N. B. AND MATTER OF THE EXPORT OF OUR PULPWOOD

(Canadian Press.)
Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 26.—The Underwood resolution now before the United States Senate, which calls for the appointment of a commission looking towards the removal of the embargo on the exportation of pulpwood from Canada to the United States, was before the provincial government at their meeting here.

Premier Foster declined to say what action would be taken, beyond saying that New Brunswick would be represented when any negotiations were actually commenced and the position of this province in the matter would be set forth.

"It might be well to point out," the premier added, "that the American interests holding leases on crown lands in this province look out their present leases when renewals were made a few years ago, at a time when they had a full knowledge of conditions as they exist today, as there was an embargo in effect in this province at that time. Just as there is today. In that respect conditions so far as they affect New Brunswick, are different from other provinces which have perpetual leases."

Reports on Work Submitted at Annual Meeting Held Today.

The annual meeting of the Women's Hospital Aid Association was held this afternoon in the board of trade rooms. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, the president, was in the chair, and the other officers, including Mrs. J. Boyle Travers, secretary, and Mrs. C. S. Sanford, treasurer, were present.

The reports from the denominational vice-presidents were evidence of the last year having been a most successful one with much accomplished. The treasurer reported that there was something more than \$4000 in the treasury. The denominational vice-presidents are: Mrs. Stewart Skinner, Church of England; Mrs. J. Verner McAllan, Methodist; Mrs. J. H. Doody, Catholic; Mrs. J. H. Jenner, Baptist; Miss Christine McEllan, Presbyterian; and Mrs. Flewelling, Congregationalist.

Their work is a most important one, as it deals with the circumstances of the patients as they are discharged from the hospital. When a patient is recovered, the hospital reports the fact to the vice-president of the particular denomination. If the circumstances are such that assistance is necessary, the vice-president reports the case to the church and the matter is taken care of and assistance sent until the patient is completely recovered.

Besides a large amount of routine business transacted the election of officers for the ensuing year took place. Much pleasure was expressed at the meeting among the members of the association, at the idea of having a new nurses' home erected.

DROPS CONTROL OF SUGAR PRICE

Ottawa, Feb. 26.—(Canadian Press)—The control by the Board of Commissioners of Canada of the price of sugar is abolished today for the specified purpose of proving whether or not the control has been effective in keeping down excess profits, and the fixed price of sixteen cents a pound at the refineries no longer obtains.

LUMBER MARKET CONTINUES FIRM

High Prices Rule in New England Market—Provincial Mills Not Eager to Sell.

Boston, Feb. 24.—For spruce dimension the demand has been slack for some days. From buyers in the immediate neighborhood wholesalers have received no orders and very few inquiries but this, of course, surprises no one. Railroad embargoes and the condition of the streets furnish an explanation.

There has been enough negotiation nevertheless to test the temper of the market and it has proved firm. The base price asked by all the great mills is \$38. It is only very easy dimensions that may be bought for less than the small producers.

The outlook for spring business is constantly discussed and opinions vary. About one factor in the situation, i. e., the shortage in houses, all are agreed. On this subject the Massachusetts Commission on the Necessaries of Life has this to say:

"The shortage of houses, especially of the better class moderate-priced accommodations, has everywhere reported, while the cost of building and repairs as well as taxes had continued to rise, the situation is relieved there is very little prospect of rents coming down. However, in progress in many centers."

Orders for random from the yards in or near Boston, or indeed anywhere else in New England, have been comparatively few ever since the great snowstorm and its many attendant inconveniences. Now that the weather is clearing, it seems reasonable to look for more normal trade conditions.

About prices the testimony is confusing. Some of the firms here in a large way of business find their connections in the provinces and, consequently, vary. On this subject the Massachusetts Commission on the Necessaries of Life has this to say:

"Orders for random from the yards in or near Boston, or indeed anywhere else in New England, have been comparatively few ever since the great snowstorm and its many attendant inconveniences. Now that the weather is clearing, it seems reasonable to look for more normal trade conditions."

