my country, as well for the Holy Book you have forwarded to me, and more particularly for the generous supply of the Sacred Scriptures which you have sent for my people, by many of whom these books will be highly prized and carefully read.

“I desire to ascribe to the will of Almighty God the position I occupy in Madagascar; and as I believe nothing will conduce more to the prosperity of my people than the lessons of the Bible, and the wide extension of the true Christian faith amongst them. I encourage the most free circulation and use of the Scriptures throughout Madagascar, and I wish religious teaching and Christian worship to be without hindrance or interruption among all classes of my people.

“I am, my Lord and Gentlemen, your sincere friend,

SOUTH AFRICA—CAPE TOWN.—It appears that the total issues of the South African Auxiliary for the year have been 7,074. The Agency of Bible-women has been drawn into the service of the Auxiliary at Cape Town.

NATAL.—The American Missionaries labouring in this part of Africa have nearly completed the entire translation of the Bible in the Zulu language, thereby providing the Word of God for a million of benighted heathen.

WEST AFRICA—ODUMASE.—The translation of the Scriptures into the Gâ language is proceeding satisfactorily. The Rev. J. Zimmermann has forwarded, during the year, the manuscript of Judges, Ruth, and the two Books of Samuel, all of which your Committee have agreed to print at the expense of the Society.

SOUTH AMERICA.—The Committee cannot but cherish the conviction that the Agency of the Society, in diffusing the Scriptures, will prove a source of rich blessing to those great Republics, which are so often distracted by intestine strife, and so sadly degraded by the rankest superstitions of Rome, or the withering principles of infidelity. It is not in the power of the Committee to give any specific returns of circulation for the past year; but there is evidence of an increased demand for the Scriptures in many places, and in some there is perceptible a spiritual work, so clear and decisive, as to show that the Spirit of God has been breathing life into those who were dead in trespasses and sins.

WEST INDIES.—From the several Auxiliaries various communications have been received, showing that the work of the Society awakens a large amount of sympathy, and enlists much zealous effort. The Depôt at Kingston, Jamaica, is placed under the control of the Auxiliary, and a large circulation of Scriptures is anticipated in the island.

UNITED STATES.—The issues of the American Bible Society have surpassed any point of circulation previously attained.

The number of volumes issued during the past year was 1,093,842. This is an increase of 371,964 volumes over the number issued in the previous year.

To provide in the best manner that circumstances allow for the spiritual welfare of the army of the North, a Society has been established at Philadelphia under the designation of "The Christian Commission." To encourage efforts for this end, your Committee have voted to this Society 5,000 Testaments and 10,000 portions, with the offer of any additional assistance that may be needful to meet the wants of the army.

A new sphere of operation has been unexpectedly opened to the Society during the past year, upon which, under all the special circum-

stances of the case, the Committee were impelled by a solemn sense of their responsibility to enter. An earnest appeal was addressed to your Committee by the Bible Society of the Southern Confederacy, entreating their Christian sympathy and co-operation in a season when help was so urgently needed. It was represented that there was no possibility of furnishing the armies with the Scriptures; that thousands of men were daily exposed to the perils of sudden and violent death, and carried in their knapsack no portion of that Sacred Volume which teaches alike how to live and how to die. The favour craved of your Committee by the Bible Society of the Confederate States was permission to purchase cheap editions of the Scriptures to a fixed amount, on credit, as the disadvantageous rate of exchange would increase to an enormous degree the extent of its pecuniary liability. To this proposal your Committee gave the most anxious attention; and they felt assured that every Christian patriot in the Northern States would approve and applaud the decision at which they arrived, in allowing the Bible Society of the Confederate States to draw such Bibles and Testaments as they needed from your Depôt, awaiting more pacific and propitious times for the payment of the debt.

But the aid of your Society was subsequently extended far beyond the limits already described. In the month of February, the Rev. Dr. Hoge, a Presbyterian clergyman from Richmond, sought an interview with the Committee, for the purpose of laying before them a statement of facts as to the impossibility of meeting the wants of the Southern army, numbering from 200,000 to 300,000 men, without such a large supply of the Scriptures as could be obtained only in this country. Dr. Hoge represented to the Committee in most affecting details the famine of the Word of God which prevailed, and the intense desire of thousands to possess at least some portion of the Bible. The Committee resolved to place at the disposal of the Bible Society of Virginia, one of the oldest Bible Society Organizations in America, a grant of Scriptures, consisting of 10,000 Bibles, 50,000 Testaments, and 250,000 Portions.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.—The great principle that the Bible is the want of man is recognized in its full force, and under the stimulating influence of this principle there is willing labour to render the Scriptures accessible to the population spread over the vast extent of Canada. Organization for this purpose is widely ramified in both Provinces.

TORONTO.—The largest and most influential Auxiliary is that of the Upper Canada Society, having its centre of operation at Toronto.

