MINUTES OF THE NINTH SESSION OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

HELD IN THE METHODIST CHURCH, PEMBROKE, ONTARIO, COMMENCING
JUNE 2ND, 1892.

The NINTH SESSION of the MONTREAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church assembled, according to appointment, in the Methodist Church, Pembroke, Thursday, June 2nd, 1892, at 9 o'clock, a.m.

The Rev. J. COOPER ANTLIFF, M.A., D.D., President, in the chair.

The Conference prayer-meeting was held from 9 to 10 o'clock.

After singing and the reading of a portion of Scripture, prayer was offered by Mr. W. H. ROSEVEAR and Rev. GEORGE McRITCHIE.

The President called for the names of the laymen reported as elected by the District Meetings. (See Appendix.) And the Secretary then called the roll, when 134 ministers and forty-two laymen answered to their names.

The Conference then proceeded to ballot for President, and upon the fourth ballot the Rev. W. H. GRAHAM was elected, who felicitously thanked the Conference for the honor.

Rev. WM. PHILP, B.A., B.D., was elected Secretary on first ballot, and thanked the Conference for the expression of its confidence.

The Secretary nominated Revs. S. D. CHOWN, J. GIBSON and DAVID McELROY, Carp, Ont., as Assistant Secretaries, and Rev. C. D. BALDWIN as Journal Secretary, which nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

Rev. JAMES LAWSON was appointed Reporter for the *Christian Guardian*, and the Rev. F. G. ROBINSON was appointed to sign railway certificates.

The hours of session were fixed as follows:—9 a.m. to 12 noon, and 2 p.m. to 5.30 p.m.

Rev. T. G. WILLIAMS, D.D., was elected by ballot as Chairman of the Montreal District, in the place of Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A., D.D., and the Rev. G. G. HUXTABLE was elected by ballot as Chairman of the Perth District, instead of Rev. W. J. Crothers, M.A., who were transferred out of the Conference.

The Special Session of the Conference met in the Methodist Church, Pembroke, on Tuesday, May 31st, 1892, at 9 o'clock a.m., Rev. Dr. Antliff, President, in the chair. After singing Hymn 753, 1 Thess. v. was read by the Secretary, and Revs. H. Cairns and J. Lawson led in prayer. Rev. John Gibson was appointed Assistant Secretary.

The roll was called, and 107 ministers responded to the call.

OBITUARIES.

REV. GEORGE HENRY DAVIS.

Rev. George Henry Davis was born in the vicinity of London, England, in 1819, the son of an Anglican clergyman. The advantages of his early social conditions led to that easy eloquence and refinement of manner and address which gave him the impress of superiority on to the very close of life. His conversion was clear, definite and influential. It led him into the communion of the Methodist Church, when, by that act, he became alienated forever from his family. For three years he enjoyed the privileges of the Richmond Theological Institution in England. In 1844, he was appointed to the Canada Eastern District, at that period in connection with the British Conference, and was stationed in the city of Montreal, then one Circuit. Never, perhaps, did a young minister come to that city with greater prestige, and never was one called to fill a more difficult position. Graceful in person, gentle in manner, devout in spirit, the Methodism of that generation took him to its heart. On the other hand, he had to compete with men of rare distinction. Dr. Ritchie and Charles Churchill were men difficult to follow, yet this gifted junior minister carried with him a pathos and spiritual power, that mystic something which we call unction, which gave him not only an equality of status, but an emphatic recognition. A ministry begun under auspices so full of promise, was continued with acceptance and power till, admonished by the inevitable approach of physical decay, he with honor retired after forty-two years of faithful service. In Toronto, Brantford, Peterboro', Cobourg, Brockville and Quebec, with minor appointments, he exercised his ministry with signal fidelity, and in some cases with phenomenal success. Manifold are the qualities in the character of this eminent minister which are worthy of our imitation. His habits of devotion were maintained with great regularity. With him the Scriptures were ever regnant, and he lived in the atmosphere of the most spiritual writings. Our honored friend had infirmities because he was a man of like passions with ourselves; but the elevation of his mind, the sanctity of his heart, his absolute consecration to the supreme ends of the ministry, his tenderness in all domestic relations, his faithfulness as a friend, will always abide as a blissful memory to all who knew him. His last days were spent in Peterboro', where, from the bosom of watching weepers, the faithful servant ascended to the joy of his Lord, September, 1891.

REV. ROBERT BAILIE.

The Rev. Robert Bailie was a native of Neutownards, County Down, Ireland, and came to this country about four years ago, that he might be connected with Canadian Methodism, and give his life's work to the Church and the cause of Christ, and though without a single relative in this country, yet by his exemplary life, his Christian character and his genial manner, he won for himself many kind and lasting friendships among his brother ministers, and those to whom he ministered. Blessed of God in his labors he gave great promise of future good, being strong physically, having a mind well stored with knowledge, and withal deeply pious, it was fully expected that he would make full proof of his ministry by contributing many years of service to the Church and the world; but God's ways are not our ways, and while trying to be reconciled to His providence, we are pleased to think of him, as one of old, who walked with God, and was not, for God took him. He was appointed by the last Conference to the Westport Circuit, and came to an untimely death by drowning, on Wednesday, August 19th, 1891. He had taken a boat and rowed a short

distance from the village, to where friends were camping. After reaching there he went in bathing, got into deep water, and being unable to swim, was drowned. The body was recovered about an hour and a half after, but life was extinct.

REV. N. H. HOWARD.

Father Howard was born in Demorestville, Prince Edward County, Ont., May 20th, 1814. When he was about eighteen years of age his father was drowned, and he assumed the care of his widowed mother and her six children. On January 3rd, 1836, he married Miss Ruth Thompson, who now survives him. At the age of twenty-seven he was converted at a camp-meeting held near the town of Picton, Ont. To the end of life he esteemed his conversion a thorough work of grace, and rejoiced in the fact. His convictions were pungent, his repentance sincere, and the evidence of his acceptance was all that could be desired. Three weeks after conversion he was appointed leader of a class of five, which class he, by a protracted prayer-meeting, increased to twenty-five—it numbered forty when he resigned charge thereof. He filled the office of local preacher for one year, when he was called to the itinerancy in the late M. E. Church. For thirty-three years he rendered efficient service as an itinerant, travelling some fifteen Circuits. On three of them he labored a second term, and always succeeded in gathering in some precious fruit. Twelve years ago last Conference he was superannuated, still he continued to preach with more or less frequency until within five weeks of his death; assuming charge of the Newboro' Circuit for some six months about six years ago. And to his credit be it said, he was always at his post if at all able to attend, and always prompt to the hour; never having missed a quarterly service since he joined the Church. His departure was not as he expected. He anticipated, and prepared for, a sudden call; but he passed away slowly, almost imperceptibly. His end was marked with great peace. He died January 8th, 1892. Eleven of his children yet remain, all of whom we trust are treading in his footsteps. Eight of our ministers assisted at the burial service. "The memory of the just is blessed."

REV. S. G. PHILLIPS, M.A.

The Rev. S. G. Phillips, M.A., was brought to a knowledge of the saving power of Divine grace in early life, and soon entered the Master's vineyard as a local preacher, in his native country, England. He came to this country in the year 1853, and entered immediately upon the work of the ministry in the Wesleyan Methodist Church. He travelled the following Circuits in order:—Dunham, Granby, East Bolton, Compton, Three Rivers, Clarenceville, Dunham, Lachute, Huntingdon, Cowansville, Vankleek Hill, Billing's Bridge, Augusta and Lyn, achieving marked success in all these fields. His last appointment was to the Lyn Circuit in the Montreal Conference, where in the faithful discharge of duty, on that heavy field, and through extraordinary exertions for one of his years, his health failed. By securing supplies he nobly held to his post, until at last it was clear that a change of climate was absolutely necessary, when he reluctantly surrendered his charge and sought restoration in the more genial air of Southern California. There for awhile his health seemed to improve, and he cherished the hope of returning to his work in Canada, when he indulged in the desire to complete his forty years of active service in the ministry. These expectations, however, were doomed to disappointment, for on the 10th of January, 1892, he attended his last service in the First Methodist Church, Los Angeles, California, when he assisted the pastor, Rev. Dr. Campbell and others, in administering the Lord's Supper, which he seemed greatly to enjoy. Returning home from that service he caught a slight cold, which intensified his disease, and caused him to keep his bed for about five weeks. His sufferings at times were very severe, but his trust in God most perfect, and his patience most exemplary. On the 3rd of March the end came.

With a happy smile he met the great foe, and in perfect peace he passed to his reward. The funeral service was conducted in the First M. E. Church of Los Angeles by the pastor, Rev. Dr. Campbell, assisted by the Rev. Alexander Hardie, M.A., of this Montreal Conference. Several ministers were present, among them was the Rev. Ezra Healy, formerly of this Conference. Brother Phillips was the author of several books, which have had a large sale and accomplished much good. Such as "Bible Palm Trees," "Sacred Names," "The Modern Prodigal," and "Sermons by Canadian Ministers," and others. In his home he was a most affectionate father and husband, and a kind and loyal friend. There are hundreds in this land who can bear testimony to his faithfulness as a pastor, and his earnestness as a Christian minister. Many learned to love Jesus from his bright example and his forceful teachings, and of him it may be said, "he rests from his labors and his works do follow him."