Some firms reject with scorn bids for 2x4s of less than \$55, while others gladly take \$45 and sometimes rather reluctantly accept \$35. For 2x10s it is not easy to find a buyer just now, and a note \$44 per board foot for Maine sawed lumber at so low a price.

For good clipped hemlock boards \$30 is one and the new price today. About the random lengths it is harder to speak with certainty. Some recent business is said to have been done at \$46 and \$48.

There are many people trying to solve the problems suggested by the late situation, but no one feels sure that he has been successful. It is possible not altogether improbable perhaps, that some of the general people here who have contracted for the output of New Brunswick mills up to June next sometimes take. There are others who regret that they did not buy more. About quoting prices for the white cedars, there is just now. There is no doubt that it is possible to buy 1 1/2 inch at \$15 Boston rate. The highest spruce at which sales have been made in the Middle West is involved in uncertainty.

Some manufacturers feel very independent about furring. For two inches they are quoted at \$54 but as yet there is no word of their having received so much. They have competitors that are still quoting \$50.

The demand for shingles has not been more active this week than that for other descriptions of lumber. The market in other words has been very quiet. There is no change to record for the present season for the white cedars, there are still very good extras to be had for \$35.00 but there are manufacturers who will not stand \$28.

In the red cedars there is so little interest shown just now that it is hard to say just what buyers would be willing to pay for them.

For the reasons assigned several times last week it is impossible to give a price for spruce clapboards.

The prices for lumber immediately following are those at which retailers are selling. Spruce refers to lumber, eight to twenty feet in length. For every one foot over a fraction of two feet over twenty feet \$1 is added when the sale is of dimension lumber.

BIG CAR ORDER FOR SCOTIA PLANT

Secures \$3,000,000 Worth of Business From Canadian National Railways.

(Montreal-Gazette)
Orders involving the supply of approximately \$3,000,000 have been awarded the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company by the Canadian National Railways, which will keep the Scotia car building subsidiary, the Eastern Car Company, operating to its capacity for some months to come.

John Irving, general sales manager of the two companies, who has been in the business in Toronto, on his return to Montreal, stated that the orders included the manufacture of 200 box cars and 500 general purpose cars, and that it was anticipated that further business would be forthcoming shortly which would make the Eastern Car Company plant operating to full capacity for the balance of the current year.

New business of substantial volume, Mr. Irving stated, had also been secured by the Scotia Steel and Coal Company, in addition to that booked for the Eastern Car subsidiary and present prospects indicated that the steel plant would be kept working at top pressure for the rest of the year.

ization of labor and transport conditions, combine to retard production and to restrict the exchange of products necessary for the proper sustenance of life and the rebuilding of the waste and destruction caused by the great war.

From every quarter of the world is being impressed, often by severe prices that increased production through increased works combined with thriftful economy in individual and state, is the only sure hope of business improvement and future prosperity.

After four years of war and a year and three months of confusion and dislocation which has succeeded thereto, it is satisfactory to know that business in Canada has been well maintained. The production has been large and the general conditions are on the whole satisfactory. The ratification of the international opinion convention renders it necessary to amend the legislation to carry into effect its provisions relating to the sale of opium, cocaine and other deleterious drugs. A bill will be laid before the house for that purpose.

These have been formed with a view to strict economy, having due regard to the requirements of the public service and the obligations of the country.





TRADE SITUATION

Transportation Difficulties a Great Handicap to Business.

(New York Evening Post.) Business over a wide area, involving both wholesalers and retailers, has been seriously hampered by traffic difficulties.

The effect of the long period of stormy weather has made local trucking almost impossible in some sections and has also curtailed rail traffic. The latter has also been greatly hampered by a striking shortage of cars. The latter, coupled with the resultant shortage of coal and raw materials, has restricted production.

Nevertheless, production has increased in iron and steel sections, but inability to ship has caused accumulation of finished material. Demand has continued good, especially for prompt deliveries, but uncertainty as to the car supply makes producers unwilling to promise shipments.

