"Perhaps one of the most historical events that ever happened in the annals of organized labor occurred when the board of governors of the Pension Association decided upon putting into effect the widows' pension.

"We believe we are the first of the railroad labor organizations, if not of any of the labor organizations, to pension the widows of the pension members for life, and we think it marks a distinct step forward in the history of organized labor, and one that will perhaps have a more far-reaching effect than any other single action of the many activities of the brotherhood.

"Eventually we hope that some plan will be worked out whereby not only the widows of the pension members, but also the widows of all members of the brotherhood, will be pensioned from the date of the death of their insbands."



The Executive of the St. John Assocation for the Prevention of Tuberculosis begs to present its annual report of work done from November 1, 1922, to November 1, 1923.

One hundred and seventy-seven clinics have been held at the Dispensary the during the year. There were 1,288 attendances at these clinics, compared to 835 of the preceding year. All these applicants were examined, discharged as non-tubercular, or sent to the County Hospital or River Glade, or treated at home and visited by the nurses. In this last year there have teen 422 new patients and 546 old petients have been discharged. Eleven patients have died. The nurses have made 2,948 visits to patients, a great advance over preceding years.

The striking features of the year are the increase in the work and attendance at clinics, and the urgent need of raising money to cover our expenses. The association is fortunate in having the present excellent quarters in the Health Centre, and in having secured Miss Alice Hegan and retained Miss Brophy. Dr. Farris has given X-Ray examinations at cost price to patients. Dr. Abramson has done laboratory work free of charge, and the city pays for treatment at River Glade for patients who cannot afford the expense.