REV. W. MCGILL.

The Rev. W. McGill was born in the town of Cornwall, Ont., on the 2nd April, 1824. His early childhood was spent within the pale of the Episcopalian communion, for whose ministry his devout parents cherished an ardent desire to train him. In the order of Divine Providence the family moved to the township of Osnabruck while our deceased brother was still but a lad; here he came into contact with Methodism, and in a very short time he was converted to God under the faithful ministry of the late Rev. J. W. McCallum. Having received more than an average education for those times, our beloved brother spent several years in the responsible work of teaching. Developing talents for usefulness, he was not unnoticed by the Church; for in the year 1845 a vacancy occurred in the old Waterloo Circuit, and Mr. McGill was induced to fill it. The hard work, the coarse fare, and the poor accommodation of those days were more than the young evangelist was at that time prepared to endure. He returned to his home sick and greatly discouraged; but all his life he felt that this was a mistake, and he could not rest until he found himself again in the work. Accordingly, in 1847, he was received on probation and appointed to the Matilda Circuit with good, honest John Lever as his Superintendent. From that time to his death he labored faithfully in word and doctrine, both in season and out of season. Brother McGill was a Methodist from principle and from choice, rather than from accident or education; but having made his choice, his mind was unchangeable amid many solicitations and opportunities. He was held in high estimation by his brethren in the ministry, who delighted to do him honor. He was also very highly esteemed by the people wherever he labored. His mind was clear and penetrating, if not profound, and had been sedulously cultivated by constant study. His preaching was solid rather than showy, but rich in spiritual food for the discerning soul. His temperament was gentle, but capable of being roused. He was a model of unselfishness, while he hated mean men and mean ways. He bore his long affliction with great patience, and though he had "no waves of ecstasy," as he said to his pastor several times, "he knew whom he had believed." Calmly confident in Christ he fell asleep on Friday evening, October 25th, 1891.

"O may we triumph so
When all our warfare's past;
And dying, find our latest foe
Beneath our feet at last."

REV. T. W. CONSTABLE.

Thomas Walker Constable was born September 18th, 1815, and died on the 28th of August, 1891, in the seventy-sixth year of his age. His early religious training was in connection with the Anglican Church, of which his father was a very zealous member. In early manhood Brother Constable was induced to attend service in a Wesleyan Chapel, and was brought under deep conviction

of sin. Being persuaded to attend class-meeting, the sound experiences and joyful testimonies of God's saving power so impressed him that he at once united with the Methodist Church, and amid much bitter opposition from relatives, held fast the beginning of his confidence. His faithfulness to God had its reward in the conversion of every member of the family. The father, last of all, from being a persecutor, found mercy and died in the triumphs of faith. Brother Constable soon began to exercise his gifts in a public capacity; was licensed as a local preacher in England, and urged to enter the ministry of the Word. This he refused to do, and to emphasize that refusal entered into the marital relation with Diana Mattison, and in 1842 emigrated to Canada to enter business. But the duty of preaching was made plainer in this country than ever. He was sent as a supply to Amherstburg Mission in the spring of 1843. This was one of the laborious four weeks' Circuits of that period, but the toil was cheerfully endured. Brother Constable's active ministry of thirty-three years was fruitful in soul-winning for Jesus. When he was appointed to take Melbourne Circuit, P.Q., in 1855, it had been riven by Millerism. But God wonderfully blessed his labors, and scores of sinners were awakened, and backsliders reclaimed. His preaching was forcible, scriptural, Methodistic, gifted with a calm logical mind, and being a keen debater and strict disciplinarian, his voice was often heard in the councils of the Church. He was seriously afflicted in the later years of his life by loss of hearing, yet, according to his ability, he still labored as opportunity offered for the good of the race. Death came swiftly in the end. Returning home from visiting his daughter after the Brockville Conference he sank rapidly, and without a pain or struggle fell asleep in Jesus as peacefully as an infant in its mother's arms. His dying counsel to his family a few minutes before death was, "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." Nearly all his large family were present at the funeral, and we laid him beside the companion of his early toils in the cemetery at Cookshire.

REV. WILLIAM HANSFORD, D.D.

Mr. Hansford was born on the 14th July, 1830, in the county of Dorsetshire, England. His parents belonged to the Established Church, and carefully trained their son according to its usages. Some time after he had been confirmed the Methodists were holding special services in his native village. Curiosity led him to these services, the power of God soon arrested his attention, moved his heart and transformed his soul. His purity of life, his gifts and his zeal arrested the attention of the authorities of the Church, and ere long we find his name upon the plan as a local preacher. Feeling called of God to devote himself to the work of the ministry, and there being at that time many openings in this country, Brother Hansford arrived in Quebec in the month of May, 1854. The Rev. W. Pollard, Superintendent of our work in that city being ill, Brother Hansford remained as his assistant for one year. In 1855, he was regularly admitted as a probationer for our work and stationed at Orms-town. After thirty-five years of faithful labor he was compelled in 1890 to ask for a superannuated relation. His period of inactivity was, however, short, for on Sunday morning, October 11th, 1891, God said to our brother, "It is enough," and took the tired spirit home.

In the death of Brother Hansford, this Conference loses one who has rendered it incessant and invaluable service of the most arduous and exhausting kind. The estimation in which our departed brother was held is seen in the offices to which he was appointed: Financial Secretary, Chairman, Governor of Stanstead Wesleyan College, Missionary Treasurer and President of Conference. Brother Hansford at his best was a preacher of no ordinary merit. He had a mind of unusual grasp, which had been cultivated with sedulous care as well by protracted thought as close reading. As a friend, no truer spirit or warmer heart ever throbbed in a human body. It is true that to know this,

one had to get close to Brother Hansford; but those who had this privilege know how true it is. As a presiding officer, he was most urbane but immovable, genial but inflexibly loyal. We miss his manly form in our annual assemblies; but he has gone to swell the number of the redeemed, for "he was a good man, and feared God above many."

REV. JABEZ AGAR.

Rev. Jabez Agar died at Whitefish Indian Mission School, on the 18th of April, 1892. He was a native of Chatham, Ont., and a descendant from an honorable Methodist parentage. He was converted to God in early life through special services held in that town, and there became a member of the Methodist Church. In the year 1889 he entered our work as a hired local preacher on the Nipissing District. In 1890, he was recommended by the Quarterly Official Meeting of the Chapeau Mission as a candidate for the ministry. Having been received on probation by the Conference, he was assigned a field of labor on the Whitefish Indian Reserve, near Sudbury, where in the two-fold capacity of Indian school teacher and evangelist, he continued to serve the Church with marked ability and success. Possessed of superior natural endowments and a liberal education, he might have ranked among the pastors of her more advanced missions; yet he prosecuted the work allotted him among the poor children of the forest with a fidelity and zeal which won the admiration of all who witnessed his efforts. In less than two years he acquired a knowledge of the Ojibway language, which enabled him to read the Scriptures and converse freely in that tongue for the instruction and edification of his pupils. His deep interest in the spiritual welfare of the Indians is shown in the fact that he had, previously to his decease, provided funds for the employment of an itinerant missionary to follow them on their hunting expeditions during the winter months, when they are mostly absent from the village. It was his purpose, if the Conference should favor his project, to offer himself for that work. The interest, however, which he felt in the progress of God's cause was not confined to its development on the Indian Missions. Four years ago he gave upwards of \$1,700 for the founding of mission churches and schools on the domestic missions lying in the territory between Mattawa and Port Arthur; and shortly before his death he bequeathed another large sum to the Methodist Missionary Society for the support of home and foreign missions. His death, which occurred in the midst of active and self-sacrificing labor of great promise, may be regarded as the consequence of unabated zeal in prosecuting the work which he loved so ardently, and which he believed to be necessary to save the people entrusted to his care. A severe attack of *la grippe* in the month of December last compelled him to desist from labor for a short time. Impelled by his burning zeal he overestimated his physical strength and recommenced work before his health was fully restored, and died in an earnest attempt to do what he thought his duty. He was a man of superior mental capacity, of broad views and unflinching charity. He loved all who love our Lord Jesus Christ, in sincerity and truth. His piety was simple, uniform and scriptural. He loved God with all his heart, and literally give himself and all he possessed to his Redeemer and Lord.

REV. WILLIAM BROWN.