In some sections the stormy weather has checked retail business in dry goods, but at other places trade is brisk, with collections extremely good. The smaller collecting growing resistance to high prices among ultimate consumers and the fact that certain goods in primary markets are less willing to place orders for future deliveries at present or higher prices. Many are buying only to "fill in" and some are asking for guarantees against cancellations.

In some lines there are signs of more pronounced self importation. Arrivals to arrive up current.

Bradstreet's says: "There are many cross currents in the trade and financial situation, preventing some of the generalizations that were possible one, two or three weeks ago when the commercial machine was slowing down from the swift pace of mid-January and the favorable developments are to be noted this week.

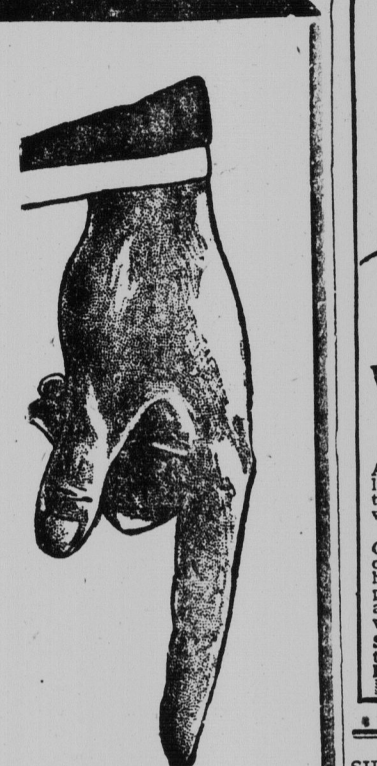

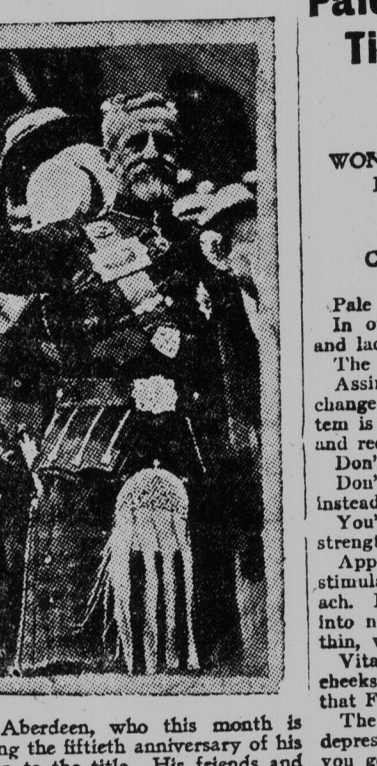

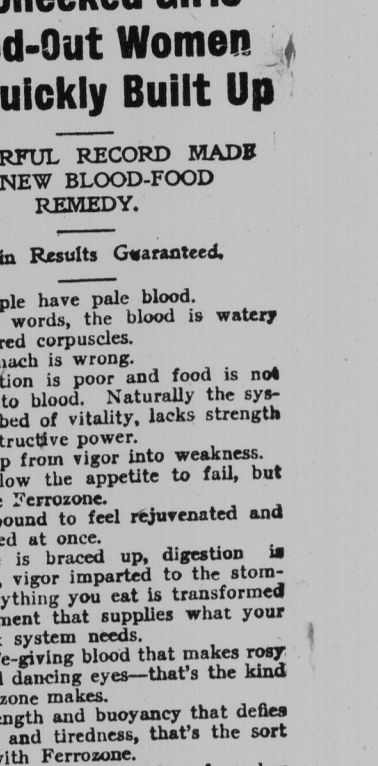

NEW YORK EXPERTS DOUBT FINDING OF MEXICAN PYRAMID

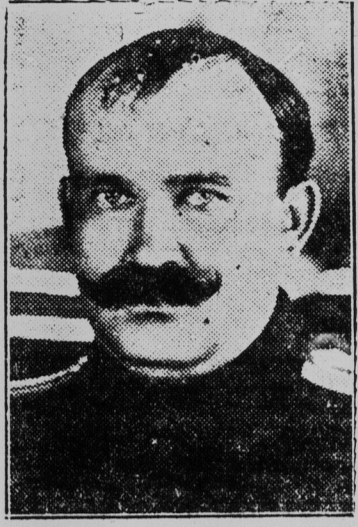
One Scientist Maintains It Would Have Been Impossible for Reported Find to Have Been Hidden.