The issues have reached 27,267 copies, and have been dispersed through many channels.

This Auxiliary can state that it has the support of no fewer than 265 Branches.

MONTREAL.—The issues for the year include 6,174 Bibles, 6,475 Testaments, and 242 Portions, making a total of 12,891 copies, and bringing the entire circulation, since the formation of the Auxiliary, forty-two years since, to 274,365 copies.

QUEBEC.—The Auxiliary at this city is endeavouring to take its appropriate part in the great Bible work. The issues of the year are stated to have been 614 copies, and the total circulation of the Auxiliary, 22,768.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—The Auxiliary in this Colony is conducted with remarkable energy. Forty-two Branch Societies are comprehended in the Auxiliary, being a larger number than previously reported.

The issues of the Auxiliary have been 1,785 Bibles and Testaments.

FREDERICTON.—The Auxiliary at this place pursues its course of useful labour without any special circumstances to report.

NOVA SCOTIA—HALIFAX.—The Nova Scotia Auxiliary during the year last reported, issued 3,125 Bibles and Testaments, many of which have penetrated the outlying districts, and found a welcome in dwellings where no copy previously existed, or a mutilated Bible, with soiled and torn leaves, was all that the inmates possessed.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND—CHARLOTTE TOWN.—The issues amounted to 1831 copies; and attention is directed to the fact, occurring for the first time in the history of the Auxiliary, that the preponderance of circulation has been in favour of complete Bibles as compared with New Testaments.

NEWFOUNDLAND—ST. JOHN'S.—The operations of the past year have issued in a circulation of 7,665 copies, being nearly double the circulation of the previous year.

HUDSON'S BAY TERRITORY.—The Cree Indians, in the Hudson's Bay Territory, cherish the deepest gratitude to your Society for having furnished them with the entire Bible in the syllabic character. The subjoined letter of thanks has been received, acknowledging the great

boon conferred by the translating and printing of the Scriptures for the tribe, and making a request for old Testaments:—

“Rossville Wesleyan Mission,
Hudson's Bay, Dec. 20, 1862.

“To the Chiefs of the Bible Society.

“Our Missionary told us to send you on paper our thanks for the Testaments you sent us; but we can only write in the Cree syllabic characters; so we have asked an interpreter to translate this paper. Great fathers! we are thankful. On Sabbath we listen to this Word in our church, and many times we read it to our children. Our hunters carry it with them to the forests. We wish very much to get the Old part of the Bible in the characters, if you will be so kind as to let Dr. Hoole, our kind friend, have some to send us; and your Indian children will pray that the Great Spirit may bless you more and more.

DOMESTIC.—The first duty devolving upon your Committee in relation to the domestic affairs of the Society is to refer, as they do with unfeigned regret, to the loss the Society has sustained by the death of some who have been long identified with your work.

The decease of His Grace the late Archbishop of Canterbury, one of your Vice-Presidents, while greatly deplored in his own more immediate ecclesiastical circle, was felt by your Committee to be the removal of an earnest, cordial, and unwavering friend of the Society, whose attachment suffered no abatement by the lapse of time, and whose steadfast approval of its catholic basis and unfettered operations was never shaken by doubts in his own mind, or vexatious controversies raised by others.

The Committee have also to record the death of the venerable and beloved Charles Stokes Dudley, who was for so long a period officially connected with the Society, and rendered it, especially in its early history, most invaluable service.

The Committee have much satisfaction in stating that, on their invitation, conveyed through the President, His Grace the Archbishop of Dublin has very cordially consented to have his name enrolled amongst the Vice-Presidents of the Society. The Lord Bishop of Goulbourn, and Sir T. D. Lloyd, Bart., of Bronwydd, have also intimated the pleasure it affords them to be placed on the list of Vice-Presidents.

The Committee presented, through their President, a copy of the Scriptures, appropriately bound, to Her Royal Highness the Princess Alice, on the occasion of her marriage with His Royal Highness the Prince Louis of Hesse.

The marriage of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, with the Princess Alexandra of Denmark, was justly considered an event of great national moment, and was universally hailed with the utmost degree of loyalty and enthusiasm. The Committee deemed it suitable to mark the occasion by presenting to the Heir Apparent to the Throne of England and his illustrious Consort, a Bible, richly decorated, enclosed in an ornamental case.

FUNDS.—The RECEIPTS of the year from ordinary sources, have been £157,990 4s. To this amount must be added £760 14s. 9d. on account of special funds, making a grand total of £158,750 18s. 9d. The total receipts from all sources are £9,692 16s. 8d. less than in the preceding year.

The sum available for the GENERAL PURPOSES of the Society is £84,263.

The RECEIPTS on account of the PURCHASE of SCRIPTURES have been £73,727 4s.

The total Expenditure of the year has amounted to £150,539 0s. 9d. inclusive of £4,897 0s. 2d. on account of special funds. This gives an excess of expenditure, as compared with the previous year, of £5,787 13s. 4d.