William Brown, formerly of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Canada, was the son of the Rev. William Brown, who served the Church long and well as an ordained local preacher, and the grandson of the Rev. William Brown who was stationed in Montreal in 1816. Wm. Brown, the subject of this notice, was born in Wolford, Ont., in 1815; but when twelve years old he accompanied his father on his removal to St. Lawrence County, N.Y. While there, and when

about fifteen years of age, he was converted. He attended, for a time, Gouverneur Wesleyan Seminary, fitting himself for a teacher. Returning to Canada in 1836 or 1837, he taught at Greenbush among other places, but finally settled down to farming. He was licensed as an exhorter by the Elizabethtown Quarterly Conference, July 9th, 1840. He began to travel, under the Rev. H. Lane, on the Matilda Circuit, in 1842, was received on trial in 1843, ordained deacon in 1845, and elder in 1847. With the exception of two years, 1869-70, he continued in the active work down to his final superannuation in 1881. He was a member of every General Conference from the time he was received into full connection down to and including the one that consummated the Union, and on more than one occasion was Secretary of the General Conference. He was Presiding Elder from 1852 to 1860, and again in 1868. He was one of the original promoters of Belleville Seminary, now Albert College. Of work and honor in the Church he had his full share, doing his work with fidelity and wearing his honors with humility. Nor were his efforts confined exclusively to the Church; for years he stood in the very thickest of the fight for Prohibition, one of its sturdiest champions when days were dark and friends were few. As a preacher, he combined a woman's tenderness with the most vigorous and well-sustained thought, frequently rising into a rush of impassioned eloquence that swept over his congregation as the very breath of the Lord. He was always gladly received on his old fields, and often sent for to conduct funerals. Many on earth and many in heaven glorify God in our departed friend. In debate, very few men cared to measure swords with him when the subject was of sufficient importance to call forth his full strength. Under that placid and genial exterior one could scarcely imagine the tempest of energy that slumbered within. The light of his piety shone with clear and steady ray all through life, growing more mellow and radiant as it approached the perfect day. After the varied toils, trials and triumphs of a Methodist itinerant for nearly fifty years, having stamped the impress of his strong personality for good upon some of the most important elements of national character, he at length "rests from his labors, and his works do follow him." It was while kneeling in prayer before retiring, about ten o'clock Sabbath evening, November 15th, 1891, that he suddenly passed from his pleasant home, in the village of Iroquois, to receive the victor's crown and the Master's "Well done."

REV. WILLIAM SCOTT.

Prominent among those who have passed from our ranks in the year now past, was the Rev. Wm. Scott. He was born in the city of Lincoln, England, October 4th, 1812. He received a thorough English education, and being of studious habits and fond of reading and writing, he added to his scholastic acquirements a large stock of general information. He was converted in boyhood, and while yet a mere stripling began to employ his gifts as a local preacher, giving evidence of great ability and promise of future usefulness; but, by an early marriage, his way into the English Conference was shut up. In 1834 he came to America, and for a year or more edited a weekly journal in the city of New York. In 1836 he was received on trial for the ministry in the New York Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In the following year he came to Canada, and at the Conference held in Toronto was received on probation, and in due course of time was ordained to the full work of the ministry. From 1841 to 1847 inclusive, he occupied the St. Clair Mission, and labored for the Christianization of the Indians of Lake Huron and Manitoulin Island. From 1848 to 1881, when he was superannuated, he was engaged in the regular pastorate, excepting one year when he acted as Agent of Victoria College. During these years he occupied many important stations, among them Montreal West, Toronto West, Ottawa, Peterboro', Napanee, Oshawa and Brockville. Twenty-four years he was Chairman of the District in which

he was stationed. From the time of his superannuation until his death he resided in Ottawa, where, during his last years, he had suitable and agreeable employment in the Civil Service, in the Department of Indian Affairs. In the course of his ministerial life, Brother Scott did a vast amount of connexional work. A better Minute Secretary it would be difficult to find. Twice the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada, and twice the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church, honored him with the position of Secretary. Thrice he was chosen to represent his brethren in the General Conference. Once he was elected President of his Conference, and, according to the testimony of his brethren, discharged his high duties with ability, diligence, fidelity and courtesy. The same terms might be employed to characterize all his church work. In all positions to which the Church called him he proved himself a faithful, painstaking, competent man. Brother Scott was endowed with a more than ordinarily vigorous intellect. Throughout his life he pursued a liberal course of reading. His large library contained not only choice treasures of theology, but many volumes besides of history, science and general literature. He continued in Canada the connection with the press which he had established in New York. From 1851 to 1858 he was editor of the *Canada Temperance Advocate*, a journal which he conducted with honest boldness, yet with sound judgment and discretion. He was the author of some able pamphlets on superior education, which also was a subject in which he was deeply interested. In 1888, he published "Hours with St. Paul and his Expositors," a theological work of much learning and ability. He was an able preacher, and his sermons were models of sound thought and just exposition. His literary habits made him a very ready man, a ready speaker, a ready debater, and his was truly the pen of a ready writer. Brother Scott was possessed of a wonderfully cheerful and equable temperament, refined and elevated by the grace of God. On several occasions in his life he was called to pass through deep waters of trouble. At such times, he revealed some of the most admirable elements of his character. The strong man bowed under the burdens of his sorrow, and at the same time manifested a strength of faith, and a strength and nobleness of nature that were deeply impressive. Down to his latest days he maintained an unvarying brightness, elasticity, and kindness of spirit. He was well known in Ottawa, and everybody loved him. He was at all times ready to assist his brethren, or to serve the Church, and his services were always much appreciated. His whole demeanor as a superannuated Methodist minister was such as to delight his brethren, gratify the people, and honor himself. His growth in spirituality in these later years was evident to all who intimately knew him. Some of his sermons, and some addresses, as on watch-night and other special occasions, were blessedly spiritual, tender and powerful. Although he was approaching four score years of age, he possessed a degree of health and vigor of constitution that seemed to promise a term of life yet largely extended. That promise, however, was not to be fulfilled. He had engaged to occupy the pulpit of Dominion Church on Sunday morning, October 4th. It would be his birthday, and that day he should enter upon his eightieth year. He conversed with his pastor about the subject of the sermon he intended to preach—the lessons of his life-time concerning the good providence and the faithfulness of God. He had a message which he longed to deliver. His discourse was well nigh prepared, and the hymns and lessons selected, but on his birthday another occupied the pulpit, while he was laid upon his dying bed. As he was standing before his own door, a slight accident caused him to trip and fall upon the sidewalk, the result of which was a fracture of the upper part of the thigh bone. It proved to be a fatal injury. In his sufferings God was with him, divine grace sustained him, nor did his habitual cheerfulness desert him. He talked pleasantly of his mishap, and had his daughter read to him Wesley's sermon on Patience. What should be the result of his injury was at first uncertain. But for any event, whether to recover or to be bed-ridden and helpless for years, or soon to be called from earth away, without a murmur he

committed himself to the Lord. He was much interested in the Ecumenical Conference about to assemble in Washington, and made arrangements to have sent him a daily paper containing a report of the proceedings, but before the Conference opened he was gone. The end came very stealthily. To his ministerial brethren in Ottawa when they visited him he spoke emphatically of his comfort and safety in the divine keeping, but hopefully, at the same time, of recovery. But the day following his birthday his strength suddenly failed. It is not certain that he himself was aware of his dying condition. The messenger had come for him, but he seemed to be unaware of his presence. In one sense it might be said of him, as of Enoch, that he did not *see* death. Yet a question that was among his very last words, "Are you all here?" might possibly indicate a consciousness that the end had come, and a wish that his beloved family might be with him at the last. On October 5th, when he had numbered one day in his eightieth year, he passed most peacefully and quietly away. Brother William Scott will long be affectionately remembered for his usefulness, his intelligence, his brotherliness and his geniality, coupled with a genuine dignity which he never laid aside. The whole Church and the whole country have gained by his life; the whole Church and the whole country lose by his death.

REV. THOMAS O. ADKINS.

Thomas O. Adkins was born in Ernestown, Ont., on Dec. 2nd, 1801. He was married in February, 1827, to Miss Margaret Landon, daughter of the late Oliver Landon, of Lansdowne. In the year 1830, he experienced a change of heart, at a camp-meeting held at Elizabethtown. For twenty years after his conversion he engaged in various vocations. Heeding the call of God he entered the New Connexion Methodist Ministry in 1850. His first appointment was in the, then, sparsely settled county of Huron, where he labored with untiring zeal and energy, organizing societies and holding protracted meetings at which numbers were converted. He often left his wife (who was a devoted Christian and cheerfully shared his privations) at their home in the Township of Hullett, while he, taking with him his knapsack, containing Bible, hymn-book and compass, sought out the huts of the new settlers. In these journeys he was often obliged to blaze the trees with his tomahawk to enable him to retrace his steps. His indefatigable efforts were greatly owned of God in the salvation of souls. The settlers were very poor, subsisting chiefly on potatoes, coarse bread and venison, which the missionary gladly shared.