New York, Feb. 26.—New York archaeologists who are familiar with conditions in the Mexican fields are inclined to doubt dispatches announcing the discovery of a giant pyramid near the City of Mexico. According to these reports a third pyramid has been found at Teotihuacan greater than those of the sun and moon, which rival those of Egypt and which have long increased and puzzled scientists.

Dr. H. J. Spinden, of the American Museum of Natural History, who has visited the ruins of Teotihuacan, said: "Country is open."

"I don't see how a greater pyramid could be discovered in that field, for the reason that it is all in an open country."

Apparently it would be impossible for such a giant pyramid to be hidden all these years. The pyramids of Teotihuacan are probably the best known of all the places of interest in Mexican archaeology. They have been visited by thousands of people, as they are less than fifty miles from the capital. For years the government has been conducting explorations in these ruins. Much of interest has been discovered, particularly in deep wells, such as the High Priest well, from which a great deal of valuable material was taken.

"I was talking recently with a man who has just returned from Mexico, and he informed me that a new and larger well than any yet discovered had been found. It may have been the official announcement of the discovery of this well which has been distorted into the discovery of another pyramid."

But while American scientists are inclined to doubt the discovery of another great pyramid on the site of Teotihuacan, it is admitted that all archaeological things are possible, not only in Mexico, but anywhere between the American border and the Panama canal.

Guatemala, previous to the way, was a wonderful field of research, the most notable work of recent years being done by Edgar L. Hewett, of the Institute of American Archaeology, who unearthed a buried city on the site of a jungle, where only a few mounds gave a key to the treasures that were buried underneath, including great temples with sacrificial altars and innumerable monuments inscribed with strange characters.

The violent earthquakes reported from Mexico the other day, which created a panic in the capital, and is said to have wrought great destruction to life and property in outlying places, gives a hint of the forces which may have buried these ancient cities and monuments of Mexico and adjoining countries, over which scientists are now puzzling. Killed 4,265 Moose.

PRUNING OF TREES.
To the Editor of The Times.

Sir—Many onlookers and owners of trees now look in dismay and ignorance on the destructive effects the recent storms of sleet and snow has placed on their much loved properties. We have pruned trees of many kinds for seventy years of steady unbroken practice of how best to perform the task, and from such experience can give some helpful hints to those who would like to know. To be successful in your efforts you must begin at once, as in this climate all pruning should begin before March comes in, as then the sap will make a

start to flow and thus weaken the trees; so the next few days should finish the job. All broken tips should be cut down with a slanting cut to where limbs are sound, and paint over with a brush of stiff oil paint at the time of sawing or cutting, or using a pruning knife—thus preventing decay effectively. Better than tar, as tar cracks in dry heat and extreme cold. The best tree to suit St. John's city growth, for sure growth and long life, is the elm, as it grows with vigor in rather spare but broken soil, also the roots and filaments should be carefully spread out with painstaking efforts, as bunched up clumping of the

roots in a small hole invites early death. The time of planting all trees of an kind here is the spring, as the fall is ever doubtful if not done early when the leaves begin to fade or discolor. Yours truly, J. S. CLIMO.

LOCAL NEWS

CUT AN ARTERY.
His numerous friends were pleased to learn that Captain K. J. MacRae of No. 1 Salvage Corps, was able to beat out his office duties again today, after having been laid up for about a week. He cut an artery in his foot on some broken glass while engaged at work at the Cameron fire in Charlotte street on last Thursday night.