ISSUES.—The entire circulation has been 2,133,860 copies, showing an increase of 538,612 copies over the issues of the preceding year.

The total circulation of the Society now amounts to FORTY-THREE MILLIONS FORTY-FOUR THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-FOUR COPIES.

INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION.—There were several modes of operation adopted by the Committee with the view to meet the speciality of the occasion. Within the Exhibition itself 7,400 Portions of the New Testament were distributed amongst grateful recipients, many of whom were deeply impressed by this act of Christian kindness, and made various inquiries on the subject of religion and the work of your Society.

Irrespective of the supplies drawn from the Brompton Depot for the purposes of other Christian Agencies, 3,218 volumes were sold in more than twenty languages.

The temporary stall which the Committee engaged at the Crystal Palace for the same period, led to a far more extensive sale of the Scriptures than had been anticipated. A considerable number of Portions were gratuitously distributed amongst foreigners, who gladly accepted the gift; and 6,849 Bibles, Testaments, and Parts, were sold. By the modes of action thus indicated, 18,349 copies of the Word of God, in whole or in part, were sold.

In addition to the foregoing, 9,244 Portions were given away, making a total of 27,593 copies issued, and, to a great extent, circulated by the directed Agency of the Society.

BIBLE WOMEN.—The mode of help is still regulated on the principle formerly announced. The Scriptures needed are drawn from the local Depôts, and the balance of payments beyond what is required for the time allotted to Bible-work, is transferred to the Committee. During the past year, 8,447 copies have been sold in connection with the work of the Bible-women; and it is pleasing to know that many of the poor, who, when visited, possessed no Bible, and who in the first instance purchased a cheap copy, have been subsequently led to subscribe for larger and better volumes.

IRELAND.—The Report of the HIBERNIAN BIBLE SOCIETY has been received, and affords the same evidence as in former years, that the Protestants of Ireland continue to attach the utmost importance to the circulation of the Scriptures. The circulation of the year has been 74,972 copies, including a very large number of complete Bibles.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SOCIETY FOR IRELAND.—The grants made by your Society to this Institution, during the year, have amounted to 9,250 Bibles and 9,500 Testaments.

CONCLUSION.—How many motives combine to induce a renewed consecration to the work of the Society. Past blessing and success are this day called to remembrance, as a new pillar of memorial is erected. The personal responsibility of Christians, as entrusted with the oracles of God for the benefit of others, must be deliberately weighed. The actual condition of the vast proportion of mankind, ignorant of the existence of The Book, or denied the possession of The Book, overshadowed by the dark clouds of superstition, or debased in all the nobler elements of their being by odious and detestable idolatries, must be thoughtfully pondered. The conquests of Divine Truth, already achieved in lands where once the huge towering barriers of heathendom excluded every ray of light, and human passion revelled in crime too awful and too revolting to describe, must be distinctly brought to mind. The facilities now at command for fulfilling

your peaceful and heavenly Mission amongst the nations of the earth, —the many-tongued utterances of divine revelation in the translations effected,—the opening by commerce and national alliances of new territory peopled with countless millions of immortal beings, having irresistible claims on your sympathy and Christian pity, must be wisely considered. And in the view of such manifold motives, the work should be recommenced this day with an energy, and faith, and perseverance, that shall never fail, never grow weary. Other motives too there are that should speak to each heart with touching eloquence and constraining force. The blessings of surpassing value we have individually derived from the Bible,—the peace, and comfort, and joy with which it has soothed and refreshed our spirits, often faint in their struggle with adverse influences,—the debt of infinite obligation we owe to the Divine Redeemer who loved us, and gave Himself for us,—the destiny of souls passing in such quick succession to the retribution of eternity, the conviction of the invincible power of Divine Truth when accompanied by the energy of the Holy Spirit, the assurance that ultimately God's Word shall have free course, and establish its dominion of light and blessedness in all realms,—these thoughts may well arm us with new and holy resolution to work as we have not hitherto worked, more in the spirit of serious earnestness, feeling that opportunity to work is brief and uncertain,—more in the spirit of tender compassion, feeling that on our efforts may be suspended the eternal well-being of many,—more in the spirit of faith, feeling that our object is one of vital and transcendent moment, identified with the sublime and immutable purposes of the Divine mind,—more in the spirit of humility, feeling that it is an unspeakable honour to put our hands to an enterprise from which God will gather such glory to His own great name,—more in the spirit of prayer, feeling that in all seasons of deliberation and labour we are strong and wise only as we are furnished with the aids of divine grace,—more in the spirit of holy waiting and fervent hope, feeling that all we do in the dissemination of the Bible is surely tributary to the coming of that grand consummation, the festival of a redeemed world, when from every land and from every lip anthems of praise shall ascend "to Him that sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb for ever."