His next appointment consisted of several townships in the County of Wellington. His home was within a few miles of the now flourishing town of Mount Forest, on the site of which, at that time, there was a dense forest. On this new field of toil he labored with his accustomed success. He now went to the head of Lake Rice, where, by excessive toil and exposure in endeavoring to bring into harmony antagonistic elements, he contracted a throat disease and was compelled to desist in 1856. After a few years, during which time he held the position of postmaster, he removed to Lansdowne, where he remained till June, 1890. He often talked of his ministerial life, and took sincere delight in recounting his successful efforts in the salvation of sinners. He many times expressed his bright hope of a future life with the Saviour, and in various ways showed the deep fervent piety that glowed in his heart. After the death of his wife, who died at the age of 85, he removed to Binbrook, Ont., where he lived with his niece, Mrs. Edward Bailey. There he remained until his death, which occurred Friday, April 1st, 1892. A brother minister says, "Mr. Adkins was a man of integrity and uprightness. He hated every false way. Like Peter Cartwright, he was bold and unflinching in his denunciation of sin. Having a strong temper, he seemed sometimes rash and harsh in manner and not always wise in his methods, but his motives were always pure and underneath a stern exterior he carried a warm and loving heart."

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

The Trustees of Stanstead Wesleyan College respectfully submit to the Conference the following report, for the year 1891-92. We present first Principal McAmmond's report:

To the Trustees of the Stanstead Wesleyan College.

MY DEAR BRETHREN,—I beg leave most respectfully to submit the following report of the College for the year 1891-92. In doing so I wish to express my devout thankfulness to the Great Head of the Church for the success that has marked the Institution during the year now closing. You will doubtless be pleased to learn that the attendance has been much larger and more regular than it has been for years, thereby increasing the educational and financial results beyond anything we have yet been able to report. The total attendance for the year has been 150. Of this number 79 were gentlemen and 71 were ladies. This includes 49 boarders. The educational results of the year have been most gratifying and encouraging to the teachers.

We prepared three candidates on the first year's course in Arts, prescribed by McGill University, all of whom passed very satisfactory examinations, ranking first class in many of the subjects. Two young ladies, having completed the Ladies' Collegiate Course, will receive the degree of Mistress in the Liberal Arts. Twelve young men and two young ladies have completed the course in Commercial Science and will accordingly receive their diplomas.

Between forty and fifty, the largest number sent up in years, will write on the Government Grade Examinations this week, and we confidently expect that the final results will be much better than those of the previous years. This includes a class of six in the University A. A. course. Three candidates have been prepared on the work required for Model School Teachers, and will write for their certificates in June. In Music and Fine Art we have had during the year 36 pupils. In regard to the health of our students, we are pleased to state that the year has been marked by an almost entire freedom from sickness of any kind. We think the sanitary condition of the College is exceptionally good. You will also be gratified to learn that, throughout the year, there has been an unusual religious interest in the College. Our prayer meetings and class meetings have been seasons of great blessing, resulting in the conversion of many, in fact, all of our lady boarders who had not, previous to this year, given themselves to the Blessed Master. In this we greatly rejoice. In regard to the financial results the total income for the year, when the books are closed, will be about \$9,222.03.

In resigning my position as Principal of your Institution, I wish to assure you of my continued interest in its future prosperity and welfare, and as its management passes into other hands, my prayer is that it may still continue to have the hearty support and patronage of the entire Church, and thus become more and more a centre of influence and power in this Province.

The plan adopted three years ago for the payment of the debt resulted in a subscription of \$10,365.00; of that amount, \$6,222.50 have been paid. Part of the unpaid subscriptions is promised on condition that the whole debt is paid of. The Board has learned that \$1,000.00 have recently been left the College by a bequest. This amount when realized will be applied for the further reduction of the debt. The trustees believe that the plan which was adopted by the last annual Conference, which provides for the distribution of the debt over the Conference, if vigorously and persistently worked would result in success. They would, therefore, again urge upon the ministers and members that they give to this movement their careful consideration and hearty support. They also request that the subject be brought before the ensuing District financial meetings.

Rev. Foster McAmmond, B.A., who has been the efficient Principal for three years past, has decided to re-engage in pastoral work. The trustees desire to express the appreciation of the faithful and successful service he has rendered the College. The present high standing of the College in the Province of Quebec, as seen in the competitive examinations, the growing confidence of the public in the work done by the College, is largely due to efforts of Principal McAmmond and his excellent staff of teachers.

Mr. A. W. Bannister, M.A., who for seven years has been Principal of St. Francis' College, Richmond, P.Q., has been engaged as Principal. Mr. Bannister has taken a high stand among the educationists of the Pro-

vince. We are confident that the same cordial support which has been given previous Principals will be accorded to him. We would again solicit the hearty co-operation of the ministers of Conference to secure a large patronage for the College, as we believe the instruction given to pupils in this Institution is sound and of a wholesome character. The staff of teachers engaged, we believe, are well qualified for their position.

The Conference will be gratified to learn that a grant from the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction, for the Province of Quebec, has been secured for the undergraduate work of the College.

Your Committee would gratefully acknowledge the Divine blessing by which we are permitted to record an advance, both in the membership of the Church, and in the Connexional interests.

After making good all losses by deaths, removals and names dropped—these losses aggregating 3,616—we report a net increase of 483.

The present membership in the Conference is 34,436; on trial, 1,370; total, 35,806.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

We report with great pleasure the gratifying increase of 1,376 in enrolled scholars and a relatively similar increase in the average attendance of 1,234. Again, it is a further joy to us to note 1,121 conversions or about 4 per cent. of the scholars during the year.

We regret to observe a reduction of 545, or more than 10 per cent. in the number of scholars learning catechism, and would urge pastors of all our Circuits and Missions to confer with Sunday School Superintendents on this important subject. We urge attention to this the more strenuously, as a small decrease in this item occurred last year. The repeated and growing decrease indicates a tendency which may well awaken grave apprehension.

There is an encouraging increase in the circulation of our Sunday School Literature, and a very substantial increase of more than forty-five hundred volumes in our libraries.

We are pleased still further to note an increase in the number of teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons, but as these are yet relatively few, would urge their establishment wherever practicable.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report that they regard the Epworth League movement as of very great importance directly to Methodism, and indirectly to the broadening, deepening and progressing Christianity of

As in all things, our faithfulness in this regard shall be the measure of the reward received, and the promise of the success we may reasonably expect.

We rejoice in the substantial increase in both the number of Leagues and the membership as a whole.

There are now within the bounds of the Conference 77 Epworth Leagues, having a membership of 3,092, being an increase in Leagues of 28, and in membership of 1,022.

We strongly recommend that the Christian Endeavor and other societies of our young people be urged to fill the easy condition, afforded by the basis of the Epworth League, of entering into organized relation with an association so peculiarly Methodist, and yet so catholic in its spirit and aims.

We recommend that pastors give their earnest support to Leagues already established, and put forth their best endeavors to organize such on all circuits on which they are not yet in operation.

We also recommend that our ministers take an earnest and godly interest in the working of the Leagues on their various charges, guiding and inspiring toward the most excellent, and thus effectually preventing any tendency toward mere amusement, or mere financial returns; ever keeping in view the all-round development of the mind and soul of the youth of Methodism.

We see in Epworth League work the opportunity of fostering in the hearts of our young people an intelligent love for, and sympathy with, Methodism in every phase of her many-sided work. And we trust that our young people shall clearly see that every interest of the Church is their interest, that all tendency to sectionalism shall be avoided, and that for the upbuilding of the Redeemer's kingdom the wisdom of age and the energy of youth shall be united by the cement of love.

As a means to the cultivation of the highest spiritual life we recommend the prayerful study of the Book of God, especially the life and teaching of the Divine Redeemer. As secondary, and yet as very important, we suggest the helpfulness of the study of religious biography, especially the biography of the early Methodist ministers, who so closely followed the example of Him who "went about doing good."

We most heartily recommend to your Epworth Leagues, *Onward*, as a periodical which will be found very helpful in its influence in the development of Christian life.

We also recommend that District Conventions be held where practicable, and that this report be read in the various Leagues within the bounds of the Conference.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Report of the Treasurers for the Year ending July 31st, 1891, as adopted by the Board.

We beg herewith to submit the Annual Statement of the Superannuation Fund.

The affairs of the Fund occupied the earnest consideration of the General Conference, which body appointed a commission, consisting of ministers and laymen, representing different shades of opinion, to take the whole question into consideration, and report to the next General Conference.

The commission has met, and appointed sub-committees to collect information from a great variety of sources, and present it in tabulated form. Important beneficial results may be expected from the thorough and impartial examination of the whole question.

The amount raised from Circuits has exceeded that of the previous year by \$1,862.04. It is, however, just to state that a small portion of this increase arises from back payments on account of former years. The Interest Account is also in advance of the former year, \$1,249.37, and the Book Room has added \$200 to the grant of the preceding year, making the yearly grant now \$6,500.

We have received in legacies this year \$6,437.25, which sum embraces the half of the legacy of the late William Gooderham. There appears to be a praiseworthy disposition on the part of our people to remember this Fund in the final distribution of their property.

We are, however, still under the necessity of expressing our regret that there are a few Circuits that have failed to pay their apportionments in full, to the great embarrassment of the ministers laboring on them, and to the great injury of the Church. The aggregate amount is not comparatively very large, but the example is bad and it is not just to those Conferences and Circuits that are loyal to the laws of the Church.

