Petrograd, May 12, via London—An earnest plea for the continuation of the war or after, including the war until German militarism is overthrown was made by Feodor I, Roditcheff, Governor-General of Finland, at an extraordinary session of the Duma.

"The alliance of free peoples is directed against the oppression of imperation and militarism. We must therefore be stoically faithful to it. We have been told that peace would come from democracy and no one has a greater desire for peace than myself, but when the enemy tramples our country under foot the duty of democracy and of every one who desires peace is to struggle against the enemy and drive him from our territory.

London, May 18—"Since May 2, no events of importance have occurred in Mesopotamia," says an official statement issued today. "Our mobile columns operating in the basins of the Shatt-El-Adhem and Diala Rivers have pressed the enemy back into the Jebel-Hamrin range, which runs in a northwesterly and southeasterly direction some sixty to eighty miles from Bagdad.

SAYS ALL CIVILIZATION MUST RISE UP AGAINST T.E TEUTONS

Mr. Balfour Moves New York Audience to High Enthusiasm-Germans Attempt to Put the World Under Foot

New York, May 12—In his speech at the banquet here last night, Rt. Hon. A. J. Balfour moved his hearers to high enthusiasm when he said:—

"We have not come here as instructors of the American republic, but it is important for me to proclaim my unalterable conviction that we have reached a crisis when the whole of civilization must rise up and voice its appeal for the preservation of human liberty.

"What has brought us together?" he asked. "What is the meaning to be found in the crowding of your streets in welcome to us?"

"The answers lay in the fact he said, that America has felt the menace of German autocracy which he characterized as an "imminent and over-mastering of the world that war has been made more heinous than ever. There is not a difference in any part of the world that

For women who register as teachers in this course, no fee will be required.




Canada was the apple campaign of 1914. Its purpose was to increase the domestic consumption of Canadian apples in order to make up for the loss of foreign mar-kets through the war. The food and other values of the Canadian apple were presented attractively in educational advertisements and a booklet of apple recipes was offered. There were 65,000 individual requests for that booklet, and at the close of the campaign many wholesale apple dealers reported increases in the sale of Canadian apples for domestic consumption of from 200 to 400

of the war and to suggest means of meeting that need. The campaign resulted in an increase of over 10 per cent. in the area under cultivation, and, in continuous continuous and the continuous contin junction with good weather conditions, in record yields per acre. The value of Canada's farm production for 1915 was over \$20,000,000 in excess of the previous high record. Over 100,000 special bulletins offered in the advertisements were

requested by farmers.

"Three domest ic war loans have been floated in Canada, through educational advertising instead of through the cusadvertising instead of through the customary method of underwriting. The aggregate amount asked for in these loans was \$250,000,000; more than double that amount was subscribed. The underwriting of these loans would have cost \$3,000,000. The advertising of the three loans cost about \$130,000.

"The need of thrift and savings in view of the war was emphasized in a series of government advertisements. This series was followed by the advertising of government war loans, debenture stock and war saving certificates. ture stock and war saving certificates. Here is the plight of a large city still under license:

The result of alcohol is to breed vice and crime and to cause both mental and physical inefficiency among men. The license system has been a sickening failure. For a typical instance, listen to Governor Foss of Massachusetts: "In the last fifteen years (Boston) the arrests for drunkenness have increased from 18,000 to 57,000, 300 per cent.! Over 60 per cent. of all the arrests in Boston are for drunkenness. It is very evident that our license system in Boston has increased drunkenness instead of checking it.'