PETRIE FOUND GUILTY.
The case of King vs. Thos. Petrie charged with theft of a camera, came up for trial in the county court this morning before Judge Macnaught. The accused was found guilty and remanded to jail, there being another charge against him. For some time appeared for the prisoner and C. H. Ferguson for the crown. The civil cases on the docket have been sorted and there being no further business before the court, the court adjourned sine die.

EXPECT DEFICIT WILL BE \$15,000

Each Storm Brings Expenditure for Snow Removal Higher—Extra Horses for Fire Stations.

Commissioner Fisher said this morning that up to Tuesday night the amount expended by the public works department for clearing the snow from the streets in connection with the street railway work amounted to about \$17,000. According to the report made by the power company the city received from the company \$8,300 a year for repairs and snow removal. As it is estimated that about \$4,000 will be required for repairs to the track sections next summer, it is expected the city's deficit in this regard alone will be in the vicinity of \$15,000. And this is, of course, dependent on the amount of snow which is yet to come.

The appropriation for other street work, including sweeping, opening catch basins, watering and snow removal from other streets not concerned in the street railway contract, is \$25,000, and although it is not definitely how much of this amount has been expended during the recent storms, it is expected that a good slice will be eliminated before the winter has passed.

The public safety department has also been put to extra expense by the necessity of having an extra team in each of the fire stations in the city. These teams were disposed of on Tuesday, but last night's storm made it necessary to have them returned in case of necessity.

REV. DR. MACRAE RESIGNS CHARGE

Is Going to Edinburgh for Course — Will Conduct Party on Tour of Europe.

Rev. Dr. Donald N. MacRae of Mitchell, Ont., son of the late Dr. Donald MacRae, one of the former esteemed ministers of Knox church, and a brother of K. J. MacRae of MacRae, Sinclair & MacRae, is resigning his pulpit to take a post graduate course in Edinburgh. For the coming summer he has accepted an invitation from The Temple Tours, Boylston street, Boston, to conduct early in April a party on an eight day trip through Europe, visiting France, Italy, Switzerland, the battlefields, Belgium, Britain, &c. A few Canadians desiring to go will be included in the party. Dr. MacRae is probably one of the most widely traveled ministers in Canada. Special features of the trip include an excursion to Versailles, a trip through the South of France along the Riviera, and by automobile to Nice, Monte Carlo, Genoa, Rome, Naples and steamer trip to Capri, the Blue Grotto and Sorrento, excursion from Venice to the Piave battle fields, steamer trips on Lakes Como, Lugano, Lucerne and Brienz, an ascent to the summit of the Rigi, and motor trips to Metz, Verdun, Argonne, Ypres, and through the Shakespearian country, the English Lakes and the Lochs of Scotland.

OFFER REFUSED

City Decided Not to Buy Lot in Kelly's Field — Taking Care of Future Cases.

The offer of Judge Armstrong of a lot in what is known as Kelly's field for \$500 was disposed of by the common council in committee this morning when a motion made by Commissioner Jones that the offer be rejected was carried.

Mr. Jones said that there was a public sewer running under this lot and the question had been raised as to the power of the city to enter for the purpose of making repairs. In view of the opinions expressed by the city engineer and city solicitor, as contained in letters read at a recent meeting, he thought the city should not buy the lot unless it was needed for some purpose. The motion carried unanimously.

In order that the city should have some guide to action in future cases of similar character, Commissioner Jones moved that hereafter the building inspector be required, before issuing a building permit, to ascertain from the applicant whether or not a public sewer has been constructed through the lot upon which it is proposed to erect any structure, and in every such case report to the council such circumstances and withhold his permit for building until the council has had an opportunity to consider and deal with the matter.

Mr. Fisher seconded the motion and suggested that the building inspector be furnished with a plan of the sewerage system to guide him. The motion was carried.

SUGGEST TAKING PLEBISCITE ON DAYLIGHT SAVING

Matter Taken Up by Commissioners This Morning — A Public Meeting.