The new claims this year are exceptionally large, and amount to \$9,630, while expired claims are only \$5,848, leaving a balance of \$3,782, less \$382, being the difference between the debt of the last year and the present one, or \$3,400 to be provided for, the entire claims for the year being \$87,084. The estimated income of the Fund will be about \$85,334, so far as we can at present ascertain. The Treasurers did not, however, feel at liberty to increase the percentage on the assessable income.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee in reviewing the state of the work reports an increase of 483 in the membership, after filling up vacancies caused by members, dropped 1,134, deaths 532, also removed 1,950, many of the latter having gone beyond the boundaries of this Conference.

There is also a slight increase in most of the connexional funds.

We are of the opinion that there was never a time when so many professed the blessing of holiness, and never were so many discussing it with a view to its intelligent acceptance and enjoyment. We pray that all our members will enjoy this great blessing and exhibit it in increasing liberality to God's cause, a conscientious discharge of all their duties in business, politics, and a broader scriptural charity towards all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth.

Your Committee has no doubt that much good has been accomplished through evangelistic services; notwithstanding we are of the opinion that we must continue to exercise due care as to the character, qualifications and teachings of those we think of employing in evangelistic work.

The increase of 1,200 scholars in our Sunday Schools, with a corresponding increase in the number of teachers is most gratifying.

The vote against running the street cars in Toronto on Sunday and the petitions against opening The Great Columbian Exposition on the Lord's Day indicate our people's respect, as well as that of others, for the Sabbath.

It must be gratifying to all lovers of Methodism that its percentage of increase, the last ten years, in this Dominion, is larger than that of any other Church.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Your Committee feeling profoundly impressed with the great importance of the Sabbath Observance question, and having carefully considered it, beg leave to report as follows:—

That while there is great cause for thankfulness that we have preserved to us the sacred rest and quiet of the Lord's Day above that of any other country, yet we cannot overlook the humiliating fact that many forms of Sabbath desecration are too common in our midst.

In view of the sanctity of the Sabbath being openly disregarded, in spite of the protest of the Churches, by railway and steamboat traffic, opening of canals as on week days, Sunday excursions, military and public parades, and many other forms of Sabbath desecration, subversive of the political and social well-being of the people; we recommend Conference to memorialize both the Dominion and Provincial Legislatures to enact more stringent laws for its protection.

We also urge upon all our people to abstain from and avoid the use of railway trains, street cars, and other public conveyances on the Sabbath, and to discountenance in every possible way the manufacture of cheese and butter as well as the selling of milk. We also regard Sabbath visiting, and pleasure seeking, even on a small scale, as being sadly injurious to the piety and influence of many people.

We desire to record our most hearty appreciation of the efforts of Mr. Charlton, M.P., to secure such legislation as we believe will be for the best interests of the youth of our country; in the meantime we would earnestly advise our people to use their influence in enforcing the laws now on our statute books to prevent the desecration of the Sabbath.

Your Committee deeply deplore the proposition to open the gates of the World's Exhibition on the Sabbath, and earnestly hope and pray that the Christian sentiment and principles of Christian people on this continent will prevent such a course that the people of Europe and of the world attending the Fair may see on this continent a model Christian Sabbath.

In harmony with the action of the General Conference, we recommend that all our ministers refer more frequently from the pulpit to the Scriptural Observance of the Lord's Day, and also that one or more sermons during the year be preached specially bearing upon this question.

We would also urge upon all Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues, and parents the importance of impressing upon the youthful mind the duty of remembering the Sabbath Day to keep it holy, that the rising generation may be trained to resist every effort made to destroy that reverence for the Sabbath that becomes a Christian nation.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

Re Memorial from the Sherbrooke St. Church, Montreal, suggesting the publication of a pamphlet in exp'ation of our Connexional Collections,

Your Committee consider the suggestion a valuable one, but would recommend that instead of a pamphlet, separate leaflets should be published showing the origin, necessity and present condition of each connexional fund, and that this Conference should respectfully request the Book Steward, the Rev. Dr. Briggs, to publish such leaflets, and that the Superintendents of Circuits and Missions should procure and distribute them at the times when such Connexional Collections are to be made; and that the Book Steward keep such leaflets on hand for sale.

Re Memorial from the Pembroke District Meeting regarding the reception of members, your Committee consider the provisions of the Discipline as being sufficiently explicit.

Re Memorial from the Perth District Meeting respecting the claim for superannuation allowance to Mrs. Brock Rose, widow of the late Rev. Brock Rose, we recommend the Superannuation Board that the allowance be continued in permanency, inasmuch as Bro. Rose received fifteen annual appointments from the Conference, and inasmuch as the Superannuation Board received and accepted fifteen annual payments in respect of his claim, which facts constitute a permanent claim in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline in force at the time of his death.

Re Memorial from the Perth District Meeting on the question of Prison Reform, your Committee would recommend that a standing Committee of four, two ministers and two laymen, should be appointed for the purpose of co-operating with other Committees which may be appointed by other Churches to urge upon the Provincial and Dominion Governments the reforms suggested by the Prison Reform Association.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We are pleased to note the encouraging and ever increasing growth of temperance sentiment throughout our country. Teetotalism has grown to be considered respectable, and has become the rule among those making claims to respectability. The word temperance is universally understood to mean the moderate and proper use of that which is good, and total abstinence from that which is evil, and hence total abstinence from one of earth's greatest curses—alcohol. Nor does it end here; we believe in total abstinence for the individual, and Prohibition for the State. That the people in general are in favor of this has of late been evidenced in various ways, notably the immense petitions, containing so many thousands of names, that poured into our Parliament recently asking for Prohibitory legislation.

As powerful aids to the cause of Temperance, we would refer to the various temperance organizations, calling especial attention to the W. C. T. U., yet not by any means forgetting the others.

We wish to remind all our voters, that, as Methodists, not to say Christians, we are bound to exercise our franchise on every possible occasion in favor of Prohibition, and never, on any account, to sign any document or cast our ballot in favor of license.

We take this opportunity also of affirming our confidence in the good effects of Local Option laws, such as the Dunkin and Scott Acts, being thoroughly convinced of their feasibility and practical utility, in addition to their beneficial educative influence.

We recommend the Conference to appoint four of its members as delegates to the annual meeting of the Dominion Alliance, to be held in the city of Montreal in September next.

In conclusion, while urging upon all the imperative duty of doing all that is possible, in any and every way, to save our fellow-men from the awful curse of rum, we would especially emphasize the importance of securing the names of all our Sabbath School children as pledged abstainers, and in this way, if in no other, we shall very soon have an army of Prohibitionists.

REPORT OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND COMMITTEE.

CONSTITUTION OF THE FUND.

1. The name of this Fund shall be, "The Sustentation Fund of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church."

2. The one object of this Fund shall be to supply those fields in our Home Work which are now, and shall hereafter be, known as "Domestic Missions," or "Dependent Circuits or Stations," so that ministers and preachers duly appointed to those fields shall be regular claimants on the Fund, and shall be entitled to supplemental grants therefrom, whenever their "total income" from other sources shall actually fall below the following scale of minimum allowances, viz.:—

For a single preacher on probation, \$300 per annum; for a single ordained minister, \$400 per annum; for a married minister, in full connexion, \$500 per annum, with \$25 for each subsequent year until his allowance reaches \$600 per annum.

N.B.—The term, "allowance" or "allowances," shall be understood as including only the items of ministerial support, viz., salary, board and fuel, exclusive of and in addition to any necessary charges for house rent, horse-keeping, travelling, removals, and circuit incidentals.

Note.—That in regard to the distribution of the money contributed to this Fund, the committee shall have discretionary power to make grants to ministers with families, even when the minimum allowance, \$600, is exceeded.

3. The income of this Fund shall consist of moneys raised within the bounds of our Conference, by collections and subscriptions on all the various Circuits and Missions, excepting the Indian and the French.

4. The general management of the Fund shall be entrusted to a Sustentation Fund Committee composed of one minister and one layman, elected by each annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the Committee; and this Committee shall transact the necessary business thereof at each annual Conference, in accordance with the following regulations:—

(a) With a view to raising the income needed, the Committee shall annually make a careful estimate of the prospective aggregate deficiencies on dependent fields, and suggest the amount desired from each District, in order to meet such deficiencies.

(b) In making grants from the Fund, the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned "Scale of minimum allowances." No claim shall be entertained which has not been recommended by the annual District Meeting; and all Quarterly Boards presenting claims for recommendation shall declare their inability to meet their "net deficiencies."

(c) Should the income of the Fund in any year prove insufficient to meet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to make up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to the aforementioned "scale," but should there be a surplus over the claims, as per said "scale," it shall be carried forward, and included in the income of the year next following.

(d) A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference annually, while in session, including a summary of business transacted, an audited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions deemed necessary to the interests of the Fund, said report, as adopted by the Conference, to be published in the Minutes.

5. That no application from any Circuit or Mission be entertained by the Committee unless that Circuit or Mission has made the most earnest efforts to secure at least twenty cents per member.

In order to obtain greater support for this important Fund, the Financial District Meetings are requested to arrange for the holding of platform meetings, and the appointment of deputations to advocate the claims of the Fund on all the Circuits and Missions.

