C., Oct. 9—Aigrettes or other bird plumage, whose importation is forbidden by the new tariff law, must be removed from the hats of incoming travelers and turned over to customs authorities before the travelers leave the wharf. 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




GERMAN SOLDIERS, INVADING FRANCE ARE REPULSED BY BAR MAID

Daily Hints For the Cook

with boiling water, let simmer until soft, then drain in a jelly bag. Measure the juice and to each pint of juice allow a pound of sugar. Boil the juice in a preserving kettle for five minutes, add the sugar, which should be warmed in the oven, stir until dissolved, then continue the boiling until it will jelly when dropped on a cold plate. Turn into glasses and seal when cold.

Snow Pudding Made Without Gelatine. Three tablespoons cornstarch dissolved in a little water, one-half cup of sugar. Add one pint of boiling water, cook about 20 minutes. Let cool, add beaten whites of three eggs and juice of two small lemons. Beat 10 minutes. It will thicken up after setting over night. Take

thicken up after setting over night. Take the yolks with a quart of milk and make a custard to pour over it.





"All right, Jack, old boy there's one left. Hand him that out curve." 'Two strikes! Wow! Rotten!"

Zowie! A homer! Take another base! Come in—SLIDE!" This was no major league ball game, nor yet a corner lot contest, but a hot diamond battle within the walls of Joliet penitentiary, where convicts howled with glee at crack of bat, thumped each other on the back with joy as their side other on the back with joy as their side got ahead, wrangled over the score and associated under the eye of only one guard as freely as on a public playground making a daily scene in the prison equalled nowhere else on earth.

The cause of the fun and the reason of it is the fact that Joliet has a new warden. The 1500 inmates realized it the fact day he took office, three months

warden. The 1500 inmates realized it the first day he took office, three months ago, and they have been realizing the change more and more every day. Today some of them told a reporter that the "underground railroad of the prison has almost disappeared; that if any prisoner made a move in opposition to the warden he would find practically all the rest ready to fight for their head keeper and that life has been changed for all of them because they know now "they've got another chance." 

SOME EFFECTS OF SINGLE TAX IN THE WEST

Vigorous Advocate Claims Stimulus to Building Operations and Protection Against Financial De-

(Times' Special Correspondence) Victoria, B C., Sept. 20-Years ago Wililam Lloyd Garrison wrote Henry George that "he did not believe that the adoption of the Single Tax would cure all the ills which afflict humanity." Mr. George replied "I certainly agree with George replied "I certainly agree with you that the single tax will not cure all human ills, but freedom will."

H. N. McDonald in the "Toronto Daily News" of September 18th, makes a vigorous attack on the single tax because its partial adoption has not made everyone in Vancouver wealthy and because he insists that all workingmen have a right to homes in the exclusive districts of Shaughnessy Heights, Kitslano and Fairview.

Every single taxer will agree that

Every single taxer will agree that workingmen do not today get a fair share of the products of their labor and that only the abolition of every form of privilege will ensure their getting their just deserts.

But Vancouver has not yet adopted the single tax even for city purposes, and taking the tax off improvements is only one short step toward the full single tax; but it is a step which has done all that any student of the single tax ever claimed it would do

that any student of the single tax ever claimed it would do.

It has not prevented Vancouver, Victoria and other cities from sharing to some extent in the general upset of business which has been caused by the contraction of credits and tight money due to the Balkan War and our bad banking system, but it has prevented those cit. system; but it has prevented those cit-les from suffering as severely as they would have done under the old system. June, July and August have swelled this so that the total so far is over nine million dollars. In spite of hard times and tight money and the great amount of building for the past few years, Vancouver buildings this year are double the population. Victoria's build-ing permits tell the same story. Exemp-tion of improvements from taxation was adopted in 1911 with the result that buildings doubled, being more than four million dollars against two millions under the old plan in 1910 and in 1912 doubled again, being over eight million dollars. The above mentioned figures for Vancouver and Victoria do not infor Vancouver and Victoria do not include the suburbs where the same system has had the same results, viz., more buildings with better accommodations and more substantial in character.

Mr. McDonald admits that the practical working of the system has converted to its favor almost every man who fought it bitterly four years ago. He approves the idea of taxing the rental value of the bare land, but if, he adds, "and abolish all other taxes," he has the single tax programme in the very words in which single taxers prefer to state it.