Whether or not the daylight saving scheme would be adopted by the city generally this year was discussed by the city commissioners at the committee meeting held in city hall this morning. Commissioner Jones introduced the matter. He said some means should be taken to prevent the confusion of last year. He moved that representatives of the Retail Merchants' Association, Trades & Labor Council, school trustees and other public bodies meet with the council on Monday, March 8, to consider the question of the adoption of the scheme during the present season.

Mr. Thornton said that in view of the difference of opinion and the difficulty in ascertaining on which side the balance of public opinion lay, it would be more satisfactory to include this question in a plebiscite to be taken at the same time as the civic elections. The motion carried, it being decided to leave the question of a plebiscite until after the meeting.

WM. H. OLIVE MEETS DEATH IN MONTREAL

Member of Prominent St. John Family—Fataally Injured When Struck by Street Car.

Many old friends heard with much regret today the sad news from Montreal telling of the death of a former St. John man, William H. Olive, following injuries sustained in a street car accident while he was on his way to his office. Though it is quite a number of years since he had lived here, he was well remembered by many friends who feel keenest sympathy for his family.

Mr. Olive was born in this city not quite eighty-two years ago, a son of the late Isaac and Lorraine Olive. His father was one of the city's best known shipbuilders.

For some years Mr. Olive was connected with the Intercolonial railway here and later went to Montreal where he became general freight agent. Prior to his going with the I. C. R., he had been with the Eastern Steamship Company, or the International as it was then known, and at one time he was general traveling passenger agent with that company. His associations in both these capacities brought him in touch with many people and he made numerous friends in many parts of the country. On retiring from the Intercolonial he engaged in the insurance business, and became general agent for the Home Insurance Company of New York, with offices in Montreal.

Although well advanced in years he had always been particularly active, and had been in the habit of going to his office after retiring to his duties. With age, however, came a slight deafness, and it is thought that this contributed to the fatal accident. Two cars were approaching each other when he started to cross the street at the corner of Wood avenue and St. Catherine's, and when he passed behind one it is presumed he did not hear the other approaching. He was picked up unconscious and taken to the Western Hospital, where he died.

Mr. Olive is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Jennie, daughter of the late Alexander Sims of this city, and two sons, Arthur G. in Brantford, Ont., and W. H. A. in Montreal. Five brothers of his family are living—George M., a druggist in Cambridge, Mass.; E. Percé, photographer, of Boston, Mass.; John L., of Walling, N. S.; H. J., bus proprietor with the marine department here, and Frank H., of the Eastern Steamship Company, in St. John's. Mr. Olive, broker, and Mrs. R. McGearty of this city are nephew and niece.

In his earlier days Mr. Olive was one of St. John's most active and popular young men. His visits made here after going to Montreal, where he went soon after the big fire here in '77, he renewed his friendship with old acquaintances who were always glad to see him. His last visit here was about three years ago. He was well known as is known in St. John, a member of any society except the Royal Arcanum, of which he was one of the founders in this city. Since going to Montreal he had become very well known there, and was highly esteemed in business circles and by a large circle outside.

THE CITY COUNCIL Has the Authority

With respect to the proposed Fairville playground, W. F. Burditt, of the town-planning commission, told the Times-Star this morning that he was not opposed to having a playground in the new subdivision, at the place indicated by Councillor O'Brien and favored by Tuesday night's meeting. He had himself visited the place and pointed out this and another portion of the area as suitable for a playground. What he did oppose was the granting of the freemen's park, which should be reserved for industries, which were to be shut out entirely from the new subdivision. Mr. Burditt said there was a level field below the truck toward Millard, part of which the city owns, which would also make a good playground; but he had no objection to the location of one on the plan of the subdivision and the city council had accepted the plan. The council could make the necessary change for a playground if it desired to do so.

FUNERAL OF BROTHER OF SIR LOMER GOUIN.

Quebec, Feb. 26.—The funeral of Senise Guoin, brother of Sir Lomer Guoin, was held at Grandines yesterday. The obsequies were attended by Sir Lomer Guoin, Eugene and Ernest Guoin of Montreal, brothers, while Rev. Abbes C. Guoin and Arthur Guoin, also brothers, took part in the service.