We recommend that most earnest efforts be put forth in every Circuit and Mission to raise at least twenty cents per member for the Fund.

That the Secretary-Treasurer be Rev. J. T. Pitcher, for the coming year.

MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his studies and general reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman, and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year, and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and further, the standard qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the preliminary course of study in the aggregate, and thirty-three and one third per cent. in each subject. Also a standing of thirty-three and one-third per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course, and the Conference directs that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely pre-emptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any District writing on any given subject write at the same hour. The maximum time for each paper shall be two hours. No supplementary examination shall be allowed between the regular time of examinations and the close of Conference. Each Examiner is expected to send at least one copy of each examination paper to the Chairmen of Districts.

The Probationers of this Conference shall have their standing given them year by year in our Minutes, jointly, according to their years travelled and studies passed.

It is further recommended that in future each paper sent to the Examiners shall be endorsed by the Chairman of the District or his deputy.

The Church Property Committee recommends as follows :

MONTREAL DISTRICT.

Montreal First, St. James Church.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of St. James Church to sell the church property on St. Paul Street, the excess of proceeds, after paying indebtedness, to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on St. James Church.

Montreal First, St. James Church.—That permission be granted to the Trustees of St. James Church to sell the property on St. James Street, known as the Temple Building, proceeds to be applied to the liquidation of the debt on St. James Church.

Montreal Second.—That permission be given the Trustees of the parsonage on St. Antoine Street, Montreal, to sell said parsonage property, the proceeds to be applied to building a new parsonage.

PEMBROKE DISTRICT.

Beachburg.—That permission be given the Trustees of the old Church, in Beachburg, to sell the old church, the proceeds to be applied towards parsonage improvements.

NIPISSING DISTRICT.

Powassan.—That permission be given the Trustees of Powassan Church to sell the old church property, the proceeds to be applied to the erection of a new church in Powassan village.

QUEBEC DISTRICT.

Robinson Mission.—That permission be given the Trustees of the Brookbury Cemetery to sell the Cemetery property, and apply the proceeds towards purchasing another Cemetery.

Riviere du Loup.—That permission be given the Trustees of Riviere du Loup Church to sell a portion of the church lot, in rear of the church, 33x75 feet, and apply the proceeds towards Church improvement.

STANSTEAD DISTRICT.

Georgeville.—That permission be given the Trustees of Georgeville Church to sell the old church property, and apply the proceeds towards the erection of a new church at Georgeville.

WATERLOO DISTRICT.

Waterloo (French).—That Conference renew the permission, granted last year, to the Trustees of the French Mission property, at Waterloo, Quebec, to sell said property, and apply the proceeds to the liquidation of the indebtedness on the Mission property at Roxton Pond.

REPORT OF THE FRENCH METHODIST INSTITUTE, COTE
ST. ANTOINE STREET, MONTREAL.

The twelfth session of the French Methodist Institute, being the third since its amalgamation with the Girls' Boarding School, at Actonvale, and its removal to the new premises, Cote St. Antoine Street, has been full of encouragement.

The number of students in attendance has been 72—36 male and 36 female. Of this number, 15 have come from Roman Catholic families, and there have been Indians from Oka, Caughnawaga, the St. Regis tribe, and the Nipissing District.

The health of the pupils has been excellent and the manifest advantage which they derive from the social life in the Institute has been evident to all. When required, the valued medical skill of Drs. McConnell and Hutchinson has, as heretofore, been afforded gratuitously to the students.

The staff of the Institute has been marked by much efficiency and thoroughness, as evinced by the result of the examinations. The Rev. Leopold Massicotte, S.T.L., has won distinction for his mastery of French literature, and is an enthusiastic instructor. The Institute has been specially favored by the continued and most valuable service of Miss Masten, whose teaching power is rendered additionally valuable by reason of her religious and elevating influence over the students.

Conscientious and effective service has also been rendered by Miss May Tweedie, M.L.A., of Sackville, N.B.; Miss McKee in vocal music, and the Misses Hall in instrumental music.

Through the kindness of Miss Greta Finley and Miss Bessie Hall, the girls have received a weekly drill in calisthenics and have derived much profit therefrom.

To the members of the Douglas Mission Band the students have been indebted in many ways; for instruction in drawing and sewing; a very pleasant Thanksgiving Social and the annual Christmas celebration. The kindness of the trustees of Douglas Church is to be noted in providing accommodation for the students every Sunday morning.

Devotional services in French have been held in the Chapel of the Institute every Sunday evening with blessed results, over 20 students having professed conversion during the session. The Tuesday evening Class Meeting has been found very helpful in spiritual upbuilding, also the Prayer Meetings conducted by the pupils themselves, while the Literary Society, meeting fortnightly, has been the means of familiarizing the students with the art of public discussion.

The retrospect of the year just closed gives cause for much thanksgiving to God for the results attained, and it is universally felt that at length the Methodist Church has made a noble step forward in the educational work among the French of the Province of Quebec. The Institute commends itself to the sympathy and loyal support of the Methodism of the Dominion.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ST. LAWRENCE CENTRAL CAMP-GROUND.

Your Committee beg leave to report :—

1. That after enquiry into the facts relating to the present embarrassment of the St. Lawrence Central Camp Ground, your Committee find that its financial condition is substantially as shown in the printed statement by the Auditors already in the hands of members of this Conference.

2. That the contributions from circuits in the several Conferences, as reported to date, amount to \$1,712.28, leaving the indebtedness still to be provided for, \$7,113.25. This sum may be further reduced by the sale of the Camp-ground property, which your Committee think should bring \$1,000.

3. That, in the judgment of your Committee, the honor of the Methodist Church demands that it come to the rescue of brethren who, through connexional loyalty and devotion, have become financially involved.

4. That hitherto a comparatively small number of circuits have contributed to the Camp-ground relief fund; and that, should all respond as liberally as the minority have done, ample provision would be made for the remaining indebtedness.

Your Committee respectfully recommend :—(a) That an appeal be made for aid, before the end of December next, to all circuits within the bounds of this Conference, which have not already responded, and that this matter be laid before the Financial District Meetings; (b) That the Camp-ground property be sold as soon as practicable, without undue sacrifice, and the proceeds applied to the reduction of the indebtedness; (c) That the Conference appoint the following Camp-ground Committee, to consult with and aid the Trustees, in conjunction with similar Committees which may be appointed by the Bay of Quinte and other Annual Conferences :

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DEACONESSES.

Your Committee met and after careful consideration of the documents submitted to them beg to recommend :—

1. The Conference to take immediate steps to establish a Deaconess Home and Training School in the city of Montreal in accordance with the action of the General Conference. (See Journal of Gen. Conf., 1890, p. 321, paragraph 5.)

2. The object shall be (a) to give instruction in the Bible and in the work of Home and Foreign Missions, and to furnish facilities for such instruction; (b) to train nurses for the sick; (c) to provide a Christian home and secure practical training for evangelistic work by engaging in city mission work.

3. The government shall be placed in the hands of a Board of Management which shall consist of the President of Conference, the Chairman of Districts, *ex officio*, with five ministers and five laymen, resident in the city of Montreal, and twenty ladies, eight of whom shall be selected from Montreal and twelve from the leading centres of the Conference.

4. The officers shall be as follows :—(1) President, the President of the Conference *ex officio*; (2) Vice-President (a lady resident in Montreal); (3) Secretary; (4) Corresponding Secretary (who shall be a lady); (5) Treasurer; (6) Executive Committee shall, for the present, consist of the Officers and the members of the Board of Management resident in Montreal.

5. The Annual Meeting shall be held during the first week of May. Special meetings may be held at the call of the President or by request of five members of the Board of Management.

6. This constitution may be altered or amended at any regular meeting of the Board by two-thirds of the members present and voting thereon, notice of proposed amendment having been given at a previous meeting.

ARTICLE I.

The President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, shall preside at all the meetings of the Board of Managers. In the absence of both the meeting may elect its own chairman.

ARTICLE II.

The Secretary shall keep a record of the doings of the meetings of the Board of Managers, and notify members of all meetings.

ARTICLE III.

The Treasurer shall keep an accurate account of all receipts in money or supplies and of all disbursements, and pay all bills approved by the Finance Committee, and make an annual report at the annual meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE IV.

The Auditor shall annually examine the accounts of the Treasurer and report the result of his examination at the annual meeting of the Board.

ARTICLE V.

The Board of Managers shall have the general management of the property of the Board, and the current expenses of the Home and Training School, act on all applications for admission to the same, select the Superintendent and such other assistants as may be needed, and have the oversight of them, prescribe courses of study, and furnish adequate instruction for the Training School. It shall hold regular meetings, monthly, on the third Tuesday of each month, and special meetings may be held at the call of the President. The Board of Managers shall appoint annually the following Committees:—

1. Committee on Finance.
2. Committee on Applicants.
3. Committee on Regulation of the Home and on City Mission Work.
4. Committee on Purchasing Supplies and Furnishings for the Home.
5. Committee on Instruction.

ARTICLE VI.

The Board of Managers shall report its doings at each regular meeting of the Montreal Conference.

7. Rules for admission of candidates:—(1) Candidates shall be required to furnish satisfactory recommendations from their pastors and the official boards of the Church to which they belong, and a health certificate from a physician; (2) None shall be admitted as candidates who are more than forty or less than twenty-three years of age, except by vote of the Managers; (3) All persons approved by the Board of Management shall be admitted to the home for three months. After serving this period satisfactorily they may be accepted on probation, provided it be their intention to ultimately seek admission to the Office of Deaconess; (4) All who are admitted to the Home shall consent to observe the established rules and regulations, and to abide by the decisions of the Superintendent, cheerfully giving all their time to the work assigned them. A register shall be prepared containing these rules and each candidate shall sign it on admission.

8. The probable cost for the commencement is estimated at \$100.00 per month, which we recommend shall be raised by the fees of those who are admitted, by donations and by bequests. For the purpose of raising this

sum, superintendents of Circuits are recommended that committees of ladies be formed in every Circuit and Mission. Each such committee shall appoint one of their number who shall be *ex officio* a corresponding member of the Home.

B. In relation to the Memorials concerning irresponsible Evangelists presented by several Districts and referred to the Committee for consideration,

Your Committee are of the opinion that the immediate establishment of such a Home and Training School, as that which is recommended in the former part of this report, would very speedily furnish the Conference with a supply of such Evangelists as would put an end to the evils complained of in said Memorials.

After carefully considering the request of Chief Timothy for aid in erecting a Methodist Church at Oka, your Committee recommend that the Chairman of the Montreal District, Chief Timothy, and one other person to be nominated by said Chairman, form a Committee to secure, if possible, a site of unquestionable title, on which to erect a church, and that the Conference shall do all in its power to help our Indians in the building of the proposed church.

The Rev. W. Blair, B.A., presented the report of Alma College, St. Thomas, and the Rev. F. Chisholm read the report of Albert College, Belleville.

A report from Rev. W. H. Withrow, D.D., of the Sunday School work under his care, was read by the Secretary.

Various communications were received and referred to appropriate Committees.

A communication from the Single Tax Association was received and laid on the table.

Reports not appearing in Minutes have been filed with Conference papers.

TOBACCO.

Moved by Rev. W. Henderson, seconded by Rev. E. S. Howard, and

Resolved,—Whereas there is a great increase generally in the use of tobacco, and especially among young boys, and as practical scientists who have recently analyzed it in the natural state, discover some six (6) per cent. of nicotine and other swift and deadly poisons, leading by its use to several diseases, and as it also tends to intellectual and moral deterioration, and is worse than a waste of money, that may be put to noble uses.

Therefore we respectfully entreat all the members of our Church and Congregations to no longer use that which is poisoning and impoverishing so many, and to resolve through divine grace and the exercise of reason to entirely abandon its use.

And we heartily approve of the recent legislation of the Ontario government in prohibiting the sale of it to all persons under age.

OPIUM.

Moved by Rev. H. F. Bland, seconded by J. M. Oxley, Esq., and

Resolved,—Whereas the opium vice is the most appalling evil now working for the destruction of the race, and is the greatest antagonistic force to Christian missions.

And, whereas this evil is largely attributable to the influence of the Indian Government in the production and manufacture of this deleterious drug.

And, whereas the Christian conscience of England is being awakened on this subject, and is now seeking by legislative action to secure the abolition of this diabolic traffic. Be it

Resolved,—That this Montreal Methodist Conference hereby tenders to British Christians its moral support, and pledges its prayers for the entire and speedy removal of this terrible hindrance to the Master's kingdom.

REV. W. J. HEWITT.

Moved by Rev. W. Henderson, seconded by Rev. W. H. Sparling, B.A., and

Resolved,—That we extend to Rev. W. J. Hewitt our sympathy in his personal afflictions leading to his superannuation. We recognize the faithful services rendered to the Church, part in the North-West, and assure him and his family of an interest in our prayers.

PRISON REFORM.

Moved by Rev. W. H. Emsley, seconded by Rev. Thos. Griffith, Ph.D. and

Resolved,—That we hereby approve of the ten resolutions adopted by the Provincial Prison Reform Conference held in Toronto, November 27th, 1891; that the same is commended to the favorable consideration of our legislators, both Dominion and Provincial, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Corresponding Secretary Prisoners' Aid Association, to be forwarded to the Hon. Sir John S. D. Thompson, Minister of Justice, and to the Hon. Oliver Mowat, Attorney General, Province of Ontario.

COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION AND SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Moved by Rev. J. M. Hagar, M.A., seconded by Rev. E. B. Ryckman, M.A., D.D., and

Resolved,—That this Conference affirms its belief that the opening of the Columbian Exposition on the Sabbath would be a violation of the sanctity of the Lord's Day and a triumph for those forces which work to the moral deterioration of the civilization of our times, and hereby memorializes the Dominion Government, respectfully requesting them to cause the Dominion Exhibits to be closed to the public on the Lord's Day.

DEACONESS HOME.

It was moved by Rev. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. W. H. Emsley, and

Resolved,—That any persons desirous of helping personally and financially in the promotion of the Deaconess Home and Training School, during the present year, are earnestly requested to communicate with the Rev. H. F. Bland, Cornwall, Ont., who shall have power to request the President to call a meeting of the ministers in Montreal, should the communications be of such a character, as in his judgment, to warrant such a step.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE, WHITBY.

The Secretary read the report of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby, which on motion was received.

Rev. A. Lee Holmes, M.A., moved, seconded by Rev. S. D. Chown, the following resolution, which was carried:—

That this Conference has heard with great pleasure the report of the Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College, Whitby. We rejoice in the success which has attended its labors during the past eighteen years, and that with a wider curriculum and a stronger staff of teachers it is prepared to perpetuate such success in the future. We heartily commend the College to our people, and bespeak for it the patronage it deserves.

Re DEGREES.

In relation to the recognition of Academic Titles, the Board of Examiners recommends:

1. That all Degrees from Canadian Universities and Theological Colleges be recognized in the Conference records.
2. That continued recognition be given to all Degrees recognized in the Minutes of 1891.
3. That in the case of foreign Degrees, on the same being reported to the Board of Examiners, recognition shall be given by not less than a two-thirds vote of the Examiners present at the Annual Meeting. Action may be delayed by the Board calling for further information, or for production of the Calendars of the Colleges concerned, or of the Diplomas.
4. Diplomas shall in no case be recognized from so-called "Correspondence Colleges," which have no provision for lectures and for instruction of resident students.

ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

Moved by Rev. T. G. Williams, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. W. Ryan, and

Resolved,—That this Conference has received with great pleasure the communication addressed thereto by Rev. B. F. Austin, B.D., Principal of Alma College, St. Thomas. The Conference rejoices that this institution is still increasing year by year in efficiency, and excels as one of the very best of the agencies for the Christian education of the young ladies of our Church and country. The Conference prays that the future of Alma College may be still more abundantly successful than the past.

It was *Resolved*,—That the following resolution, passed at a former Conference session, be retained in the printed Minutes as a standing resolution: "That the Librarian of the Wesleyan Theological College be requested to take the custody of completed District Journals and other Church documents of valuable historical interest, to be deposited in the Library of said institution, and to be accessible at all times to members of this Conference."

MINISTERS MOVING RESPONSIBLE FOR SUPPLY OF PULPITS THEY ARE LEAVING.

It was *Resolved*,—That each Circuit Superintendent be responsible for the filling of the pulpit on the Circuit from which he is moving two Sabbaths after the close of this Conference.

Rev. Mr. Bayne, and Rev. Mr. Knowles, Presbyterian ministers, of Pembroke, were introduced and briefly addressed the Conference; also Rev. S. N. McAdoo, formerly of the Montreal Conference, and the Rev. Dr. Barrass.

ADDRESS
OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES
UNDER ITS CARE.

The sessions of our Annual Conference furnish the occasion for the issue of the usual address to our membership. We accordingly greet you, dear brethren and sisters in the Lord Jesus, with assurances of our affection and profound interest in your highest well-being.

The Church year, the events of which we are now reviewing in our annual gathering, has been crowded with reminders of the brevity of life, and the necessity of buying up opportunities for service while the day lasts. The ranks of the ministry have been frequently invaded by death. Some whose brows were whitened by the snows of age have laid down the banner of the cross which they had long and proudly carried. Brethren in all the wealth of the maturing wisdom of middle age, and rejoicing in the love and confidence of their people, have "ceased at once to work and live." Others, in the very morning of life's day of activity, have been summoned from labor to reward. "These all died in faith," leaving behind them reputations for fidelity and Christlikeness, and calling upon us to be "followers of those who, through faith and patience, have inherited the promises."

Nor has death visited the pastorate only. The membership has suffered seriously, in many quarters, from the departure of earnest and efficient workers for the Lord Jesus. Vacant seats in the sanctuary, empty chairs by the fireside, hushed voices in the social means of grace, will remind us, for months to come, of those whom God has taken. Let there be no undue or improper grief at their removal from the midst of us. Our Lord checked excessive grief at His prospective departure from His disciples by the gentle rebuke, "If ye loved Me, ye would rejoice, because I said, I go unto My Father." What was true of Him is true of those whose absence we mourn. Nor is it too much to believe that, as the withdrawal of Christ's visible presence from the Church gained larger benedictions for His followers than His prolonged continuance in the body could have secured, so the departure from earth to bliss of those whose work is done here, opens to them larger opportunities for service to the Redeemer's kingdom than they could have rendered by abiding longer with us in the tabernacle of the flesh.

"Better a death, when work is done, than earth's most favored birth;
Better a child in God's great home, than the king of all the earth."

"For we know that if our earthly house of this tabernacle were dissolved, we have a building of God, an house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." (2 Cor. v. 1.)

Our hearts have been cheered by tidings of revivals in different parts of our Conference territory. Our profound regret is that these "showers of blessing" have not been more copious and more general. It is an alarming fact, worthy of our most candid and sorrowful consideration, that additions to the Church's membership from heathenism and the ranks of what we are accustomed to call the "lapsed masses," are out of all proportion to the increase gained from the homes and congregations of our most highly favored communities. It would sometimes seem as if conversions were in an inverse ratio to the gospel blessings bestowed. Our Lord's prediction concerning His own people would appear to be in process of fulfilment in our time: "Many shall come from the east and west, and shall sit down with Abraham, and Isaac, and Jacob, in the kingdom of heaven. But the children of the kingdom shall be cast out into outer darkness." (Matt. viii. 11, 12.) Why is this? Are our methods for the conversion of "the children of the kingdom" inadequate? Is our alarm too slight, our zeal too languid, our grace too small? A Methodist Church, which is doing no aggressive work for Christ, is surely painfully unequal to its opportunity. But the Church which is powerless to win the children of its homes and the unsaved of its congregations to Jesus, does well to inquire deeply into causes of decline and to do again its first works. Let us, as pastors and people, resolve with God's help that a revival of pure religion shall crown the labors of His servants in the coming year upon every appointment.

One of the contributing causes to a great revival will be a careful and diligent study of the Holy Scriptures; not a mere reading of them, but a painstaking study of their contents. To this we earnestly exhort you. Attacks upon the inspiration and authority of the Bible are painfully common. These are a sign of the theological unrest and religious doubt which characterize our times. There is nothing to fear, however, for that believer to whom the Word of God is a rule of practice, and not a mere storehouse of doctrine and history. Our Lord's declaration is in place here: "If any man willeth to do His will, he shall know of the teaching whether it be of God." (John vii. 17.) As the truths of the Bible were first of all experimentally realized before they were recorded for our instruction, so it is intended that the precepts of the blessed volume should be translated into action by those to whom they are given. This is the best preventive and cure of scepticism. "If ye know these things, happy are ye if ye do them." In whatever particulars the Scriptures may or may not be infallible, their inerrancy has been tested by millions as a guide to Jesus, to holiness, to heaven. As such we commend them to you. Obey them and you will believe in them; for if it be true, as all confess, that creeds modify and fashion conduct, it is not less certain that conduct does much in determining the complexion of one's creed. Duty well done will be influential in developing correct dogma.

As an aid to a right study of the Bible, we shall do wisely to read with care books which treat of its origin, purpose, doctrine and history. Indeed it is important that we should give attention to our reading as a whole, that it be so wisely ordered that the Holy Scriptures may have the first place in our studies, and that our pursuit of general literature be such as shall tend to develop personal piety and those nobler, mental and moral

traits upon which the Word of God insists, as essential to our truest well-being. There is much need of caution and wisdom here. Books were never so cheap or so widely read. But doubtful and skeptical literature was never more plentiful. The seeds of unbelief are scattered broadcast, and fasten themselves in the fruitful soil of youthful minds. To nothing should we give more earnest heed than to the books our children read. Of what avail is it that we preserve our boys and girls from evil companions upon the street, and surround our homes with wholesome influences, if the books they read introduce them into fellowship with the "unfruitful works of darkness?" Mrs. Browning utters a warning which we cannot afford to treat lightly :

"Sublimest danger, over which none weeps,
When any young wayfaring soul goes forth
Alone, unconscious of the perilous road,
The day-sun dazzling in his limpid eyes,
To thrust his own way, he an alien, through
The world of books. . . .
Behold ! the world of books is still the world ;
And worldlings in it are less merciful
And more puissant. For the wicked there
Are winged like angels. Every knife that strikes
Is edged from elemental fire to assail
A spiritual life. The beautiful seems right
By force of beauty, and the feeble wrong
Because of weakness. Power is justified,
Though armed against St. Michael."

It is the aim of our Book Steward and connexional editors to furnish proper mental food to our people. Let them have our prayers and assistance in the prosecution of this most important work.

May we venture to direct your prayerful attention to the subject of systematic beneficence ? We rejoice in the liberality of our people, but the conviction deepens that better results would be secured in this direction, and at the expense of less friction, if there were a more general recognition of the obligation to devote to the Most High one-tenth of our revenue and one-seventh of our time.

And this leads us to renew our appeals that you resist all efforts which have for their object the secularization of the Lord's day. To take this day from the working-man, under the pretence of securing his freedom from ecclesiastical tyranny, is to commit robbery in a most flagrant form, as well as to dishonor the God who made the Sabbath for man. The attitude recently taken by our Dominion Legislature in reference to this question, and the expressed intention to still further disturb the quiet of our sea-ports on the Sabbath by the starting of vessels on their voyages upon this holy day are symptomatic of a careless and diseased condition of public opinion. Nor can we view without alarm the increase of travel upon the Lord's day by many of our people. Journeys are begun and ended on the day of rest for reasons often trivial and selfish. National sins must bring national punishment, and the violation of the divine law which secures one-seventh of our time for rest and Christian service will undoubtedly bring upon us the divine disapprobation. Perhaps we

should seek wisely for absence of commercial prosperity in the practice of our national transgressions.

The growth of interest, on the part of our young people, in their mental and spiritual improvement, and the general welfare of the Church, as witnessed in the rapid increase of young people's societies, is very cheering. We gladly recognize in this movement an encouraging sign of the times. These societies must be held closely to the Church by the bonds of holy sympathy and affection. Should mutual jealousies arise between the younger and older sections of our membership, great mischief will result, and a movement so potential for good will prove equally powerful for evil. Let our young people remember that they are banded together "for Christ and the Church," and that they show their truest loyalty to either by pure devotion to both.

We cannot omit reference, more brief than its importance merits, to our class-meetings. Discouraging reports of attendance upon these means of grace in some quarters reach us. Let us be true to our traditions in this regard. We cannot afford to permit our social means of grace to fall into neglect. Let us make them better; then our people will be constrained to attend them.

We have reason to believe, that with comparatively few exceptions, the members of our Church respect and observe the rules of the Church in relation to amusements, and feel themselves bound, by their own voluntary act in becoming members, to refrain from recreations and amusements which, in the judgment of spiritually-minded persons in all Christian churches, are incompatible with a spirit of consecration to God and His service. The rules of our Church, as interpreted by the General Conference, are sufficiently explicit in pointing out such recreations as cannot be used in the name of the Lord Jesus, specially emphasizing games of chance, such, for instance, as card playing, together with dancing, theatre-going, horse-racing and similar sports. We earnestly exhort our young people to guard themselves against the insidious spirit of worldiness characteristic of the age in which we live, and which at this point, more, perhaps, than any other, seeks to betray young Christians into practices which are peculiarly adapted to lower the tone of their spirituality, and limit their influence for good.

The full and interesting reports, presented elsewhere in the Minutes, treat of other matters of great moment which we must leave untouched in this address. We commend to your special attention the Report of the Committee on Temperance, and implore you to give effect to its suggestions so far as you may. Let the reports of the Sustentation and Superannuation Funds receive your best thought. Our Missionary and Educational Societies will, we trust, continue to obtain at your hands the generous encouragements of the past. Heed should be given to the facts and suggestions which the reports of the Committees on the State of the Work and our Sabbath Schools contain.

And now, dear friends, we close by reminding ourselves and you that "Applied Christianity," the Christianity which exhibits itself at home as well as abroad, in the market-place and street as well as in the sanctuary, is the need of the hour. Our holy religion stands in greater need of witnesses than of advocates. The best apology for our faith is not the

scholarly treatise by the learned professor, but the consistent life which mirrors forth the character of Jesus. Men would see Jesus. Where have they the right to look for Him if it be not in the doctrines which the pulpit proclaims, and the lives of those who profess to translate these doctrines into behaviour? Christianity has less to fear from its avowed enemies than from its languid and inconsistent friends. With no Judas to betray, and no Peter to deny, the Church may well bid defiance to her foes. The citadel is safe if no traitors lurk within. It is ours by well-doing to put to silence the ignorance of foolish men. May the new Conference year be one of largest blessing to us all, and may the "God of peace, that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ; to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen." (Heb. xiii. 20, 21.)
